Trustees Approve Contracts For School Employees

The Board of Trustees of the Talco-Bogata Schools met in regular session at Rivercrest on Tuesday, March 9, 1982 at 7 p.m. with all members present.

The major item on the agenda was the consideration of teacher con-

tracts and employment for the 1982-83 school year. All teachers who had been recommended by the administration were approved by the Board for employment for the coming school year.

Board approval was given

for John F. Cook of Talco and Travis Hale of Bogata to be submitted as the school district's nominations to serve as members of the Review Board of the Red River County Appraisal District. The Talco-Bogata School District is a member

of the Red River County Appraisal District which has the responsibility to appraise all properties in the school district with these new values to become effective for the 1982 tax year.

Related to the new values that will be used for the 1982

school year, the Board of Trustees approved a 40 percent exemption on all residence homesteads in the district for the 1982 tax year. This exemption will be 40 percent of the market value of each residence homestead with the exemption being no

less than \$5,000. This exemption will be in addition to other exemptions previously approved by the school district and or state.

In other and final matters, the various financial reports were approved; Textbook Committee Report was

accepted, and approval was given to the purchase of needed materials for repair of the Talco Elementary School roof. Also, approval was given for the administration to gather information and work up plans for needed work at the football field.

A special meeting of the Board has been called for Monday, April 5 for the purpose of approving the results of the April 3 trustee election. The next regular meeting of the Board will be Tuesday, April 13 at 7 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.

The teams play one another in basketball tournaments. Last Thursday the Bogata Rockets placed first in the tournament, the Flames second and the Falcons third.

Texas Cities Receive \$48.9 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday sent checks

totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collection ever distributed—29 percent over the same period in 1981.

This record payment, reflecting taxable sales made by Texas businesses in January, is the second record payment in two months, but Bullock added a note of caution.

"Record sales can be one indicator of good times, but they are not an indicator of profit margins. These taxes

are based on sales price or market value. True, Texans are spending more but these figures don't tell us what the merchants or suppliers or manufacturers are having to pay for the goods they buy."

The biggest check this month went to Houston, which received \$10.3 million, compared with \$8 million last March.

Locally, Blossom has received \$2,228.45 to date in 1982, a 20.39 percent increase over the same date in 1981.

Bogata received a check for \$735.95 for net payment this period, comparable to

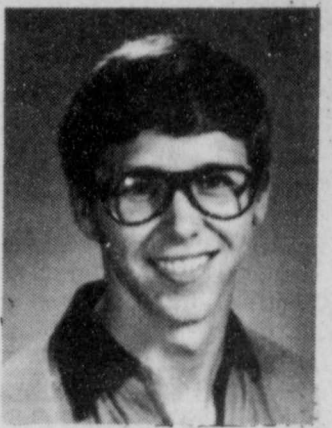

as it took almost all day to get all the kids back to where they belonged.

Sometimes it was the horses and mules that were switched around, just anything to give the smart set a laugh and to cause confusion, but everyone, or most everyone, took it as something to break the monotony of hard work and little money to show for it.

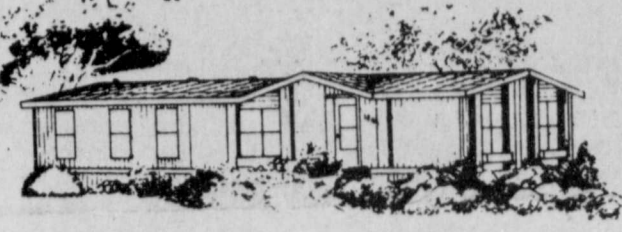

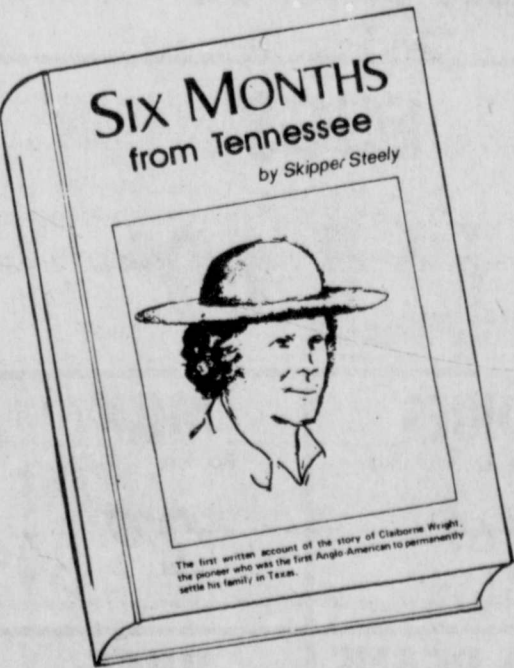
