## Bogata Rodeo Starts Annual 3-Night Run

All area trails begin moving in on Bogata this afternoon (Thursday) as the curtain goes up on the annual Bogata Rodeo and Frontier Days celebration.

A 5 p.m. parade through downtown Bogata will officially open the rodeo, while the first the rodeo itself will kick open the first of three nights of the classic confrontations between man and beast at 8:30 p.m. at the rodeo grounds on the southside of Bogata.

An estimated 400 cowboys and cowgirls from the southwestern part of the United States are expected to be in the line-up of contestants for the full series of rodeo events.

The Bogata Rodeo, considered one of the top drawer events on the circuit, is co-sanctioned by both the Central Rodeo Association and the Central States Rodeo Association.

Once again, the rodeo will be produced by Bogata's own Jerald Smith and his nationally-known Wing Ranch Rodeo Company.

Smith's Wing Rodeo outfit provides the stock for many of the top rodeos in the country and he traditionally brings his top stock to the hometown arena.

Thursday's opening parade will form on South Main, near Kisner's Grocery Store, and will follow a route up North Main. Parade participants are requested to report at the assembly area no later than 4:30 p.m. Miss Vicki Zehetner of Clarksville,

who won the 1981 Rodeo Queen honors, will be among the leaders in the parade.

Also in the parade of horses, wagons, bicycles and other entrants of all type will be the five area young girls competing for this year's queen honors and the four young ladies bidding for the rodeo princess crown.

The nightly admission charge for the rodeo is \$3 for adults and \$2 for children. Advance adult tickets, available from the four girls competing for the princess title, have been priced at \$2.

The opening night of the rodeo will be observed as Hub Whiteman Night, honoring the late rodeo hall-of-famer will present a \$100 savings bond to someone in attendance at the Thursday opener, in memory of her late husband.

Among the various events for the rodeo participants each night will be the bull riding calf roping, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding, steer roping and barrel racing.

There will be day money and trophies awarded to the "average" winners during the rodeo.

In addition, there will be the spectacular wild horse race at each night's performance.

Clowns, the all-important people for the contestants in the arena, for the Bogata Rodeo will be Tom Ward and Kyle Bell.

There are many cemeteries like it scattered throughout the area. Small, peaceful plots of ground, tucked away in corners and on black top roads, but Halesboro is one of the most interesting, remote, and peaceful of them all.

It lies on a corner south of Deport, the only remnant of a once-thriving town.

The names on the old fashioned

stones read like a pioneer roll call for this area. Harbisons, Kimballs, Haydocks and Roaches, Jeffus and Grants and Chesshires, have their final resting place in the serene, tree-surrounding setting of Halesboro.

Unlike modern cemeteries, which are apt to mark graves with flat bronze markers in perfect rows, or carefully regimented stones that all look much alike, the variety of headstones at Halesboro seems endless.

The gravestones are as individual as the personalities of the departed, and often attempt to reflect something of the person they watch over.

Graceful arches, massive chunks of granite, or tall, thin edifices mark various graves. Small lambs bear mute testimony to the briefness of infant life in pioneer days.

Poetry and biblical quotations were freely used, and some of the stones bear fascinating tales.

One tall stone has on it the words "Albert G. Thompson, MURDERED, April 16, 1886. That stone bears permanent testimony to the tragedy of property line dispute back when men were prone to carry their own law.

The story goes that Thompson and a neighbor had been arguing for a long time over their boundary line. When he failed to come in one evening, his family went looking, and found him shot to death.

The neighbor apparently made a fast move west, and has not been seen nor heard of since.

The family had the bitter word as to the manner of his death put on Thompson's tombstone, and many a visitor to peaceful Halesboro has been moved to curiosity by the sight.

Time has created other mysteries at the old graveyard. Tucked on the fringes of the trees are wooden markers from the very early days. The names of those buried are long unknown, weather having erased the careful information once carved there by a pocket knife. The trees and brambles have reclaimed some of

these graves, the age of which no one knows.

Most of the headstones testify that gravestones with chiseled carvings were available in the early 1850's. That seems to be when the first burial dates appeared.

Halesboro was the site of the lodge charter which is now at Deport, and the masons are well represented there by stones with the masonic emblem on them.

Woodmen of the World are easily spotted. Many a tree with the Woodmen emblem stands sentinel there.

Some dates and misspellings are found on the stones. This was due to stonemasons having regular routes

