## Patriots Open District In Winnsboro Friday

The Prairiland Patriots will open their district competition against the Winnsboro Red Raiders Friday night, with a 7:30 kickoff time for their fourth straight away-from-home game.

The Raiders have a 4-1 record, and run the same offense and defense as the Patriots do.

Head Coach Chet James says "it will depend on who executes the best as to who wins the Winnsboro game."

James also says that "it might have been two different football games last Friday". He refers to the Mt. Vernon-Prairiland game in which the Red Pride had the Tigers down 14-0 until the 3rd quarter, when the Mt. Vernon bunch broke loose to defeat Prairiland 19-14.

The first half was all the Patriot's, but the second was the Tiger's. James says that he's glad the game happened now, before district play begins, and that it will be a different ballgame when Mt. Vernon travels to Prairiland to play again.

After a 14-0 lead at the half, the Red Pride saw their lead nibbled away when the Tigers came back to score 3 times in the second half. James says that the boys just didn't keep up the first half intensity, and made a lot of linebacker coverage errors in the second half.

The Pats had control of the game completely as they set out in the 1st quarter. The series that resulted in the first score was a combination passing from QB Todd Davis to Jeff Ballard, plus two handy pass in-

terference calls that resulted in automatic first downs.

Interference on the part of an over-enthusiastic Tiger put the Prairiland team in a 1st and goal situation, with Ronald Nichols tearing through for the TD and Brian Franks adding on the PAT.

The two teams then went through a series of evenly-matched punt returns, until Chris Spann pounced on Mt. Vernon fumble.

Davis carried the ball over for another TD, and Franks' trusty toe made the score 14-0, where it stayed until the 3rd quarter of the game.

Scott Dunagan and William Newman were outstanding on defense, and several times the Mt.

Vernon commander, Jimmy Laughton, found himself sacked or rushed behind the lines.

Prairiland's David Edwards was in the game for the first time in 5 weeks after an injury, but did not have his best night.

After the half things still looked good from a Patriot view-point, and when the Pats recovered a Tiger fumble it seemed like touch-down time again. However, they failed to capitalize on that, giving up the ball with a 4th and 1 situation on Mt. Vernon's 28.

The Mt. Vernon team decided that this wasn't the kind of homecoming game their fans came to see, and began an onslaught which resulted in a 10-play score with the Pats defeating their conversion attempt.

Prairiland's momentum seemed to wind down then, and they couldn't hold onto the ball, an interception resulting in another Tiger score.

Again however, the staunch defenders kept the Tigers from their conversion attempt.

In the fourth quarter the score read 14-12, but the Mt. Vernon line began to sack or rush Davis almost as soon as he got the ball.

Another pass interception led to the Tigers scoring, making them the leaders with a 19-14 edge.

Hope still remained in the Patriots, who doggedly set out to rectify the situation with another touch down. With 5 minutes left the Pats gave up the ball again though, as the Tigers

## Blossom Man Wins Contest

Seven must be the winning number in the weekly News-Times football guessing contest as that number again represented the fewest mistakes by any contestant on the 28-game card and for Troyal Barker of Blossom it meant the \$12 first place prize money.

Barker was all alone with only seven wrong guesses, finishing one game ahead of Kay Byndas, Route 1, Bogata, and 2-time champ Lance Miller of Mt. Pleasant, who tied for second place.

Barker's misses included the Baylor-Houston tie, which everyone missed; along with the Texas Tech upset of the Aggie, Jesuit's win over Paris, New Diana over James Bowie, Hughes Springs tipping New Boston, Daingerfield popping Paul Powell and Mt. Vernon's win over Prairiland. Barker, however, did guess LSU would upset Florida.

In going to the tie-breaker game to dissolve the deadlock between Byndas

and Miller, both had figured Prairiland would beat Mt. Vernon. The second tie-breaking step is margin of victory, but since both contestants had erred on guessing the winner, they remained deadlocked. The third step is total game points and here Byndas had a total of the Patriots would win, 24-14, a guess of 38 game points; while Miller favored the Pats by 32-13, a total of 45 game points.

