Four Seek Deport City Council Seats

The City of Deport will be holding their city election with four people running. Three seats are vacant, they have been vacated by the expiration of the terms of councilmen John Denison, Roy L. Castlebury and John Cliff Randle. Randle has been filling the seat left open when Duane White resigned due to moving from Deport.

The three candidates receiving the most votes will be elected to the three vacancies, which will be two year terms.

John Lee Rpoach is the co-owner of Roach Oil Company in Deport.

He and his wife, Corene, have two children, Jenny and Michael. He has lived most of his life in the Deport area, and moved back to Deport last year after living in Tyler for eight years. He is interested in the wellbeing of the town, and hopes he can do something to better it.

Don J. Neal is married, and has four children. He has lived in Deport nearly

two years. He works at Franklin County Hospital in Mt. Vernon.

He feels that someone needs to be interested in the city.

John Cliff Randle is better known as Cliff. He and his wife, Shirley, have lived in

Deport two years, and operate their cabinet business out of Deport.

Randle says that "I feel like I can be an asset to the City of Deport. Not because of intelligence, but because I have been involved in various civic and political organizations for a number of years."

Walter Gifford has served for eight years as the city secretary and water superintendent, and tax accessor and collector.

He has lived in Deport all his life, and he and his wife, Edna Earl, raised their children here.

He has also served as a city councilman for two years some time ago. He feels that he is very familiar with the problems and assets of Deport, and wants to help.

The elections will be at city hall on April 4, all day, and all citizens of Deport are urged to vote.

Prairiland FFA-4-H Livestock Show Set

The annual Prairiland FFA and 4-H Livestock Show, Saturday, April 4, is

expected to be larger than ever this year.

Prairiland FFA members and 4-H'ers will compete for awards with their beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, poultry, and rabbits. Entries will include steers, barrows, and lambs that will be shown and sold at the Lamar County Junior

Livestock Show in Paris April 23-24. Also to be featured again this year will be the "Kiddie Class" for youngsters under nine years of age.

Danny Johnson, vocational agriculture teacher at Sulphur Springs, will begin

judging the animals at noon.

This year, the show will be held on the Prairiland High School campus. Immediately after the show, a Pig Wrestling Contest will be held, followed by a stew supper and auction. Tickets for the stew supper can be purchased from any FFA member for \$2.00 each.

Named Contest Finalists

The names of eight finalists in the rural Electric Youth Tour Contest sponsored by Lamar County Electric Cooperative were announced this week by Charles Christian, Member Services manager of the Cooperative.

The eight young people were selected from a group of high school sophomores and juniors who wrote essays on "Electric Power Supply—Issues of the 80's." Among local finalists are Debra Rozell, junior at Prairiland High School, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Rozell of Detroit and Charlotte VanDeaver, junior at Prairiland Highschool, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon VanDeaver of Deport.

These young people will be quizzed Friday, March 27 by a panel of five judges. From the group of finalists, one boy and one girl will be selected as winners of an 11-day all expense paid Rural Electric Youth Tour trip to Washington, D.C. during the month of June.

Final judging of the contestants is to be based on knowledge of cooperative rural electrification, speaking ability, poise,

personality and appearance. During the five day stay in the nation's capitol, these young people will see their government in action, visit with their congressmen and senators, and visit various government agencies and sites of historical significance.

On Wednesday, June 17, the group will meet approximately 1,000 young people from 28 states for a program coordinated by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association. The morning program will be an informative question and answer session with congressional leaders and government officials. After lunch, buses transport the young people to the South Lawn of the White House for a special program and tour of the presidential mansion. All states banquet will highlight the evening events.

Prairiland Pig Wrestling Coming

What happens when three people attempt to "corner" a pig on the pig's home territory? You can find out when the Texas State Championship Pig Wrestling Contest is held following the Prairiland FFA and 4-H

Livestock show Saturday, April 4.

Rules for the contest are quite simple: a team of three members will enter a pen that contains a pig, pick up the pig, and place it in an upright barrel. In order to

make it more interesting for spectators, the pen will be six to twelve inches deep in mud, the pig will weigh approximately 200 pounds, and the barrel will be of the 55-gallon size. Each team will have five minutes to



accomplish this feat, and individual first place trophies will be given in both the mens' and womens' division to the team with the best time.

