Besides that, both are active in the local Methodist church, Carlos as Sunday school superintendent, Melba teaching a group of primary youngsters.


Besides gardening, Carlos has another great love. He has held four season tickets for the Dallas Cowboys football games every season since



They constructed one large nest, and laid 24 eggs in it. They set on the eggs alternately, one staying on them at all times, and at night both of them slept on the eggs.


Last Friday and Saturday their efforts were rewarded as duckling after duckling began to hatch.
