Courthouse Rededication, Fall Festival will fill this weekend

Plans have been finalized for the rededication of the Red River county Courthouse in Clarksville on the weekend of October 25, 26 and 27th. While the interior work will not be complete, the majority of the exterior and some interior work have been completed. Limited tours will be available on Oct 26th. The event will be in conjunction with the Red River Co. Historical Society's Fall Bazaar, which has been changed from its usual weekend.

The Festival will begin on Friday with a county-wide history quiz bowl with two teams from each of the county schools. The Quiz Bowl will be held on Broadway St. between Blackmon Pharmacy and the Antique Emporium. This will be followed by the dedication of the Red River Co. Hall of Fame on the Clarksville Square. The hall of fame will be housed in the Red River County Chamber of Commerce Building, State comptroller, Carol Keeton Rylander, will be the dedicatory speaker for this event. Following the dedication of the Hall of Fame, the Clarksville Rotary Club will host

a barbecue behind the Library Thrift Shop, south of the Courthouse and the Post Office. Back by popular demand, Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys will play western swing music for everyone's dancing enjoyment. This band played at George W. Bush's inaugural ball.

The Courthouse Players will present their first performance at 7:00 P.M.. On Friday and will have performances on Saturday at 11:00 a.m., 4:00 P.M. and 5:30 P.M.. The regular cast of characters and some new characters will present an entertaining play, which is sure to bring laughter to those in attendance.

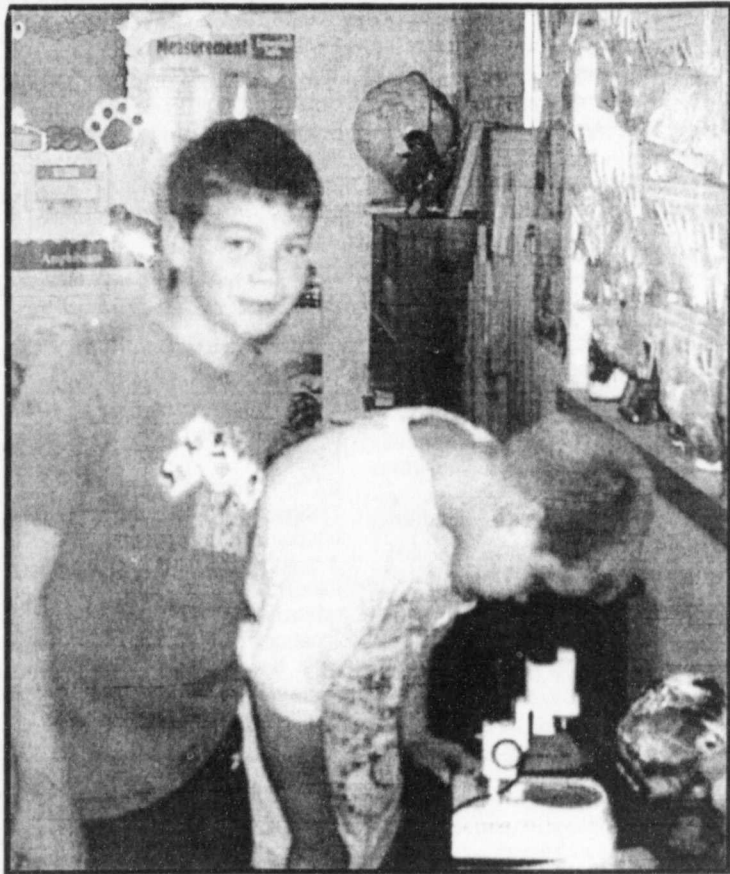
Saturday is to be a much-remembered day in the history of Red River County. In addition to the usual Fall Bazaar activities, many additional events are planned. The day will begin with a parade down North Walnut St. led by marching bands from Clarksville and Rivercrest school. Each community is invited to enter a float in the parade. The only motorized vehicles allowed will be those pulling floats.

