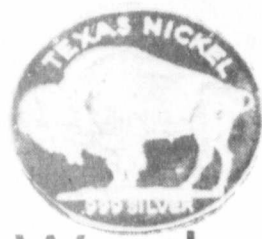

Parents And Students Talk To Board School Board Tours Elementary Campus

The Prairiland School Board listened to the opinions of some 10 adults and 15 students Monday night when the board met at Blossom Elementary School.
The parents and students wanted the school to change the ruling that allows only Prairiland Juniors and Seniors to attend the annual Junior-Senior Prom.
Many of the students expressed a desire to invite a guest to the prom, and some parents backed them up.
The school board had previously made a ruling in September that no invited

guests would be allowed at the annual event, continuing the policy of past years.
No action was taken, and the board stated that it would discuss and consider the situation and take action, if they decided to change the ruling, before the next meeting.
Following the discussion the board and Architect Bill Lightfoot toured the Blossom Elementary Campus, looking over the situation and discussing how extensively the building could be renovated and how much time it would take to do it.

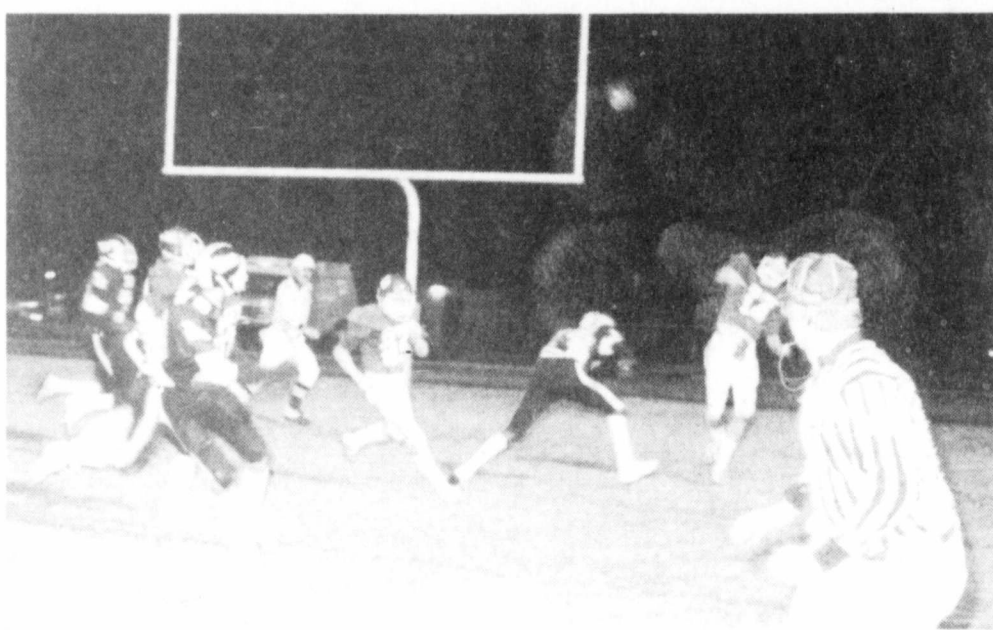
Superintendent Leslie Taylor stated that there was a crowding situation which must be relieved at the school, since absolutely no extra space was available.
The next meeting will be held at the Deport Elementary Campus for the same purpose.
The decision was made to purchase a 15 passenger vehicle for the use of the entire school system in transporting small groups of students. It is felt that such a vehicle could pay for itself

within 3 years, since the cost of operating a large bus is 69 cents per mile.
The vehicle could be used in transporting groups to UIL competition, track

meets, organizations, field trips, etc.
During executive session reassignment of school personnel was considered, but no action was taken.

Superintendent Taylor also mentioned that McClanahan and Holmes should have the final school audit ready at the end of November, and a called

session of the board will be necessary for the purpose of approving the audit before it is submitted to Austin.
The board's next meeting will be on December 13.

