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Patriots Go For 2nd Straight Oklahoma Invasion Is Next

The Prairiland Red Pride broke the "jinks" and whipped the Queen City Bulldogs last Friday night, and fans, coaches and players are still riding high. They not only defeated the 'dogs, but racked up some pretty impressive statistics in the bargain.

This next Friday they hit the longest trail this year for Oklahoma City to take on the 5-A Northeastern Oklahoma Vikings, a trip designed with a tour of a college campus, and the team getting to watch the Oklahoma University workout the afternoon before the game.

Game time is 8 p.m. and fans wishing to follow the Pats who aren't on the chartered bus (which is filled) can take Hwy. 82 to Gainsville, Interstate 35 to Oklahoma City, and get off the interstate at 23rd St. Viking Stadium is on the corner of 23rd St. and Kelly.

Head Coach Chet James says "we don't know too much about this team, but we're going to go for it. We've had some injuries the last few weeks, and we're hoping to have everyone well."

James also mentioned that some junior varsity players would make the trip too. "We're going to give them the opportunity of running some specialties." The Patriots will take some 30 players up to Oklahoma.

As to the win last Friday, when asked how it felt "It feels fantastic," the coach says, "and the boys feel that way too. There's just no way to describe it."

"They lined up with an 8 man front, daring us to pass and we did. We were pretty much outmanned on the line, but it gave us the chance for passing. We kept them off top and threw some long patterns we haven't been able to throw this year. We just took what they gave us." They surely did, too, with Todd Davis throwing an incredible 12-19 pass attempts, for 267 yards, and Jeff Ballard catching 11 of those 12 completions, for 240 yards!

The game opened with the Queen City Bulldogs receiving the punt and running to their 38 yard line with a nifty hand-off from the punt receiver

Blossom, Deport Continue To Top '81 In Sales Tax Refunds

Blossom and Deport continue to exceed last year's sales tax receipts, with Blossom leading Deport by some \$3,200 after the first nine months of the year.

Although Deport failed to receive a sales tax reimbursement check for the period ending Sept. 8, Blossom received \$512.33 to hike the city's total reimbursements through the first nine months of the year to \$8,201.71. That gives Blossom an increase of \$2,003.96, or about 32.3 percent, over the same nine month period of 1981.

The reimbursement is the amount of the city's one-cent city sales tax that is refunded to the city after it has been collected by the state comptroller's office. Reimbursements for a monthly period are not made when the total is less than \$500, but is held over until the following report period.

Deport, which received no refund this month, has received \$4,900.75 for the year to date and that's \$102.85, or 2.1 percent, more than what Deport had received through the first nine months of a year ago.

The statewide increase is averaging 20 percent for cities, compared to last

September, according to the state comptroller's office. Among other area cities, Paris received a September check for \$87,201.45, showing that city over the million dollar for the year to date.

Paris now has received \$1,125,422.56 in sales tax money, some \$200,000 or 23.4 percent more than it had this time last year. Mt Pleasant is up by 22.4 percent; Clarksville by 47.6 percent and Mt. Vernon by about 5 percent.

More TV Choices Due By Nov. 1st

Arrival of three satellite receiving dishes has signaled the start of construction on the earth stations for Arena Cablevision, that will add three channels to the basic service of the area cable TV system along with two movie channels.

Construction work and installation of the satellite receivers, including one each in Deport, Blossom and Bogata, is now underway and is to be completed in time for the channels to be on the cable system for subscribers in the Bogata, Deport, Blossom, Reno and Detroit area by Nov. 1.

Use of the satellite system will permit Arena Cablevision to add channels WTBS in Atlanta, Ga., WGN in Chicago and the USA network to the basic service, plus Home Box Office and Cinemax as two pay channels for uninterrupted and uncut movies, says Roy Faubion, vice president of Chaney Communications, Inc.

