"Joe?" she replied.

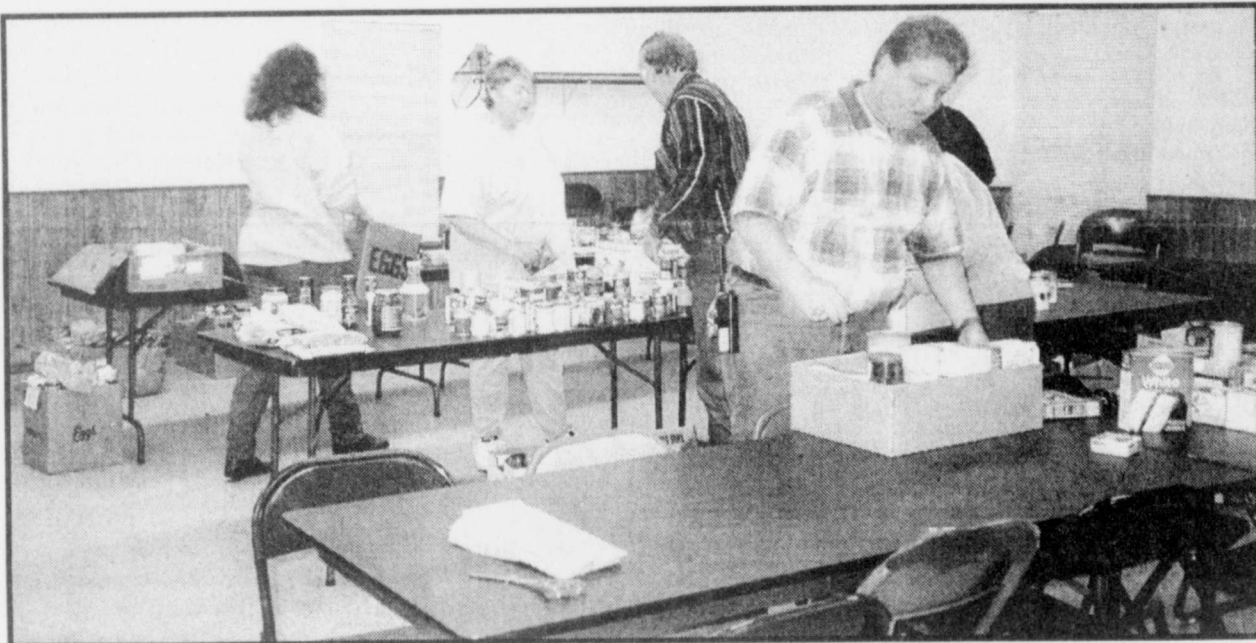
"Yes, that's me, plain old Joe. Pass a kindness along for me, will you please".

