Absentee Voting Starts Monday

Public Meetings Set On School Bond Plan

Absentee voting in the \$750,000 bond issue election for the Prairiland School District gets underway next Monday and will continue through Sept. 7.

The bond issue, aimed at providing funds for a junior high school building to be built at Pattonville's Prairiland campus, which would accommodate the 7th and 8th grades which are presently attending Blossom or Deport schools, and renovation of school facilities in Blossom and Deport is scheduled for a voter verdict on Sept. 11.

To further public knowledge, two public meetings will be held, one on Aug. 30 at 8 p.m. at the Deport

Elementary School, and the other on Aug. 31 at 8 p.m. at the Blossom Elementary School.

The public is invited to these meetings, and the school board will be present at both meetings to answer questions about details of the bond election.

A certain amount of rumour concerning exactly how many grades would be moved to Prairiland Junior High School, and what types of remodeling would be done at the elementary schools have been circulating. The meetings are being held so that voters can hear exactly what will take place if the bond election passes and then vote in whichever

manner they choose.

Architect Bill Lightfoot is expected to present detailed cost figures and architectural drawings at any time, and public hearings are expected to be held.

Absentee ballots will be available in the district administration building at Prairiland from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday during the absentee voting period.

All registered voters who reside within the school district's boundaries are eligible to vote.

The bond issue is showing signs of having a strong support both for and against, and voter turnout is expected to be higher than usual.

New Armyworm Outbreak Due

Armyworm activity appears to be tapering off in the Red River Valley area from the exploding situation existing this time last week. However, now is not the time to relax and forget about them. Another generation is expected, and it is quite possible that they will remain with us for several weeks.

Many have called wanting to know about the life cycle of the worm, so perhaps a review would be in order. The true fall armyworm is greenish or brownish and are one and one-third inches in length when fully grown. Some are so dark green that they appear black.

They have three yellowish-white, hair-like stripes down the back, a

conspicuous inverted "Y" on the head. This inverted "Y" is often undetectable in small worms.

We are now between generations. The first generation have or are in the process of going into the ground for pupation. This pupal stage may not be more than eight to 10 days in this kind of warm weather.

The adult stage of the fall armyworm is a moth with a wingspan of one and one-half inches. The hind wings are grayish with the front pair dark gray, mottled with light and dark areas and with a light spot near the tips.

The life span of the moth is 10 to 14 days. The female may lay upwards of 1,000 eggs and fly hundreds of miles in the process. The eggs may hatch into the tiny worms in as few as two days.

Reagan's Tax Plan Appeal Not Too Popular Here

President Reagan's decision to go over the head of Congress and take his case for a tax increase to the people, with the nationwide tv and radio appeal Monday night, may have fallen on deaf ears, based on results of a three-county opinion survey by the News-Times newspapers.

Forty-five percent of all people contacted Tuesday, either in person or via the telephone, in the Deport, Bogata, Talco and Blossom areas, say they are against the President's \$6-billion tax

package. Only 38 percent of those surveyed by staff members of The Bogata News, Deport Times, Talco Times and Blossom Times would say they support Reagan's plan. Another 17 percent offered comments other than a straight "yes" or "no" commitment.

Comments ranged from "I've lost complete confidence in the man (Reagan)," as expressed by businessman in Bogata; to a Deport nurse who said she supports the tax proposal

"and everything Reagan does."

A retired Deport area school teacher said she's against both the tax proposal and President Reagan and didn't watch his Monday night broadcast because, "If I see him on TV, I have to go and take Pepto Bismol!"

Fifty-five percent of the opinion poll respondents were men and 45 percent were women.

The women packed the largest "no" vote in the survey, with 54 percent of them saying they were

against the tax increase plan, while 38 percent did voice support of the President and 8 percent had "other" comments.

While the women were decisive, the men were at a stand-off as 37 1/2 percent said they were against the Reagan plan, another 37 1/2 percent supported the plan, while 25 percent were in the "other" category.

The question directed to those contacted in the poll was: "Did you see or listen to President Reagan last night (Monday) and do you

support his tax program?" Here were some of the answers, with the respondents given assurance that their names would not be published:

"I think he's crazy. Of course, I don't approve (of the tax plan)," said a Blossom businesswoman. "It may be inconsistent with what he first said, but the deficit is frightening and we need a tax increase," from a retired Deport insurance man.

"I've lost all confidence in the man. A Year ago, he

wimpered his way to getting a tax cut; now he wants to raise taxes. What he gives with the left hand, he takes away with the right," says a Bogata businessman.

