Forestall Shut-Out Against Speedy Cats Patriots Fall To Blue Tigers

By Thomas Nichols The air wasn't the only thing with a bite last Friday night when the Prairiland Patriots took on the Clarksville Blue Tigers. This year, although the Tigers clawed the Pats 35-6, the Red Pride from Prairiland had teeth too.

Last year's dismal game, played in the pouring rain, saw the Patriots making not a single first down.

This year's team scored once and the defense played well against a team with tremendous talent. Now they're ready to take on the Mt. Vernon Tigers with a will. Head Coach Chet James says "we let the Mt. Vernon boys off the hook last time, but it's district play now, and we've looked at the film over and over. We let down that second half, but don't intend to do that this time."

Kickoff for the last of the Patriot home games will be at 7:30 p.m. with a Wednesday night bonfire and pep rally getting fans and players stirred up for a win.

Against the Clarksville bunch James says "we woke the sleeping giants. We didn't play badly, but the speed and talent the Tigers had in every department were just hard to beat. It's hard to believe they've lost so much with the quality they displayed."

An example of the Patriots drive and desire was evident in the second quarter, with 6 minutes and 7 seconds left in the half, with the Tigers 6 points in the lead and on the Prairiland 15 yard line.

The Red Pride overcame the charge of blue to take over on downs.

Early in the 3rd the Patriots forced the Clarksville bunch to fumble the ball on the 44 yard line and again on the Prairiland 24 yard line.

The offense couldn't quite handle the tremendous rush and hitting from the Blue Cats, but came close several times.

The hang-in-there spirit was evident again in the fourth quarter when the Tigers found themselves being backed up on 1st and second downs to face a 3rd and 20 yard situation. Prairiland received the ball on their 30 yard line, and an excellent combination of pass and run moved the ball, but offense couldn't break through the Tigers for numbers on the board at that

time. Faced with a fourth down situation the Patriots faked the punt gave Nelson Hevron the opportunity to burn up some yards for a first on the Prairiland 35.

Although the great play didn't lead to points, they still refused to be denied anything, and late in the fourth quarter managed to shut up the Clarksville fans screaming for a shut out.

The fine running of Dennis Rhodes and Todd Davis brought the Patriots to 1st and goal on the 7.

Running back Ronald Nichols scooted around the left end for the TD.

Although the extra point attempt was no good the Pride of Prairiland of 1982 had erased some of the bad feeling of humiliation of the previous year.

The Patriots had hopes of racking up a district win against the Mt. Vernon team this coming week, and playing on their own turf for once should be a big boost.

Fans can look for a tough, hot game, worth going to see.

The Deport Times, Bogata News, Talco Times and Blossom Times have been returned to Four Corners Publishing Co., owned by Bob and Pat Wright of Mt. Vernon.

The return of the assets to the Wrights from Bert West and Red River Publishing Co. was completed at 6 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 24. A writ of

sequestration was issued at noon Friday, Oct. 22, from the Franklin County District Court of Judge J.N. Thompson, and the equipment used in the publication of the newspapers was secured Friday afternoon by Lamar County Constable Al Parks in the old First National Bank building in Deport. The sequestration

was the first step in the process of returning the newspapers to the Wrights.

Bert C. and Betty West returned the operating assets of the company to the Wrights through a bill of sale on Sunday.

Operation of the Newspapers is expected to remain basically the same,

with the same employees working for the Newspapers.

Nanalee Nichols will be the managing editor, and Vera Grogan (when she returns from the hospital) will operate the office in Bogata. Joyce Alexander will be the Talco editor and Shelley Vaughn will be the Blossom editor.

Interment followed in Elmwood Memorial Park in Abilene.