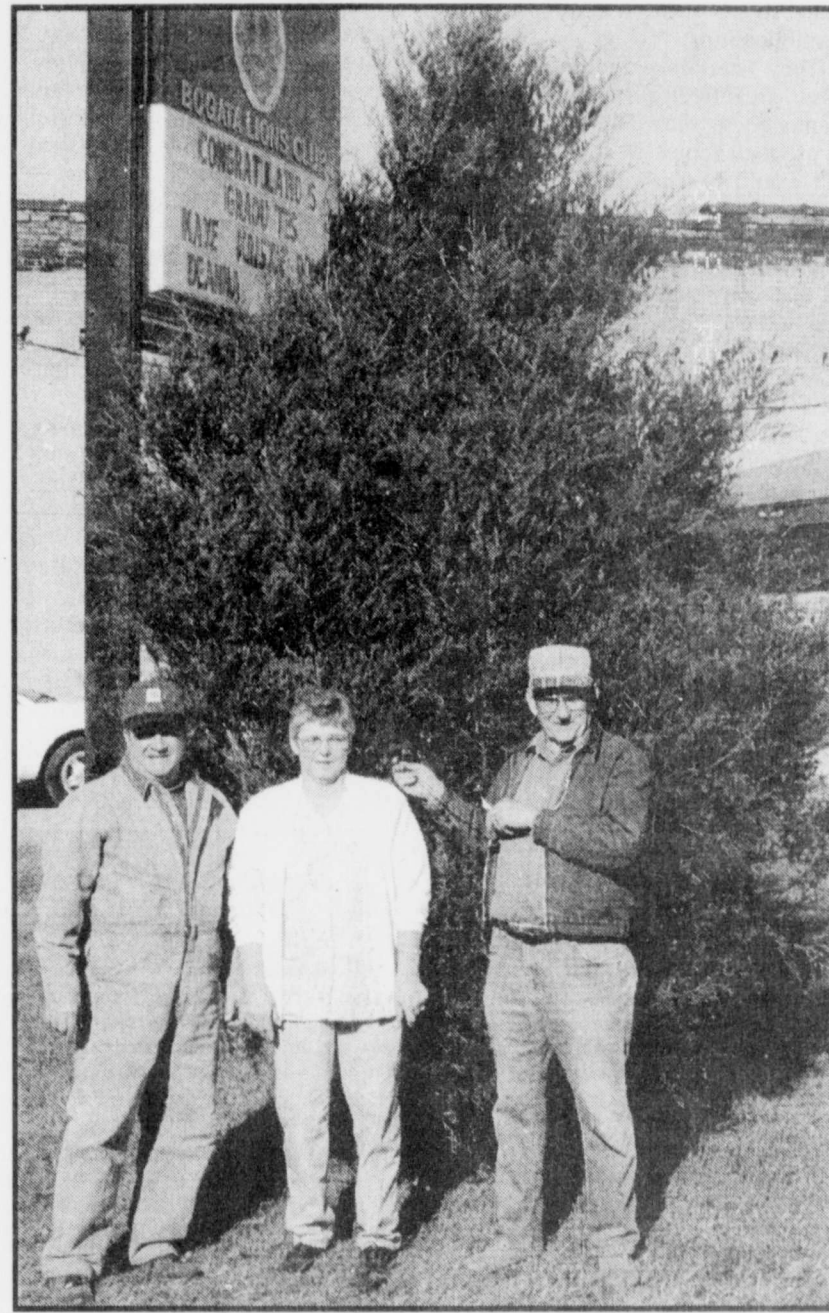

Nanalee Nichols, spokesperson for the citizens committee working to keep the clinic open says "we are asking everyone to be patient, we have some good possibilities here, and we are not going to rest until we have done absolutely everything possible to see our clinic survives".

They certainly come up with some great recipes each year and thanks go to these ladies for letting us use their recipes.

I would like to take this time to wish everyone out there a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year and hope that 1999 brings you all that you hope for and we will see you in the kitchen!

Chicken Crescent Wreath by Patsy Norrell-refrigerated crescent rolls is the center of this recipe and it is topped with soup and veggies along with water chestnuts and cooked chicken. Wonderful for the holidays!

Chocolate Fudge by Juanita Sparks-If unsweetened chocolate is used, decrease butter by 2 tablespoons. She likes to use cocoa. She almost always doubles the recipe when she makes it. By cooking the pecans in the candy, a toasted taste is achieved.

Divinity Candy by Juanita Sparks-this recipe was given to

Juanita in the early days of her marriage by Mary Taylor of Cunningham and she told her the secret of successful divinity was the crackling sound! It works every time.

Mixed Nut Turtle by Nanalee Nichols-Use mixed nuts that include macadamia, almonds and cashews.

Vanishing Oatmeal Raisin Cookies by Bocky Norman-As usual, Bock always turns in a wonderful cookie recipe and this year is no exception!


Almond Filled Cookie Cake by Dawne Darden-This can also be made into tartlets as well as cake form.

Travis Fleming died Friday, December 18 at Baylor Medical Center, Dallas.

Chicken Crescent Wreath Patsy Norrell

- 2 tubes refrigerated crescent rolls
- 1 cup shredded Co-Jack cheese
- 2/3 cup condensed cream of chicken soup
- 1/2 cup fresh broccoli
- 1/2 cup chopped sweet red pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped water chestnuts
- 1 can white chicken-drained or 3/4 cup cubed chicken
- 2 tablespoon chopped onion

- Arrange crescent rolls on a 12" pizza pan, forming a ring with pointed ends facing the outer edge of pan and wide ends overlapping. Combine the remaining ingredients; spoon over wide end of rolls. Fold points over filling and tuck under wide ends. Filling will be visible. Bake at 375 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until golden brown. Yield 6-8 servings.

