Parents Present Views To Board

The Prairiland School Board heard from a group of concerned citizens Monday night, when several people from Blossom and Deport expressed their concern about the possibility of moving the Junior High School grades (6th, 7th, and 8th) to the Pattonville campus.

Drucilla and Charles Rollins opened the discussion, and stated that they were opposed to such a move, as did Bobby Kent and Elizabeth Irwin of Blossom.

The Board stated that such a plan was by no means final, and that they had such a poor response from citizens in both communities when the bond election had come up six months before

that they felt the proposal to leave the junior high schools where they are, wasn't what the people wanted.

Several parents expressed the view that they felt people had simply felt that they could get by without doing anything, not that they were opposed to rebuilding at the present campuses. They also stated their feelings that once the Jr. High was at one location, the next step would be to try and move the lower grades as well.

The meeting between citizens and board members resulted in one clear cut issue—that something needs to be done, since the Blossom and Deport school buildings were becoming so old that they were unsafe or inadequate.

The people involved stated that if the board would work up a survey to get the public's feelings and wants, they would help by forming committees and seeing that people were truly made aware of the situation and the necessity of doing something about it.

The board indicated their willingness to do this, getting financial estimates and alternatives for presentation in the near future.

The possibility of a public meeting was also discussed. The parents at the meeting stated that they thought that would be good. They repeatedly stated that they knew of almost no one in favor of moving the Junior

High Schools to Pattonville from the Deport or Blossom area. It was pointed out that the two communities were not the only ones with an interest in the matter, and Mrs. Rollins replied that everyone was aware of that and did not mean their actions to be anything more than a concern for the welfare of children and the communities.

After discussion on these matters the board considered and approved the selection of a textbook committee to select the social studies book for the next year, approved James Dunagan as the Lamar County Tax Appraisal Board

Member, and heard the financial report.

Superintendent Leslie H. (Buddy) Taylor told the board what the administration had found out concerning the installation of acoustic tile in the gym in order to lower the noise level to an acceptable level. At present no sound system can be installed that will function properly because of the extremely loud echo problem.

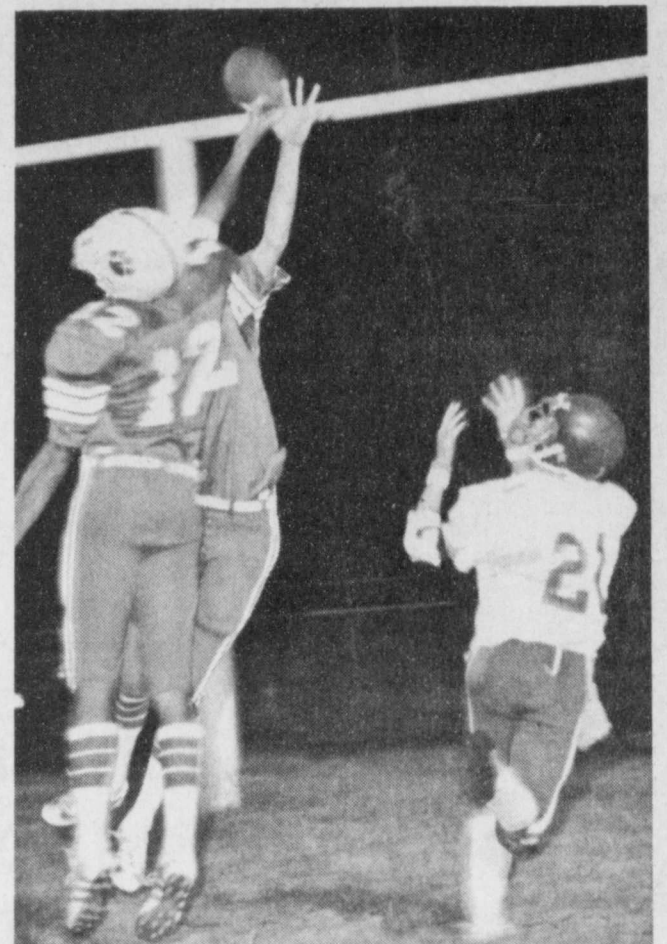
A trip to a gym which has already been done by the proposed company is being planned in order to investigate the matter further.

A progress report on the repairs being done at the

Blossom and Deport Elementary Schools was made. The Deport two story building has already been painted and numerous other smaller jobs completed, and work at Blossom is also underway.

The board went into executive session to discuss personnel, but no action was taken.

