## Chemical Dumping Proposal Brings Reactions

A dumping ground for hazardous waste, including cancer-causing agents, has been proposed by Chem-Security Systems, Inc. for a 310 acre site six miles east of Cunningham, Texas, in southern Red River County. The site is within the Sulphur River Watershed, four miles north of Hagansport, and is owned by John Ward of Fulbright.

Chem-Security has an option, and plans to buy the land if core drill tests, completed last week, are favorable. Results of the tests are expected to be available within two or three weeks.

Representatives of the company said Thursday in a meeting with local newspaper owners Bob and Pat Wright that the site

would be used to dispose of any substance which could be handled safely, according to the conditions of a permit which has yet to be issued by Vernon.

"We will be involved not only in the disposal of solid waste, but in the recovery of the Environmental Protection Agency. The only substance which the company spokesmen completely ruled out for disposal at the site was low-level nuclear waste.

Although company spokesmen said Thursday that the dump could be an asset to the area by attracting industry, the primary source for the hazardous waste material initially would be Longview, Tyler and Dallas. The chemicals would be transported to the site in a liquid state, with the most logical routing along

I-30 from Dallas, through Mt. Vernon to the Red River County Site. Waste from Longview and Tyler could also be routed through Mt. Vernon to the marketplace," Roger Nelson, business development manager for Chem-Security Systems, a Bellevue, Washington based company said Thursday. "We already have the technology for recovering other substances from waste products, but the process is too expensive now. Later, when the economics are right, we could remove waste from the dump and extract the substance," Nelson said. "We can only dispose of solid waste material," Nelson continued, "no liquids, so we have to take the water from the waste at the site, then treat the water to be sure it is absolutely safe

before we release the water."

Owners of the site expressed confidence in the safety of the operation. Mrs. Ward stated last week, "We have land all around the 310 acres that Chem-Security has an option on, and if we weren't convinced that it was harmless we wouldn't have done this."

Sen. Ed Howard and Rep. L. P. (Pete) Patterson have called for public forums on the dump site, in which the company would be required to explain the site to the citizens of the region. Representative Patterson stated that "I'm trying to keep an open mind, but it's hard. I am very much concerned that such a facility

should be located so close to the Sulphur River Watershed. Patterson also said that he considered water one of the primary resources of East Texas, and that with only a limited number of sites for more lakes and reservoirs of the area he was concerned that such a chemical dumping facility might limit them further.

"I'm also very concerned about our high rainfall in this area, and the drainage. Flooding from Sulphur is another concern."

Patterson concluded that "until they convince me, and the people of the area that this thing is 100 per cent safe, and that it is the best for us, I'm against it." He also

noted that he would be logging any calls or letters concerning this matter for the next thirty days to get public opinion, and wanted a forum on the matter.

Congressman Sam B. Hall stated he was contacted by an attorney some months ago, who said they wanted to locate a chemical waste disposal plant somewhere in the First District. He gave them the names of several area realtors after being assured that there would be absolutely no nuclear or radioactive waste dumped at the site.

Chem-Security held a meeting in Bogata on

Thursday afternoon, with four or five people notified of it.

Among those present was Leslie H. Taylor, superintendent of Prairiland Schools, in whose district the facility would be.

Taylor stated that he had no prior knowledge of the plant, and the people picked up and took him to the meeting without prior notification. He stated that "At present I can't be anything but against this thing. I believe the company is honest and open, and they have had no accidents within the five years they've operated similar plants, but the long-range effects concern me very much."

Besides, Taylor said, what the people in the area want is my major concern. "There will have to be a public meeting and additional information before I'll be satisfied."

Bogata Mayor, John Worth Hood, expressed concern that neither he nor any council members had been contacted about the meeting.

First National Bank of Deport president, Hugh Jeffus, Jr., expressed unhappiness that no one from the city of Deport had been contacted about the meeting, and stated "What will be the long range effects of such a facility? While it is monitored it should be safe, but what happens when the dump is full and the company no longer monitors it?"

It's very hard for someone who gets upset at dumped garbage bags to keep from becoming extremely concerned over the prospect of a chemical waste dumping site in our area.

Although the company appears to be of the highest quality, and regulations for such facilities are strict, the very fact is that such operations are so new that their long-range effects are truly unknown.

It is something that all

area citizens should give careful thought to, for once it is done, there is no turning back. At no point after such an operation begins can it be reversed.

The company states that such a facility would bring in new industry, yet admits that much of their contract for waste disposal would be from Tyler, Longview, Dallas, and perhaps even New Orleans.

If waste dumping facilities are safe, and they may very well be, why aren't they

located closer to the plants? Why must they be put in isolated areas?

Questions should be asked NOW, no later, and a serious look at this proposal taken.

We have something very precious in our area—clean air, water and rich soil. Although this company promises that a waste dumping facility would not harm that, we must consider, is it worth even the slightest chance of losing our natural resources to provide a dumping site for industry?