Chocolate Fudge Juanita Sparks

- 1/2 cup cocoa or 2 squares of chocolate grated
- 2/3 cup milk-scalded
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 tablespoons corn syrup
- 4 tablespoons butter or oleo
- 1 cup pecans
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

- Mix cocoa, sugar and corn syrup; add scalded milk and then pecans. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved; bring to a boil; uncover and boil for 3 minutes. Uncover and cook, stirring frequently, until it reaches a soft ball stage or 236 degrees. Remove from heat and add butter. Cool to lukewarm or 110 degrees without stirring. Add vanilla and beat vigorously until very thick and begins to lose its gloss. Quickly pour into buttered pan. When firm, cut into squares.

Divinity Candy Juanita Sparks

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 1/2 cup Karo syrup
- 2 egg whites-stiffly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup nuts

- Mix sugar, water and syrup in a saucepan and cool until a thread spins about 6 inches or 236 degrees on a candy thermometer. While this is cooking, beat the egg whites. Add about 1/3 of this mixture to the egg whites and beat until mixture begins to thicken slightly. While beating this, continue cooking syrup mixture until it reaches a hard crack stage (test by dropping a spoonful into a cup of cold water and when you can hear crackling sound, it is ready). Add this to egg white mixture and continue beating until thick. Add vanilla and nuts. When it begins to lose its gloss, quickly drop by spoons onto a wax paper lined cookie sheet.

Mixed Nut Turtles Nanalee Nichols

- 3/4 cup soft butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 can mixed nuts (with macadamia, almonds and cashews)
- 1-1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate morsels
- 2 teaspoons shortening

Beat butter at medium speed of an electric mixer until creamy; gradually add sugar, beating well. Add egg yolk and vanilla, beating well. Add flour, beating until just blended. Drop dough

- by level teaspoonsful 2 inches apart onto ungreased cookie sheets. Flatten each ball of dough to a 2 inch circle, using fingers. Cut any large nuts in half. Press nuts firmly into outside top edges of cookies. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until edges of cookies are lightly brown. Cool on cookie sheet 1 minute. Carefully remove cookies to wire racks to cool completely. Place chocolate and shortening in top of double broiler over hot water; stir until melted. Spoon heaping teaspoon melted chocolate onto center of each cookie. Spread and smooth chocolate between nuts. Let set until chocolate hardens. Yield 26 cookies.

Vanishing Oatmeal Raisin Cookies Bocky Norman

- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1-1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 cups oatmeal
- 1 cup raisins

- Heat oven to 350 degrees. Beat together butter and sugars, add vanilla and eggs. Mix dry ingredients, add oatmeal and raisins, mix well with butter-sugar mixture. Drop by rounded teaspoonsful onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes. Makes about 4 dozen.

Almond Filled Cookie Cake Dawne Darden

- Crust:
- 2-2/3 cup flour
- 1-1/3 cup sugar
- 1-1/3 cup butter-softened (not margarine)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 egg

- Heat oven to 325 degrees. Grease 8 inch spring formed pan. Combine all crust ingredients. Divide dough in half and spread half in bottom of greased pan to form crust.

Chocolate Almond Cookies Ann Lee

- 1 cup (2 sticks) butter or margarine softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup Hershey's cocoa
- 1/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips or mini chips
- additional sugar
- blanched slivered almonds

Beat butter and 1 cup sugar until fluffy. Add egg, almond vanilla extract; beat well. Combine flour, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda and salt; gradually add

- to butter mixture, beating to form smooth dough. Stir in chocolate chips. If necessary, refrigerate dough about 1 hour or until firm enough to handle. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Shape dough into 1-1/8 inch balls; roll in sugar. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Place 3 slivered almonds on top of each; press lightly. Bake 9-10 minutes or until set. Cool slightly. Remove from cookie sheet to wire rack. Cool completely. About 3-1/2 dozen cookies.

Toasted Oatmeal Cookies Patsy Norrell

- 1-1/2 cup regular oats
- 2 cups brown sugar-packed
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 2-1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/3 cup buttermilk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup dates
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup raisins

- Toast oats under broiler-stir frequently. Set aside. Cream sugar, shortening and eggs. Combine flour, soda, baking powder, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg. Add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk. Stir in vanilla. Add oats, dates, nuts and raisins. Mix thoroughly. Drop by teaspoonsful. Bake 10-12 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 7-1/2 dozen.

