


I'm sure most folks around here can recall the same things ... remember when there were four gins, and they ran day and night during the ginning season? I recall that the entire town was filled with a gentle, humming vibration that went on for several months, beginning around the middle of August and going into October.

If one of the gins shut down...especially during the middle of the night, it was liable to wake people up. Lying in bed it took awhile to figure out what was the matter. It would simply be the change in the rumbling sound that filled our lives. The fields for miles around were

filled with cotton pickers. Bright colored shirts, followed by long white cotton sacks, moved slowly up and down the rows as backs bent to the difficult, tedious task of "pulling

could also help. The pay was low, the work was hot, and it is doubtful if anyone who ever did it misses it now.

The sacks would be weighed at the wagon and the tally kept as the hands were paid by the amount of weight they picked.

No acid or defoliant went on the cotton, and a field would have to be covered several times before it would be picked clean.

When the first mechanical pickers or strippers appeared on the scene old-timers nearly had heart failure at the messy look of the field after the machine had gone through.

In 1957 the country had the most abundant cotton crop ever. There just weren't enough field hands to handle the amount of cotton. Seven hundred Mexican Nationals were brought in from Mexico to pick the cotton, and they did a good job, too.

They were quartered in the old cotton warehouse down on Hwy. 271 and in the old community center that was located where the housing authority is now.

After working through the daylight hours the strains of a softly picked guitar and the unfamiliar sounds of voices raised in Spanish song would drift gently over town.

It was a peculiar interlude in the communities history. And it will never come again .. mostly because that was really the last year that cotton was "king". From that time on cotton began to have to compete with soy beans, milo and other crops.

But...back then...not so many years ago, Cotton was the King, and at this time of year the evidence of that was all around!


Citizens Hear School Plans

Rollins Files "Against" Intentions

Deport businessman Charles E. Rollins this week became the first person to file his intentions concerning the Sept. 11 bond issue election for the Prairiland School District, as apparently required under a little known state law.

Rollins filed a form at the school district's administration office Tuesday afternoon, stating he was against the bond issue. Earlier, Rollins also filed his intentions with the Lamar County clerk's office, saying he is against the countywide jail bond issue that will also be voted on Sept. 11.

According to County Clerk Margaret Coplin any person or any committee who plans to spend any money on a bond issue election must file with the county clerk's office before any money is spent on the election by that person or committee. Coplin says the rule is required by (See ROLLINS, Page 7)

They threatened to bring suit to the courts and hold the rolling stock and rails through court action until they got their pay

Upon investigation they learned that the whole outfit, lock, stock and shady barrel, had been borrowed or leased from people, and there was no sign of the main promoters of the scheme left, only honest people who had been taken advantage of.

Folks around Deport and Blossom who were major loser in the venture didn't like to talk about it. The businessmen who invested in the haphazard transaction have long since departed, but it's a fair bet that the folks who proposed the whole deal were showered with some pretty strong epitaphts during that period in


Actual statistics were not available on the issue, but Supt. Taylor expressed his feelings that there would actually be little differance either way.
