School Officials To Outline Building, Bond Issue Plans

Prairiland school trustees, Supt. Leslie (Buddy) Taylor and Architect Bill Lightfoot are scheduled to outline the school district's proposed building program and speak on the \$750,000 bond issue election at two public hearings next week.

The first public airing will be held Monday in Deport Elementary School, starting at 8 p.m., followed by a Tuesday night session in Blossom Elementary School, which will also

begin at 8 p.m.

School board members Ernest Stinson, James Norwood, Bobby Kennedy, Harold Morrison, Johnny Dawson, Bobby Dunn and Leon Anderson will be present at both meetings to join Supt. Taylor in answering questions and outlining the school district's plans. Stinson is board president and Morrison is secretary of the seven-member board. Lightfoot is scheduled to present

individual drawings of the interior and exterior of the proposed new junior high school that would, if the bond issue is approved, be constructed on the Prairiland campus.

Although architect drawings were anticipated for completion several days ago but the hoped-for completion date was not met. Lightfoot—also involved in plans for the proposed new county jail, has indicated they will be available in time for the public

meetings.

The planned junior high would consist of six classrooms and a gym, costing an estimated \$345,000; a kitchen-cafeteria, costing \$159,000; and a band hall with a \$70,000 price tag.

Under the proposed building program, the facility currently under construction at Prairiland as a band hall would be converted to classroom (See SCHOOL, Page 6)

The armyworms are still around. They must have the most voracious appetites imaginable. How can anything so small eat so much!

Now, however, the war is heating up, and some extra troops besides the crop dusters and spray booms have begun to appear.

The blackbirds are back! One reason that the worms have been worse than usual is that there have been few blackbirds in the area

Now blackbirds aggravate folks because they eat milo and corn sprouts and lots of other things that mankind wants to eat for himself...but more than anything like that they also like armyworms.

When the invading forces of wormdom crept across the area there were only a few scattered flocks of birds to be found.

The worms fed and fattened and multiplied, and of course, marched on. Now though the beginnings of what may be the blackbird army are beginning to appear.

Larger and larger flocks of the glossy birds are appearing. They stalk happily through the grasses and strike at the worms with lightning fast beaks.

It's quite fun to observe them, since most of us hate armyworms so much.

If enough of the birds come in it is possible that they may help reduce the second generation sizeably.

The question is though...where were the birds this time of the year?

Normally they are here, following the combines by the thousands and feasting on milo.

This year they are late. Were they on vacation in Colorado? Or maybe they went to Knoxville to the World's Fair. Were they busy forming a blackbird union, and didn't show up on time because of business reasons?

We'll probably never know why they were late, but it's a cinch that we may enjoy seeing them arrive more than we usually do.

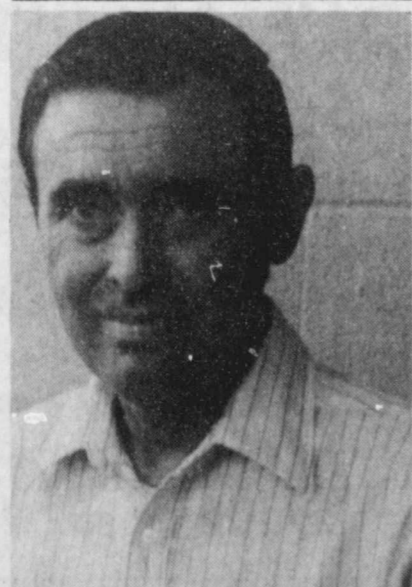

The Prairiland Patriots will travel to Hooks Friday night to scrimmage against the Hooks Hornets. With their spirits bolstered after a win against the Valliant Bulldogs last Friday, they hope to show the Hornets that the Patriots have a whole new look. The Hooks team is rated number 4 in their 14-AAA district, but after Friday night's performance by the Patriots, that won't daunt them much.

The Patriots, who only play three games on their home turf for the whole season, went into the woods of Oklahoma to play the Valliant Bulldogs and the "Red Pride" of Prairiland shown brightly.

The 1-0 win in favor of the Pats had the boys excited and confident.

David Edwards and Ronald Nichols put together three first downs at the beginning, but Valliant stopped them at the 25-yard-line.

The Patriot defense, with William Newman, Nelson Hevron, Darrin Gifford and Dennis Bedford held the Bulldogs to only two first downs. Hevron saved a possible score for the Dogs by bringing down the ball carrier at the 12 yard line after a 42 yard pass completion by Valliant. Darrin Gifford pulled the Bulldog's

teeth then with an intercepted ball which set up the game for Prairiland's second chance at the football.