Crunchy Orange Slice Cookies Juanita Taylor

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups unsifted flour
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup chopped orange slices
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup coconut
- 1 cup oats
- 2 cups corn flakes

Mix well. Drop by teaspoonsful onto cookie sheet. Bake about 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes approximately 8 dozen.

Chicken Salad Balls Juanita Taylor

- 1 cup chopped cooked chicken
- 1 tablespoons chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped pimento
- dash of hot sauce
- 1 cup more or less chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise

Combine all ingredients, mixing well. Chill 3-4 hours and shape into tiny balls. Yield about 2 dozen balls.

Skillet Cookies Dot Nichols

- 1/4 pound margarine
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped dried apricots
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- 2 heaping cups Rice Krispies

Melt margarine in skillet, then beat eggs and add sugar. Add dates and apricots. Cook 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Then add vanilla, nuts and cereal. While warm, roll into balls, then roll in coconut. Refrigerate 1 hour before serving.

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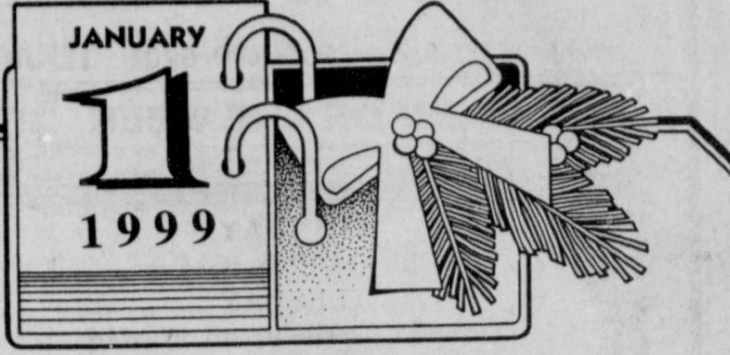
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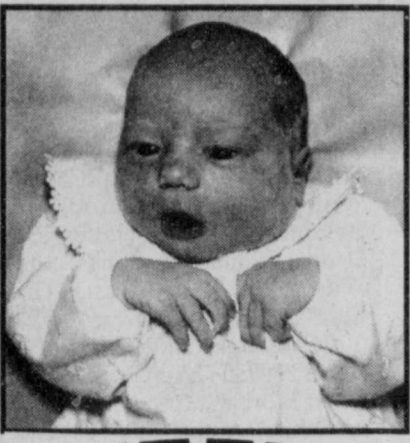