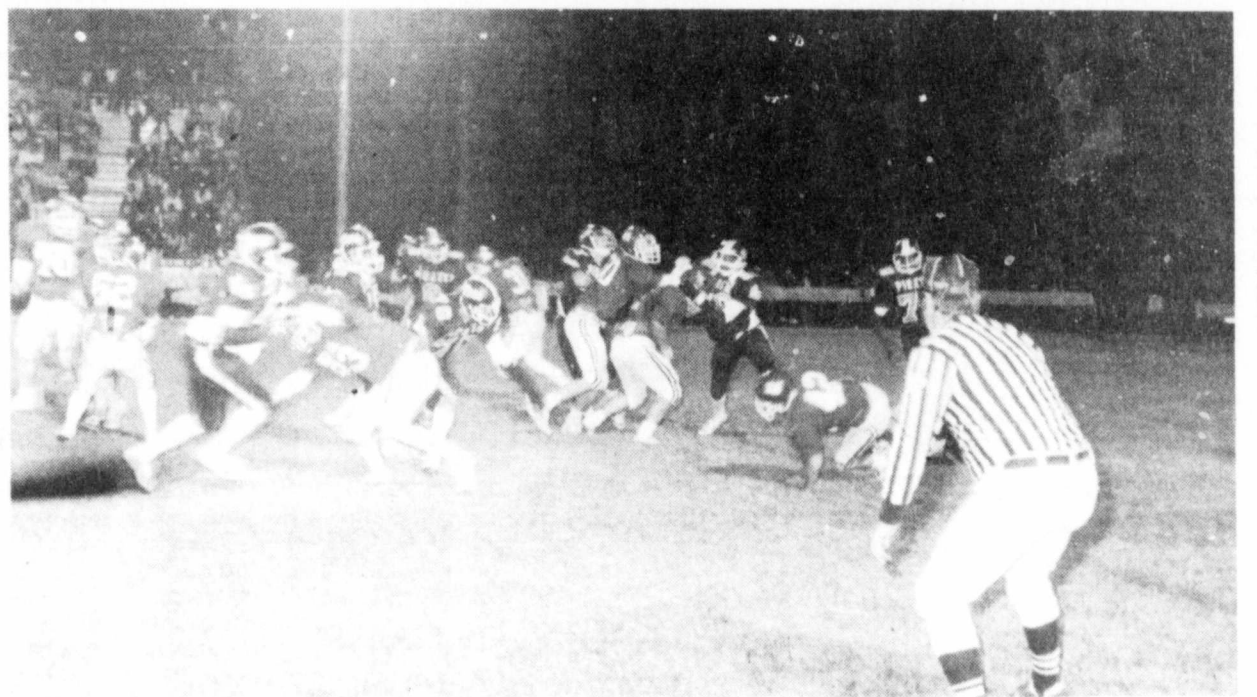


Looking For A Receiver

Tough Pirates Raid Patriot Hopes Pitt Ends Prairiland Season 47-6

Being defeated by the District 13-AAA champs may not be so bad, especially when the season reads 2 wins, one of them in district competition, as compared to a last year's record of all losses.
But for the Prairiland Patriots it was a bitter cold night at Pittsburg, as they faced a fired up team of Pirates that had made the score 20-0 before their offense ever made a play.
Head Coach Chet James says that "the boys were awfully tense and nervous before the game, and we made them look really good."
Such would seem to be the situation as the Pirates displayed an incredible speed, running the kickoff all the way down the field for a score.
The Patriots immediately tried to do something, but after 3 plays and only 4 yards of real estate, were forced to punt. The speedy Mark Cooper, taking the ball on kickoff, promptly scooted down the field in a repeat of the first kickoff performance.
Then an interception on the part of the Pirates on a Davis pass took the last heart out of the Red Pride as they watched a pass play turn into yet another score for the Pirates.
The Patriots pulled themselves together then, at least defensively and the Pittsburg coach pulled some of his fastest players out.
But it was definitely not a night for a fainthearted Prairiland fan, as they saw the half close out 33-0.
The Patriots played, undoubtedly, the worst game they have played this season. Nerves and the awesome display of skill and speed on the part of the Pirates kept them from "getting it together" for long.
The defense did their best, the offense tried valiantly, but it seemed a night that nothing worked.
The second half opened with a nice, 24-yard drive by the Pats before a fumble resulted in yet another TD for Pittsburg.
The last Pitt TD came in the third quarter, on a series of fast running plays.
David Edwards helped out for the Patriots with some good runs, but every time it

seemed the Pride might make much ground a fumble seemed to take it away.
James sent in, during the course of the game, every player on the sideline in an attempt to find something that worked, and to give each boy the chance to close out the season.
For seniors William Newman, Nelson Hevron, Jeff Ballard, Chris Spann, Jon King, Phil Graves, Ronald Nichols, Kevin Russell, Jerry Stone, Scott Dunagan and Guy Davis, the season ended on a disappointing note, the final score being 47-6.

Coach James said that "the season for us really ended against Mt. Vernon, when we took a 26-0 victory that made everyone feel great."
In the fourth quarter 54 yards in 7 plays by the Red Pride showed that whatever might happen, the boys don't give up. Davis passed to Jeff Ballard for 14 yards, keeping the game from being a shutout, but the extra two points failed.
Time ran out without anymore scoring on the part of either team, and a tired, weary team of Patriots

made the trek home.
The season recap shows improvement over the past few seasons, with the defense probably being the best it has been in years.
The offense, which showed flashes of deadly accuracy on pass plays from quarterback Todd Davis (returning next year) and much improved skills in execution, also has nothing to be ashamed of.
This year's Red Pride were in the game all the way, and provided a hope for better things to come in Prairiland football.

