Raymond Highnight said that "back in those days we didn't really know what was happening from one community to the next, as each little community was world in itself".

That's a fact that has vanished from life in today's society.

Back then, this area was dotted with little towns. Hoovertown, Byrdtown, Halesboro, White Oak, all had stores, schools and a sense of closeness.

The larger places, Milton, Fulbright, Deport, Blossom, had oil mills, schools, one or two banks, three or four doctors, half a dozen churches, pharmacies, and no telling what other types of businesses.

Travel was limited to horseback, wagons or buggies, or by foot. Most youngsters were well acquainted with the "foot" mode of travel. Necessarily, this meant that an excursion of six or seven miles was an all day trip.

Old timers recall that a trip to Paris was sometimes only a yearly or bi-yearly thing. It meant a stop-over with some relative, or at one of the many hotels available.

Neighbors knew one another well. And over-abundance of vegetables, milk, eggs or anything else was shared. Folks went together and purchased and killed a beef, since no one family had a means of keeping a whole one before the days of refrigeration.

There was a community spirit that has faded since TV's have replaced front porches and rocking chairs.

Times have changed, and we all lead rapid-paced lives, but a resurgence of community spirit sometimes seems evident.

As economic times tighten up again, it seems that small communities are beginning to function on a more neighborly basis too.

Times were hard back then...but everyone shared them. It just may be possible that the same thing is happening again...and if so...it is a good thing!

## Jail, Prairiland Bond Issues Both On Sept. 11 Ballot

Voters in Deport, Blossom and other areas of the Prairiland School District will have a pair of bond issues on which to mark their verdict when they go to the polls in special elections on Sept. 11.

The Lamar commissioners court this week set the Sept. 11 date for a countywide bond election for funds to construct an estimated \$2.25-million new jail facility.

Prairiland school trustees, several weeks ago, selected the Sept. 11 date as the time to ask voters of the school district to approve a \$750,000 bond issue to finance new construction, remodeling and repairs for schools in the Prairiland district.

Some supporters of the Prairiland bond issue reportedly are not too happy about the county selecting the same date for submitting the con-

troversial county jail question to the voters. They believe the controversy over the jail dispute will increase the negative spinoff onto the school proposal.

Architect Bill Lightfoot has charge of preparing the detailed plans for both the new jail facility and the new construction and improvements for the Prairiland schools.

The Lamar commissioners court went ahead with setting the Sept. 11 date for an election this week although the detailed plans have not been completed and the county has yet to officially select a site where the proposed new jail would be built.

Meanwhile, Prairiland school officials say a detailed breakdown on the cost of the various projects in the school bond issue is expected to be completed within the coming week.

In its regular August meeting Monday night, the Prairiland school board accepted the preliminary budget for the 1982-83 school year, a move that was taken while awaiting final valuation figures from the Lamar County Appraisal Board.

The official budget cannot be approved until the appraisal figures are in and the final tax rate cannot be set until that time either.

In the meantime the preliminary budget for Prairiland has been set at \$1,911,973.

Broken down this provides \$1,462,408 for payroll; supplies of \$168,400; purchase and contracting services at \$177,323; capital outlay of \$35,300 and debt service and operating expenses at \$68,542.

The 1982-83 budget is up close to (See BOND, Page 6)

## How Deport And Blossom Gambled On A Railroad...And Lost

Mrs. John Sasser of Blossom was kind enough to tell me about the tragedy that occurred on the old O-R-T.

Her father had the dubious distinction of being the only person who ever lost their life on the railroad, and that was after the railroad was

out of business. Mrs. Sasser, born Gladis Youngblood, was born on May 18, and on June 19, 1914, her father was killed. He was helping to take up the old railroad track.

The engine, with two flat cars, was backing down the line to Deport. Two of the workmen, one a young man named Turley Youngblood (The father of Mrs. Sasser) and a black man, were working when the signal came for the train to move. Youngblood was wearing hard, leather-soled shoes, and as the pair attempted to move out from the path of the train, he slipped and fell. The wheels of the train literally cut him in half.

