The Rev. Ray Evers of the Church of God will preach the Easter Sunrise message. This will be a community gathering and everyone is invited to share in this early morning worship service.


VFW Donates **To Scouts**

Warning Period Expires **For Liability Insurance**

The 90-day DPS warning pointed out. "That number period for the new manlaw expires this week. After year." midnight Wednesday, March 31, state troopers will begin issuing citations to drivers who fail to show proof of insurance when such information is requested.

The law, which became effective January 1, 1982, requires all drivers to carry minimum liability coverage for bodily injury of \$10,000 per person and property damage of \$5,000. Colonel Jim Adams, DPS

director, said the law is encouraging more drivers to obtain the required coverage. "DPS figures show that

during 1981 approximately 73 percent of drivers involved in reportable accidents had insurance," Adams the

for the first offense and from \$200 to \$1,000 for subsequent violations. In addition, a conviction under the new law

will result in the suspension of the violator's driver license and motor vehicle registration unless the violator establishes and maintains proof of financial responsibility for five years from the conviction date.