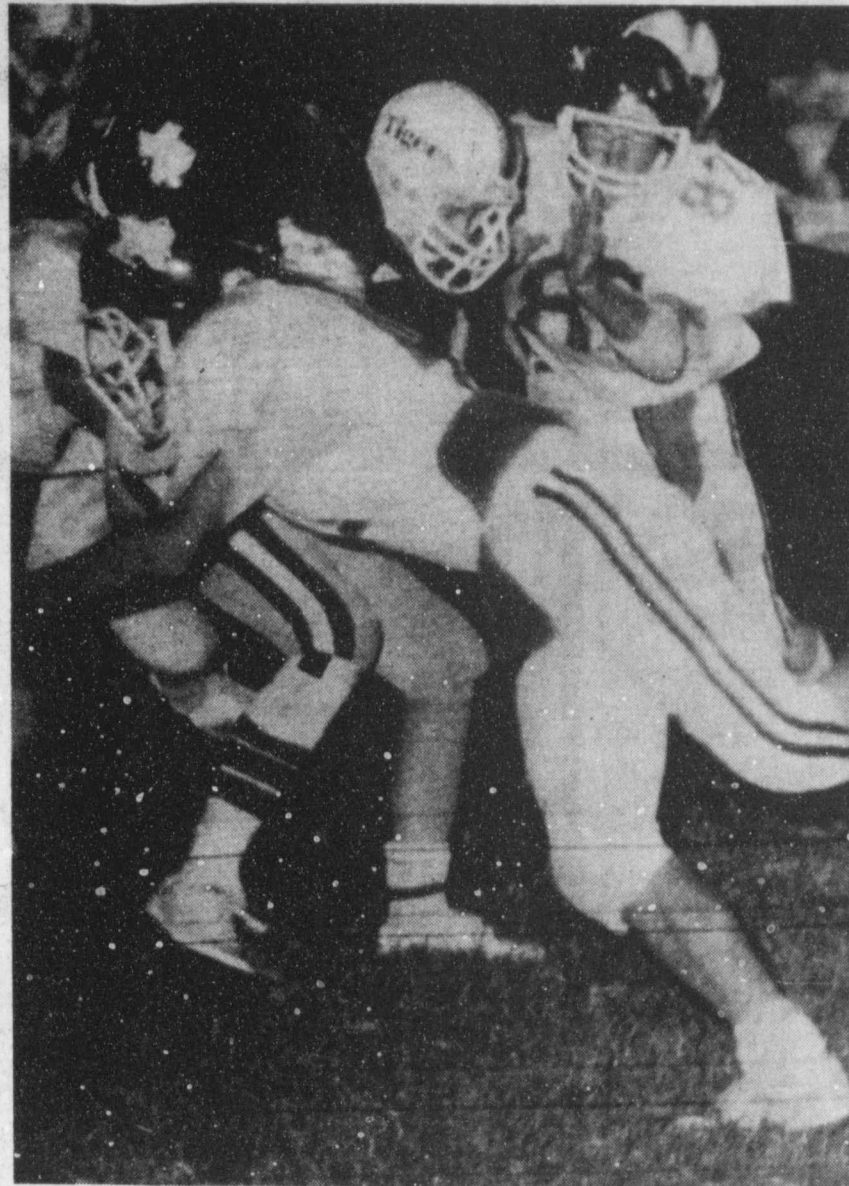

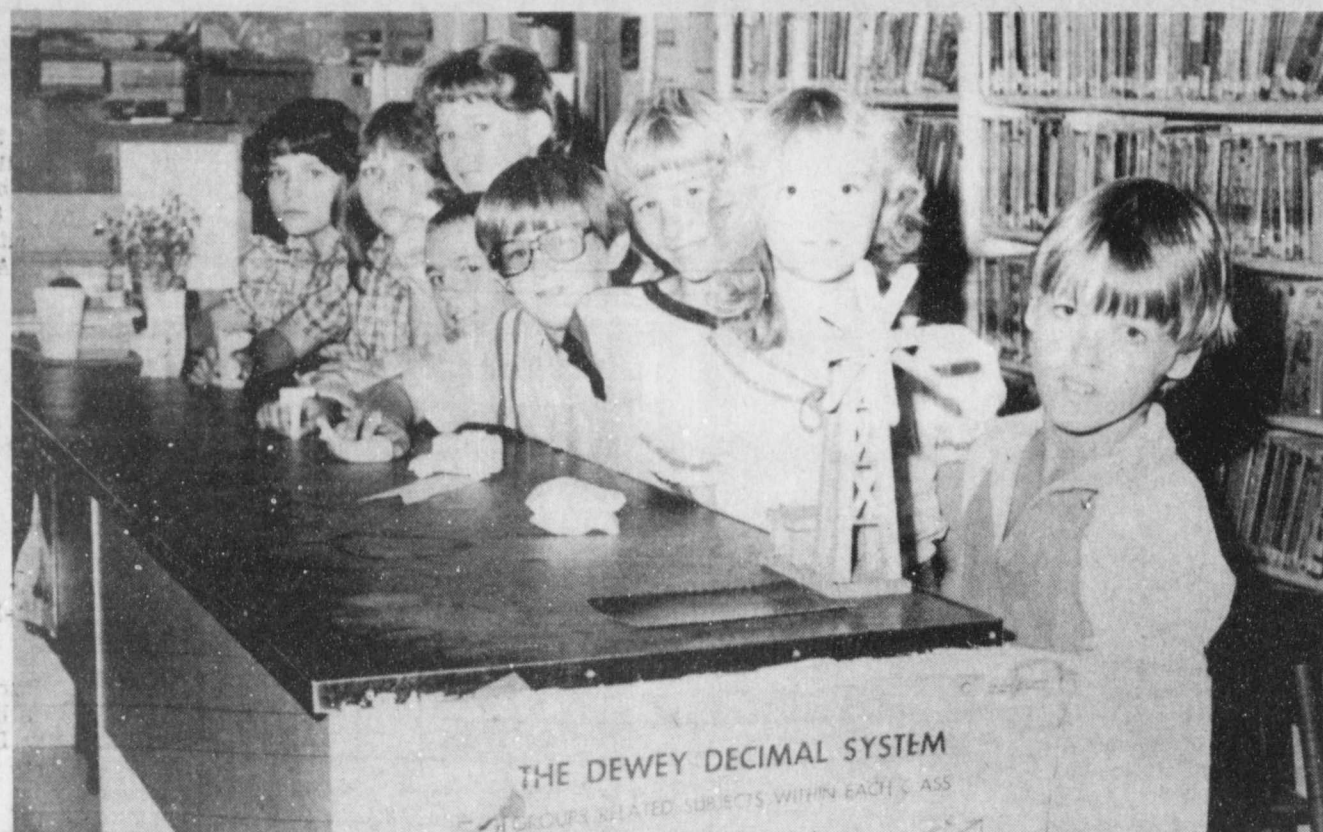

Now, how do you impress this on students in elementary or in middle school? Simple: tell them and show them, over and over again. You do not depend on the public schools or anyone else to do it. The guiding hand must come from home.

No one said that being a parent would be easy, did they? On the contrary, being a parent is one of the most demanding (and sometimes frustrating) roles we will ever fulfill. It takes 24 hours a day and seven days a week to be an effective parent.

Homework, special projects and co-curricular activities take time on the part of students and parents. Yet, this is time which is well spent, because it is time which is spent in developing the ability to learn how to learn. This lasts a lifetime.

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# New 4-H Beef Program Established

The Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas has established a new 4-H beef production and recognition program with the Texas 4-H Foundation in behalf of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H.

This new program, known as the 4-H Beef Producer Awards Program, will be phased in over a two-year period, said H.T. Davison, Extension 4-H and youth Specialist and executive director of the Texas 4-H Foundation.

Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader, said the 4-H Beef Producer Awards Program will emphasize production. "To qualify, a 4-H member must keep records on 10 or more head of beef cattle," Pelham said. "The 4-H project may be breeding beef cattle, yearlings, stocker cattle, heifer production or any type of beef production activity which will emphasize breeding, feeding and nutrition, management and marketing."

Emphasis will also be placed on demonstrations, public speaking, judging events, tours, exhibits, leadership and citizenship activities, said Pelham. The program will emphasize and recognize those 4-H members who have intensive, well-rounded beef projects.

Cliff Boucher, an ICA spokesman, said that the state winner will be selected by the Extension Service and

will be honored at their annual convention. The 1982-83 winner will receive a special plaque and a \$6,000 scholarship.

Boucher said that in 1984 the awards will be expanded and a winner will be named in each of the 14 Extension Service districts. Each of these district winners will receive a trip to the Independent Cattlemen's Association Convention and a plaque. Three state winners will be selected and will receive scholarships of \$6,000, \$4,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

"We are highly pleased with the program initiated by the Independent Cattlemen's Association," Davison said. "It will greatly strengthen the current 4-H beef program and will recognize 4-H members for their accomplishments in beef production."

4-H members interested in beef production will enroll in the beef project through their 4-H clubs, Pelham said.

Under the guidance of a volunteer beef leader, they will develop their individual production goals which may include buying and managing livestock.

With the assistance of the beef leader and working in small groups, 4-H members will study all facets of beef production, including production record keeping. At the end of the 4-H year their records can be submitted for consideration and competition in this new beef awards program.

Roy Wheeler, ICA president, told the recent 1982 ICA Convention assembly when the program was approved: "Cattle producers of today must encourage and lead young people interested in agriculture to ensure that we have competent cattle producers of tomorrow. Awarding scholarships and employing these young people and including them in our county and statewide activities are a few ways that we can educate them to preserve our industry."

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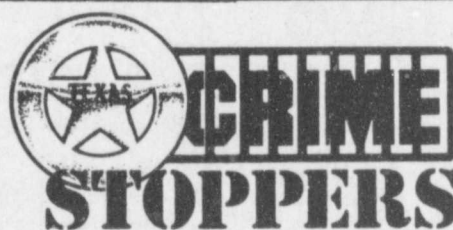

Cash rewards are available for information leading to arrest and felony indictment of those who would, through fraud or coercion, attempt to set aside the voting process. Citizens do not have to reveal their name, just give their information, and they will be given a unique code number for identification purposes.

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**A:** This is a typical problem of not a bad credit rating, but simply none at all. Do this! Make an appointment to visit each credit bureau in town to see what record they show of your marital credit. While you are there, request the Bureau to begin a listing for you, specifically entering in your name the accounts you have paid.

As a further step, you might apply for a credit card in your own name and use that payment reference when you apply for your next card or loan. Once a bank will lend you money, repaying that loan will aid in establishing a creditworthy history.

**Q:** Many years ago I bought a home where a small creek flowed through the backyard. Over the years the creek changed course and is no longer on my property. Is it lawful for me to re-route

the creek back onto my property?

**A:** If the creek is no longer on your property, you would have no right to re-route the creek back onto your property. First, you would be committing a trespass to enter upon lands of another in order to re-route the creek. Secondly, you have legal obligations to both the owners of the property upstream and downstream. You cannot make a change which adversely affects the property of the upstream or downstream property owners.

**Q:** When a state trooper gives me a ticket for speeding, am I admitting guilt when I sign the ticket?

**A:** No. Your signature does not admit guilt nor does it complete any future action that is required. You are simply making an agreement to contact the judge in the particular county where the ticket was issued. However, if you fail to do so, the magistrate may issue a warrant for your arrest.