The Tyler based Chaney firm recently announced the purchase of Arena and Faubion says the parent corporation has made a commitment to rapidly follow through on pledges

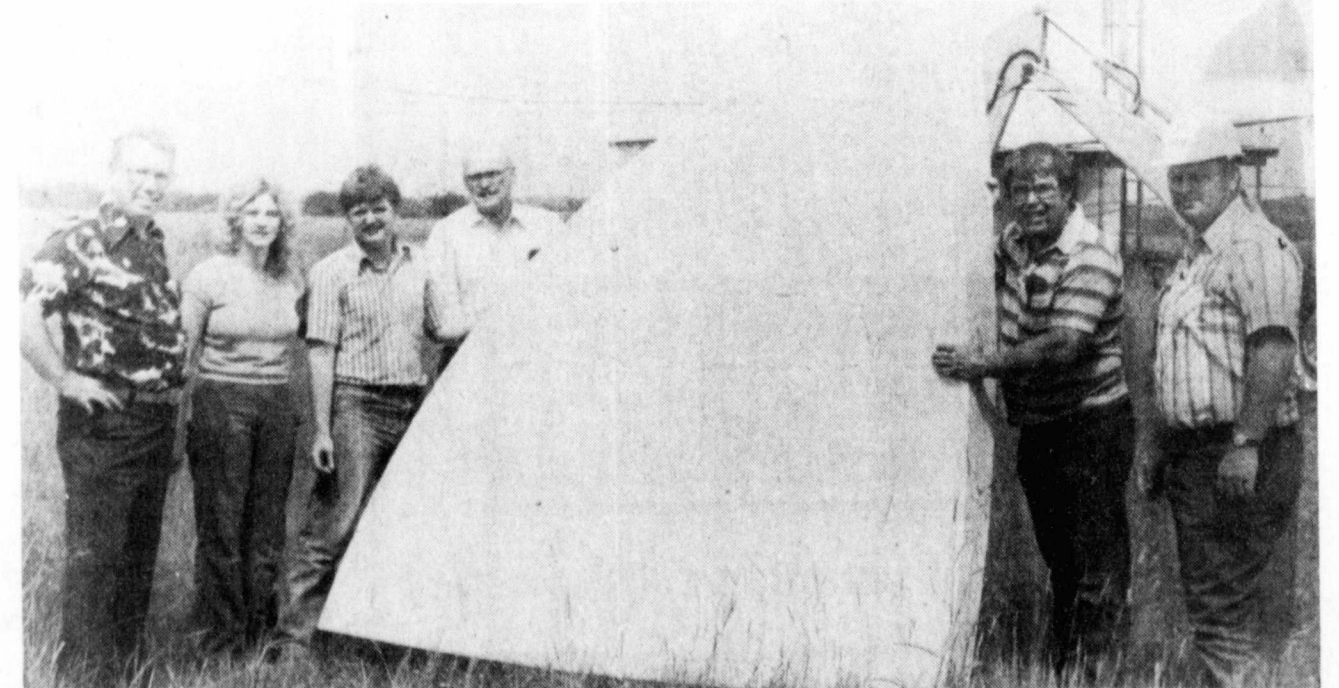
Andrew N. Cox of Bogata was all alone in second place with only eight miscues; so he wins the \$5 third place money in the contest.

great grandfather, born 11 Oct. 1841, died 17 Oct. 1893, came to Bogata from Tennessee sometime before the Civil War. After the war, he married Lucena Ann Sisson, born 1 Nov. 1846, died 2 Sept. 1928. She was born in Alabama and was 7 years old when she came to Bogata.

"She had two sisters who also lived in Texas. They were Nancy (Sisson) Guess (or Guest) and lived at a place commonly called "Guesses Prairie" and Lou (Sisson) Copeland. Can anyone tell me who their parents were?"

Farm Picture Bleak, But Hope Remains

Texas farmers are suffering from a siege of economic setbacks that are the most serious since the depression of the '30's. But despite the catastrophic situation, there is some glimmer of hope as farmers forge ahead and plan for 1983.

"Both weather and the marketplace have devastated the hopes of many producers this year," said Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "It's been a year filled with widespread crop losses due to hail, wind, floods and drought, and now at harvest time, huge stockpiles of most crops coupled with a sagging demand are driving prices below production costs."

And delinquent loans are running rampant, with almost half of the 25,000 Texas farmers with Farmers Home Administration loans behind in their payments.

Many farm prices have been driven through the floor by huge crops the past two years, noted the economist. During the first half of 1982, prices for cotton, cottonseed, rice and hay dropped more than 30 percent below the same period last year and grain sorghum averaged about 20 percent less.

Texas livestock producers are faring a little better than crop growers. Hog prices are up 21 percent and beef cattle prices are holding even compared to the first half of 1981 while milk prices are off slightly. Prices for calves, sheep, turkeys and eggs are averaging 5 to 10 percent less while wool prices are off 20 percent.

With this overall dismal situation, how can there be hope for farmers?