"No way can I support a tax increase when the things he wants to increase the tax on are the things that will hit the average person the most. No way," says a Talco merchant.

"I think it's all right. Something needs to be done at least," says a Blossom (See SURVEY, Page 6)

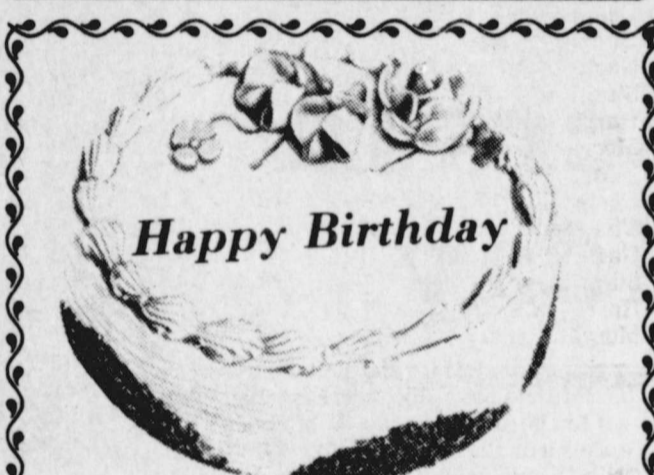

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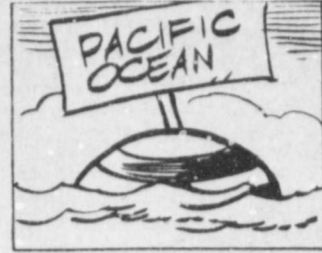

WOODEN BOWLS

The wooden bowl we picture is in a small historical society museum in Shaftsbury, England. It differs from most in that it is carved from oak. Wooden bowls in this country are most often found carved from pine which is a soft wood, easily worked with primitive tools. We will find them here as well in oak, or maple or walnut burl which is the wood from a trunk stump area, or where a large branch joins a trunk. The working of the wood back and forth in storms ruptures the fibres, toughening them and creating the patterns of graining in the wood.

One will notice the different shapes in bowls in different parts of the country. Many were carved in New England with handles, yet many will be found without. The New England bowls influenced by English design are most often deeper than those found in the Pennsylvania-Ohio region which was more under the influence of German work. More hardwood bowls will be found from this latter area.

Naturally, condition is important, so those with splits are not popular, as they cannot be used. Generally, they end up as table centerpieces filled with fruit or other decorative objects. Many like to use these old bowls. Ordinarily, the oils in salad dressings will keep them from drying out and splitting, so this is really the best method of preservation - use them. Some fill them with water once a year, and allow the moisture to soak in a bit. Above all, keep them away from heat and the sun.

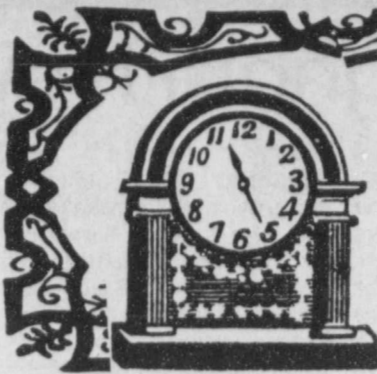

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DISCHARGE OF WASTES INTO THE SANITARY SEWERS OF THE CITY OF DEPORT, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING A PERMIT SYSTEM, ESTABLISHING A SYSTEM OF CHARGES FOR SERVICES RENDERED, REGULATING UNSEWERED AND MISCELLANEOUS DISCHARGES, AND PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT.

WHEREAS, the City of Deport has provided facilities for the collection and treatment of wastewater to promote the health, safety, and convenience of its people and for the safeguarding of water resources common to all, and

WHEREAS, provision has been made in the design, construction and operation of such facilities to accommodate certain types and quantities of industrial wastes in addition to normal wastewater, and

WHEREAS, it is the obligation of the producers of industrial waste to defray the costs of the wastewater treatment services rendered by the City of Deport in an equitable manner and, insofar as it is practicable, in proportion to benefits derived, and

WHEREAS, protection of the quality of the effluent and proper operation of the wastewater collection and treatment facilities and quality of effluent may require either the exclusion, pretreatment, or controlled discharge at point of origin of certain types or quantities of industrial wastes, and

WHEREAS, the City of Deport shall require future compliance with any rules and regulation promulgated under Section 307 of the Clean Water Act;

WHEREAS, this ordinance is on file at the Deport City Hall explaining the compliances, rules and regulation promulgated under Section 307 of the act; and can be examined at anytime.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DEPORT.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, recording, and publication as provided by law.