## State, Environmentalists Disagree On Chem-Nuclear

Although officials with the Oregon State Government have nothing but praise for Chem-Security, Inc., a Washington based company which proposes to build a chemical disposal site near Cunningham in Red River County, at least one environmentalist in the area takes issue not only with Chem-Security, but with the

way the state of Oregon administers the waste disposal laws.

Nancie Fadely, a former state representative and chairman of the House Environmental and Energy committee in Oregon, said Tuesday that "my impression is that it's a rather well run place. They have been cooperative and met all the requirements."

George Ward, a consulting civil engineer in Portland, said he has opposed the manner in which the state agencies have handled the hazardous waste disposal problem, citing the 1968 dumping of 25,000 barrels of toxic waste on a dry lake bed, Alkali Lake, and the subsequent burial of that waste by Chem-Nuclear Systems, the parent company of Chem-

Security Systems. However, the decision to bury the barrels was made by the state, and Chem-Nuclear was just the contractor on the job. When the barrels began leaking, cancer-causing agents were released into the ground water.

"Alkali Lake was just a horrible experience that the state and everyone else learned from," Gary

Whitehouse with the "Lakeview Examiner" said Tuesday. "I think everyone is pretty happy at this time. The state is taking steps to see that it doesn't happen again, and dealing with it in a fairly realistic way."

The Red River County site, according to Roger Nelson, business development manager for Chem-Security, will probably be composed of

trenches 200' wide, 600' long and 40' deep packed with clay. The site will be open until filled, kept dry by draining and treating the rainwater which falls into the trench, then closed with another layer of clay. The trench will then be covered with topsoil and planted with grass, Nelson said. In addition to the packing around the trenches, the area will be

encircled with monitoring wells. Money to ensure the continuous monitoring of the site for 30 years following closure in the event of the total collapse of the company is placed in trust in three different funds, Nelson commented, including money which pays for the expense of the government to monitor the site while in



Dear Editor:  
I am a citizen of Southwest Red River County and proud of it. Perhaps Red River County has had some problem in the past, but in my opinion we have had no problems as un-surmountable as the problem we will have if there is a Chemical Waste Disposal facility located in Red River County.

There was no one in this community, and most of the people of Red River County did not know that anyone was considering building a chemical waste disposal plant in the county until they read the article in the Paris News on Wednesday, April 29, 1981. Although it was stated in that edition that a representative of the company would meet with leaders of Red River County on Thursday the people were not informed as to the place or the time the meeting would take place, however, I read in the Friday, May 1 edition of the Paris News that a meeting was held in Bogata Texas on Thursday, and a resident of Lamar County, Leslie Taylor was quoted. Why would Lamar County citizens be notified and not Red River County residents, along with those in Cass and Bowie County, since these counties are affected by the water from the Sulphur River Water shed.

I live three-tenths of a mile from the proposed site of the disposal plant, and I was not notified that such a facility was being considered, under my very nose. Is this the definition of being honest and wanting to keep everything above board?

Although I am not a geologist, I have lived fifty years of my fifty-five years within a few miles of my present home. I definitely think there would be some seepage thereby reaching Sulphur River.

We have to think of the people who live in the vicinity and the people who get their drinking water from Sulphur River area, such as Texarkana, Hooks, New Boston, DeKalb, Avery, Annona and about one-third of the rural area of Red River County.

I consider this proposed plant dangerous and I am opposed to it.

## Burglars Hit Deport, Bogata

Two burglaries, one in Bogata and the other in Deport, have similarities which cause authorities and store owners to believe they may have been committed by the same people.

On Wednesday night, or early Thursday morning the back door of Pat's Place, a women's clothing store, was broken down and merchandise in value of around \$2400 or more was taken from the store.

On Thursday night burglars attempted to force entry into the back door of Davidson's Department Store, and when unable to open the back door threw a brick through the plate glass front door to gain entry.

At both places burglars took specific sizes, and picked out the more expensive items.

Footprints at Pat's Place indicated that one of the thieves was either a very slender man or a woman.

The burglars matched outfits, and picked out co-

ordinated ensembles. They took Junior and childrens sizes.

At Davidson's Department Store they took two sizes of men's clothing and one child's size in jeans, shirts and underwear.

They selected only the expensive sheets, bath mat sets and towels.

Apparently tanking their time they matched gowns and robes up in size and color, and took only the most expensive men's shirts available.

Boots and hats in several sizes and styles were stolen.

Jo Nell Davidson, owner of the store, stated that merchandise totaled somewhere over \$4000 had been taken.

A dropped plastic bag, with several hats in it, indicated that the thieves had come prepared with their own bags to take away merchandise.