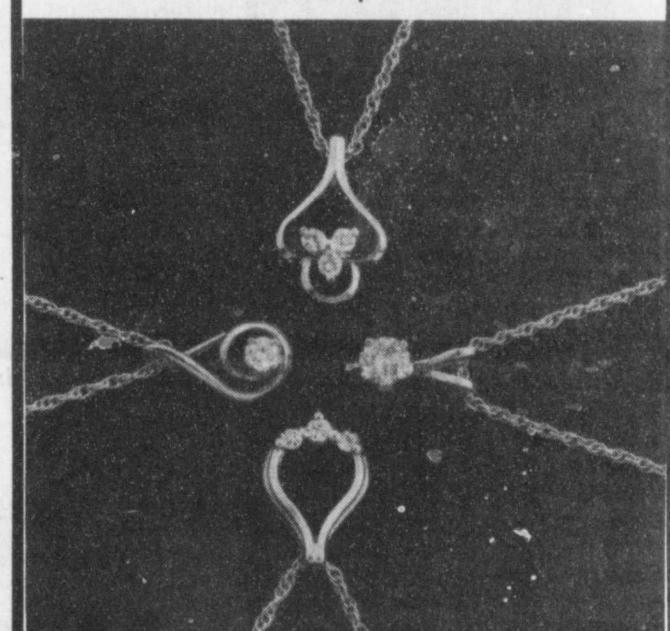
Mrs. Lemen attended Fulbright school and married Hoyle Lemen on March 11, 1934 in Clarksville.

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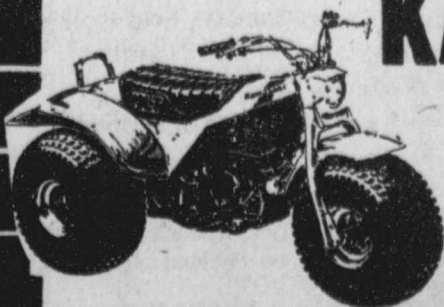
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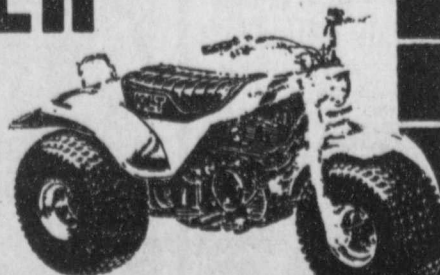

In spite of the rapid changes which took place in the publishing of these newspapers over the week end, we took care to greet Sam's ghost when we entered The Deport Times building.
When we originally bought The Deport Times, Talco Times and Bogata News from George and Wilma Grant in 1973, it was understood that we bought all

the assets and Sam Holloway's ghost. George and Wilma never said if the ghost was an asset or not. They just said it went with the building.