Jeff Ballard, late for the game after being best man at his brother's wedding, wasted no time upon wading into the game upon arrival.

Todd Davis, the Pat quarterback, connected with Ballard for 7 and with the situation at second and 16 let David Edwards carry for five yards. Ronald Nichols then shook off the Bulldogs for a 19 yard run that took the Pats to a first and goal.

Edwards then carried the ball on in and the Prairiland fans, coaches and players erupted in glee.

The Prairiland offense had 136 yards with Todd Davis 2-for-6 and 38 yards in the passing department.

The second varsity units of Prairiland and Valliant fought desperately to a scoreless tie while the Valliant JV defeated the Pats 4-1.

Head coach Chet James says that "Things are going to look a little different this year. We accomplished what we set out to accomplish, and all the boys got to play. Now we see the areas we need to work on, and that's just what we're going to do. We're all pleased."

Sales Tax Refund Tops 1981 Pace

Both Blossom and Deport are running ahead of last year in the amount of revenue the two cities have received from their one-cent city sales tax, according to the August report from the state comptroller's office.

Blossom has received a check for \$1,898.43 for the period ending Aug. 6, to hike that city's sales tax revenue through the first eight months of the year to \$7,689.38, which is 24 percent more than Blossom had received through the same January-August period of last year.

Deport's August check totaled \$1,887.96. This lifted Deport's total for the year to date to \$4,900.75, slightly more than 2 percent ahead of last year, but it marked the first time this year that Deport has pulled ahead of its 1981 pace.

All Lamar County cities are running ahead of last year with the exception of Toco, which is down by about one percent. On the statewide basis, the comptroller's office reports that Texas cities are running 12 percent ahead of last year.

Roxton is the county's leader in

percentage increase, with its \$3,838.58 total for the first eight months of the year, more than 79 percent ahead of last year.

Paris, of course, is the big leader in total revenue as its August check for more than \$247,000 shoving Paris over the million-dollar mark. Paris now has received \$1,038,221.11 in sale tax money through the first eight months, an increase of 24.2 percent over the same period of a year ago.

In neighboring Red River County, Clarksville is up by more than 56.5 percent, with its August check of \$29,892.79 boosting that city's eight month total to \$125,678.70. Bogata dropped below last year's pace with eight month total of \$14,197.24 about 3.5 percent less than what it had received in the same period last year.

Hickory Shuckworms, A Pest For Pecans

The hickory shuckworm frequently causes severe injury to pecans. Although present throughout the growing season, it's activities become especially serious in pecan trees during late summer, according to Chris Bull, Red River County Extension agent.

Damage to the pecans is caused by larvae feeding in the shuck. The larvae are white with a brown head and usually appear in the shucks of pecans in August. The shell of the pecan is too hard for the larvae to penetrate. The feeding activity of

this insect in the shuck of the pecans destroys the nutrients carrying tissue to the pecan, therefore slowing or destroying the maturity of the kernels. Shucks also tend to stick to nuts and nuts may fail to open, thus increasing harvesting difficulties.

August is the time to begin hickory shuckworm control, Bull says. Both chemical and cultural methods are recommended. Cultural control in commercial orchards consists of plowing to bury infested shucks. Homeowners can rake old shucks from the

yard in the fall and destroy them in some manner. Larvae are unable to mature in decaying shucks and adult moths are unable to emerge from the soil. Plowing depth must be regulated in commercial orchards to prevent root damage to the trees.

Chemical control should begin in mid-August to early September or as soon as the shells harden. Best results are obtained if two applications of insecticides are made at 10 to 18 day intervals. Chemicals labeled for commercial use to

control this insect include Azinphosmethyl (Guthion), Phosalone (Zolone), or Dialifor (Torak). Homeowners can use Malathion, Azinphosmethyl (Guthion), Carbaryl (Sevin), or Phosalone (Zolone). Azinphosmethyl (Guthion) is a highly toxic material and should be used with extreme care by homeowners.

The 12 percent emulsifiable concentrate Azinphosmethyl has a homeowner label. Whenever using any insecticide always follow all the instructions for mixing and applying the chemical. Bull cautions. Complete spray coverage of the entire tree is important in obtaining shuckworm control. Some of these materials cannot be applied after shucks split, so it is very important to read the entire label on these products.

If you have had a problem with this insect in the past, chances are you will have a problem with it this year, says Bull.

Guidelines In Overseas Research

Although many of us are blessed by being sons, or daughters of immigrants, most of us are not the descendants of recent immigrants. Some time during our research we will find what country our immigrant ancestors came from. It is at this time many people give up hope for any additional information.

