## **Deport Mayor Cited** For Accomplishments

Deport mayor Charles (Dugan) Deport community. Foster and Thomas Ray of Blossom have been honored for their outstanding contributions to the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Service

The two received recognition at the annual 54-county Region 4 banquet of the TSWCS, held last week in

Nacogdoches. Foster was saluted as the region's outstanding business and professional man and Ray, who operates a 274-acre dairy farm in the Red Oak community, was named the region's outstanding conservation farmer.

Both men will receive "local honors" May 27 when they will be recognized at the annual conservation awards program held in cooperation with the Paris Noon Lions Club. That program will be held at the Quality Inn at Paris.

Ray, a cooperator with the Lamar County Soil and Water Conservation District since 1947, has developed a well-planned pasture system consisting of bermudagrass, legumes, cross fences to facilitate rotational

grazing and ponds for livestock water. In nominating Ray for the regional honor, the Lamar SWCD noted his "enthusiasm for conservation of soil and water resources and the example he has set for others in carrying out a complete conservation program."

Mayor Foster, with the support of the Deport City Council, is credited with being instrumental in bringing about many improvements to the

The award nomination by the Lamar SWCD states that under Foster's leadership, the Tom Jeffus floodwater regarding structure was built, providing needed flood protection to residents of Deport, along with the downtown portion of

the city itself. Completed in 1980, the structure has already served its purpose by keeping the waters of Deport Creek within its shallow banks on at least two oc-

Other improvements cited during Foster's term in office include improvements to streets, and the water

and sewer system. The Lamar SWCD notes in its nomination of Foster the "many hours of time he has spent for the betterment of his community.'

banquet was highlighted with a surprise award this year, as students presented their advisor, Max Ballard. with a special series of gifts at the annual event held Thursday, May 6.



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

# Prairiland Students Score 'Good' In TABS Tests

The results of the TABS tests recently administered to selected grades at Prairiland CISD were announced to the Prairiland school Board Monday night, and Dr. Richard Nash, in charge of the testing, stated "We're quite pleased with the results, and feel we are making excellent

The TABS (Texas Assessment of Basic Skills) is a test administered on a state-wide basis designed to show performance of a school system in

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teaching basic skills. It was administered to the third and fifth grades at both Blossom and Deport Elementary schools, and the ninth grade at Prairiland High School.

In reading, 70 percent of the third graders demonstrated mastery of their skills, 65 percent of the fifth graders and 67 percent of the ninth

This shows the third grade to be about two percent below the estimated and desired goal, the fifth

graders six percent above and the ninth graders three percent above the projected results.

In math, the third graders demonstrated a 72 percent mastery, the fifth graders 66 percent, and ninth graders a 72 percent mastery of the basic math skills. This shows a four percent better score over projected results in the third and fifth grades and a one percent betterment in the ninth grades.

Dr. Nash stated that a Region VIII meeting will be held to compile a math program for kindergarten through third grades which will help in the problem areas that show up in all the area testing programs.

program," Nash said, "is a significant factor in the improvement of our total reading curriculum."

The board noted that the standards set up by the state authorities to be reached by 1984 are already above or nearing the required levels at Prairiland currently. They also stated that they would continue to work towards bettering the TABS score even more.

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



By Sue Clarkson In 1901 the Blossom Oil and Cotton Company was built. business established with a capital stock of \$50,000. It grew to be a very profitable business and helped Blossom to grow.

In about 1912 the company installed an electric light plant in connection with the mill and gin, from which the town was furnished with excellent lights.

In 1919 the annual business amounted to \$150,000, with a payroll that was quite large. That same year, the company ginned more than 2,100 bales of cotton. As you can see, Blossom Prairie was once a large cotton growing

The old electric building still stands in South Blossom. It can be seen from Highway 82, just a little south of the Blossom Truck Stop.

The old gin and mill once stood about where the Truck Stop is located.