According to Max Ballard, vocational agriculture teacher, the contest should begin at 4:30 p.m. Approximately 15 teams are expected to enter.

Graduates Are Eligible For Benefits

High school graduates in the Depot area are eligible for up to \$20,000 in college benefits through enlistment in the U.S. Army.

The program is eligible for bonafide high school graduates who score 50 or higher on the Armed Forces Qualification test and enlist for two, three or four years in one of the critical military job skills. Further, individuals must be nonprior service.

\$2400 for a two-year enlistment, \$3600 for three years and \$4800 for a four-year enlistment.

"Additionally, recipients will receive \$300 a month in payments while in school. The number of monthly payments vary depending on the length of enlistment. In other words, a two-year enlistment would qualify for 18 monthly payments totaling \$5,400, three years for 27 payments totaling \$8,100 and four year enlistment for 36 payments totaling \$10,800.

This means an individual who enlisted in one of the critical job areas could receive a total of \$15,600 following a four-year enlistment. The four-year enlistment may also qualify

R.E. Workshop To Be Held

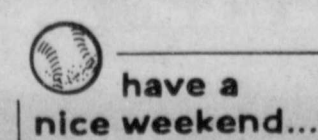

Old Gas Pump Brings Back Memories

There is an old landmark between here and Paris that takes me back to the days of my youth.

I don't know how often I've passed by and not seen it, but there it was the other day. It was an old gas pump. No electricity was used, instead the gasoline was pumped to the top of the glass cylinder and gravity fed it into the tank on the car.

There was once a store and gas station there, but the gas pump is the only thing left now.

Cars were just beginning to become popular when that pump was installed. Mostly horses, wagons or buggies were what folks traveled in.

Probably half the people owned cars, the others still used mules and horses.

I loved to go to my Granddad's just to play in his buggy back then. I loved

to bounce up and down in it, playing like I was driving in it. It had fringe around the top, and little side light to fill with kerosene for night driving. Back then folks took as much pride in their fine, pretty horses as people do of cars today.

They used to take them out to race on back roads, and of course, when the Model T's came out, the young men raced them. I thought we had some very snazzy cars back then too. There weren't any Thunderbirds, Regals or Mustangs, but we had Chevrolets, Dodges or Fords.

When I came back from World War II, I was still a country bumpkin, and I went to buy a car. When they asked if I wanted a Fairlane, I replied "No, I want a Ford or Chevy!"

Noone worried about gas mileage. Gasoline sold for from ten to eight cents per gallon. Of course, pay wasn't too good then. We could work all day in the field for about \$.75. Cotton picking or hoeing was awful hard work, too.

It came out about the same though, everything was cheap, even if salaries were too.

Don't Pay With Cash

Cash should never be sent through the mail to pay federal income taxes, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the cash payment should be lost, stolen, or destroyed, the taxpayer would have no record of payment.

Using a check or money order is much safer for two reasons, the IRS adds. First, either is hard to steal, and secondly, the cancelled check or money order receipt will serve as a record of payment.

Taxpayers should also be sure to write their Social Security number, the tax period and the form for which the payment is being made on the check or money order. In the event the payment is separated from the tax return, proper credit can still be given to the taxpayer's account.

East Texas Eating

Fresh garden lettuces, are in my opinion, pure luxury! For the last couple of winters now, we have been able to mulch several volunteer Bibb lettuce seedlings through the cold weather with the aid of a blanket of loose hay. We pulled the hay back a couple of weeks ago. The little Bibb plants that had been hovering close to the ground promptly responded to the sun's warming rays by sending forth tender, bright green leaves. The plants even survived last night's chilling 32 degrees. We will be able to begin to snip the outer leaves for salads in the next few days. The wintered-over Bibb plants will bolt to flower and seed about the time the lettuces we planted in mid-February reach their peak. Meanwhile though, we will enjoy their tender, fresh goodness.