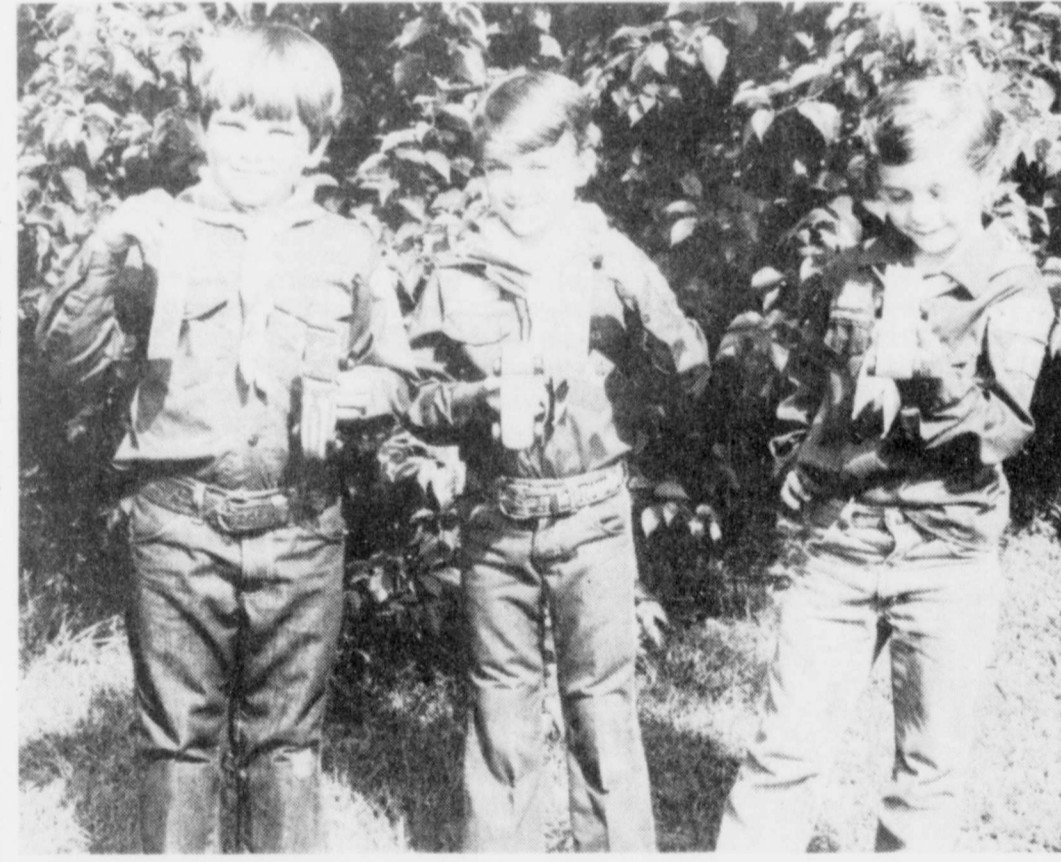
The case is currently under investigation by both Lamar and Red River County Sheriff offices.

This method of chemical disposal, "entombment" is not the answer to chemical disposal, according to engineer Ward, who has been awarded two National Science Foundation grants for the purpose of studying the disposal of chemical waste.

"Soil microorganisms can be used to totally devour highly toxic chemicals," according to Ward, who says he proved the theory in a laboratory.

The microorganism method is already in use by Chem-Nuclear in the Arlington, Oregon, plant, according to company president Patrick Wicks, who says there are still a lot of chemicals which can't be handled in this way.

Ward also takes issue with Wicks, who worked as the administrator of Hazardous Waste Management Section in Land Quality Division of Oregon Department of Water Quality before going to work for Chem-Nuclear.

"Wicks wrote the permit for Chem-Nuclear, then quit and went to work for them," Ward charged.

"I was involved in the writing of the permit," Wicks said, "but I feel there was no conflict of interest here, even though we knew there would be suspicions. I came from industry into government, and feel quite comfortable going back into industry. I felt I had accomplished all I could in government. They (Chem-Nuclear) offered me a job with the prior approval of my boss, the head of the department of environmental quality."

While with the government, Wicks filed suit against the company which dumped the barrels on Alkali Lake, but lost the case in court. The loss made the state of Oregon responsible for cleanup of the site. Within a year of the time Wicks left his government job to work for Chem-Nuclear, the company was awarded the contract to bury the barrels at Alkali Lake.

In spite of the charges of conflicts, Chem-Nuclear has no record of problems in the 11 years it has been operating a low-level nuclear waste site in Barnwell, S.C., and no major problems with the Arlington, Ore., site.

"We have had some problems with leakage at the Arlington site in trenches lined with asphalt," Wicks said, "but they were contained and controlled. We are phasing this method (asphalt lining) out of our operation."