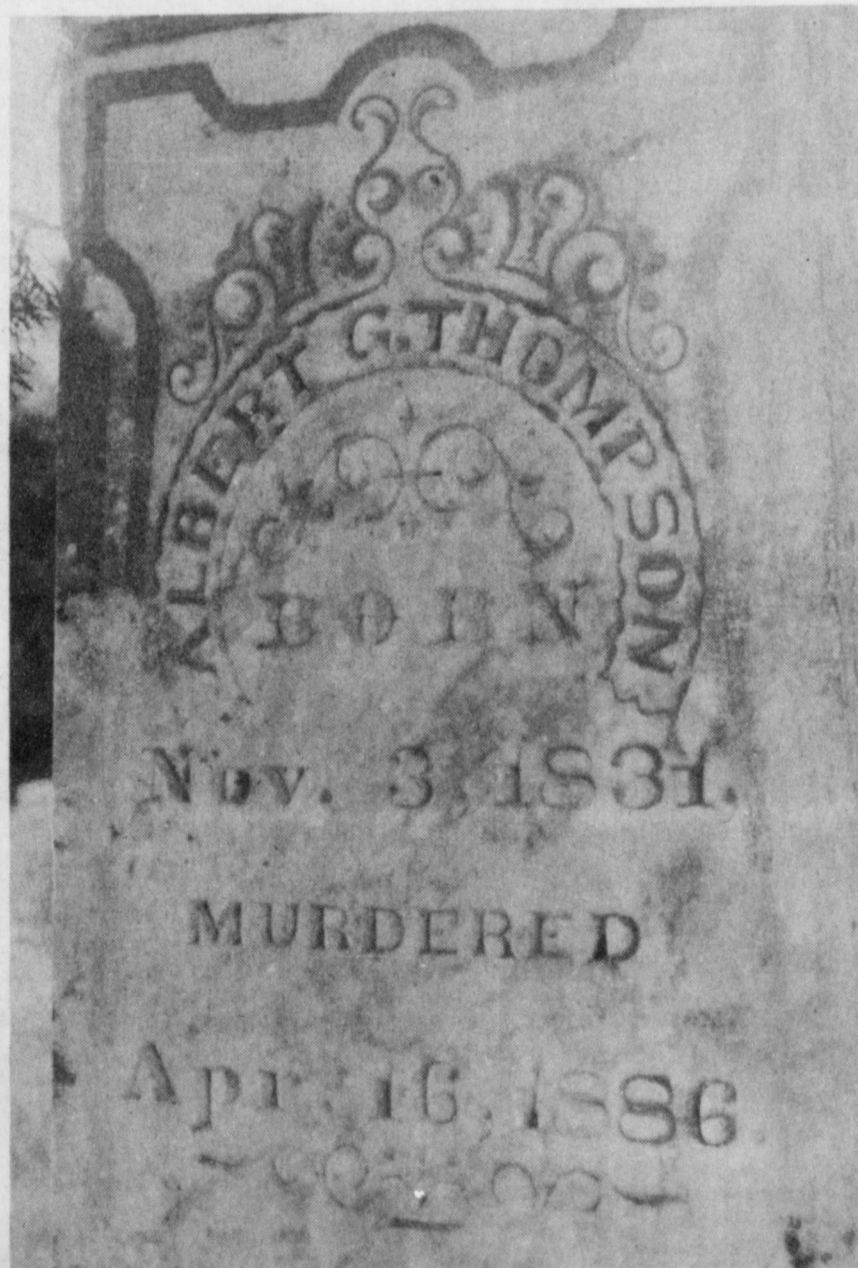
throughout the countryside. The morticians might have the stones, but the information often was six months to a year being added. When the stonemason arrived, he would do numbers of graves at the same time.

Halesboro was once a bustling town of banks and doctors, churches and schools, but the railroad passed it by. Without rail transportation businesses

# GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U

## Letter Writing Starts The Family Tree Research

After we have received all the replies to the letter we wrote last week, we are ready to start our research. The starting point of your research is determined by the answer to your letters and whatever previous knowledge of your family records you have.

In many cases, you may receive information such as birth and marriage locations and dates for several generations back. No matter where you start your research, we all need to follow the same principle. This I call the second principle of genealogical research-letter writing.

You begin with the last person you have any information on. Let us use the name Selma Bakken for an example. She was born in 1906 at Benson Swift Co., Minnesota. This is all that we

presently know about her.

In order to find out more information about her, we call or write the following. First, we will write to the county clerk. Some counties call this office District Clerk, Probate Judges Court, etc. To see if they have her birth certificate and if so, how much it will cost for an uncertificated copy, contact any of these offices.

In the case of Selma Bakken, I received a copy of her birth certificate which gave her parents name, Sam Bakken and Ranghilda Christensen, their ages and that Selma was the fifth child to be born to this couple. It also said that Ranghilda was born in Swift Co., Minnesota and that Sam was born in Norway.

After receiving information, I wrote and obtained Ranghilda's birth

records. When we find this information, do not forget to put the certificates in the correct folders, place their name on the family tree chart, and place a tack on your map to represent the location.

Secondly, you should continue writing to this office for more information on the other relatives in the county.

Sooner or later you will run up against a dead end and all your information will seem to stop. This is the time to try the second phase of this principle. First you contact the newspaper in the nearest town to where your relatives had lived, asking for information on them.

Secondly, you contact the phone company or directory

assistance and obtain names and telephone numbers of any people with the same surname in the area. Finally, you contact the Chamber of Commerce for a city or county map, information about housing, schools, churches, and a telephone book.

The principle of letter writing is a tremendously

important principle. It is so important that each of its three phases will be discussed in the upcoming weeks at great length.

The third and final phase is persistency. You need to write four letters a day, five days a week for the next two weeks. Make sure you divide them between the above sources.

As you will notice when you receive replies to these letters, many of your relatives lived near each other. Pattern of settlement, relationship, development, and westward movement will be discussed on a greater detail next week when we talk about the third principle of genealogical research-census records.