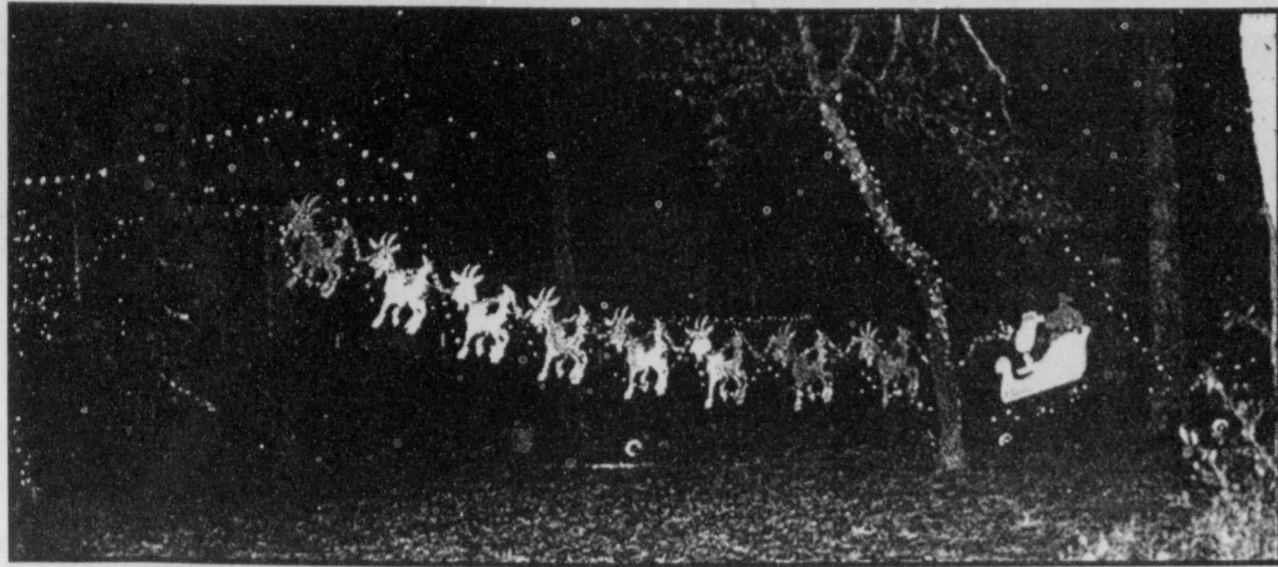


ARE SANDALS SAFE?

