Last week we related how Deport and Blossom decided they needed a railroad. No picture of the engine can be located, but the train locomotive for the Oklahoma, Red River & Texas Railroad, (O-R-T) came to Blossom over the Texas & Pacific Railroad when the O-R-T began to build to Deport, and the promoter of the railroad, by the name of Moore, sat on the cowcatcher as the engine pulled into Blossom. A picture of the train was published in the Blossom Bee back in 1908, but is apparently no more.

The locomotive was wood burning, small, not one of the huge monsters

used to pull the massive, long freight or passenger trains of the times.

The railroad had it's beginning at Blossom and ended at Deport. Ac-

ording to P.B. Bailey, author of the story published by A.W. Neville, the

train was like the newspaper at Pattonville "born a weakling and died in infancy".

The railroad had an organized stock company and elected officers. Who the officers were has been lost in time. One man, C.P. Moore, was the director, president, superintendent and roadmaster. In fact, it seemed he had the "whole cheese" wrapped up with one major exception, he had other people financing the project.

Moore and a mysterious partner named Palmer first appeared in Blossom, where their flowery speeches and golden promises had prominent businessmen very interested. When the two showed up in Deport there was even more interest,

and they made it seem a sound business proposition.

They said that for a stipulated amount of cash and the right-of-way between the two towns they would build a railroad & have it in operation within a short time. The subscribers were told that the short line would soon be part of a road that was to come out of Oklahoma crossing the Red River northwest of Blossom, where it would then go into the tracks to Deport and onward to Louisiana. This was a major factor in making the plan seem financially sound, and a fact that was never to be. More of the story of the railroad and some of it's quirks and eccentricities will be forthcoming.

## Oil, But Also Salt Water

Salt water has interfered with drilling for oil west of Deport, on land owned by Marvin Couch. Empire Oil Co., headed by John Ward of Bogata, is doing the drilling. The well was down to 1,470 feet when it struck both oil and salt water. The salt water, it is feared, is in such large quantities that it will

result in discontinuation of drilling. An estimated 60,000 gallons of the salt water would have to be pumped from the oil well into a separate well drilled for that purpose. The expense will probably outweigh the oil production and the drilling rig is expected to leave the site sometime this week.

## Milo Field Day Set At Webb Farm Monday

The annual Lamar County Milo Field Day will be held Monday evening on the Webb Farm in the Byrdtown Community, midway between Pattonville and Blossom, starting at 7 p.m.

In addition to inspecting the various demonstrations, a question and answer session with seed company

representatives, the field day will be capped off with a watermelon supper, compliments of Paymaster Seed.

The farm hosts, Melvin, Mark and Les Webb, invite all interested persons to attend the event. To reach the site, take FM 196 from either Blossom or Pattonville, then turn east on the black top road located about three miles from either town. The demonstration block is about one mile east of FM 196, on the right.

County Agent Paul Payne will lead the tour and answer questions concerning the various demonstrations.

The first stop will be the County Milo Variety Demonstration. It includes 17 varieties representing most of the major seed companies. All of the varieties have bloomed and the earlier maturing are turning color. (See FIELD DAY, Page 6)

## Tips For Band Beginners

(Ed. Note: The Prairiland School District is inaugurating a band program with the 1982-83 school year. To assist the student and parent in deciding which instrument may be best suited for the student, Band Director Dave Clark, over the next 3 issues of The Times, will describe the various instruments and desirable physical features of the student, such as lips, teeth and fingers.)

This week we will discuss band instruments in the Woodwind Family for beginners. These include the flute, clarinet, alto and tenor saxophone.

**FLUTE:** The prospective flute player needs to have even teeth, normal overbite and medium-sized lips.

The upper lip needs to have a

natural arch rather than a "cupid's bow." The "cupid's bow" or "bud" that is prevalent in many upper lips tends to divide the air stream, thereby making tone production very difficult.

Cap braces are not painful for the flute player, but can hinder a beginner's progress. Once the student learns to produce a sound without braces, adding braces at a later date is not as severe as trying to begin with them.

The fingers should not be double-jointed. The test for double-jointed fingers is to press on a table top with the fingers. If the student can press the fingers and experience a folding under or locking sensation in the joints, the student can assume he has normal joints.

**CLARINET:** The prospective clarinet player needs to have a normal overbite. Some protrusion of the upper teeth will not hamper progress if the lower teeth are even on the biting surface.

Lips ranging from thin to medium thickness are best for beginners.

The fingers need to be wide enough to cover the holes. The finger joints need to be normal. Double-jointed fingers make the clarinet a frustrating experience.

Cap braces do not cause problems for the clarinet player.

**ALTO & TENOR SAXOPHONE:** The physical and oral structure of the student can be of most reasonably normal design. Only a pronounced underbite would prove detrimental to the student's success.

Cap braces do not usually cause pain.

The tenor saxophone is a larger instrument and requires slightly longer arms.

+++++

Other woodwind instruments that are not normally suitable for beginners are the oboe and bassoon. These instruments are for the serious minded, intellectual students who are prepared to work harder and expect slower progress.

These instruments are also more expensive and delicate. Most students start on one of the other woodwinds and then switch over at a later date.

Maybe these descriptions mentioned will help the parent and child decide which instrument is best.