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

- 1/2 pound boneless chicken breast
  - 1/2 small bunch broccoli 3 scallions
  - 1/4 pound mushrooms
  - 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
  - 1 teaspoon cornstarch
  - 1/4 teaspoon NoSalt Salt Alternative
  - 1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper
  - 1/3 cup dry white wine

Cut chicken into 3/4-inch cubes; reserve. Cut off tough ends of broccoli stalks; discard. Cut remainder into small flowerets and short lengths of stalks. (You should have 2 cups.) Slice scallions including about 3 inches of green part. Halve or quarter mushrooms if large. Heat oil in wok or large skillet; add chicken.

## New Trespass Laws Tougher

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said hunters and fishermen in the state should be aware that the state's trespass laws now have more teeth.

House Bill 717 enacted by the 67th Texas Legislature went into effect last Sept. 1 and it increased fines and or jail sentences for those caught trespassing.

Persons trespassing to hunt with firearms or bow and arrow are subject to "Class A" misdemeanor charges, which carry a fine of not more than \$2,000 and or not more than one year in jail. The Class A misdemeanor trespass also includes entering a person's habitation, whether or not the trespasser is carrying a weapon.

Trespassers not carrying a weapon are subject to Class B misdemeanor charges, which carry a fine of not more than \$1000 and or 180 days in jail.

Officials also remind sportsmen that they can be charged with trespassing on property even if the area is not posted with signs.

Crossing any fence or any other enclosure designed to keep livestock in or trespassers out constitutes trespassing. Also, "no trespassing" signs are sufficient to keep out trespassers in the absence of a fence.

Further, if a landowner notifies a person orally or in writing that he cannot trespass, that person is obliged to stay off the land even if it is not fenced or posted with signs.

Further questions about trespass laws can be answered by your local game warden.

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**2 charter members due recognition this week ....  
15 started Rodeo Association in '48**

Two of the four surviving charter members of the Bogata Rodeo Association that was started in 1948 at Rosalie will be honored at performances of the 1982 Bogata Rodeo.

Travis Hale will be honored at the Friday night rodeo, while James (Hokey) Gibson will be saluted at the closing performance on Saturday night.

The Bogata Rodeo Association was established at the 1948 meeting in Rosalie and after a cattle show in 1949, the first association's first rodeo was held on Aug. 17, 18 and 19, 1950 at Bogata Stock. The initial rodeo was provided by Ramsay's Ranch of DeKalb.

There were approximately 15 charter members of the Bogata association, with the four surviving members being Hale, Gibson, Jessie Gray and Steve Biggerstaff.

There are currently 70 members of the Bogata Rodeo Association. The group holds monthly meetings throughout the year and will begin plans for the 1983 performances immediately after this year's

rodeo is concluded. "They are a busy bunch of hardworking men who go to a great deal of trouble to have the great rodeos you have in Bogata each and every year," a spokesman says.

Serving as this year's officers are Johnny Hudson, president; Robert Kennedy, vice president; and Donnie Strain, secretary-treasurer. Members of the board of directors are C.R. Williams, Morris Foster, Bernie Huddleston, Rayford Yancey, Sam McConnell and John Brooks.

Although reports give no estimate on the crowd at the 1950 rodeo, it was stated that the "grandstands were full and overflowing".

Those 1950 performances were held at 8:30 p.m. and were lighted by 14 large electric lamps of 1500-watt capacity.

**Pick-up men, horses have vital role**

The job of the pick-up men is no job for amateurs because their responsibilities are many. Their abilities as horsemen and riders are obvious requirements to accomplish their prime duty of getting bronc riders off their bucking mounts and on the ground safely and quickly.

The care of highly prized bucking horses is also entrusted to the pick-up men while an event is in progress, from the quick removal of the flank strap to a safe exit to the stripping chute.

The horses these men ride contribute greatly to their success or failure. Top pick-up horses must have great size, speed, endurance, courage, and maneuverability, a combination of traits seldom found in the average horse.

**FIRST RODEO**

Pecos is credited as site for the first rodeo in America, in 1883, when foremen of two rival ranches conducted a July 4th celebration that included roping, racing and riding contests for hands of local ranches, whose owners made up the purses. The first rodeo was so popular that it was made into an annual event.

400 or more cowboys and cowgirls competing in the Bogata rodeo. Emery is one cowboy who got a late start in his profession but lost little time in making a name for himself.

Bruce went to the 1981 finals in second place behind James Finley. He won a second the first night but missed placing the second go. He was just out of the money on Friday night but had a good chance to win the average. Bruce got his steer on Saturday night in 4.50 and won a first and the average also winning the CRA Championship.

Steer wrestling needs three things for a cowboy to be successful, 1) perfect timing, 2) skill, and 3) muscle.

It, like most of the other events, has no roots in everyday ranch work. It was first used as an exhibition at wild west shows but later was used as one of the standard events in rodeo.

Modern steer wrestling utilizes a technique which relies on timing and leverage more than on brute strength. Today's steer wrestler hauls two horses, one which is used by a hazer, and the other used by the dogger. After the dogger jumps from his horse to the steers horns, he stops the animal and twists his head until he falls to the ground with all four feet in one direction.

A good run is a time from 3 to 5 seconds.

