Patriots Defeat Pittsburg Pirates In Tuesday Night Action! Prairiland Patriots Keep District Hopes

By Joel Birch The Prairiland Patriots stuck it to the Pittsburg Pirates Tuesday night to keep their district winning streak alive, and improve their district record to four wins and two losses. They revenged an earlier district loss to Pittsburg by beating the Pirates, 66-37.

Mark Reily, Joe Smith and Jeff Griffin led Pat scorers with 21 for Reily, 16 for Smith and 15 for Griffin. The game was highlighted by good defense and outstanding rebounding strength. The Patriots out rebounded the Pirates, 36 to 24.

Pat Totals Mark Reily, 21 points, six rebounds, six assists and four steals; Joe Smith, 16 points, one rebound; Jeff Griffin, 15 points, eight rebounds, four assists and three steals; Jeff Ballard, nine points, 10 rebounds, two assists and one steal; Jon King, four points, 10 rebounds, one assist and three steals; Phil Graves, one point; Paul Lyles, one rebound, two assists and one steal.

Sixty-four points was the margin at Prairiland Friday

night, as the Patriots came out running and never looked back, they rolled easily over the Winnsboro Red Raiders, 101-37.

Friday's spirit boosting win improved the Patriots 13AAA record to three wins and two losses. The Pats placed five players in double figures. Joe Smith led the scoring bombardment with 22. Jeff Ballard and Jeff Griffin added 20 and 16 points respectively and Jon King and Paul Lyles sank 14 and 11 points respectively.

The Pats struck quickly. Before Winnsboro could call time out the Patriots managed to score 14 points. After the time out, the Red Raiders finally got their first two points with 4:10 remaining in the first stanza. While Winnsboro was trying to figure out what was going on, they called time again with 2:02 left in the first. The score 21-6. Patriots. The quarter finally ended, 31-8 Patriots, with all the substitutes in the game.

Joe Smith scored 15 of his 22 points in the first quarter before it ended.

The second quarter was a comeback quarter for Winnsboro, if you could call

it a comeback. They scored the most points for them, in a quarter in the second, but still lost, 17 Patriot points to their 14. Both teams played a tight man to man defense, but the Patriots proved the better, as the half ended 48-22, Prairiland. Even though the score didn't indicate it, Winnsboro's shooting percentage went 52 percent in the first half. The Patriots percentage went to 58 percent.

The second half opened with the Pat starters back in. It wasn't long however, until they were taken back out. The Pats came back out the second half so hot, the Red Raiders were held to nine points in the third quarter, mostly by the good hustling defense, and quick offensive punch of the Patriot reserves. The third quarter ended, 73-31, with murmurs of a 100 point plus game. The fans got their wish.

The Patriot bench came in and played a great fourth quarter. A good defense and offense kept the hopes of a 100 point game possible. As the quarter neared the final minutes, the scores continued to climb, and so did the tension. With less than two minutes left, and the score three points shy of 100, Paul Lyles connected for a

long jump shot and was fouled in the process. The free throw was made, and the 100 points reached. The final score ended 101-37, Prairiland. The next game will be at North Lamar, February 4, games starting at 5:00 p.m.