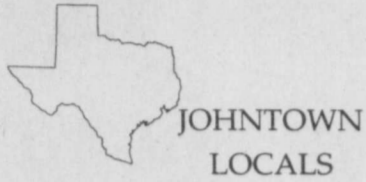

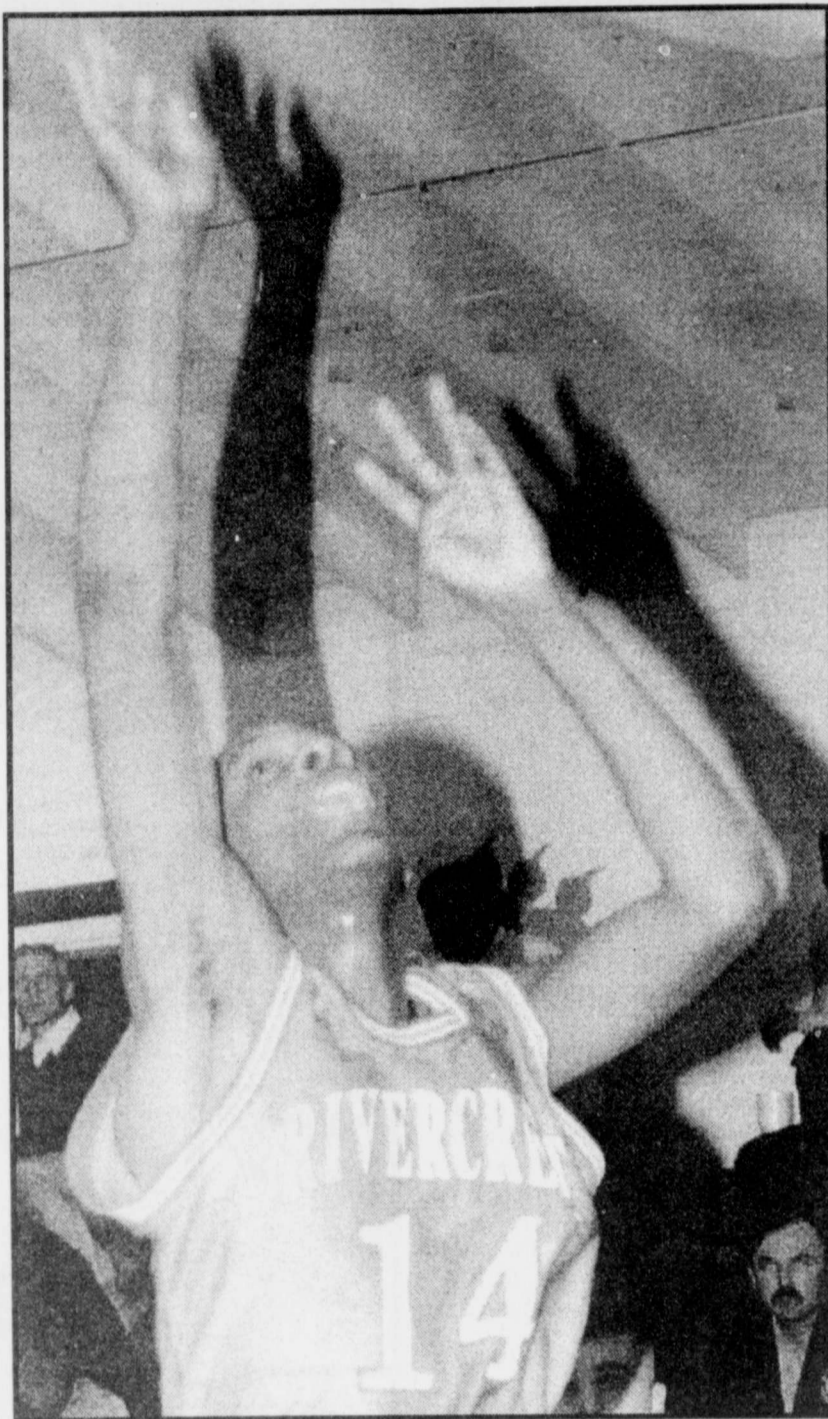

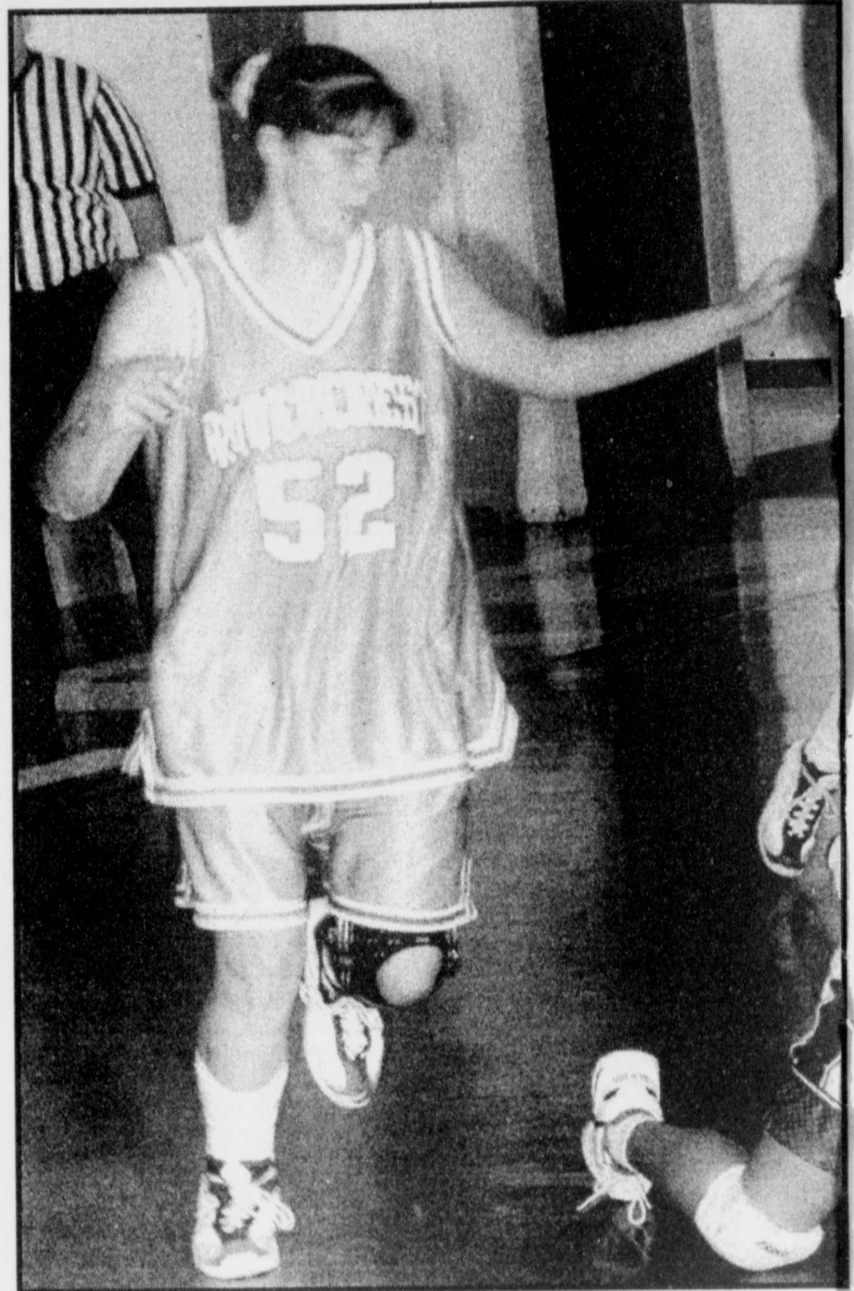

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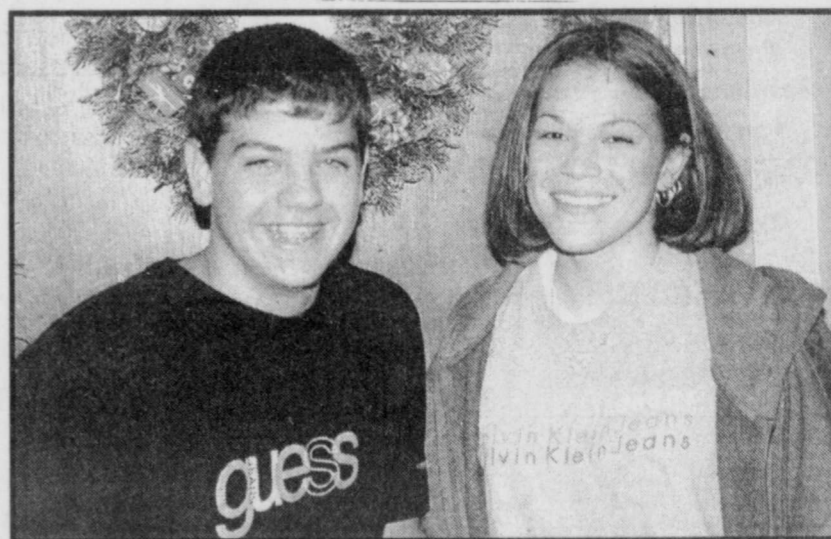
Christmas From The Heart Welcomes all Christmas Day

A nativity from the 1850s

In this and other recent Christmas seasons, the media have been reporting "living nativity scenes" as something new. In reality, Bogata's first example of such a scene appeared almost a century and a half ago, in 1850.

We have no details and no pictures, but the evidence is official. The federal census-taker took down the bare facts when he appeared on horseback at the cabin of the William and Mary Humphreys family, the first settlers at the site of the future town of Bogata, in early December of that year. (Their cabin then stood a few feet north of the site of the present-day First Baptist Church in northern Bogata)

After listing the Humphreys couple and their children, the record appears at first glance to be just a reminder that human slavery, now only a part of our distant history, was still a grim reality. The "slave schedule" indicates two African slaves as part of the household. A slave who was in those days not even accorded the dignity of a personal name was listed as a black male, thirty years old. Another nameless black male was shown to be "4/12ths" of a year old.

The inevitable conclusion is that the older man was father of the four-months-old infant and that the mother had died in childbirth, or shortly thereafter, of what was then called "childbed fever". The account is a sad memento of pioneer life in northern Texas. But that is not the whole picture, or the end of the story.