In the afternoon, the Red River County Civic Chorus will present a concert of patriotic music at 1:00 P.M.. and the Clarksville High School Band will present a concert. This will be followed by the actual rededication of the courthouse at 2:00 P.M..

Dr. Raymond Judd, former minister of the First Presbyterian Church of Clarkville and a founder of the Red River County Historical Society, will be the dedicatory speaker at the program. The Reverends Pete Adrian and Walter Sam Rice will participate in the service, in addition to numerous local and state officials and Texas historical Commission officials.

On Saturday evening, Jody Nix and the Texas Cowboys will again play for a street dance on North Walnut Street, which will feature a spectacular fireworks show at 9:00 P.M.. Which is sponsored by Valor Telecom.

On Sunday, the recreation of an 1884 church service will be held at the First Presbyterian Church followed by a covered dish luncheon in the Christian Education Building.

Can you believe it is already Halloween time again! Time for those ghosts and goblins to make their rounds for trick or treating...

It is still another week before Halloween, but here are a few recipes that I thought you might enjoy and some can be prepared ahead of time...

FRUIT DRINK WITH

Thursday, October 24, 2002 Halloween Recipes

Fruit Drink with Wiggle Worms 12 ounce can frozen orange juice 12 ounce can apricot nectar-chilled 2-12 ounce cans lemon-lime carbonated beverage-chilled

Prepare 6 ounce can frozen pineapple-orange juice and arrange worms in bottom of 4-cup ring mold. Pour juice into mold until almost covering worms. Cover and freeze for one hour...

Sticks and Stones Snack Mix 3 cups puffed corn cereal 2 cups crispy corn and rice cereal 2-1/2 cups tiny pretzel sticks 1-1/2 cups salted mixed nuts or shelled pumpkin seeds

In 15x11x2-inch baking pan, combine cereal, pretzels and nuts or seeds. In small saucepan heat butter, Worcestershire, and spices over low heat until butter melts...

Bubbling Cranberry Sauce Links 8 ounce can cranberry sauce 1/3 cup catsup 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard 1/8 teaspoon allspice

In medium saucepan stir together sauce, catsup, lemon juice, dry mustard and all spice. Cook and stir over medium heat until bubbly. Add links and cover and cook over medium-low heat about 10 minutes or until heated through...

Shrunken Heads

8 medium apples 8 wooden craft sticks 1 cup coarsely chopped nuts 21 ounces vanilla or chocolate caramels 3 tablespoons water 6 ounces vanilla-flavored candy coating 2 teaspoons shortening variety of candies for decorating such as gumdrops, candy corn, M&M's, etc. canned frosting tubes of writing gel decorating icing Wash and dry apples. Insert wooden stick into each apple. Place on buttered baking sheet...

WIGGLE WORMS-candy worms make punch really scary! STICKS AND STONE SNACK MIX-great for all those little goblins!

BUBBLING CRANBERRY SAUCE LINKS-snack sausages swimming in red and gooey mixture.....they kids will love it!

SHRUNKEN HEADS-caramel apples you design to make your own shrunken heads!

MUMMY WRAPPED SANDWICH LOAF-wrap finished sandwich in thin dough strips and bake to make this ghoulish treat!

SPIDER WREATH COOKIES-black spiders surround these delicious cookies!