Mrs. Sasser says that Will Reynolds and another man recall that with his last breath he begged them to "take care of my baby".

The company had been dissolved, (See ORT, Page 6)

and would pay nothing towards even the young man's burial. Even his pay was never claimed, much less compensation.

Although the death of Youngblood was the major loss on the line, the monetary loss to many citizens, both Blossom and Deport, was no small thing either.

If the little railroad had been connected with the Texas and Pacific in Blossom with the switches to transfer shipments to each line, and if it had been well managed, it could have been a "going" concern.

Folks at Deport didn't give up though, and when it became apparent that the O-R-T would never fit the bill, they battled for a railroad, and in the fall of 1910, when the Paris and Mount Pleasant Railroad reached Deport, achieved their goal.

## Marching Armyworm Poses New Problem

An invasion of army worms is causing consternation throughout the eastern end of Lamar County.

The aptly named little worms, which travel in forces of thousands and seem able to eat anything in their path, have been showing up in ever-increasing numbers for the past two weeks.

They especially have a preference for just-mown hay meadows, and seem to be concentrating on the broad-leaved, tender grasses in yards, pastures and meadows.

The worms, which have a black

stripe down each side, and are pale greenish in color, are about half an inch to an inch long, and are easily detected.

Grass lands destroyed by the pests will turn pale white as the damaged plant stalks wither in the sun. (See WORMS, Page 6)

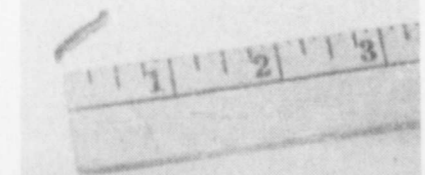
Bonham. The car was a total loss, but Mrs. Burdine was treated and released with only minor injuries from a Paris hospital. (TIMES STAFF PHOTO)

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# GENEALOGY BEGINS WITH U.... Valuable Genealogical Data In Libraries

During the last several weeks we have discussed several different phases of genealogical research. Because of its essential position, library research is the 10th principle of genealogy. Preparation is a vital element in any research program. You need to prepare before you go to the library. If you do not, you can easily spend several hours in unproductive work. A major point of this preparation is to write down all the names, dates and places you are going to look up before you go. The larger libraries will have four major features which will help any genealogist. First they will have microfilm readers. If they have the readers, they will normally have microfilm copies of census, wills and various other information. If they do not have a copy of what you need, they may be able to order it. Secondly, they should have a large amount of out of state telephone books. These books will give you addresses of churches, libraries, and distant relatives who may supply additional information. Thirdly, they should have many good resource books (American Compendium of Genealogy, Burkes, "Extinct Barontages and Peerage," other books on peerage and indexes to censuses, etc.) These books may prove to give you invaluable leads. Fourthly, probably the most important source of information is the librarian. They can be very helpful and their expert guidance will be priceless.

Local libraries will have a lot of information on the area surrounding the library. Here, the best thing to do is to go talk to your librarian and tell him or her what you are doing and ask for some professional advice. If by chance you are unable to find the information you are looking for at your library, let me know and I'll try to help you. Next, we will discuss the 11th genealogical principle—overseas research.