## Oklahoma cousins wage duel for '81 calf-roping honors title

The 1981 championship in the calf roping event came down to a shootout between two Oklahoma cousins -- Jack and Dick Foreman. Jack led Dick by \$500 going

into the Finals, but Dick was very experienced at winning championships. He had won both the calf roping and All Around titles in Central States in 1978.

But Jack had all the luck in the Finals, clinching the championship after the third go-round.

Jack won seven firsts during the season and earned a total of \$5,396.08. His biggest payoff was at Seminole, Okla., where he won \$1,064 for first place.

Jack has qualified for all

five Central States Finals and also qualified for the International Finals four times during the 1970s. In 1974, he was the average winner in calf roping at the IFR.

He has also won calf roping titles in the ACRA in 1980 and the SCA in 1972, as well as the All-Around title in the Indian Association in 1977.

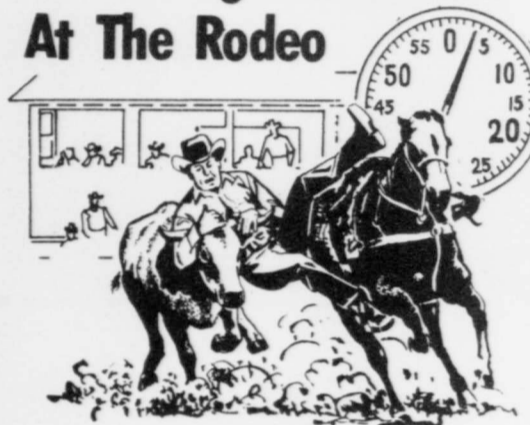

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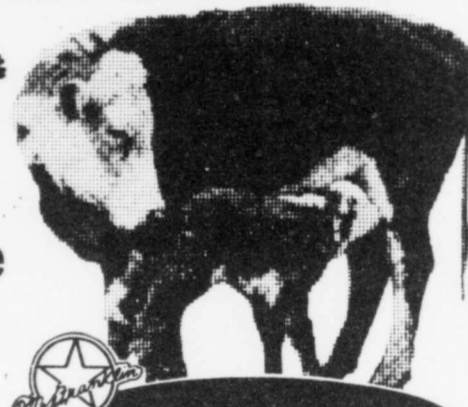

Bogata was well represented by people of this area at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Ft. Worth, Sunday, Feb. 4, 1962, which was designated as Bogata Day. Bogata had a representation of 49. Bogata Day was sponsored by the Bogata Community Chamber of Commerce and the Bogata Roping Club.

Miss Donna Ann Rozell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Rozell, was selected as the Queen. Miss Rozell rode in the Grand Entry at the matinee performance and was introduced to the capacity crowd as Bogata Rodeo Queen.

The Bogata section was spotlighted and their representatives were asked to stand for recognition. Citizens of Bogata who attended the show Sunday agreed that the City of Bogata received far more recognition and publicity at the show than was expected.



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## Saddle bronc event attracts fewest rodeo riders

Although saddle bronc riding is the cornerstone of all rodeo competition, there are fewer saddle bronc riders than any other event in professional rodeo.

There's a good reason -- the instinctive reactions required to keep in the stirrups, sense what a horse will do next and the rhythm required, because there is nothing solid to hold onto.

A long rein, usually made of braided Manila, is fastened onto the halter of

the bucking horse. Spurs are short-shanked with dull rowels. Chaps are of light leather, snugged tight around the thigh.

The dependency a cowboy has on his rein makes the difference between a good and a champion rider. A man who is not dependent on the rein alone will get a higher mark for his full arc strokes, or "licks."

His spurred feet should fall into rhythmic stride, going to

the animal's shoulders as it kicks high behind, moving back toward the saddle's cantle as the bronc jumps.

Equally important is the fact that some horses will buck better if the passenger isn't just hanging onto the rein with brute strength.

The rider is downgraded by the judges for losing control, or "getting into a storm." The saddle also hinders the rider's recovery from this loss of control.

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## Kelly Ray missed chance for all-around honors

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Kelly Allred Ray of Lavaca, Ark., missed her chance for fame in 1981. Oh, sure, she repeated her championship in barrel racing, but something much bigger was at stake.

Had she won money in any other event, she would have been very much in the competition for the championship of the All-Around event.

And had she won the All-Around, she would have been the first woman in any association to do so. But all of that speculation was for naught when she decided to just concentrate on her barrel racing.

She earned \$8,370.85 to outdistance her nearest rival by \$2,700 and breezed to her second straight Central States barrel racing title.

The year 1981 was a busy one for Kelly, who married Mike Ray of Lavaca, Ark., in the midst of winning the Central States, Arkansas Rodeo Association, Arkansas Barrel Racing Association and Arkansas High School Rodeo Association titles. All four titles were repeats of championships won in 1980.

She has also won the ARA Finals in 1979 and 1980 as well as being named to the Cowboy Hall of Fame.

## Crowther didn't win in first 5 months

Jimmy Crowther, of Roxbury, Kans., went the first five months of the 1981 season without winning a

penny on the Central States Circuit.

His first victory of the season didn't come until mid-June and it wasn't even in his specialty - bull riding. He won his first money of the season by taking first place in team roping at Herrington, Kan.

He finally won money in bull riding by taking the \$1,231.20 first prize at Seminole, Okla. That was all he needed to get things into motion.