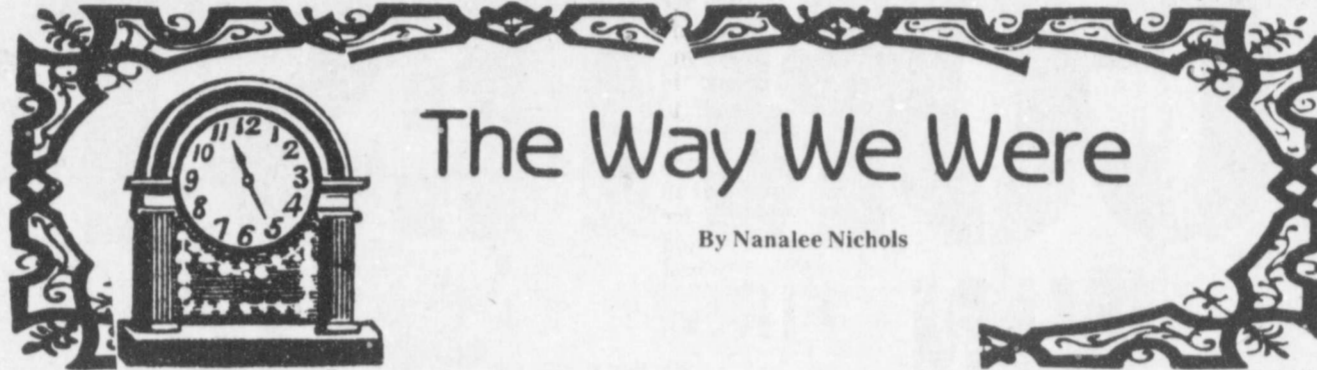

BEEF AND STUFFING PIE

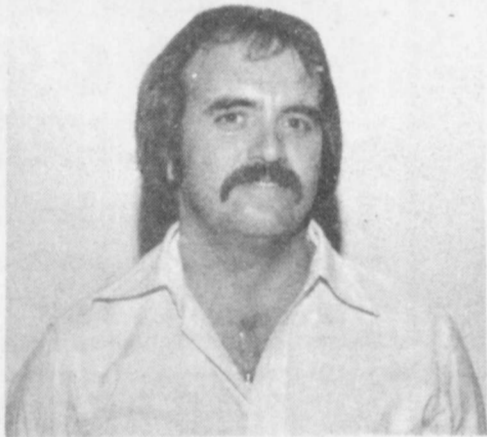
- 1 pound ground beef
- 2 eggs
- 1 package (6 oz.) Stove Top stuffing mix for beef
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, cut in pieces
- 1-3/4 cups hot water
- 1 package (9 oz.) frozen cut green beans, thawed
- 2 slices (1 oz. each) process American cheese, cut into strips

Combine meat and eggs. Press lightly into bottom and up the sides of two 7- or 8-inch pie pans to form shells. Place contents of vegetable/seasoning packet and butter in bowl. Add water; stir just to blend and partially melt butter. Add stuffing crumbs; stir just to moisten. Add vegetable and spoon into shell. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes. Arrange cheese around edge and bake 10 minutes longer. Cut into wedges. Makes 5 cups plus meat or 6 servings.

Munsing Union Suits for the whole family were on sale in time for cooler weather at J.O. Pirtle Co. in Deport. Girls and Boys complete suits were 50 cents. Men's and Ladies complete suits were available at \$1 to \$1.50.

Charles Gifford, who lived east of Deport near Lake Drain, was ill with malaria. Almost all of Johntown's business section was destroyed by fire.

30 YEARS AGO

Oct. 16, 1952
Due to the terrible drought a disaster hay program was being set up to help area stockmen.
Thirty-two young men had been called for induction by the Lamar County Draft Board.

The Hub in Clarksville had puckered nylon mens shirts for \$3.66. Work suits in khaki, complete pants and shirt outfit for \$4.50.

Miss Georgann Story had been honored with a misc. bridal shower at the home of Mrs. John R. Brittain.

20 YEARS AGO

Oct. 12, 1962
The Deport, East Lamar, Cunningham and Blossom schools were requiring physicals for boys and girls before basketball season began.

Area gins had turned out 4779 bales for the season. Deports three gins had

cranked out 3383 bales, Cunningham 1017, Fulbright 379. Seed price was \$52 a ton.

Bank statements reflected the depressed cotton harvest with deposits down slightly, loans up. Drought had hit cotton, hay and other crops.

The Cunningham Choral Club had elected officers. President was Brenda Black, vice president Sharon Gordon. The choir boasted 30 members.

W.O. Westbrook Grocery featured 10 Hershey Bars for 39 cents. 25 pounds of red potatoes were 69 cents and peach preserves, large jar were 25 cents.