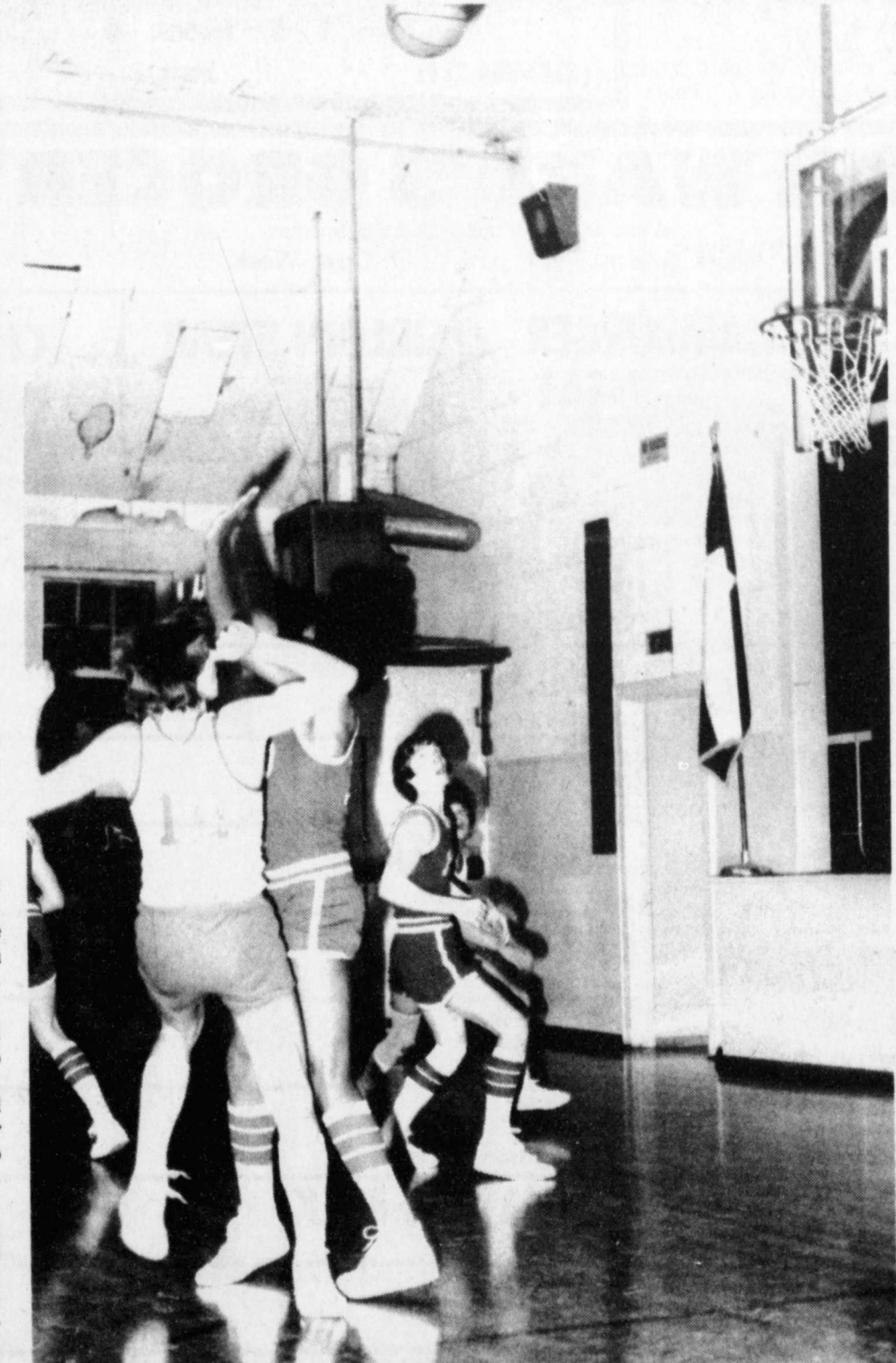

Emergency Loans Available From FHA

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration, Joe D. Wishard, FHA county supervisor, said today. Wishard asked that those who need farm credit as a result of physical and production losses make their needs known at the FHA office at 1745 Ballard Drive, Paris. Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until October 20, 1983 for physical and production losses. FHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings, lost

through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs, Wishard said. Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of eight percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay. Applicants who certify that other credit is available may also receive these loans at a higher interest rate. To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered

losses from the disaster that occurred as a result of the tornado on April 2, 1982, or excessive rain May 12 through October 22, 1982. Blossom First Baptist Tour Seminary Rev. Angel Food Cake is really very simple to make. But, do keep a few pointers in mind. The eggs will separate easier when cold, but the whites will beat to a higher volume when they are at room temperature. So, separate them when you first remove the eggs from the refrigerator. Let the whites warm while you assemble the other ingredients.

Bake the cake in a 10x4" ungreased tube pan that is sometimes referred to as an Angel Food Cake pan.

Elegant Angel Food Cake  
1 cup sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar  
1 1/2 cups egg whites (11 or 12)  
1 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. almond flavoring  
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Measure and sift together three times the cake flour and sifted confectioners' sugar, set aside.