Add some new lettuces to your garden this spring. Or, border a flower bed with them. Lettuces can take some filtered shade. They do like adequate moisture and a fairly loose soil. Work some mature compost or old barnyard soil that is rich in humus into the row before planting as well as a light application of commercial fertilizer and the bright green lettuces will reward you amply.

Black Seeded Simpson that sends forth the familiar yellow-green loose leaves is the old-timey favorite in our East Texas Area. Romaine, Bibb, Buttercrunch, Salad Bowl, Prize Head, Ruby, and Oak Leaf are other loose-leaf or loosely heading varieties that grow beautifully locally and yield leaves of marvelous texture and flavor. Romaine yields tall, crisp leaves that form loose heads 10 inches or so tall. Give Romaine a little shade from late spring's hot sun and it will go on into early summer. Bibb yields a smaller, tender rosette of bright green leaves. I like to use the young leaves whole in salads and on hamburgers.

The red-tinged sweet Prize Head leaves and the sparkling red, crisp ones of Ruby perk up any salad and are a joy to behold in the garden. Oak-Leaf lettuce looks unbelievable like its namesake and has a very mild flavor. It stands up to more heat than most lettuces and therefore can be planted on up to late spring.

Plant and care for these lettuces as you do Black Seeded Simpson. Most of these do like a little more room between the plants as they begin to grow. So, when two or three leaves have formed, thin to four or five inches apart. As the larger leaved varieties—Romaine, Prizehead, Ruby, and Salad Bowl, grow, continue to thin

to allow room for the plants to reach their peak.

Enjoy the tender goodness of the lettuce thinnings. Here are some ideas to try:

+ They make marvelous additions to soups.

+ Mix with Romaine from the grocery store and toss lightly with a cream and vinegar dressing.

+ Try the old-timey East Texas favorite, Wilted Lettuce:

2 slices bacon;
1 onion, sliced;
5 cups chopped lettuce;
3 Tbsp. vinegar;
2 Tbsp. sugar;
dash of freshly ground pepper;
1 tsp. salt.

Brown bacon in skillet until crisp. Remove bacon; add sugar, salt and pepper to drippings. While the drippings are still hot, add the vinegar and pour over cleaned and chopped lettuce and onion. Mix well; garnish with bacon bits and serve. For a change, add a chopped, boiled egg.

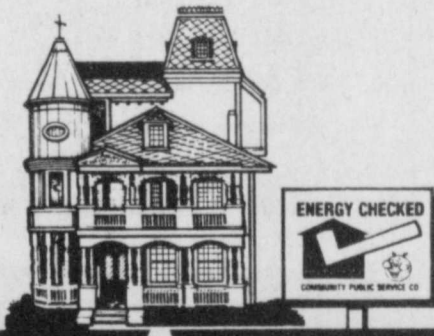

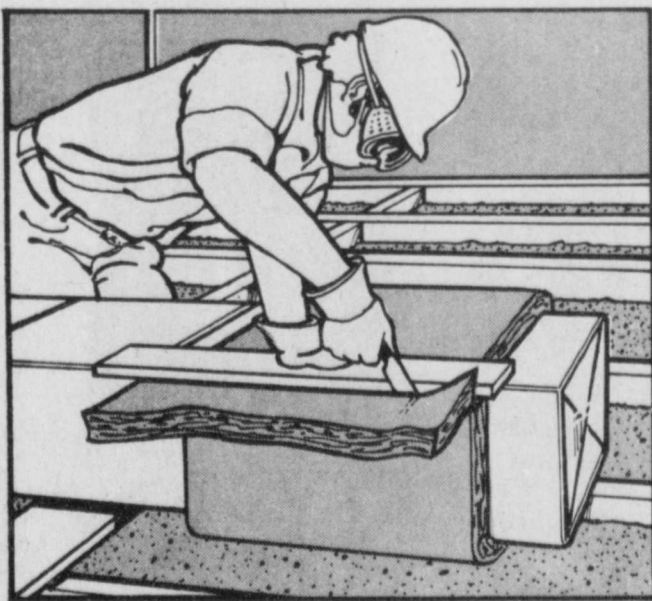