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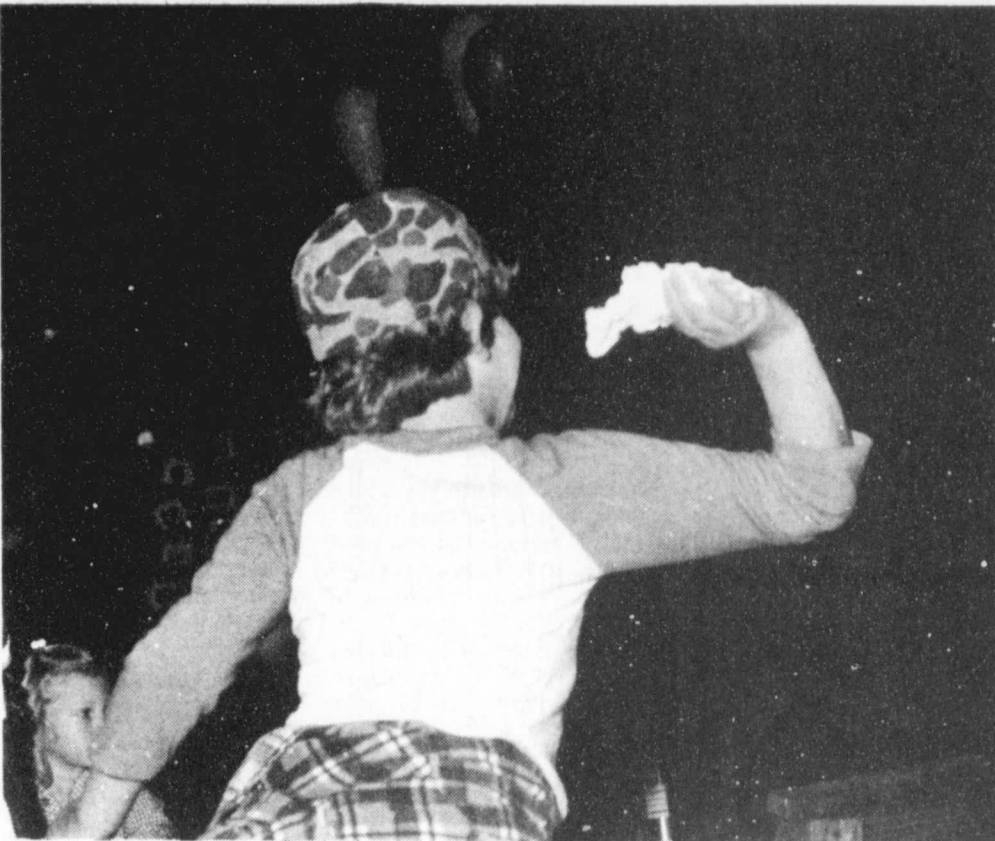