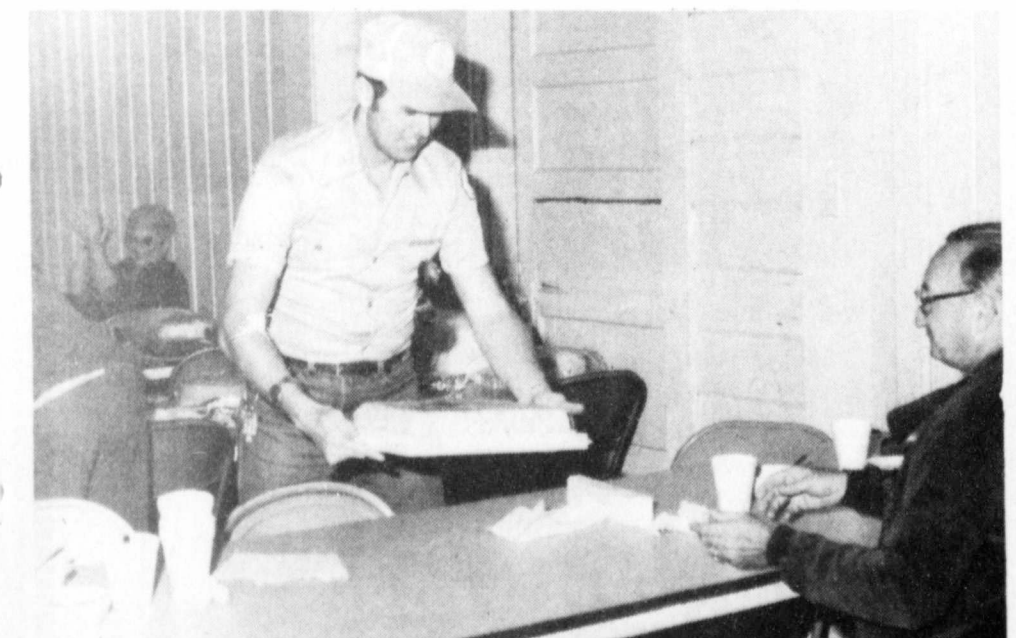

East Texas Eating

Ah, the sweet potatoes have cured enough to bake.

As with most seasonal vegetables, I think the first big mellow sweet potato should be eaten with a certain amount of ceremony. I favor choosing one large, perfect sweet potato per person, baking them until the skins crackle and the golden-orange interiors are soft when gently squeezed. The distinctive aroma is

bound to whet the appetites of family members as it summons them to the table. I really feel that a generous pat of real butter and a sprinkling of salt and freshly ground black pepper are all that those first, perfect sweet potatoes need to make a complete meal. However, if your family is bound to ask "Is this all?" then choose medium size sweet potatoes and small braised pork chops and crisp rings of new fall apples.

Then, next Sunday, top off dinner with an old-fashioned Sweet Potato Custard pie. Here is a recipe of the late Mrs. J.E. VanDyke (1850-1944) that is included in the "Baker's Dozen Early Red River County Recipes" put together by the Red River County Historical Society. If you prefer a less sweet meringue, reduce the sugar in the meringue to one-half cup.

SWEET POTATO CUSTARD

Pint mashed sweet potatoes, half-pint sweet milk, cup butter, cup sugar, yolks of four eggs, 1/2 tsp. of nutmeg, half teaspoon vanilla. Pour into pan lined with crust; bake. Beat whites of eggs well, one cup sugar, spread over top and brown.

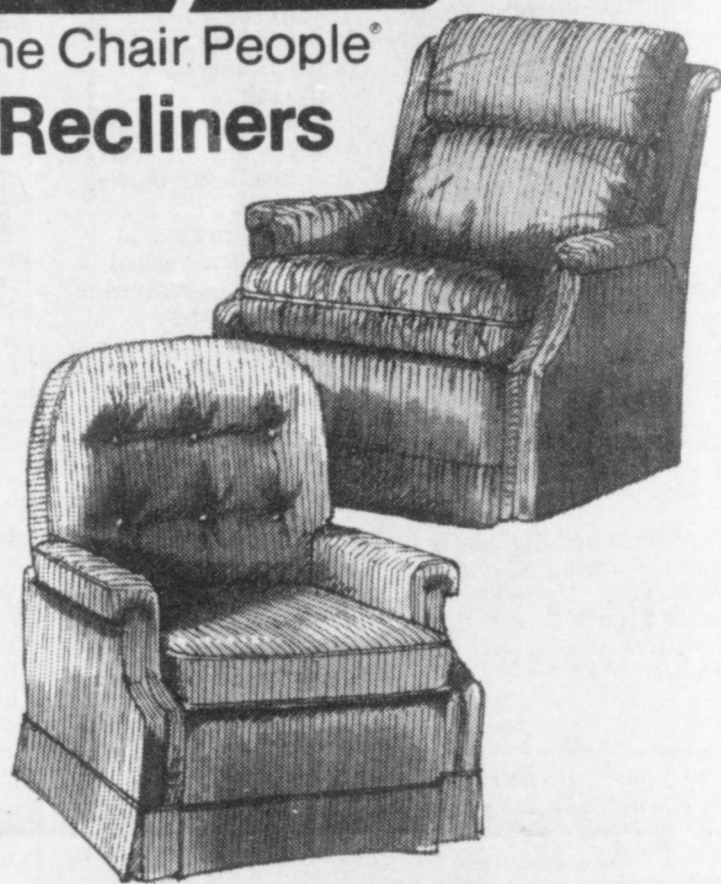