The census also shows that the Humphreys household included two teen-age daughters, Mary, thirteen and her sister Elizabeth, fifteen. The natural maternal instincts of the two girls make it a virtual certainty

that, as Christmas approached in 1850, a real, live baby, whose care fell in large part to them, replaced their dolls. The infant's "manger" would in all likelihood have been an oak-splint basket, or perhaps a roughly-made crib that had previously held younger siblings of the two girls.

As the girls fed the child, or rocked and cuddled him and lent him a finger for his tiny ones to clutch, they doubtless had thoughts paralleling those of an earlier Mary and Elizabeth...that owing to the circumstances of his birth, the child was fated to have a difficult future.

It would be hard for us to imagine, as we approach the bi-Millennium, a more faithful reenactment of the nativity scene of Jesus of Nazareth.

Unfortunately, the sequels to this little story are only partly known. As for the Humphreys sisters who reenacted the roles of the Mary and Elizabeth whose story was detailed in the gospel of Luke, we know that they married and were the forebears of dozens of Bogatans.

Of the little orphan slave-child who played the part of the baby Jesus, the rest of his life is lost to history. In the census of 1860, there is a child, still nameless on the record, who may have starred in the living nativity scene of the previous decade, but even this identification is uncertain. We suggest no parallel for Joseph of Nazareth's flight into Egypt to save the infant Jesus from the wrath of Herod.

It is comforting to speculate, however, that the "baby Jesus" of 1850 could have survived well into the twentieth century, and may be the ancestor of many Americans celebrating the Nativity in 1998.



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