We will have a night meeting for parents and students after school starts and I will again describe and play each instrument. I will then talk with each parent and examine the student's lips, fingers and teeth and will recommend an instrument for the child.

## Manslaughter Charges Filed In Traffic Death

A 24-year-old Detroit man was fatally injured in a car-truck crash in Blossom early Friday and the driver of the car in which the victim was a passenger has been charged with involuntary manslaughter.

Wesley Allen Conley, riding in a car driven by Mickey Lee Bates of Paris, died in a Paris hospital at 2:37 a.m. Friday, about 2½ hours after the accident on Highway 82 at Center Street in Blossom.

Bates, who suffered minor injuries in the crash, was placed under \$10,000 bond when arraigned before Justice of the Peace Chester Oakes on the involuntary manslaughter charge.

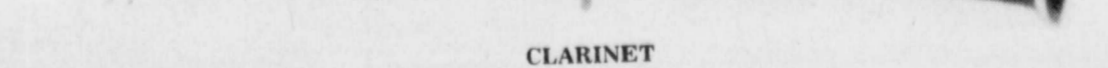
A Department of Public Safety report said Bates was eastbound on Highway 82 with Conley as a passenger in the car. Bates attempted to make a left turn onto Center Street when his vehicle was struck broadside by a tractor-trailer truck traveling west on Highway 82, the DPS report said.

Conley was thrown from the car, which flipped over and landed on top of him, the DPS says. Passing motorists used bumper jacks to lift the car off Conley, after which he was rushed to the hospital.

The truck driver, Robert H. Nattin of Hugo, Okla., was not injured in the accident, according to the DPS report.

# Church Records Offer Valuable Data

## Genealogy Begins With U

There are normally three major events in a person's life (birth, marriage and death). All three events also play an important part of a person's religious life. Since churches were normally founded at or near the very beginning of a town's settlement, church records play an important role in genealogical research.

Birth records may be found in baptism records, blessings, or other similar religious practices. These records will usually state the date on this event, date of birth, child or person's name and names or parents, relatives or sponsors.

By following up on these leads, their records furnish unlimited opportunity for further research.

If you find a person's baptism record at a church, write to see if they have any records for their parents,

brothers, sisters, uncles, aunts and grandparents.

Marriage records are often found in the records of a church. This record will normally give you the maiden name of the wife, the age of the bride and groom and it may also give you the name of the parents.

Although death records may include information such as birth, marriage and death dates, it may be more valuable for information on the name of the next of kin, children of deceased, brothers or sisters and the parents. Because throughout their history churches have been taking care of cemeteries, these cemetery records will also be very important.

In the case of genealogical research, persistency pays off. One fact or date revealed today becomes the clue for the next fact or date

tomorrow.

Please remember, when writing a church or any other place for information, be specific. Ask for information on one person or his family at a time. Always begin your research of church records at the local church your relatives attended.

If you have any questions about any genealogical problem, write me in care of your newspaper office and I will answer you. Next week we discuss the seventh genealogical principle - The Newspaper.





## AUTO TIPS

**Checking Treadwear**

A tire's ability to hold the road decreases as the tire's tread wears down. When the depth of a tire's groove is one-16th of an inch or less, lateral wear bars appear across the grain of the tread.

A tire that reaches this point is potentially hazardous, particularly on wet pavement, and should be replaced, according to Bill Woehle, manager of industry standards for Uniroyal Tire Company.

The tread depth of a tire can be easily measured with a ruler, or with a Lincoln-head penny, he says. If a ruler is not available, insert the penny with Lincoln's head down; if you can see all of Lincoln's head, the tread is less than one-16th of an inch and the tire needs to be replaced.

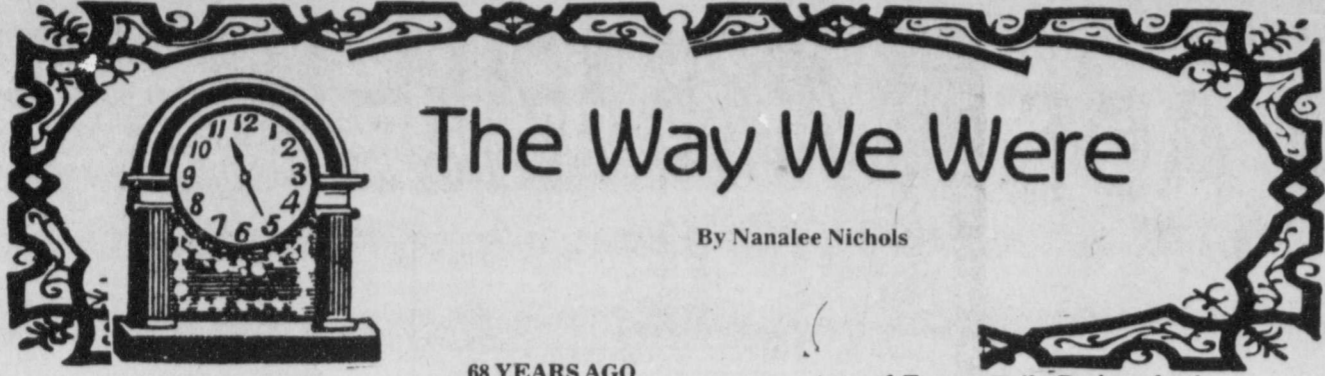