1 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup soft shortening (half butter or margarine)  
1 tsp. vanilla  
5 egg yolks (3/4 cup), un-beaten  
1/2 cup milk  
another 1/4 cup milk  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. 325 degrees for ceramic or glass pan.  
Grease and flour or line with paper a 9x5x3 loaf pan. Sift together into large mixing bowl the sugar, baking powder and salt. Add the shortening, vanilla, egg yolks and 1/2 cup milk if cake flour is used. If all-purpose flour is used, add all 3/4 cup milk at once. Beat two minutes. Add the other 1/4 cup milk. Beat two more minutes. Spoon batter into prepared pan. Bake 60 to 70 minutes.  
Brown Sugar Pound Cake (Tube pan, 10x4)  
1 cup shortening  
1 stick margarine  
1 box light brown sugar, sifted  
5 eggs  
3 cups all-purpose flour  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1 cup evaporated milk  
2 tsp. maple flavoring  
Cream shortening, margarine and sifted brown sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift dry ingredients and add them alternately with milk. Add flavoring. Pour mixture into greased and floured tube pan; bake at 300 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

Measure the egg whites, cream of tartar and salt and place into large mixing bowl. Beat until the whites are foamy. Gradually add 2 Tbsp. at a time, the granulated sugar. Continue beating until the meringue holds stiff peaks. Fold in the flavorings. Sift the flour-sugar mixture over the meringue and fold in gently just until the flour-sugar mixture disappears. Place the batter into ungreased tube pan, pushing gently to fill pan without large holes. Cut through batter with a knife in a wide circle to break air bubbles.  
Bake in 375 degree oven until no imprint remains when finger lightly touches top of cake, 30 to 35 minutes. The cake will be a nice golden brown with lighter streaks showing.  
Golden Pound Cake  
2 1/4 cups sifted cake flour  
or 1 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 cup sugar  
2 tsp. baking powder

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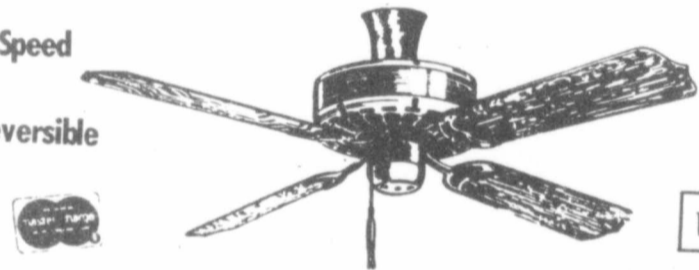

## Texas-New Mexico Filing For Rate Increase

Texas-New Mexico Power Company announced today they were filing with the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the cities it serves for a 4.24 percent rate increase for all customers.

Galen Legate, District Manager for Texas-New Mexico Power Company,

said a typical residential customer uses almost 1000 kwh each month. If a customer uses this amount, their increase in the price of electricity would be \$4.54 per month. This is a 5.60 percent increase in the summer and a 5.86 percent increase in the winter.

Galen Legate cautioned that consumption varies and that the amount you use may not be the same as the amount used by a typical customer.

The overall increase for residential customers is 5.74 percent; for General Service customers the overall in-

crease will be 4.64 percent. Maxie Davie, Vice President-Corporate Affairs, stated that the increase was necessary to cover increased operating expenses incurred in 1982.

The Public Utility Commission normally takes about five months to make a

final determination on a rate request.

## Dr. John H. Moore Elected To Board

The Texas State Board of Education has elected Dr. John H. Moore, the Murchison Professor of Education and chairman of the department of education at Trinity University, to a second three year term as a member of the Commission on Standards for the Teaching Profession.

The nomination was made by the Commissioner of Education for the State of Texas. Moore, who was first elected to the Commission in the fall of 1980, serves as chairman of the Committee on Standards and Procedures for Institutional Approval. The Committee currently is writing new Standards for the 64 colleges and universities in Texas which feature teacher education programs.

Moore joined the faculty of Trinity University in 1968 after completing his master's and doctorate in education from Southern Methodist University and Baylor University, respectively. He also is a Trinity alumnus, receiving his undergraduate degree from Trinity.

Moore is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Moore of Deport, Texas.

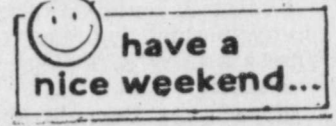

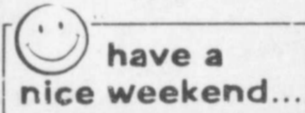