Also accomplished during the meeting was the swearing in of Leon Anderson of Blossom as a new member of the school board. Anderson replaces Dee Grissom who resigned at the October meeting.

Patriots Drop Game To Tigers

The Prairiland Patriots jumped to a 15-0 lead over the Mt. Vernon Tigers Friday, Nov. 6 in Tiger Stadium, but were unable to hang on for a victory, finally falling to the Tigers 24-15.

The early minutes of the game looked best for the Patriots, when they scored on their first two possessions of the ballgame. The Tigers won the toss, but their first drive was thwarted when Patriot quarterback Norman Alexander intercepted a Tiger pass at mid-field and ran the ball back to the Mt. Vernon 29 yard line. Four plays later Patriot halfback Brad Sessums turned the left corner and raced 22 yards to the Tiger three. Sessums got the nod again, and went through the center of the line for three points. Alexander's extra point kick was good.

The Patriots stopped the second Tiger effort in four plays, then Sessums took the punt on the Prairiland 15 and returned it 11 yards to the 33 yard line. Sessums made the next first down on one play and a 10 yard gain, but the Patriots, faced with fourth down and four their own 49 yard line, were forced to punt. Alexander's punt was high, and hit the shoulder pads of a Mt. Vernon player. The football was covered by Keith Burdine, and the Patriots were in scoring position on the Mt. Vernon 30 yard line. Sessums made one try at the middle of the line with no gain, then Alexander

connected with Rick Harrell for a 30 yard touchdown pass. On the try for points after, Alexander faked a kick, lateraled to Todd Davis, who completed a pass to Harrell in the end zone for two points.

A 47 yard kickoff return by the Tigers put them in excellent field position on the next series, but the Patriots held on fourth down and stopped the Tigers at the one yard line. A Patriot fumble on the next play gave the Tigers another chance, and they got on the scoreboards with eight points before the end of the first quarter.

The Patriots got into trouble early in the second quarter, when a 15 yard penalty for an ineligible man downfield, combined with a sack of quarterback Alexander forced the Patriots to punt the ball away. Patriot defense held on the next series, but an interception on the first down play gave the ball back to the Tigers on their own 27 yard line. Prairiland was able to contain the Tigers enough to prevent a touchdown, but an 11 yard field goal attempt was good. The Patriots still led at halftime, 15-11.

It wasn't until late in the third quarter that the Patriots managed to tilt the game in their favor, and soon after that touchdown, quarterback Norman Alexander was injured and taken by ambulance to Franklin County Hospital emergency room. Alexander suffered a jammed neck and was released that night to his parents.

An 18 yard punt by Todd Davis, substituting for Alexander, gave the Tigers possession on their own 45 yard line. The Patriots again punched the Tiger offense full of holes, including a seven yard loss on a sack by Barry Johnston early in the fourth quarter. A fumble on the second down of the Patriots possession at their own 11 yard line set up the final Tiger score.

The Patriots caught the Mt. Vernon quarterback behind the line of scrimmage eight times. Defensive standouts were Chris Phipps, David Edwards, Timmy Henry, Chris Spann and Johnson. Sessums carried 18 times for 75 yards.

The Patriots will play North Lamar at home at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 13.

Final papers will be filled out and submitted, and construction on the new plant could begin within a few weeks.

