
> Brooks states "I feel I've bought a good, clean bank, and I'm happy with the people in it.



40. With only one game remaining in district action, the Patriots are sure to keep three rebounds, one assist on the winning track, as they travel to Winnsboro to play the Red Raiders in the last game of the district season.

Griffin led the Pat scorers as all the Patriots received playing time. The Patriots, who never trailed in the game, had five players in double figures: Reily and Griffin with 14 each, and Joe Smith, Jeff Ballard and Phil Graves with 12 each.

The Patriots came out in a press, which shook up Mt. Vernon. To try and regroup, the Tigers called time with 3:51 left in the first stanza and the score 14-3 Pats. After the time out, the Patriots continued to dominate the Tigers on the defensive, as well as the offensive end of the court. The Patriots led at the end of the first quarter, 28-11. With 6:09 left in the first half the frustration of the game came to a head for the Tigers. A technical foul was called against the Tigers assistant coach.

Paul Lyles shot the two charity tosses, but missed both shots. However, within 30 seconds another technical was called, resulting in a Mt. Vernon player being thrown out of the game. This time Phil Graves connected for the two free throws. The Patriots kept building up the points and the first half ended 51-19, Patriots.

The second half opened with the Patriots switching to a man to man defense rather than their usual 2-3 zone. The man defense gave the Tigers plenty scoring opportunities and they took advantage of them. However, Patriot cool and patience paid off as the Patriots cruised to a 68-31 lead after the third quarter. The fourth quarter was more of the same, but the Pat defense held the Tigers to fewer points. The final score improved the Patriot district record to seven wins and two

The next game for the Patriots will be hosted by the Winnsboro Red Raiders at Winnsboro, as the Patriots go after their eighth straight district win to close out district play.