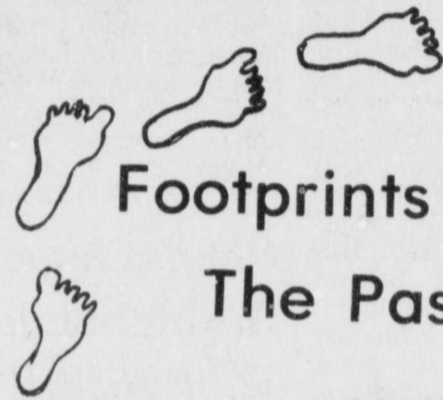

### Tornado Season Is Here

The season for nature's most destructive storm—the tornado—peaks this month. The number of death attributed to tornadoes over the past 25 years averages out at 95 annually, while the

number of yearly sightings runs from 700 to 800. Although the number of storms reaches its height in May, tornadoes have occurred in every month of the year.

With this in mind, the American Red Cross has issued the following safety tips.

When a tornado threatens, your immediate action can save your life. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls, protect your head. In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, factories, offices and shopping centers, go to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floors are considered safest. In high-rise buildings, go to interior small rooms or hallways. In mobile homes or vehicles, leave them and go to substantial structures. If there is no shelter nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch, ravine, or culvert with your hands shielding your head.

REMEMBER: Tornado watch means tornadoes and severe thunderstorms are possible. Tornado warning means tornado detected, take shelter immediately. The Red Cross also advises that individuals listen to radio and TV for latest National Weather Service Bulletins.

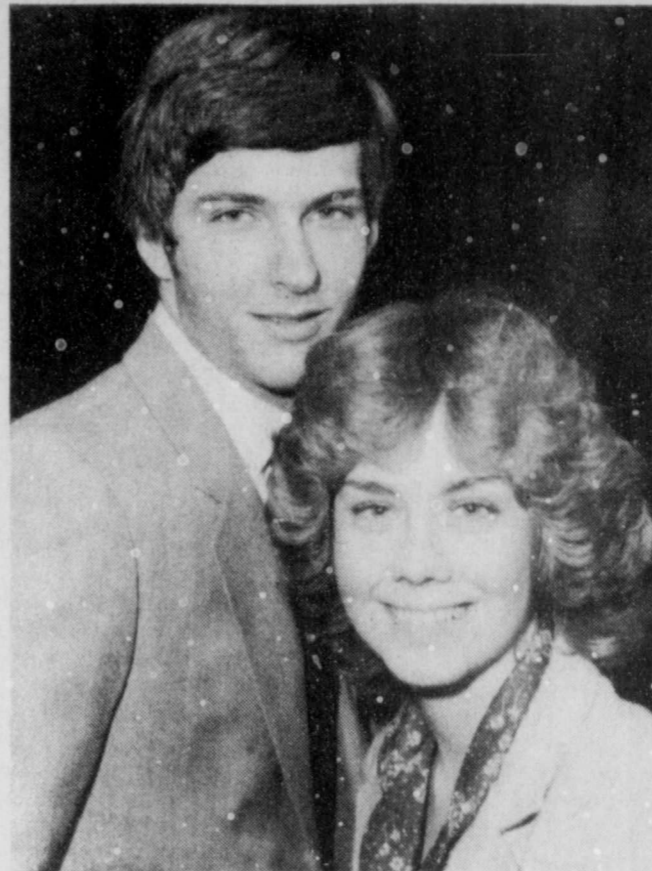

## Minimum Tillage Has Advantages

Minimum tillage is a system of farming in which cultivation is limited to those operations essential to crop production. It uses herbicides to control competition. The ideal system is one that prepares a seedbed, plants the seed, and applies herbicides and fertilizer in one operation. The benefits depend upon the type of system installed, crops grown and equipment used. With most minimum tillage systems only one or two cultural operations are required. Fewer trips across the field mean savings in labor, fuel and equipment. The residues left on the soil keep the temperature cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter. Plus you get only about half the direct evaporation losses from your fields. Probably the most important benefit is reduced soil erosion. It contributes to environmental improvement by reducing pollution from sediment and blowing dust. On land susceptible to erosion, minimum tillage can often keep soil losses so low that cultivation could become feasible. However, this does not mean Class VII land becomes capable of cropland. Double-cropping soybeans after wheat is becoming more popular in Red River County. Minimum tillage is ideally suited to this type of cropping system. In fact the wheat could be harvested and the soybeans planted in the same field the same day. Before starting a minimum tillage system, there are a number of points to consider. Special equipment is needed to plant in the previous years residue. This equipment must be purchased or adapted from equipment already on hand.

Herbicides will take the place of cultivation. Pre-plant, pre-emerge or post-emerge herbicides will be used. The proper chemicals along with the timeliness of application are extremely important. Proper fertilization along with other good farming practices are necessary to insure good results. Minimum tillage is a proven practice that can save time, cost, soil moisture and much more.