In the three months between mid-June and the end of the season in mid-September, Crowther won a record-setting amount of money on the Central States circuit. He earned a total of

\$10,267.16 overall and \$10,080.34 in the bull riding alone.

That was the first time a Central States cowboy ever earned more than \$10,000 in bull riding, and also the first time a Central States cowboy earned more than \$10,000 before the Finals.

Crowther, who had previously won the bull riding title in Central States in 1977, finished the year with \$10,933.81 after the Finals. He entered 37 rodeos, rode 35 times and won money on 28 bulls.

He outdistanced 1980 bull riding winner Gary Hiner, of Cuthand, nearly \$2,500 and led All-Around runnerup Joe Robinson by almost \$4,000.

## Wager won first in 20 different rodeos

Rome Wager was determined in 1981 to correct the mistakes he had made in 1980.

Wager was leading the saddle bronc event going into the 1980 Central States Finals Rodeo, but was beaten out at the Finals by a determined Mike Fletcher. Wager didn't go home empty-handed, though. The Eagle Butte, S.D., rider won the saddle bronc riding

Rookie-of-the-Year honors.

In 1981, Fletcher moved on, leaving Wager in control of the entire event. And Wager took advantage of it. Wager earned \$6,699.55 in 1981 - a Central States record. He won first place in 20 different rodeos. His nearest competitor, Calvin Merriman of Clarksville, won the average at the Finals, but still finished nearly \$3,000 behind Wager.

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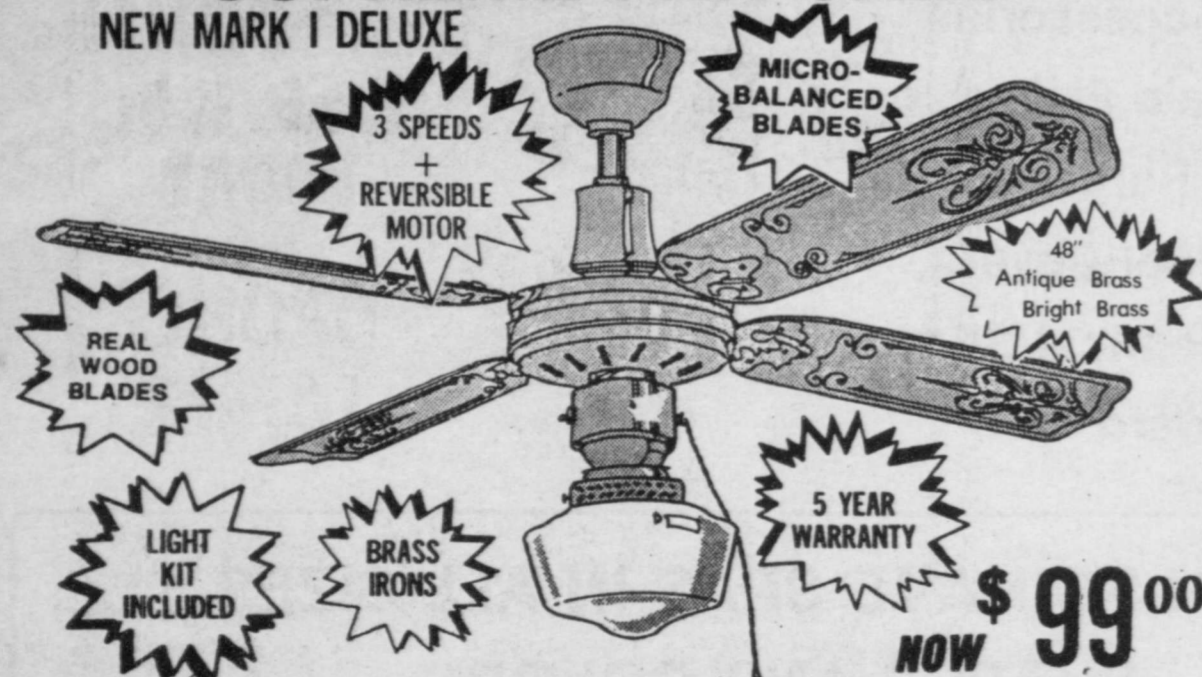
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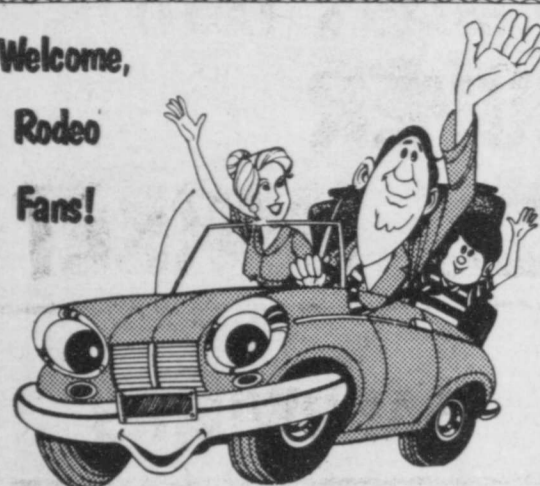

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**Hot streak in 1981 stretch ....**

**Cuthand's Gary Hiner set torrid wind-up**

There was no cowboy alive who could beat the streak Gary Hiner, of Cuthand, was on the last few months of 1981.