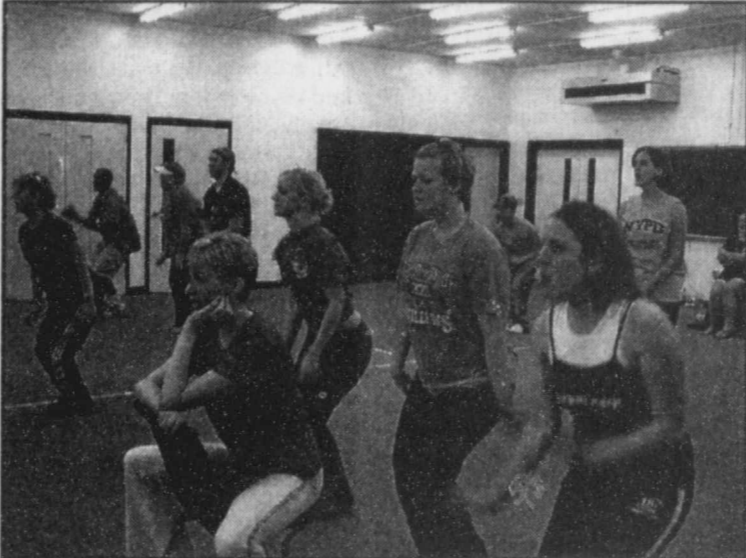

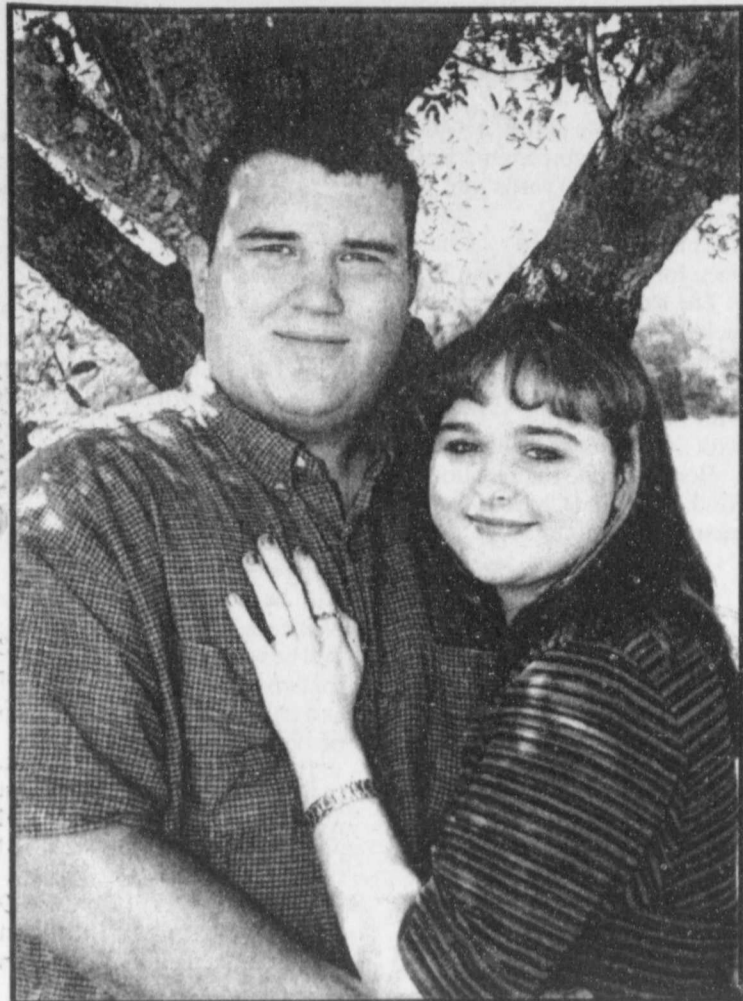

A Memorial day proclamation in 1921

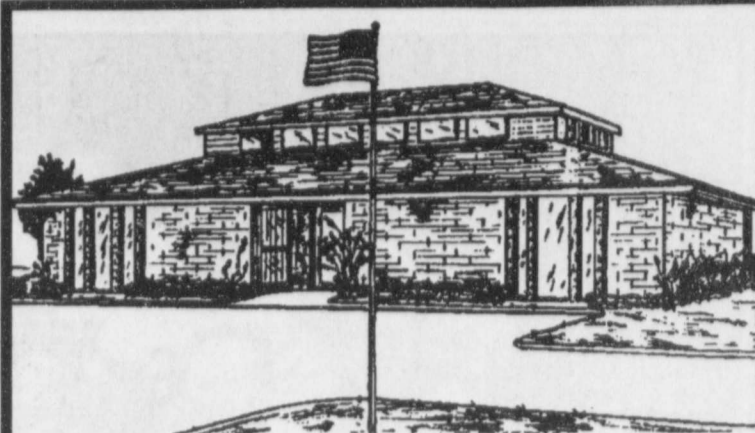
Sharon Francis found this old clipping at Deport City Hall recently, and brought it down with the comment "I wonder what would happen if we tried to declare a holiday using the words about God, and so on now?"

