Patriots Fall To Tigers In Wet Football Action

Complete and total misery might best describe the situation at Clarksville's Tiger Stadium last Friday night. That is if you are a Prairiland Patriot fan, or player. There was certainly no dust to clear at the end-it poured down a cold, uncomfortable rain the whole time, but the 55-0 score was colder and more miserable than the rain.

The Pats failed to make a first down the entire game. The ground was slick, the Tigers fast and powerful. Nothing seemed to work. But the most important factor was the spirit of the Patriots themselves. The sale average for the Northeast Texas Limousin Sale held this past week was down from last spring's sale and reflected the general poor market prices being received for commercial cattle. The 120 lots in the sale averaged \$854. The high selling animals in the sale were fullblood cattle. A full blood Limousin cow and her six month old heifer calf sold for \$4800. The five year old cow consigned by Joe Will of Lawton, Okla. went to Missouri while her calf stayed in Lamar County with Reno 4-H member, Brian Payne. The top selling bull at \$2500 is the new herd sire for Steve Carroll of Bonham. The 20 month old son of Goldenview Hercules was consigned by McKown and Sons of Ardmore, Okla. Even though Lamar

County Limousin Breeder Association members were disappointed with the prices received, they were pleased with the number of new owners making purchases at the sale, according to association president, Fulton Stephens. MILO VARIETY RESULTS Results are in for the 12-variety milo demonstration conducted by Melvin and Mark Webb of the Byrdtown Community. Oro GXtra was the top yielding variety after coming in second in the 1980 test. The 1981 yield was 6161 pounds per acre. Seven of the other varieties produced in excess of 5000 pounds with Paymaster 1089 and Pioneer 8680 in second place at 5587 pounds. Yield averages of the other varieties are Ring Around 807-5500 pounds, Paymaster 1125-5404 pounds, Ring Around 733 GB-5370 pounds, Harpool 6203 GR-

Patterson Attempting To Block Sale Representative L.P. Patterson has asked Congress to intervene if Seagram Company, the Canadian distiller giant, continues to pursue a controlling interest in Pennzoil Company. He warns that future U.S. fertilizer needs could be a foreign controlled monopoly if Pennzoil is allowed to be purchased by foreigners. Sulphur is of prime importance to every sector of the fertilizer industry. Pennzoil has vast reserves of sulphur at Culbertson County, Texas, the largest Frasch sulphur mine in the Western world. Pennzoil, Texasgulf Inc. and Freeport-McMoran are the major sulphur frascing companies in the U.S. In August, Texasgulf was purchased by Elf Aguitaine, a French government

controlled corporation. If Pennzoil is allowed to be foreign controlled, Freeport-McMoran will be the only major sulphur frascing company to remain in U.S. hands. The U.S. started developing its fertilizer industry during World War I due to shortages and high prices because they were foreign controlled at that time by France and other European countries. Patterson feels we are placing our farmers in a very precarious situation when we allow foreign corporations to monopolize fertilizer supplies.