Although he wasn't in contention to repeat the bull riding championship he had won in Central States in 1980, it didn't keep him from competing better in the last three months of 1981 than ever before.

It began with "The World's Richest Bull Riding" at Billy Bob's honky-tonk in Fort Worth in October. Hiner was matched against the best bull riders in the world - the ones from the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. Hiner scored more points than PRCA stars Donnie

Gay, Denny Flynn and Bobby DelVecchio to take the first prize and more than \$20,000, the richest purse ever in bull riding.

Three weeks later Hiner came to the Central States Finals Rodeo with the same attitude. As a result, he came away with the best

showing of any cowboy in the history of the Finals. He won the Finals average, taking first in three of the four go-rounds. In two

go-rounds he had record scores of 89 points. Hiner finished the Finals with 341 points, 33 points more than his closest

competitor, Dale Haraway of Oklahoma City. His lowest score at the Finals was an 81 to take third place in the fourth go-round.

Annual rodeo sponsored by the Bogata Roping Club is announced for June 22-25, 1960, J.C. Ward of Coalgate, Ok., to furnish the stock.

The customary big horseback parade is announced for 4 p.m., Wednesday, June 22, and all entry fees must be paid before that hour at the R&R Cafe, rodeo headquarters.

Entrance fees range from \$10 for ladies barrel race to \$20 for calf-roping, \$15 being set for bareback bronc riding, bull riding and bulldogging.

In addition a cutting horse contest will be conducted under National Cutting Horse Association rules.

Mack Mitchell and "Trixie Bee" will appear in a cutting and trick horse exhibition. A street dance will be another feature of the four-night entertainment.



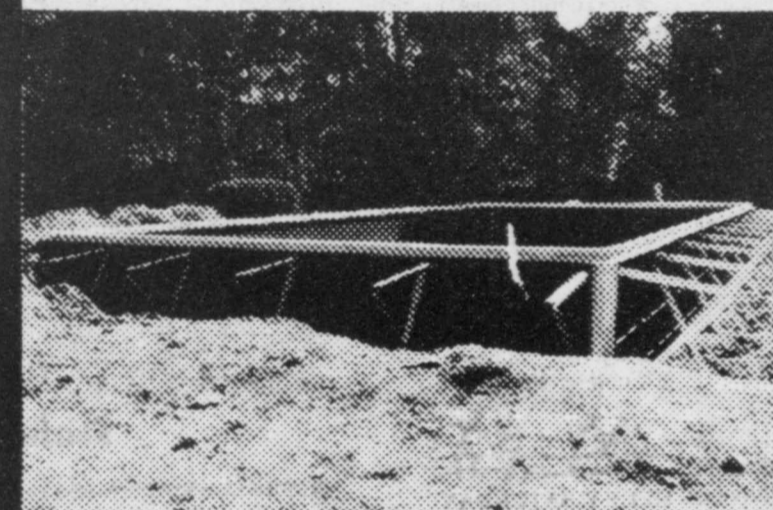

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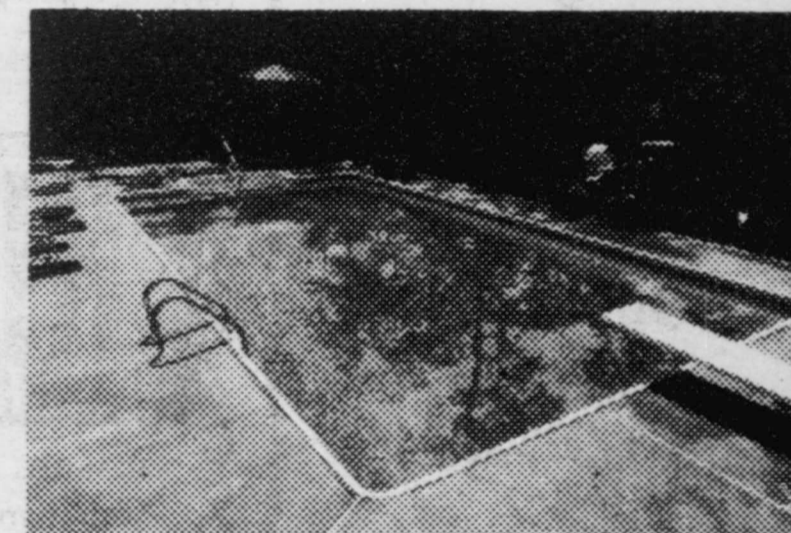
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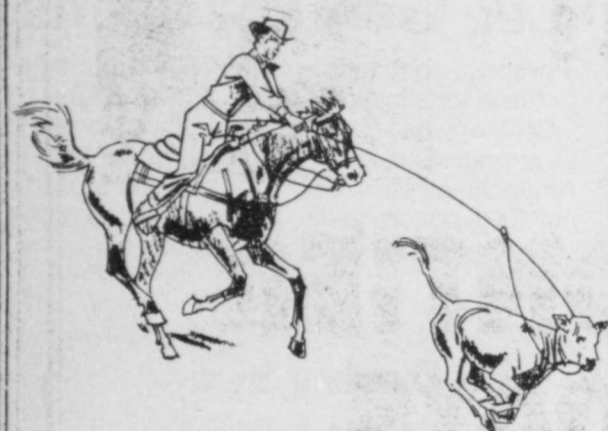
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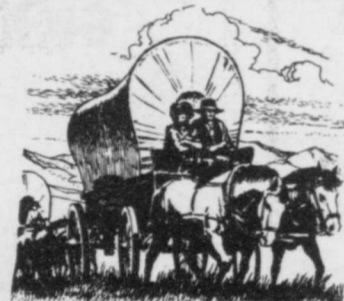