The story is a AP story, dated May 3, 1921 and reads as follows.

"The annual memorial day proclamation setting aside May 30 as a holiday was issued by President Harding today. The text follows:

"Whereas this nation has been conceived in prayer and devotion by men and women who were moved under God to found a nation where principles of right should form the lasting cornerstone; and whereas these principles purchased at the price of great sacrifice have been fostered by a worthy posterity, and whereas the great war has lately laid its costly demands upon our lands; now, therefore, I Warren G. Harding, President of the United States, do hereby proclaim Monday, the thirtieth day of May a day already freighted with sacred and stimulated memories, a day of public memorial. I invite my fellow citizens fittingly to pay homage on this day to a noble dead who sleep in homeland, beneath the sea, or in foreign fields so that we, who survive, might enjoy the blessings of peace and happiness and to the end that liberty and justice, without which no nation can exist, shall live forever.

"I witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and cause the seal of the United States to be fixed. Done in the District of Columbia, this third day of May, in the year of our Lord, 1921, and of the independence of the United States.

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not cotton growers shall establish a boll weevil eradication program in the area designated by rule as the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and pay a maximum annual assessment in the amount of \$13.25 per land acre of cotton each year until costs of the eradication program plus finance charges are paid off, which is anticipated to take up to 10 years, and a nominal maintenance fee thereafter. The initiation of a program at this assessment level is contingent upon obtaining financing and a minimum of 30 percent state and/or federal cost-share funding. If approved, the program and assessment are expected to begin in the zone on a date determined by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program Board of Directors.

The Northern Blacklands Eradication Zone consist of all of Montague, Cooke, Grayson, Fannin, Lamar, Red River, Bowie, Cass, Morris, Titus, Franklin, Hopkins, Delta, Hunt, Rockwall, Collin, Denton, Wise, Jack, Parker, Tarrant, Dallas, Kaufman, Rains, VanZandt, Henderson, Navarro, Ellis, Johnson, Hood, Somervell, Bosque, Hamilton and Hill counties; and those parts of McLennan and Limestone counties north of State Highway 84. If a zone program and assessment are approved by this referendum, growers in the zone shall vote again on whether or not to continue eradication efforts after four years of active program activities.

Also, as part of the referendum, a representative of the above-referenced zone will be elected to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The referendum and board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed by November 19, 2002. All ballots cast by mail must be post-marked no later than December 9, 2002, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having cotton production in 2002 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and if he or she resides in the North-

ern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a candidate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm.

Any person eligible to vote in the referendum or board member election who resides in the Northern Blacklands boll weevil Eradication Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. The application shall be on a nomination form provided by the Department and must be signed by the applicant and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received in Austin by November 11, 2002, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION: City of Talco, P.O. Box 365, Talco, Texas 75487, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. 10869-001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 125,000 gallons per day. This application was submitted to the TNRCC on July 19, 2002.

The facility is located on the north side of Farm-to-Market Road 71, approximately one mile northeast of the City of Talco in Titus County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to an unnamed ditch; thence to Prairie Lake; thence to an unnamed tributary of the Sulphur River; thence to the Sulphur/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for the unnamed ditch and high aquatic life uses for Prairie Lake. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are high aquatic life uses and contact recreational.

The TNRCC executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, statement of basis/technical summary and executive director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at Talco City Hall, 400 W. Broad Street, Talco, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask

question about the application. Generally, the TNRCC will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public meeting should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of the notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comment. The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on dispute issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing. The TNRCC may act on this application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and requests to the TNRCC Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.