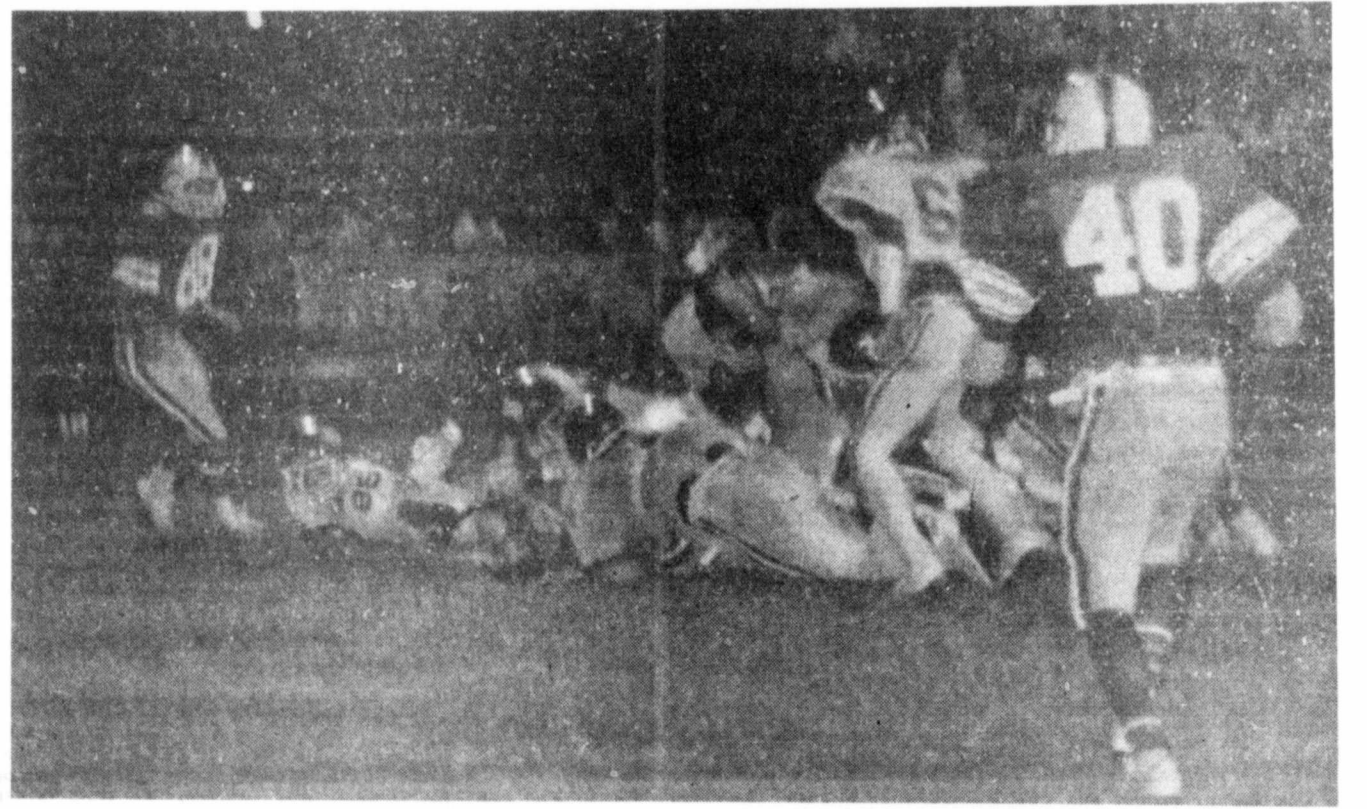

### Defense contractor hires cream of ex-Pentagon crop

WASHINGTON -- The Martin Marietta Corporation lost a bundle when it failed in its recent bid to take over the Bendix Corporation. It was an incredible display of corporate cannibalism.

But don't weep too much for Martin Marietta. It is still the nation's 12th-largest defense contractor. And the firm has taken steps to make sure that it keeps its lucrative share of the Pentagon budget.

What Martin Marietta has done is to hire former Pentagon brass hats -- by the carload. Most defense contractors do this, but Martin Marietta is the king of the hill. From 1979 through 1981, the corporation placed 231 former high-ranking officers and Defense Department officials on its payroll. That's more than twice as many as any other defense contractor.