"Economic health can return from either lower supplies or increased demand that will boost market prices or through more favorable farm program prices," said Anderson. "Either adjustment may take up to three years to develop fully. Currently, Texas farmers are looking to Commodity Credit Corporation

loan rates, farmer-held reserve loan rates and target prices as their main hope for surviving the most severe financial pressure in half a century," he said.

"Unfortunately, earlier this year many of them did not recognize the benefits of support prices and the looming financial dangers."

According to Anderson, failure of more than half of the sorghum farmers to take part in the farm program has caused grain prices to fall sharply below the CCC loan rate. This resulted because nonparticipants were ineligible to put their grain into the loan program and thus had to dump large amounts on the open market, driving prices down.

Now farmers must look ahead to the 1983 farm program. Specifics of the program are being developed, said Anderson, and should be available soon for planning next year's crops.

However, farmers can use expected target prices and loan rates for various crops in their early planning. Expected target prices are \$4.30 per bu. for wheat, \$2.86 per bu. for corn, \$4.91 per cwt. for grain sorghum, 76 cents a lb. for cotton and \$11.40 per cwt. for rice. Regular CCC loan rates will be close to \$3.65 per bu. for wheat, \$2.65 per bu. for corn, \$4.50 per cwt. for grain sorghum, 55 cents per lb. for cotton and \$8.55 per cwt. for rice. Anticipated farmer-held reserve loan rates are \$4 per bu. for wheat, \$2.90 per bu. for corn, and \$4.91 per cwt. for grain sorghum. There is no reserve loan for cotton and rice.

Using these anticipated figures, maximum deficiency payments (difference between target price and CCC loan rate) that farmers could expect are 65 cents per bu. for wheat, 21 cents per bu. for corn, 41 cents per cwt. for grain sorghum, 21 cents a lb. for cotton and \$2.85 per cwt. for rice.

"Since reduced production will be a major goal of next year's farm program, it will likely call for laying out 15 to 25 percent of the base acreage for each eligible crop," said Anderson. "Farmers should take this into consideration as they begin land preparation and fertilizer and herbicide applications for next year's crops."

1983 farm income could improve some with increased participation in the farm program since reduced production would help the supply situation and allow loan rates to be more effective in setting price floors. On the demand side, lower interest rates should give a boost to the marketplace. And an improved economic climate could spur the demand for farm products, said the economist.

Meanwhile, farmers will be looking at controlling or

minimizing operating expenses, evaluating alternative crops for highest returns while taking as little price risk as possible, foregoing capital purchases and taking a hard look at full participation in the government farm program, Anderson said.

