## Pats End Football Season

The Prairiland Patriots hosted the North Lamar Panthers, always an arch-rival in a football game Friday night which saw the Panthers deadly passing game as the primary weapon against the Pats. The final score of 35-6 saw a disappointed bunch of Patriots march off the field.

The Patriots defense was tremendous against the Panthers ground game, but there just didn't seem to be any way to stop the incredible accuracy of the long passes that North Lamar threw again and again.

The Patriots saw the first score against them from a long, perfectly aimed pass from Panther quarterback Stephens which hit at the 25 yard line, Bryan carrying it on in.

Extra point was good, but the Patriots began a good series which featured a 12 yard pass from Todd Davis to Rickey Harrell, and then a good run by Bradley Sessums. It looked as if the Patriots might score, but the drive was shut down on the North Lamar 20 yard line.

Norman Alexander, still suffering from whiplash sustained against Mt. Vernon, had to stand on the sidelines as his last chance to

play high school football passed by.

In the second quarter a lucky interception resulted in another touchdown.

The rest of the period was dominated by the Patriots, whose defensive efforts were outstanding, and whose offensive efforts resulted in near score, but was not quite able to pull it off.

North Lamar came out of the half fired up, preventing the Patriots from making much yardage. Then Davis punted, a 10 yard kick didn't help, and a penalty left the ball on the nine yard line, making an easy score for the Panthers.

With the score at 21-0 the Prairiland boys again had to punt, and the Panthers ran it up to 28-0.

In the last minutes of the game Prairiland got a

glimpse of glory, as Todd Davis spearheaded a very long drive. A hard drive, a penalty and three pass plays took the Pats 82 yards for a touchdown.

North Lamar, with only about two minutes left, still didn't seem satisfied with their score, however, and drilled in for one more score, leaving it at 35-6.

The Patriots have had a bad season, and probably heaved a sigh of relief that it is all over, but are also turning their eyes toward next year.

It is sure that it "Won't always be this way" and the dedication and determination that has enabled them to hold their heads high can combine with more skill and better blocking to make for a winning team in the future.

## Eighth Grade Patriots District Champs

By Joel Ballard & Eric Stewart The Eighth Grade Patriots became district champions Thursday night by defeating North Lamar 12-6 and at the same time made history by being the only Patriot team ever to go undefeated the entire season.

After receiving the kickoff, the Pats, via Mike Connots and Joe Morre's hot-foot, moved down the field, and five plays later Scott Scudder on a quarterback draw, sneaked over for a touchdown. The controversial try for the bonus point by Joe Darrien's wide sweep was no good. Later in the same quarter North Lamar moved to the five yard line before they received a penalty setback.

Heath Kennedy dampened their hopes by intercepting a pass.

At the beginning of the second quarter with the score 6-0, the Panthers pulled a "bongdozzle" play. With the clock stopped and the Pats still on the side line talking to Coaches Riddles and Rader, the Panthers lined up and ran for a touchdown. The score was now 6-6. Most of the remainder of the quarter was mostly defense, but the Patriots did manage to make another touchdown when Scott handed off to Connot, who drove 10 yards through holes made by the Patriot offensive lines. The score was 12-6, which was the final score.

As a reward for a good season, every player served as a team captain.

## Voters Registration Efforts Underway

A campaign to register voters in Deport and Blossom is now underway. Postage-paid voter registration cards are now available at all the local merchants such as groceries, banks, drug stores, etc.

The attempt to aide in voter registration is merely to help mobilize the voting populace.

Any resident of Lamar County for more than six months is eligible to register.