Our 11th genealogical principle is-Over-seas Research. It will help give you ideas on how to obtain information.

Researching foreign records can be done quite successfully if we follow these guidelines. First, find out the name and birthplace of your ancestor who came over here. Secondly, see what, if any information you can find out about them here in the United States. Thirdly, try to find out this person's religious preference. This may be very important.

Fourthly, if you cannot find out where overseas to write, contact the embassy in Washington, D.C. of the country where your relatives came from. They will send you some information on where to write their country for information.

If by chance need the embassy address, write me and I will forward you their address.

You can also order census records, church records and other records, from many foreign countries. If your library cannot obtain these records, I will forward to you the address of the nearest library that has these records.

When writing these foreign libraries, be very specific on information you request. Just ask for information on one person or family at a time. You need to have a date and location. Do not simply just write for an Olaf Anderson in Norway.

Over the next several weeks, we will in great detail discuss overseas research. Next week we will discuss the most important of all principles of genealogy Persistence.

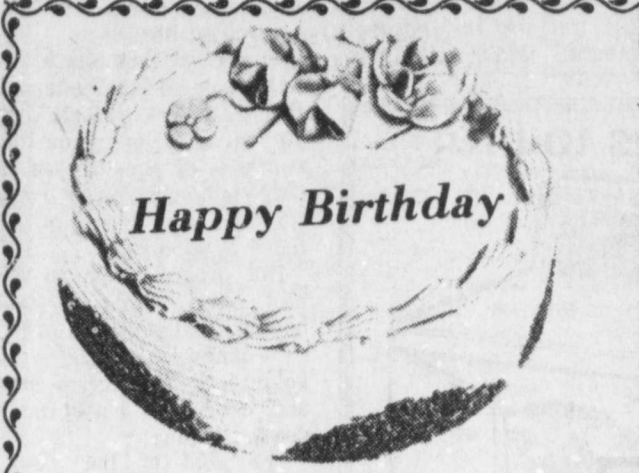

Cystic Fibrosis (CF) is a chronic, fatal disease—the number one genetic killer of young people in the United States. It primarily attacks the lungs and the digestive system by producing an abnormal accumulation of mucus which interferes with breathing and with the body's absorption of food.

When a child is born with CF, chances are the disease will not be immediately detected. Often called "the great masquerader", cystic fibrosis mimics other lung and digestive problems, so as many as 40 to 50 percent of the individuals with CF are not diagnosed or sometimes misdiagnosed. That's unfortunate, because early diagnosis and treatment help to prolong life.

Cystic Fibrosis is a major health problem because there is no test to identify the 10 million symptomless carriers of the CF gene; there is no control for cystic fibrosis; and, worst of all, there is no cure.

But progress against CF has been made largely because of the efforts of the CF Foundation and the many volunteers who give time and energy to raise much needed dollars.

The goal of the Foundation, pursued through its care and education programs, is to lengthen and improve the quality of life for CF patients and to reduce the impact of the disease on the patient, the family, and society.

space and another building for a band hall built.

The old cafeteria now in the high school building would become classroom space at the high school and the proposed new kitchen-cafeteria would serve the entire Prairiland complex.

Estimated costs of the junior high work total \$565,100. The remainder of the \$750,000 bond issue funds would be used for remodeling work at both the Blossom and Deport campuses.

"The purpose of the bond issue is to give the patrons of the school district a chance to express their wishes as to whether they want a junior high school or not," Taylor says.

Voting on the \$750,000 bond issue will be held Saturday, Sept. 11, with absentee balloting already underway. The absentee vote period continues through Sept. 7.

Preliminary or estimated financial figures will be outlined at the two public meetings.

As currently planned by the school district's bond consultant, George E. Cooper, Jr., of Schneider, Bernert and Hickman, Inc., approval of the bond issue will call for a tax increase ranging from 27.7 cents to 30.3 cents per \$100 valuation. The lower increase will be possible if the bonds become available at 10 percent interest, with the higher increase required if the interest rate is 12 percent.

Prairiland has a current rate of 53 cents per \$100 valuation.

Bond officials say preliminary estimates show that in event the tax rate is increased 27.7 cents to an 80.8 cent total, a person whose property is valued at \$20,000 after all exemptions and who is currently paying \$106 annually in school taxes, the tax bill will increase to \$161.40.

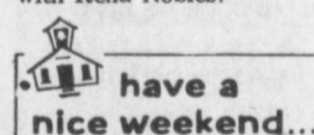