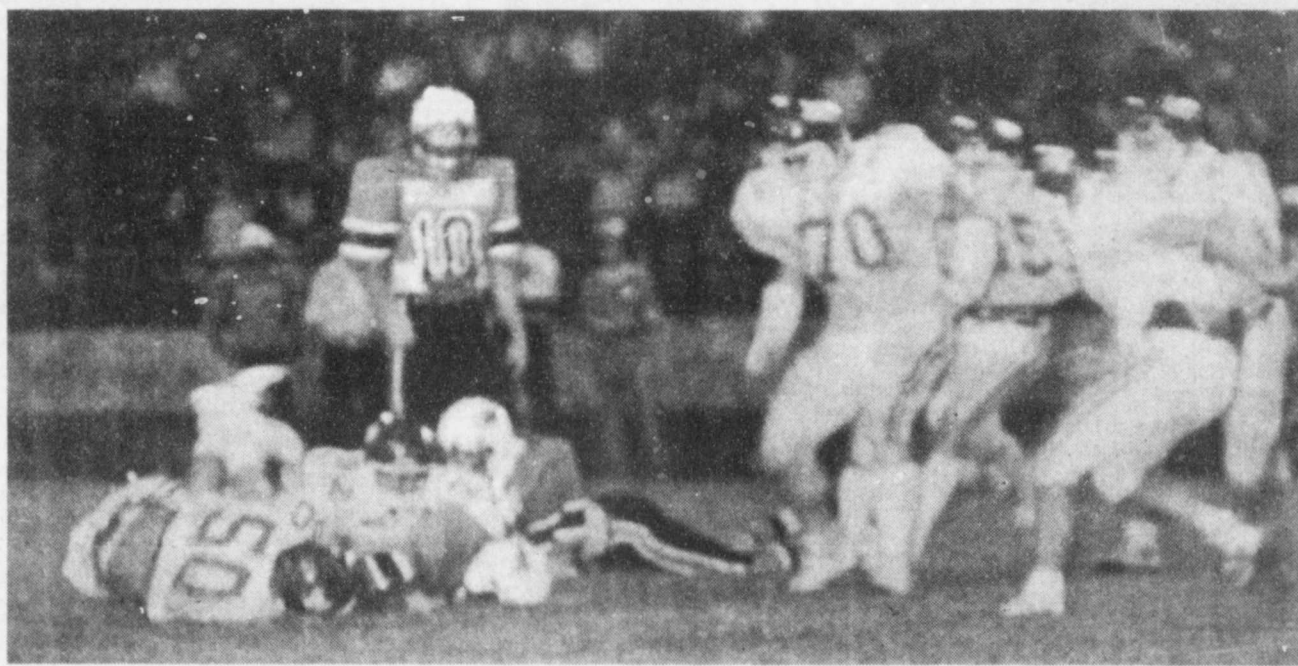

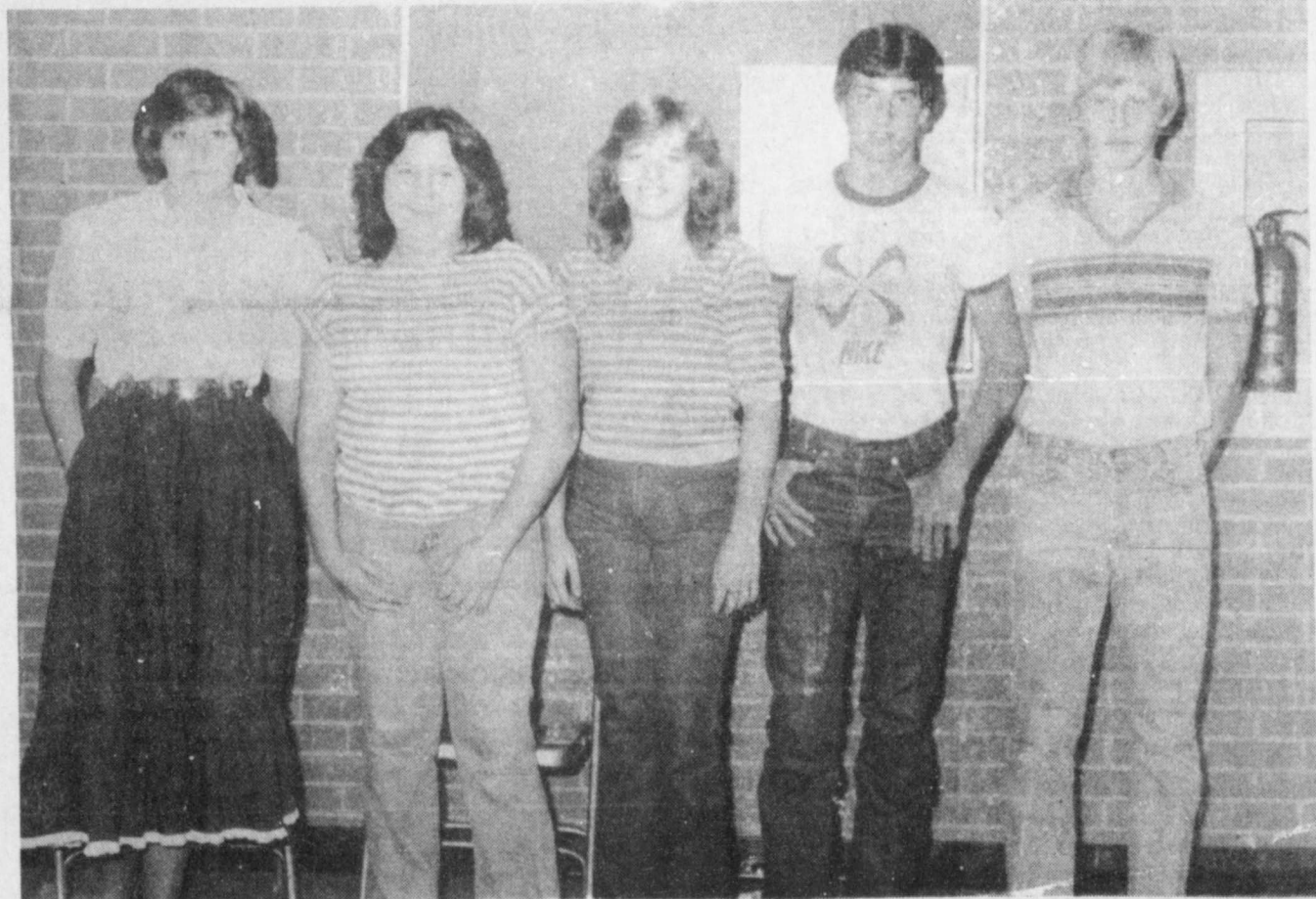
UMW Holds Fall Meeting

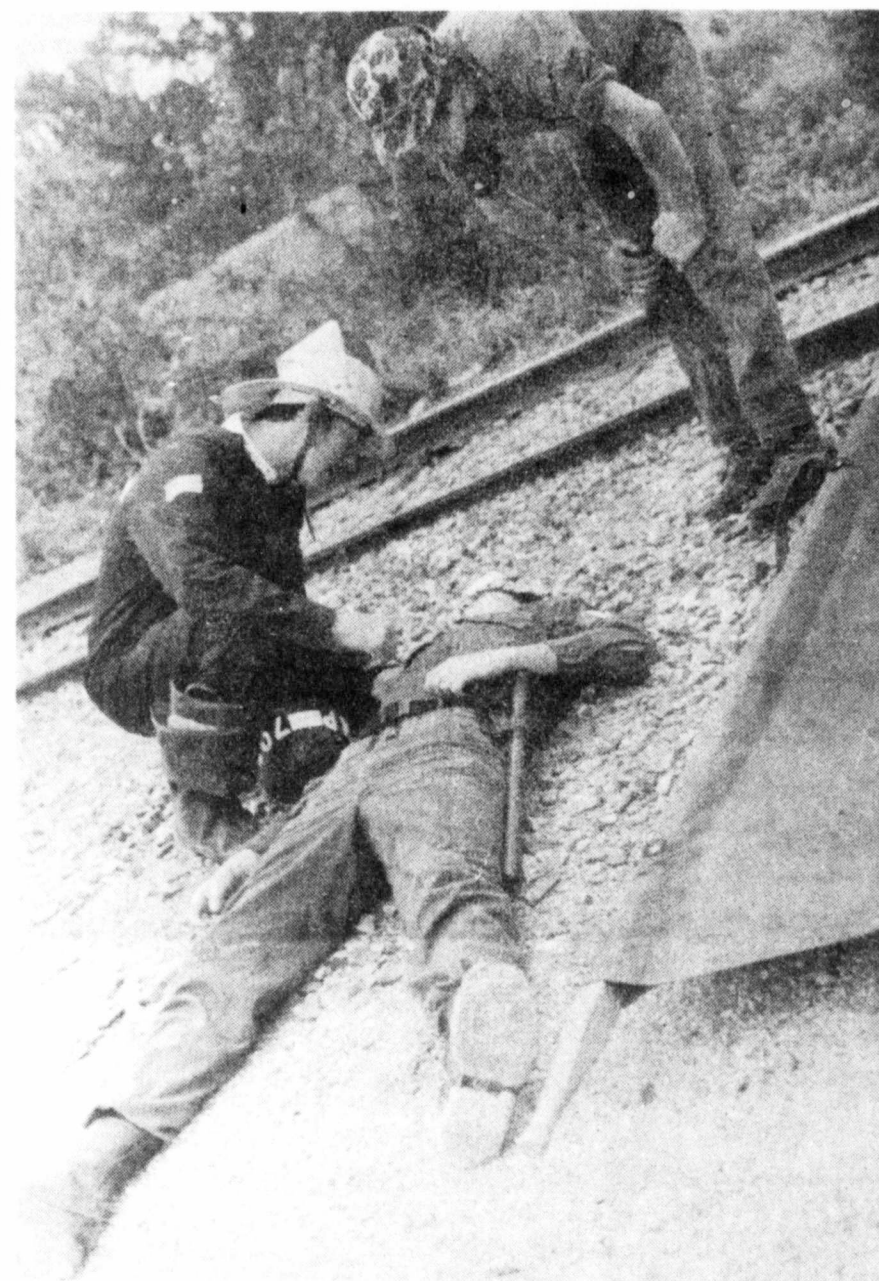

Technology In Our Lives

Portable Pocket Phones Have Arrived

Good news is ringing out for doctors, businessmen, and anyone who has to be within quick reach of an office. It's a new radio telephone system that can be used either in a car, or in your pocket.