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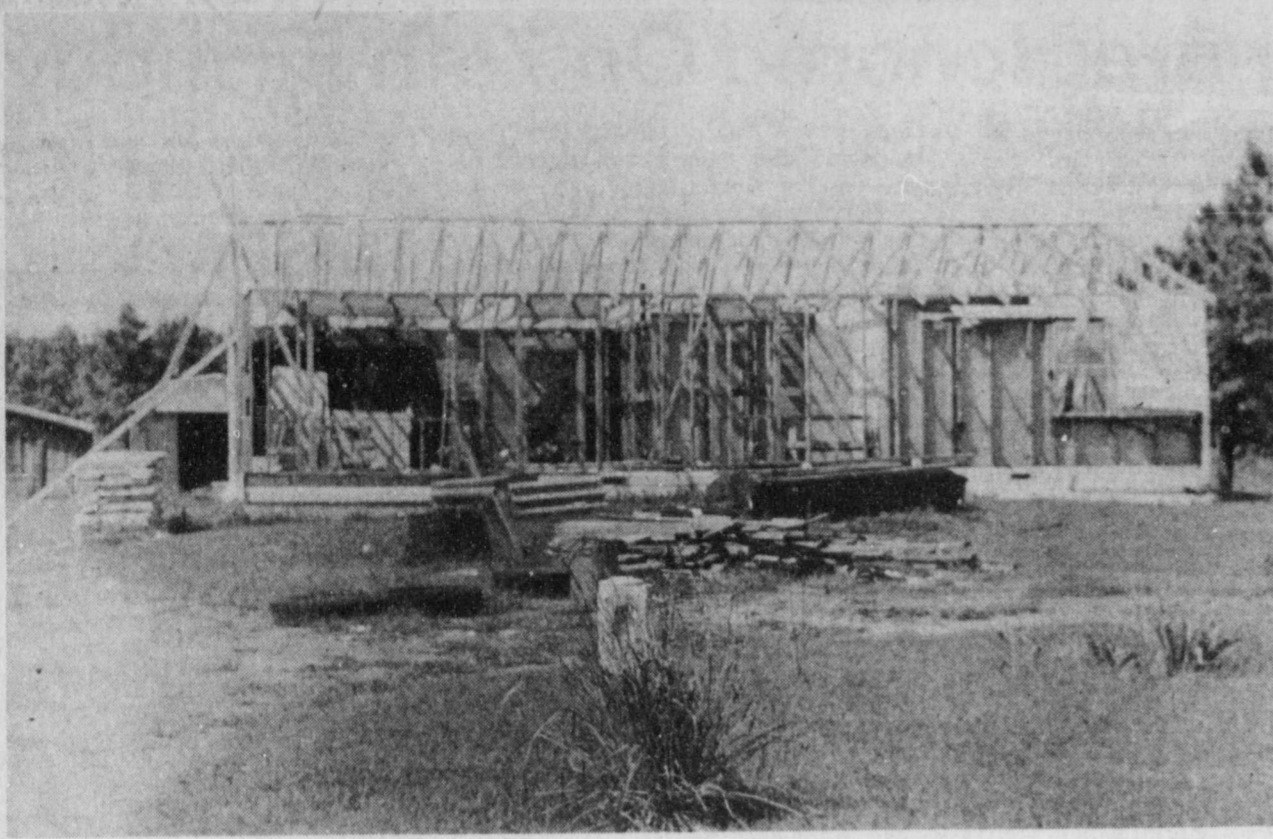

#### Byrd Sauce

One quart Wicker's barbecue sauce  
One small bottle Kraft barbecue sauce  
One-half tablespoon garlic salt

Mix the above ingredients in sauce pan to boil and then let cool. When cool, add the following ingredients:

One-quarter cup cayenne pepper  
One-quarter cup salt  
Three quarts of quality apple cider vinegar  
One 12 ounce can Natural Light beer

Let sauce stand three to four days before using. Makes two-thirds of a gallon of Byrd Sauce.

#### Meat Preparation

Rub outside of meat and skin with garlic salt.

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### Starting From Tennessee County....

## Former Resident Tells About Researching Early Deport Settlers

(ED. Note: The following article comes from David Teague of Austin, a former resident of Deport and Talco. In addition to its interest, it may prove helpful to Deport area residents who may be

starting their family research).

In the early 1880's my great grandparents, Taylor and Agnes Pirtle Teague came to Lamar County and settled in the Minter com-

munity. They were part of a large group of families who came to the Deport area in wagons from Tennessee.

