This week's Cook is for those hot ing in an air-tight plastic bag. Be summer days when you don't feel like turning on that oven or taking time to prepare a lot for mealtime. Cook it ahead and freeze it!

Here are a few simple rules to go

1) Place prepared and cooked food in the freezer with the temperature set to 0 degrees as soon as possible after preparing it. Food that is very hot should be cooled down first. This keeps the temperature in the freezer even and keeps other foods from becoming thawed.

2) To cool food more quickly and evenly, move it to another larger pan or divide into the portions you wish to freeze. The hot pan may also be placed in the sink with just enough water to cover the bottom of pan. If dish is a sauce or other liquid, stir it often to cool faster.

3) Freeze food in airtight, moisture-resistant packages to avoid freezer burn and retain the best qual-

4) Double wrap foods. Such as wrapping in foil first and then plac-

sure to remove air bubbles

5) Divide your food portions into the best size for your family.

Make-Ahead Meatballs

4 eggs 2 cups dry bread crumbs 1/2 finely chopped onion l tablespoon salt

2 teaspoons Worchestershire sauce 1/2 teaspoon white pepper 4 pounds lean ground beef

In a large bowl, beat eggs. Add next five ingredients. Add beef; mix well. Shape into I-inch balls. Makes about 12 dozen. Place in single layers in ungreased baking pans and bake at 400 degrees for 10-15 minutes; turning often and drain. Cool and freeze.

Spaghetti and Meatballs package spaghetti jar spaghetti sauce or homemade 30 meatballs-thawd

grated parmesan cheese Cook spaghetti according to package directions. Meanwhile, in saucepan, combine sauce and meatballs; cover and simmer for 15-20 minutes or until meatballs are heated through. Serve or spaghetti and top with parmesan cheese.







#### **PROPERTY TAX PROTEST AND** APPEAL PROCEDURES

The law gives property owners the right to rotest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal proures if you have a concern about:

\*the market or special appraised value

placed on your property \*the unequal appraisal of your property
\*the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll

\*any exemptions that may apply to you \*the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal

\*the taxable status of your property
\*the local governments which should be

taxing your property
\*the ownership of property
\*the change of use of land receiving special

\*any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district, (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB is an independent board of citizens

that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your nearing, you may ask to review the evidence

the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. ou or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 101 West Broadway, Clarksville, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order form which the appeal is taken.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 101 W. Broadway, Clarksville, Texas. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Divi-sion at P.O. Box 13528, Austin, Texas 78711-3528.

#### **Deadline for Filing Protests** with the ARB

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more formation.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district in-formed you that you are losing agricultural ap-

praisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to