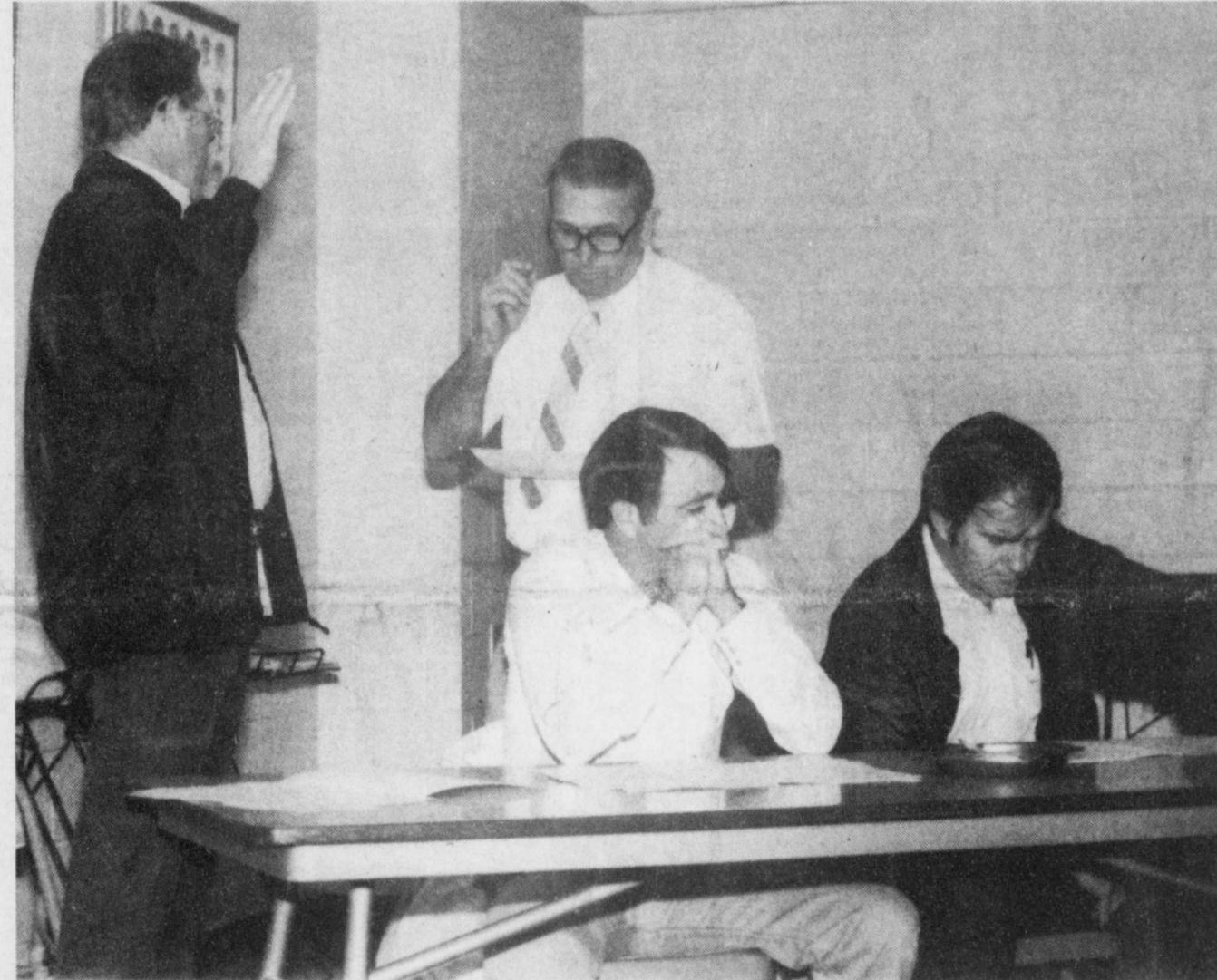
In other business the council voted James Dunagan as the representative for Deport on the

The Ark-Tex Council of Governments was extended an invitation to meet with the council and citizens at the Deport American Legion Hall sometime in March.

The board approved payment of bills and adjourned.

homemade desserts. Price is \$3 per adult and children \$2.