It doesn't work like a radio, though. It works like a phone with dialing ability and two-way transmission. The new phones use a cellular system which re-uses scarce radio frequencies many times by dividing cities into cells, each with its own transmitter.

Thanks to this new system, the door of vital communications will now be open to millions of new users. One of these systems, developed by Motorola, is now a reality. Called the DYNALOC system, it is already in operation in the Baltimore-Washington, D.C. area. In the last seven months it has processed over one million calls, at a level of service equal to that



achieved by standard wire-line telephone systems. Designed to operate virtually anywhere within the cellular system coverage area, the new portable phones provide all the ability of home or business telephones. Many experts believe these new portable phones will not only replace the beep as a status symbol, but become the communications of the future, turning travel time for many businessmen into productive time.

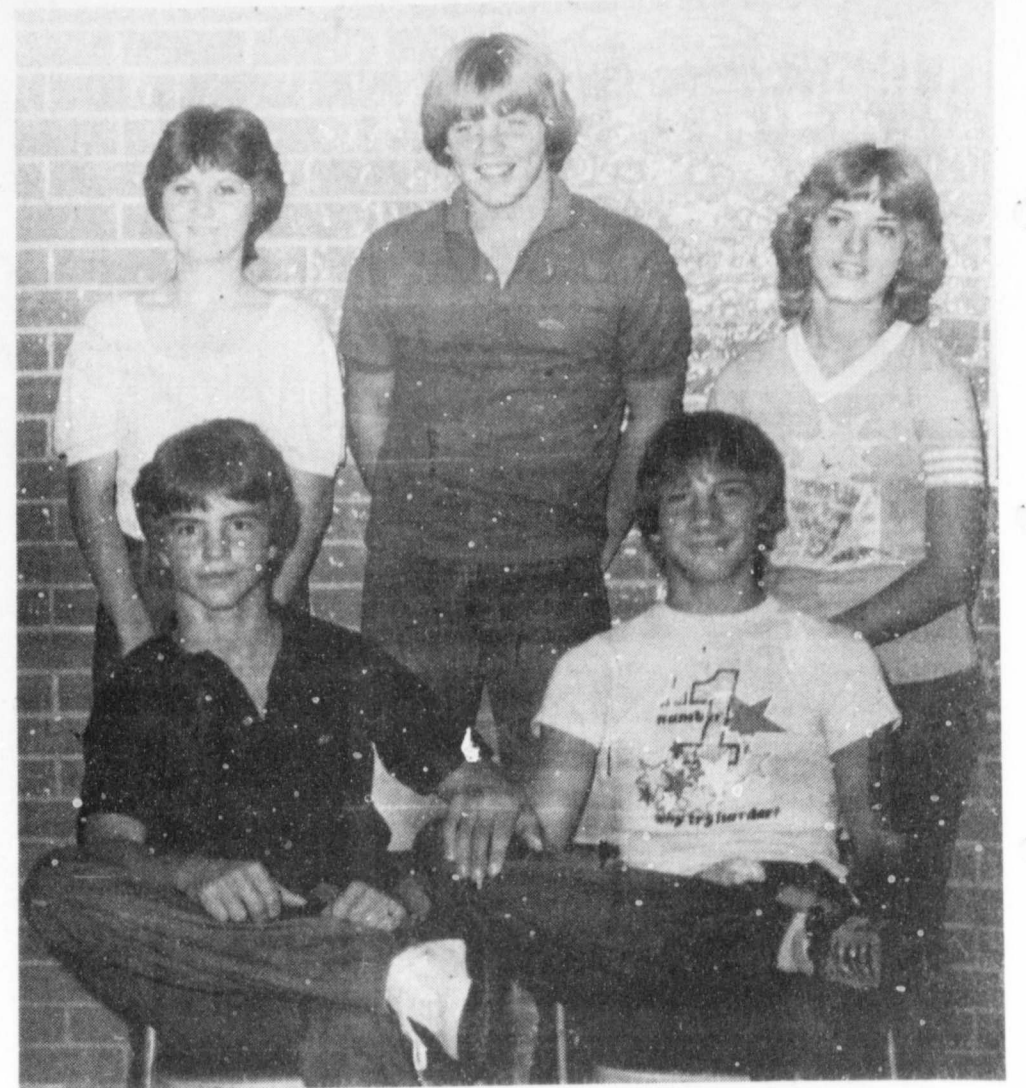