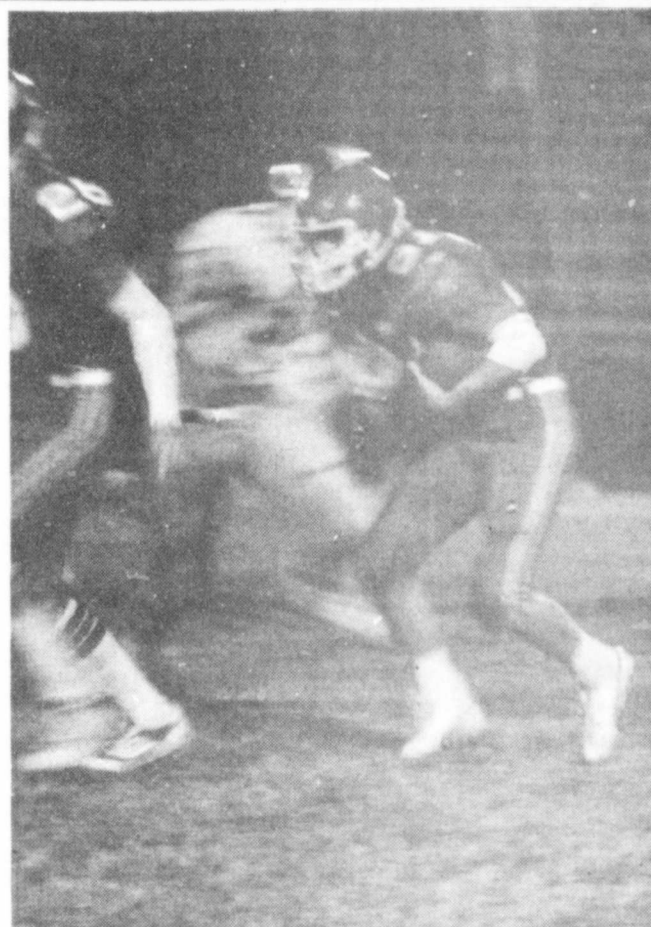

APRICOT RUM CAKE

- 1 cup egg whites, at room temperature
- 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 2-1/4 cups cake flour
- 1/2 cup apricot nectar
- 1/4 cup Bacardi dark rum
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 5 egg yolks
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup apricot preserves
- 1 tablespoon Bacardi dark rum
- 2 egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Yellow food coloring (optional)

In electric mixer bowl, beat egg whites and cream of tartar until soft peaks form. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar and continue

beating egg whites until stiff and glossy. In another large bowl, blend remaining 1 cup sugar with flour, apricot nectar, rum, oil, egg yolks, baking powder and salt. Gently fold into egg whites. Pour batter into ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 325°F. for 1-1/4 hours, or until cake springs back when lightly touched. Invert pan on funnel to cool. Heat apricot preserves to boiling. Add rum. Beat 2 egg whites with vanilla extract and food coloring to soft peaks. Gradually beat in hot preserves and continue beating about 6 minutes, until mixture peaks. Use to frost cooled cake. If desired, decorate cake with sliced almonds. Makes one 10-inch cake.

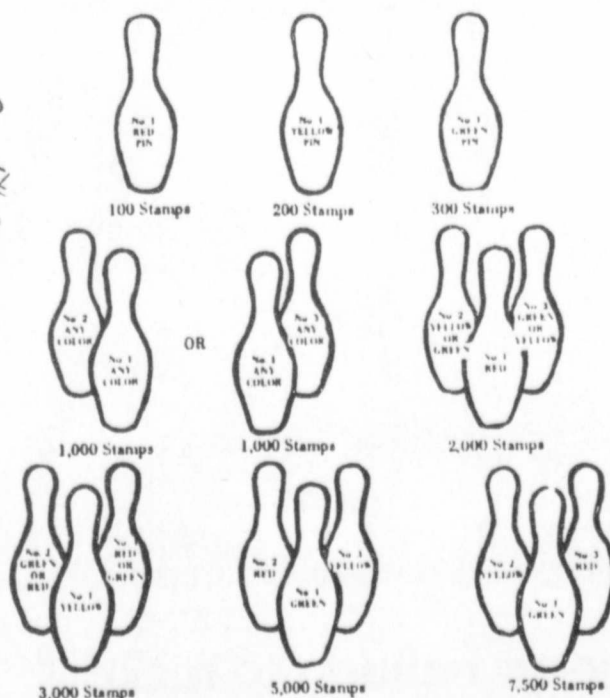

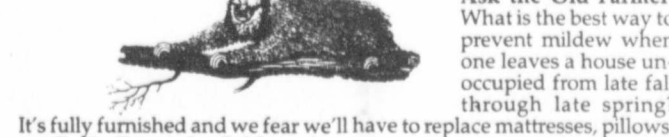

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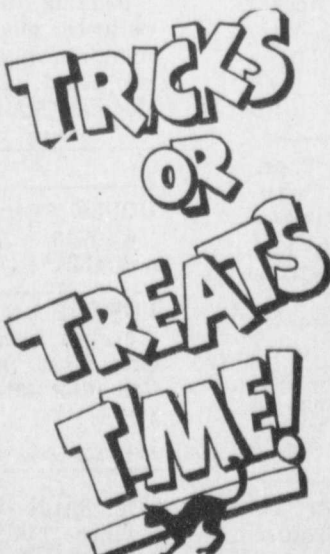