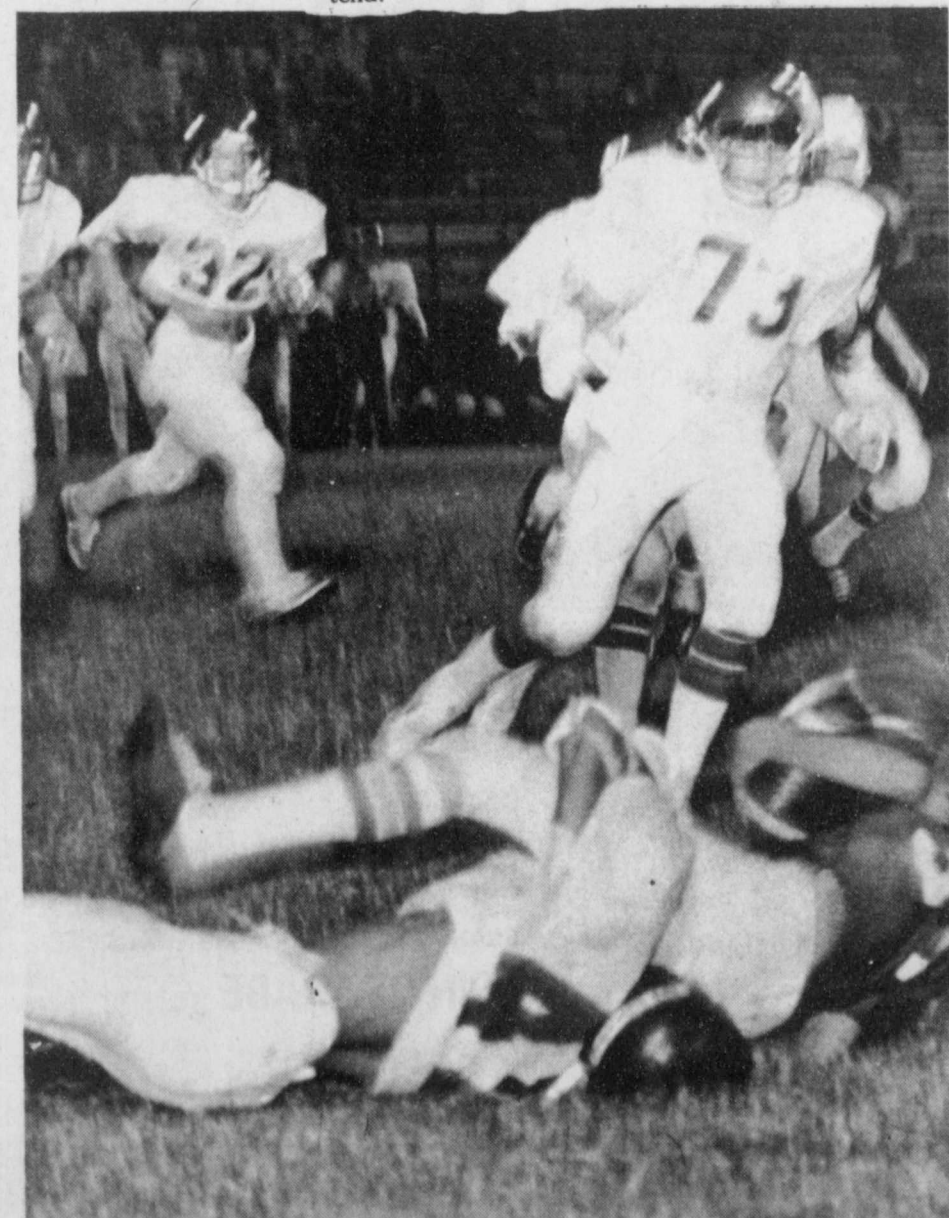
Those wishing to take the food home with them should bring their own containers.

Reba McEntire To Perform

Country-Western superstar Reba McEntire will be present for a one-show engagement in DeKalb, Texas on Saturday, November 21, during the Central States Rodeo Association rodeo.

McEntire, a finalist in Country music's Most Promising Female Vocalist in Nashville earlier this year, brings her current Top 10 songs, along with a medley of favorites in the country music field. Her third Mercury album, *Feel The Fire*, arrives on the success of her hit single "You Lift Me Up To Heaven." The album is a compilation of both new tunes and revitalized old songs, and includes her current single, "I Can See Forever In Your Eyes." Her mentor is the great Red Steagall, who helped form her career in the late 1970's. Her debut album, "Reba McEntire" was released in 1977 to encouraging critical reception, and she made her debut on the Grand Ole Opry following that release. "That Makes Two Of Us" was a duet with western favorite Jacky Ward.

Along with Miss McEntire, top rodeo contestants are expected for the two nights of rodeo competition. Among them are Gary Hiner of Cuthand, Texas, who for the second year has won the championship title in bull riding for the Central Rodeo Association, is the 1980 Central States Rodeo Association bull riding champion and the 1980 and 1981 Finals bull riding champion. Hiner, on October 30, won the World's Richest Bull Riding competition at Billy Bob's Texas in Ft. Worth, where he was paid over \$23,000 for his abilities. Competition was open to all associations, and Hiner topped the field over Jerry Beagley, Bobby DelVecchio, Kenny Wilcox, Donnie Gay and others.

Rodeo action begins on Friday, November 20 with seven championship events at the Western Sports Indoor Arena in DeKalb, with the event champions being crowned on Saturday, November 21, and the engagement of Reba McEntire.

Advance tickets may be purchased at 271 Conoco in

Bogata. Cotton-Burr Western Store in Clarksville, Blackmon Machinery in DeKalb, Western Discount Store in New Boston, both Western Stores in Texarkana. Box seat tickets are \$5 advance and \$5.50 at the door. General admission for adults for Saturday night is \$4 advance and \$4.50 at the door. Friday tickets will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for children.