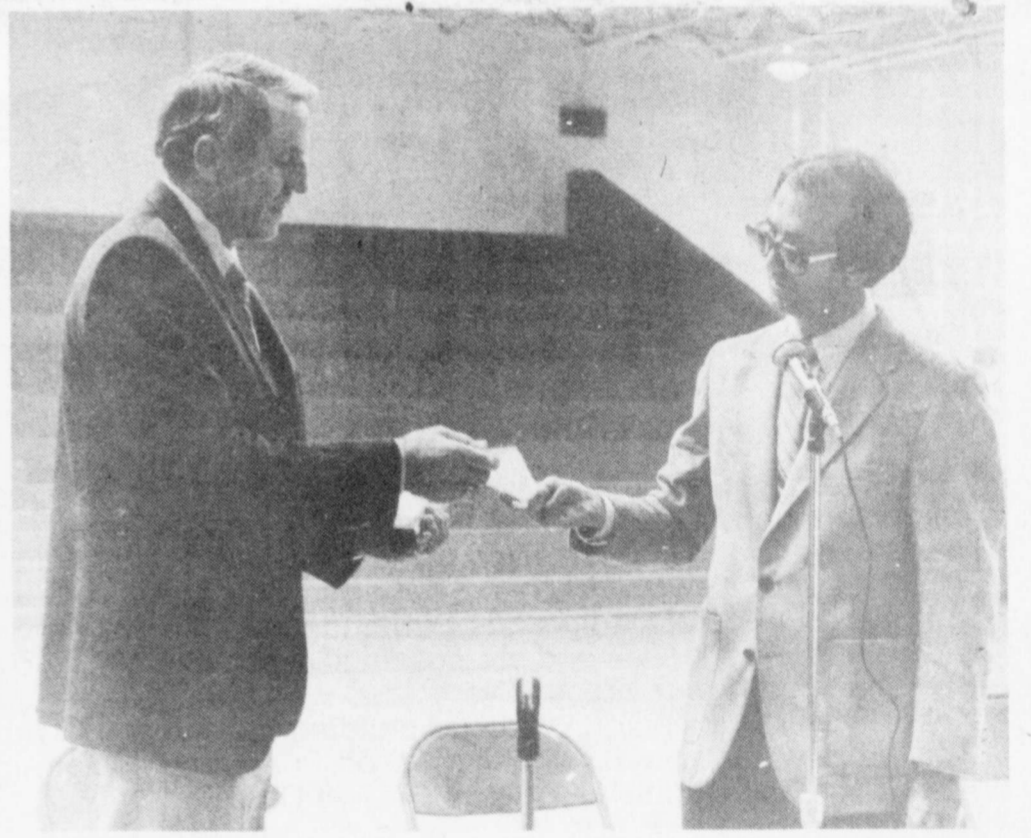
All that is necessary is to fill in the card and mail it in. A voter will then be eligible to vote in any election held 30 days after receiving their card.

Anyone who is a resident of the county, and is registered to vote, can do so in any school bond or county election, whether they own property or not. However, if a property owner lives outside the county, even though he cannot vote within that county.

The purpose of this voter registration is aimed at utilizing the voting community more effectively, since response in recent elections has been poor.

Residents of this county who are not agready registered are urged to do so in order to achieve a better voting result.

The proposal that a school bond election may be upcoming within the next months or year has prompted the placement of the cards. How people vote is, of course, entirely up to them.

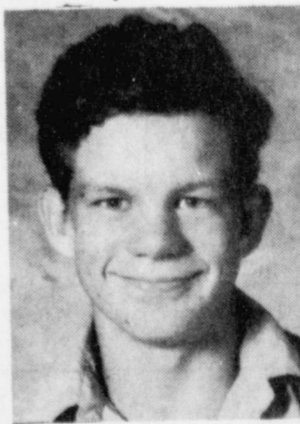
He was an active member of Future Farmers of America, at Prairiland High School, and a member of the Blossom Church of Christ.

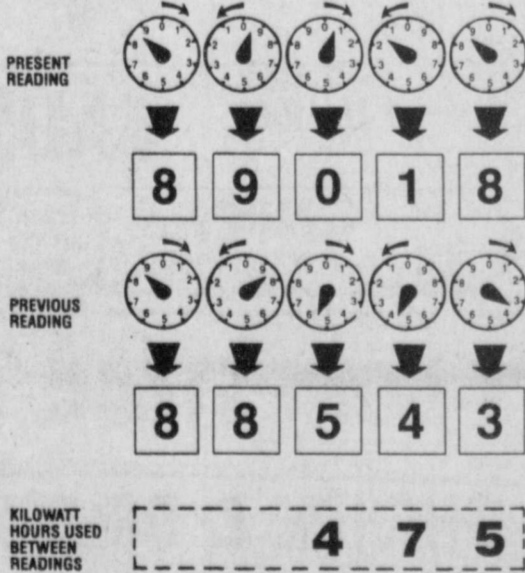

Be sure to record the dates the readings are taken, since the reading is good only for measuring kilowatt usage for the number of days between readings.