This was the extent of the information I had on the history of my family until several years ago when I became interested in genealogy research. Now, thanks to a lot of help from others, together with information I have gleaned from the genealogy records of the State Library and Archives, I can identify my lineage for 11 generations here in America.

The purpose of this letter is to share some of this information with others whose families came from Lexington, Henderson County, Tennessee. I believe this to be quite a number, if not most, of those who were the early settlers of this area.

If you only know that your family came from Tennessee, there is a good

chance they came from the Lexington area. If you already have this information, perhaps you will be pleased to know that there is a directory of all marked graves of Henderson County. A copy is available here in the State Library at Austin.

Using information from this source, while in Lexington several years ago, I was able to locate the graves of my GG and GGG Grandparents. I obtained their names by reading census reports from Henderson County. These are also available on microfilm here in the State Library at Austin.

Should you wish to follow this example, start with the name and age of that relative who came from Tennessee. If he or she was born in 1855, there is a good possibility you can find them listed as a five year old child in the household of their parents in the 1860 Henderson County census report. Many of these reports are not indexed, but most of the counties can be read in one to two hours.

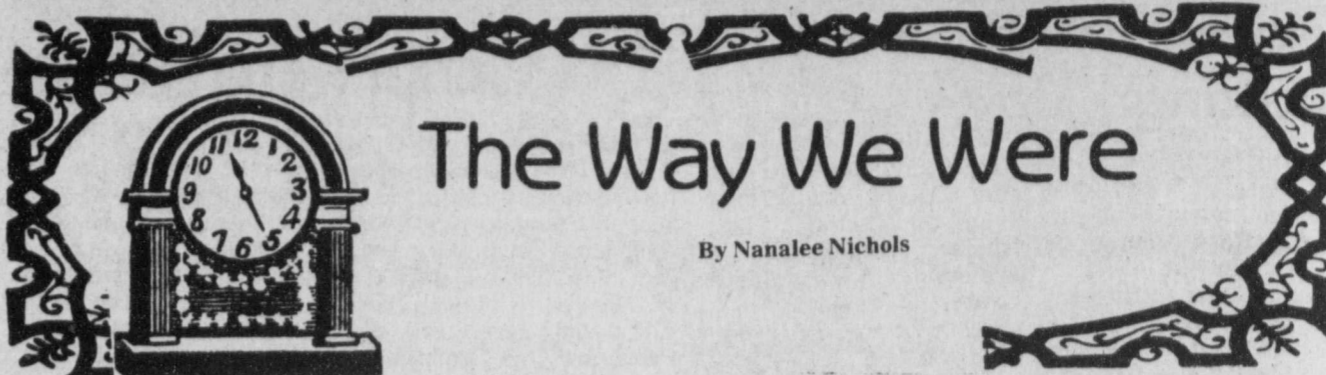
Having spent my early childhood in Deport, I remember a lot of the family names and recognize them in the reports from Henderson County. Some of these families who later came to Deport were related going back to when they lived in North Carolina.

It, therefore, appears that neighbors and relatives made the same type of migration, in large groups, from North Carolina to Tennessee, as did their grandchildren when they came to Texas.

I have located and corresponded with some of my Tennessee cousins from the Lexington area. Through them and from several books, I have the following information as to the history of Henderson County and its people.

In 1819-1820 the Chickasaw Indians ceded the land in West Tennessee. This opened the area for white settlers to come in without having to fight the Indian wars that took place in the settling of East Tennessee. The state of North Carolina was at the same time virtually bankrupt after the Revolutionary War.

In order to pay its veterans, grants were given for land in Tennessee, which was then a part of North Carolina. Not all the

### 20 YEARS AGO

Aug. 9, 1962

veterans came to settle their land, some sold to speculators. The early settlers of Henderson County were a combination of veterans and those who bought land from the speculators.

There is a book available here that lists the names of those veterans from North Carolina who received land grants.

The county was named for Colonel James Henderson, who commanded Tennessee troops at the Battle of New Orleans. He also served on the staff of General Jackson during the Natchez and Creek Campaigns.