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**Cooper current champ ....**

**8-seconds important  
in bareback**

Bobby Cooper current bareback champion in the CRA will be at the Bogata rodeo, June 24-26. Bobby won more than \$5,000 in the CRA and was second in the first go round at the 1981 CRA Finals. He came back in the third go and won a first with a great ride of 82 points and \$255, to win the championship buckle and saddle at the finals.

The 8-second bareback ride is confusing because sometimes a cowboys' wild spurring appears to be simply showing off while in fact the rhythm of a man's legs on his horse is all that keep the rigging - a handhold on the surcingle - from being torn out of his hand.

The bareback rider throws his feet forward in time with the horse's jumps, and at the same time this motion keeps his seat close to his riding hand. He's well aware that once he slips away from the handhold he's on the launching pad. The further back he gets on a high-kicking horse the further out he is on the catapult.

Also the cowboy who has his riding arm straightened invariably winds up having his clenched riding hand jerked open.

Rules require the rider's dulled spurs be over the break of the horse's shoulders when the animal lands the first jump out of the chute. Some bareback

brons wheel out almost as quickly as the gate can be jerked open and the cowboy has a hard time keeping that outside foot where it is required to be.

The judges are looking for the horse that gives the rider the most trouble for the full eight seconds.

Onlookers when hearing the score often are mystified because the bronc who threw a spectacular whinging, perhaps several times, wasn't marked higher. They failed to take into consideration that for some of the eight seconds the horse, in the judge's opinion, wasn't difficult to stay on.



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The Old California Trail of 1849 passed through St. Jo, Texas, as did the cattle trails of the 1870s. As a result, St. Jo held rodeos every Saturday during the summer, bringing together some of the finest riders of the range.

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**Bull riding is most dangerous event**

The most popular - and most dangerous - event in rodeo is bull riding. Serious injury occurs more often in this event than any other in rodeo.

Capable of savage, sustained bucking, these crossbred Brahman are fast and powerful, and most weigh more than 1,500 pounds.

They add insult to injury many times by trying to gore or trample a fallen rider. They are just as dangerous in the chute before a ride as they pin a rider's leg against the chute, which could easily break the leg.

Woven with a single handhold, a flat-braided length of Manila rope about an inch and a quarter thick is used as a noose around the bull, set just behind the animal's shoulders.

A weighted belt is also attached and falls free when the ride is completed. Tightly strapped spurs and a riding glove complete the necessary gear.

When the rope feels right to the rider, he takes a the free end of the rope and lays it across his palm. Then he wraps it once behind his hand and lays it across his palm again. He clenches his fist and hunches his body close to his hand. As soon as he feels the bull standing squarely, he nods his head and the gate swings open.

Some cowboys claim a Brahma bull can buck anybody off, anytime it turns

on full power. Staying in the middle of one calls for balance and strong riding arm.

Spinning bulls are considered more hazardous to ride than those that buck straightaway. There is more danger of being trampled or butted if a rider falls to the inside of the whirling animal.

As long as the cowboy doesn't touch the bull with his free hand and still has his riding hand on some part of the rope at the end of eight seconds, the judges will score his ride on how hard the bull bucked and how well the cowboy rode.

**Barrel race**

Barrel racing is the oldest event for girls in rodeo.

A girl must be an expert rider, able to ride a horse at full speed while making a clover-leaf pattern around the barrels.

The horses are highly trained and usually cost several thousand dollars.

It takes several years of hard work to get a horse trained well enough to compete on a professional level.

## Wes Ward won '81 rookie honors

But it took some doing in CRA finals

When the 1981 Central States Finals Rodeo began, Wes Ward of Coalgate, Okla., was only \$200 away from taking the Rookie of the Year honors. It was assumed he would win the \$200 early in the Finals, but that just didn't happen.

Going into the last go-round of the Finals, Ward hadn't won a penny. He needed a first or second place in the bareback ring event to take the title. What once had looked easy began to look like the impossible dream for Ward.

But Ward said he didn't feel any pressure going into the last go-round and went on the make one of the most spectacular rides in the history of the Finals.

Ward scored a ride of 83, which was not only the best ride of the go-round, but also the best of the four-day

Finals as well as a record-setting bareback ride in the five-year history of the Finals.

He earned \$333.33 to win the go-round and the top rookie honor.

The 19-year-old Ward won a total of \$2,580.96 in his rookie season, finishing sixth in the bareback riding event for the year. He won five first, including a prize of \$370.50 for first place at Osceola, Mo.

Ward was a top 15 finalist in the National High School Finals in 1980 and won the Oklahoma high school bareback crown that same year.

## cowboy badge

"A cowboy is normally a peaceful man, but one sure way of making him mad is to touch or take his hat. If you deform a cowboy's hat, he'll likely try to deform you," said cowboy artist Jim Sayre, of Deadwood, South Dakota.