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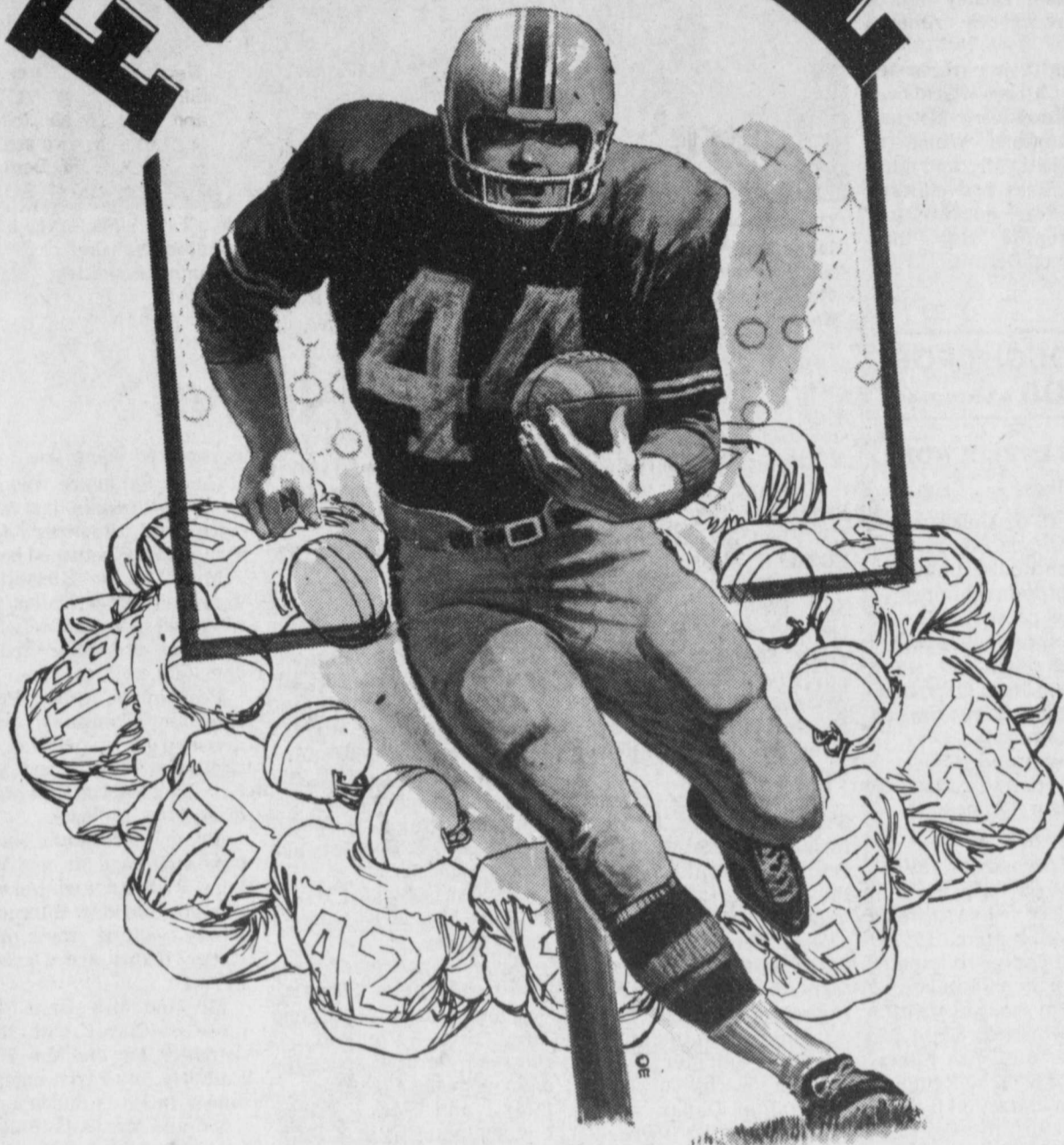

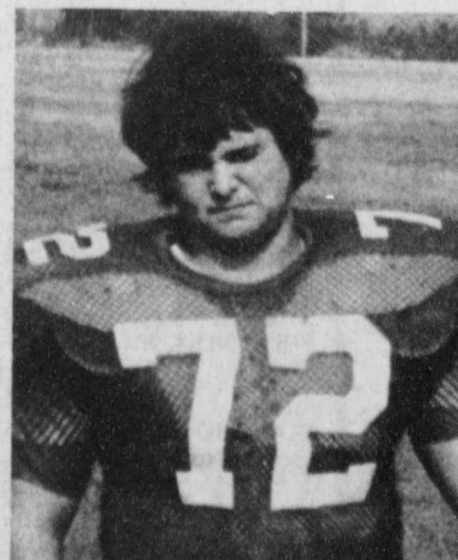

Fewer Forms Required For Cars

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office Monday reported that Texans who buy cars and trucks will be filling out fewer forms in the coming months.

The Comptroller's office has adopted a single, one-page form to replace two separate forms used to register motor vehicles and pay the sales tax.

The new form will replace the Department of Highways and Public Transportation's application for title and the Comptroller's seller, donor or trader's affidavit.

The combined form is expected to be used by more than four million Texans during the next twelve months.

The form eliminates the duplication of information requested by each agency by more than one-third on each motor vehicle sold.

The Comptroller's office and the Highway Department will recognize the use of old forms until supplies are exhausted.

The Comptroller's office has been instrumental in developing easy-to-read,

shortened forms in an effort to reduce taxpayer paperwork.

The state's postcard-sized sales tax return is used by more than 300,000 businesses and merchants who collect and forward sales tax to the Comptroller.

The state's four percent motor vehicle sales tax during the 12-month period which ended August 31, 1981, produced more than \$523.6 million in tax revenue.