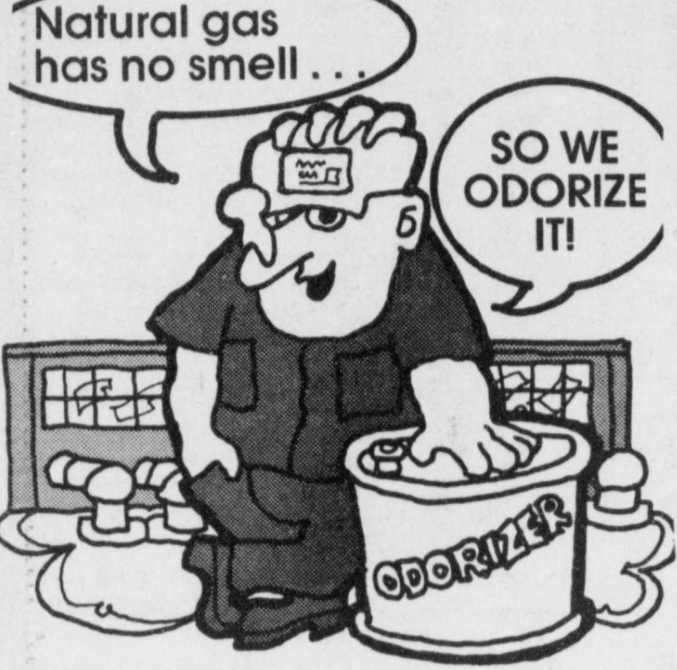

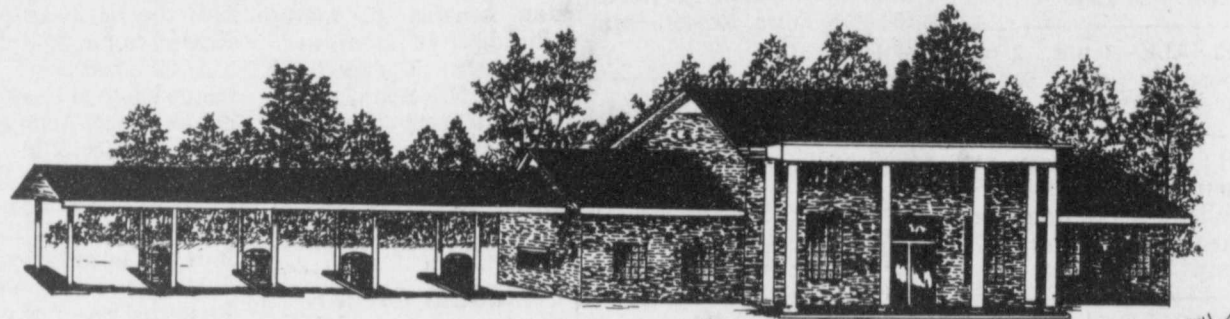

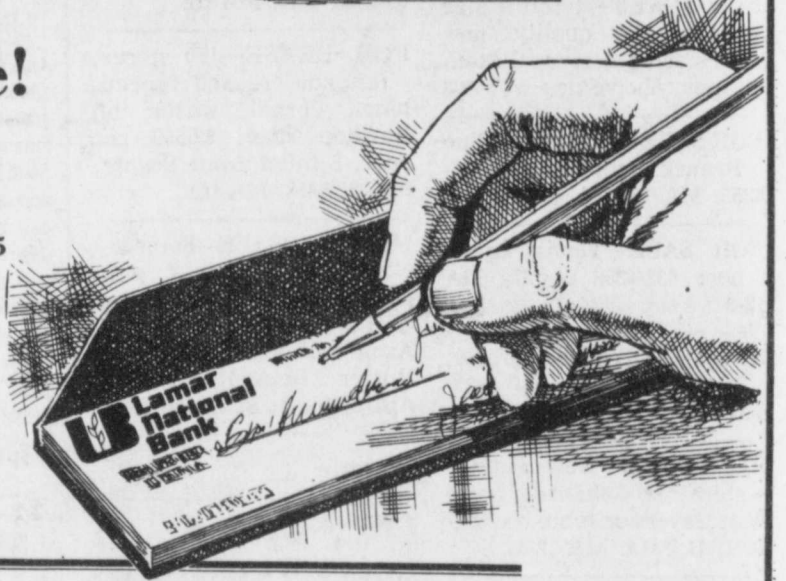