The early settlers found plenty of wildlife. Migratory birds, song birds, quail and turkey were abundant. Wild pigeons were especially prized because of their delicious meat and beautiful plumage. Pioneer parents taught their children at home until schools were established.

There was a strong belief in work ethics with work days starting early and lasting until late in the evenings. They slept on beds of hide or straw, which were made on dirt floors. All cooking was done in fireplaces. Mules and oxen were the beasts of burden and had to be guarded from wild animals. Corn and vegetables were the principal crops until the mid 1840's, when cotton became king.

In 1850 there were 13,000 bales reported to have been sold at an average of 4 1/2 cents per lb. (seed cotton). It took approximately 1500 lbs. of seed cotton to yield one bale of lint cotton. An average of one bale was produced for each three acres. It was a very successful farmer who could produce one half bale per acre. He considered to own very rich soil.

It is mind boggling to think of the advancements that have been made in the past 100 years since those early settlers came in their wagons. It is important, however, to remember that their hard work and sacrifices made possible the opportunities we have enjoyed.

We should, therefore, remember who they were and learn something about their lives.

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

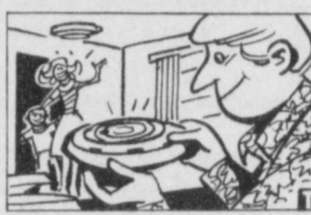
## SMOKE DETECTORS SAVE LIVES, BUT ONE IS NOT ENOUGH

Studies indicate that there's smoke... there's also a smoke detector. In 1980, 50 percent of homes reporting fires had a smoke detector, representing a 20 percent increase over 1978, when only one out of every ten homes had a unit installed.

The increasing use of smoke detectors spells good news to fire safety experts. A recent study by the International Association of Fire Chiefs concluded that smoke detectors can not only save lives, but reduce property loss, as well.

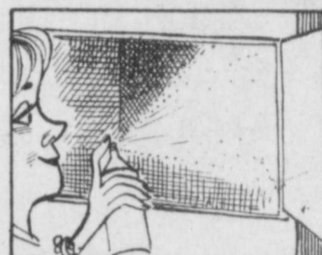
However, experts agree that in most cases, one smoke detector is not enough. Most multiple death residential fires occur between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. when residents are most likely to be asleep and unaware.

"Smoke detectors serve as an early warning to fires, but are effective only if they can be heard by all family members. Unfortunately, many home designs preclude this," said King Harris, chairman of the board of BRK Electronics, manufacturer of First Alert and BRK smoke detectors.



For minimum protection, each sleeping area should have its own smoke detector. In addition, smokers and persons who sleep with their door shut should have a smoke detector inside their bedroom, too. In a multi-story house, detectors should be located at the bottom and top of each stairway. Some manufacturers, such as First Alert, make a smoke detector with an Escape Light that illuminates the way to aid in a speedy exit.

"Basement detectors are also important," says Harris. "If a furnace malfunction starts a fire in the basement, it would take some time for smoke to reach the first or second floor detector. The minutes saved by having a basement detector sound an alarm could mean the difference between life and death. One smoke detector is simply not enough," he said.

## OATMEAL-NUT MUFFINS

- 3/4 cup Bisquick® baking mix
- 1/4 cup quick-cooking oats
- 1/4 cup finely chopped nuts
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon finely chopped nuts

Place paper liners in 6 microwaveproof muffin cups, 2 1/2 x 1 1/4 inches, or 6-ounce custard cups. Arrange cups in circle on 12-inch microwaveproof plate.  
Mix all ingredients except 1 tablespoon nuts; beat vigorously 15 seconds. Fill muffin cups about 3/4 full. Sprinkle with nuts. Microwave uncovered on high (100%) 1 minute; rotate plate 1/2 turn. Microwave until tops spring back when touched lightly and are no longer doughy, 30 to 90 seconds longer. (Edges of muffins will appear moist.) Remove from cups. 6 muffins.