The feeling a cowboy has for his hat has developed out of more than a century of tradition of a hat being a part of a cowboy's image, equipment or trade.

"A hat is the badge of a cowboy," said the rodeo artist who was formerly a Brahma bull rider.

"A typical cowboy will spend his last dime on a good hat, because a hat is important for his ego and helps him look the part. Anyone who wears a cowboy hat is saying he wants to be identified with this way of life," Sayre said.

For the true cowboy, a hat symbolizes and expresses the spirit of the old West. Today, the hat remains the strongest link with the past since its style is truly American in origin.

"The better the hat a cowboy wears the more people are impressed. Everyone looks at your hat before they look at your shoes, because they are looking at your face when they talk to you," said Johnny Smith of Denton, Texas.

"A cowboy may not always be able to wear the best pair of jeans or shirt, but he will always have a

what part of the country a cowboy was from, or what his rodeo event was from the style of his hat, but that these differences are disappearing as various styles become more available in stores

Over the years, the cowboy hat has also been associated with many superstitions and stories. For example, never throw a hat on a bed as it will bring bad luck before the day is done. Or, if a cowboy

wears his hat tilted to one side, watch him closely, as he probably can't be trusted.

A favorite hat has also been known to bring good luck. Casey Tibbs, the famous saddle bronc rider, always spit in his hat before each event to help insure good luck.

And people have also been known to be married wearing their hats, and to take their hats with them when they are buried.



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## Courageous clowns

If the desire to ride bulls is mystifying for the average rodeo spectator, the occupation of a rodeo clown must appear to be downright suicidal.

To a bull rider, the clown is one of the most important men in the world.

When a bull rider leaves a bull - intentionally or not - only the clown is there to keep the bull from hooking, butting or running over the fallen rider.

Most bulls don't lower their head and charge. They will keep their eyes glued to a fallen or scrambling cowboy and they can move with lightning speed. They can hook and butt

and they don't seem a bit concerned about where they put their feet. A rodeo clown may often have to slap a bull around the head to get him to turn his attention away from a fallen rider.

Whatever their specialty, most bullfighting clowns have contested in rodeo and are hooked on the sport. Along with cowboys, they share in the emphasis the sport places on freedom.

They would rather lead a tough life than trade one bit of freedom.


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## Here's Some Tips On Pro Rodeo

One of the foremost thoughts of a first-time rodeo spectator is wondering just what is going

on down there in the arena.

violation of this rule. A hand can make a perfect ride on an impossible horse and still get a "goose egg" for missing the horse out.

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It's easy to tell if a cowboy makes the whistle in a riding event or takes all day in a timed event—but why are some cowboys that make the tooter given a no score and how come some ropers were fined ten seconds and others weren't.

Well, each event has its own set of rules. These rules are made by the contestants themselves and usually serve two purposes: make it harder on the cowboy; easier on the livestock.

In the horse riding events, the rider is required to spur his horse out of the chute. This means that his spurs must be touching the horse somewhere ahead of the shoulder slope the first time his mount touches the arena floor with his front feet. Miss one out and the no score is automatic. If the judge turns away from the rider right there in front of the chute, he's usually writing down a zero for

In all riding events, the cowboy is required to keep one hand free and in the air at all times. If he so much as touches his mount with his free hand he is given a no score. This infraction is most common in the bull riding.

How come one cowboy rode a rank horse and another rode one my kid sister could ride and still scored higher? Easy, cowboys are judged on how well they ride, usually meaning where and how much they spur their mount. The animal and the rider are marked separately and the total is what counts. Thus, a poor ride on an outstanding bucking animal will usually not beat a good riding on an average animal.

All other timed events are conducted behind a barrier. The barrier gives the calf or steer a head start and leaving the box too soon costs the contestant 10 seconds for a broken barrier.

A calf roper can catch his calf any way he can make the rope fit but a team roper must catch his steer around the neck or horns before the heel catch may be made.

A steer wrestler is simply required to throw his steer so that he is on his side with all four feet clear from under him. He must be touching his steer when he is flagged by the field judge.

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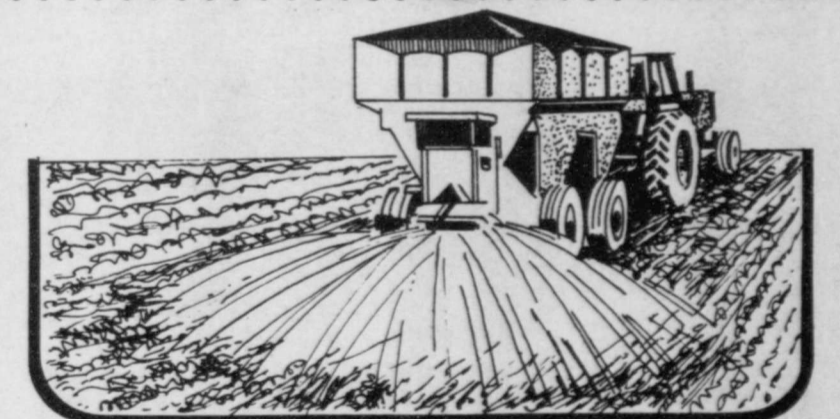
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