The rodeo is produced and directed by the Wing Ranch Rodeo Company of Bogata, where just the past week in Tulsa, Oklahoma, K-Bob, No. 4, received his second consecutive regional bucking award, a double, as he was chosen Bucking Bull of the Year of 1981 and Bucking Bull of the Finals for 1981 in both the Central Rodeo Association of Texas and the Central States Rodeo Association, which hosts rodeo in the seven mid-western states.

The Wing Ranch Rodeo Company was honored at a banquet held Sunday, November 8, with the co-honor of the biggest award in the rodeo industry, that of Producer of the Year for 1981, in the Central States Rodeo Association.

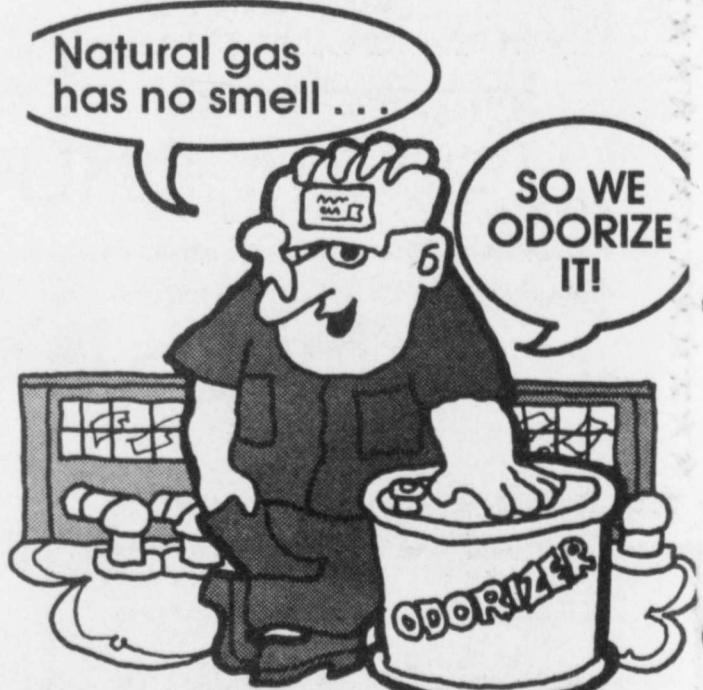

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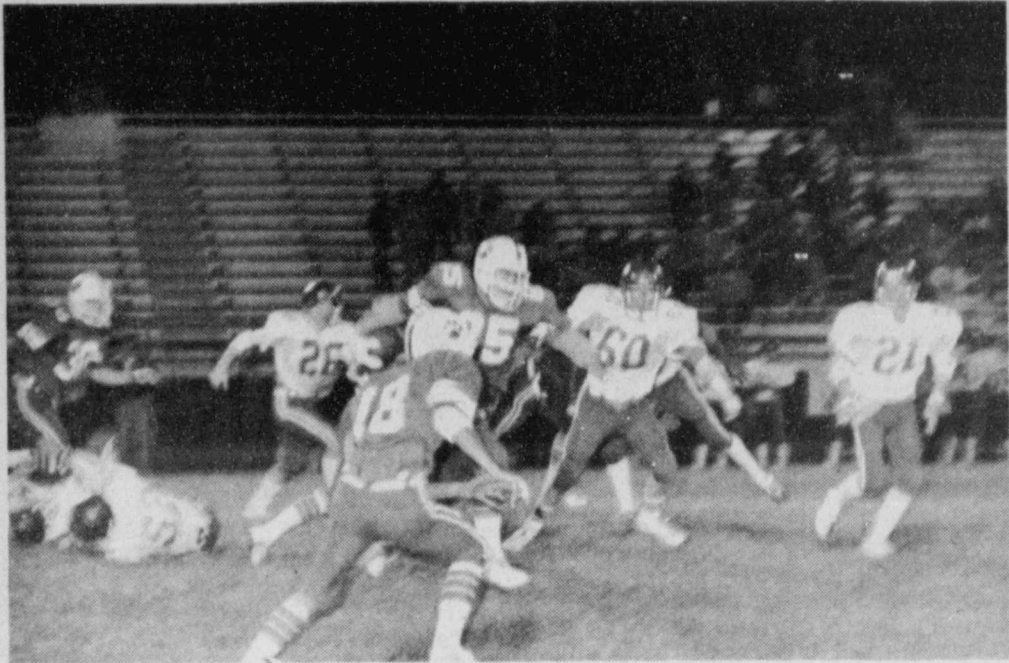