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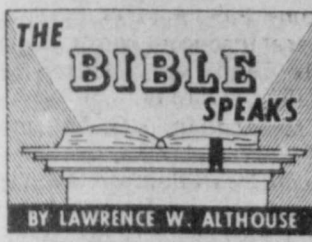

WHO BUILDS THE BARRIER?
November 8, 1981

Background Scripture: Romans 8.
Devotional Reading: Galatians 5: 16-24.

In those times when God seems absent from our lives, when it appears that he is not present to help us in our trouble or sorrow, it is customary for us to assume that he has for some reason placed a barrier between himself and ourselves. It is also customary for us to assume that the reason for his absence is his displeasure with us—something we've done or not done, something present in our lives that shouldn't be there or something lacking that should be.

The Psalmists frequently complained that God had forsaken them: "O God, why dost thou cast us off forever?" (74: 1). King Saul was convinced that God no longer listened to his prayers. Even Jesus cried on Calvary, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" If all of these—and more—experienced a barrier between God and themselves, it is not so surprising that we have also experienced it.

According to the Flesh
Yet, the Bible seems to indicate that it is really not God who abandons us, but we who abandon him. If there is a barrier between us in times of great need, it is because we have perhaps unwittingly erected it our-

selves. God does not desire to separate himself from us even in the midst of our sin. One of the ways in which we build such a barrier is to focus our whole attention and being on the material side of life. Whether our hangups are food, drink, clothing, money, power or our other material pleasures, we stifle our spiritual selves when we fail to recognize that we are both flesh and spirit. It is not that God becomes angry with us for our material preoccupation, but that these "things" erect a barrier that tends to shut him out. Thus, Paul reminded the Romans that "all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God" (Romans 8: 14).

Who is to Condemn?
Another way we build a barrier between ourselves and God is by failing to really accept his forgiving grace. Although in our minds we "know" that it is through God in Christ that we are freed from our guilt, we still may live as if we don't believe it. We act as though we are more powerful sinners than he is a Saviour. So Paul reminds us in Romans, "It is God who justifies, who is to condemn?" (8: 34). To live with unrelieved guilt is to actually reject the grace of God.

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" asks the Apostle (8: 35). His answer: Nothing or no one! "For I am sure that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (8: 38).

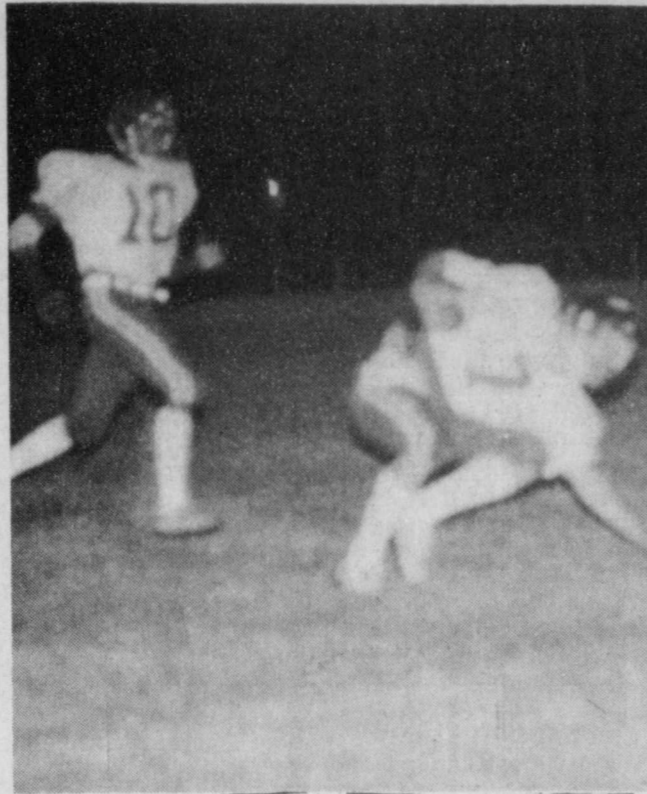

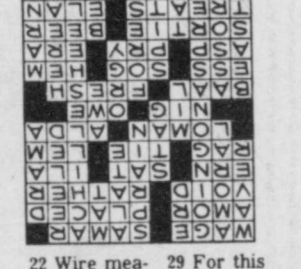
