Only women get breast cancer. Estimated annually figures show that about 1,600 men a year get breast cancer and about 400 die from it. But it's mainly a women's breast cancer.

Only women with known risk factors get breast cancer. Over $70 \%$ of women with breast cancer have no identifiable risk factors other than being women.

A lump in your breast means you have breast cancer. Over $\mathbf{8 0} \%$ of lumps are benign. They are very common, but any unusual lump should be evaluated by a physician.

Breast self-examination is enough to detect breast cancer.
BSE is just one part of the early detection program and should be combined with regular professional breast exams and regular mammograms for women over 40. A regular professional breast exams and regular mammograms
monthly self breast exam for women ages 20 to 29 , and a clinical breast exam by a health care professional is recommended every 3 years.
Mammograms have no benefit for women under $\mathbf{5 0}$. More than $\mathbf{2 0} \%$ of breast cancers are diagnosed in women under 50 .

collapses into a deep sleep now and then, he may have narcolepsy, a rare neurological disorder that can affect animals and humans
alike. alike.
While Wets may be more disturbing to the pet owner than to the pet and are not actually harmful, Coates says even one narcoleptic event should
prompt a visit to the veterinarian. Some animals grow out of their Some animals grow out of their
narcolepsy, but usually not without some veterinary treatment. If your pet is diagnosed with narcolepsy, there are medications thal may reduce the frequency of at-
tacks. Eventually, at the advice of your veterinarian, it may be pos-
sible to slowly wean the patient sible to slowly wean the patient
oft of the medication, but relapses may occur.
In addition to medication, Coates recommends keeping the
pet in an environment that will not become harmful in the event of a narcoleptic episode. This means estricting the pet from stairs, ledges and any oth
which it can fall.
If you suspect your pet's narcolepsy is causing it undue stress, remember narcoleptic pets can often be completely unaware of
heir condition. The old phrase of letting sleeping dogs lie could be harmful to your pet.