Our reporter Eric Koli checked the list of retired military and civilian defense officials who have taken jobs with Martin Marietta. There is a law which requires these former officials to disclose when they go to work with a defense contractor.

The law is supposed to let the public know when there might be a conflict of interest in the billions of dollars the Pentagon spends. Mil-

itary purchasing officers might be giving an edge to defense contractors who are going to hire them when their government service is finished.

In any event, Martin Marietta has gone after the cream of the crop. Among those hired since 1979 were two Army generals. One was a vice chief of staff, the other a deputy under secretary of defense in charge of acquiring weapons systems and materiel.

Also put on Martin Marietta's payroll were a former chairman of the Defense Department's contract finance committee, a former inspector general and two members of the inspector general's investigative staff.

We want to emphasize that Martin Marietta did nothing illegal. An unemployed general can go to work wherever he can find a job. But it doesn't hurt a defense contractor to employ people who know their way around the Pentagon.

**MENACHEM MANEUVERS:** The National Security Council has been secretly discussing ways and means of dealing with Israel's recalcitrant prime minister, Menachem Begin. So far, the White House officials haven't come up with a workable plan.

An arms cutoff to Israel has now been ruled out. Tue-

main reason is purely practical: The Israelis don't need American arms right now. Their invasion of Lebanon didn't cost them much equipment. In fact, they wound up with an enormous amount of captured military booty.

But President Reagan's advisers have been discussing some less-dramatic reprisals against Israel. Reagan wants to punish the Begin government, we're told, not only for standing by while hundreds of Palestinian refugees were massacred, but also for brusquely rejecting his peace plan for the Middle East.

Here are some of the ideas that are being considered by the White House:

-- The United States may stop forgiving the Israeli arms debt. Usually, about \$500 million is written off the books each year.

-- Organizations that donate money to Israel could be stripped of their tax-exempt status. This would put a serious crimp in Israel's fundraising efforts in this country.

-- The administration might tighten up the rules on Americans who lobby for Israel. Most of them are not required to register as foreign agents. But Americans who lobby for Arab causes are usually compelled to register.

-- The White House may decide to deduct the money

Israel spends on its West Bank settlements from the \$1 billion a year it receives in U.S. economic aid. This could cause the Israelis to wonder whether the West Bank colonies are really worth the cost.

A top-secret Central Intelligence Agency report states that "the Palestinian question raises so many sensitive issues that most Israelis would prefer not to face it." What Reagan wants, in the words of the CIA document, is to "force (the) Israelis to come to grips with the question."

**WATCH ON WASTE:** According to federal auditors, the taxpayers shell out nearly \$500 million a year to operate 688 aircraft for the sole purpose of flying bureaucrats around.

For example, Federal Aviation Administrator Lynn Helms took no commercial flights during his first eight months in office. His flights aboard government aircraft cost \$417,000. Identical flights aboard commercial aircraft would have cost less than \$13,000.

Another example: The Pentagon dispatched a plane from Illinois to New Mexico -- at a cost of \$3,500 -- just to pick up some unclassified briefing material. The material could have been sent by express mail for \$9.

## Tighter controls Established on Food stamp abuse

AUSTIN—Measures  
designed to tighten control  
over abuses in the food stamp  
program have been announced  
by Marlin W. Johnston, com-  
missioner of the Department  
of Human Resources, which  
administers the program in  
Texas.  
Johnston said food stamp  
recipients in Texas have been  
instructed to sign each book  
of food stamps as soon as it  
is received so that no one else  
can use the stamps, and to  
have their food stamp ID  
card with them and be pre-  
pared to show it to their  
grocer whenever buying food  
with food stamps.  
In addition, the department  
has redesigned the food stamp  
ID cards using special serial  
numbers and a new code to  
verify that the authorized  
family representative or fam-  
ily member is the only user of  
the card. All food stamp re-  
cipients will have the new cards  
by Nov. 1.  
In the past, Johnston said,  
the agency had limited con-  
trols over how many ID cards  
were issued to a family, since

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
