East Texas Eating

Moist, succulent meat beneath a crispy, golden brown skin has long made roast chicken a popular East Texas mealtime favorite. Proper roasting seals in most of the flavor-packed juices and preserves the valuable protein without adding appreciable calorie laden fat.
Wash and pat dry an approximately four pound broiler-fryer. Rub inside and out with butter. Salt and pepper the interior cavity. Place on a rack in a low, uncovered roasting pan and put into a pre-heated 450 degree oven. Reduce the heat at once to 350 degrees. Roast the chicken about 20 minutes per pound. After the first 20 minutes in the oven, baste frequently with pan juices, or as there is not much pan juice from a four pound chicken, use one cup chicken broth and 1/4 cup melted butter. Frequent basting is the secret to the crisp skin and the preserved juiciness.
The chicken is done when a leg moves easily and the skin is a beautiful dark golden brown. Remove from the oven and let cool slightly before slicing. A traditional and delicious next step might be to place the slices of roast chicken on top of a pan of cornbread dressing and bake until the dressing gains a slight, golden crustiness.
Just once, at least, try serving slices of the roast chicken with your favorite tossed green or fruit salad and vegetables. I, for some reason, lean towards English peas cooked with just a hint of mint and Cooper Penny Carrots or pan browned potato slices which have first been cooked in the microwave or with a small amount of water in a saucepan until almost tender and patted dry.
If there is any of the roast chicken left over, it makes great sliced chicken sandwiches, chicken salad or is an ideal addition to a low calorie chef's salad.
Here are some chicken stretching recipes.
Chicken Salad
2 cups diced chicken
1 cup diced celery
1 cup mayonnaise
2 Tbsp. of the crisp chicken skin (optional, but gives good flavor)
1 chopped, hard-cooked egg (optional)
2 Tbsp. chopped chives (optional)
Combine the ingredients and toss gently to mix and coat with the mayonnaise. Serve on cold, crisp salad greens--leafy lettuce. Garnish, if you desire, with fresh fruit. White grapes, orange sections, strawberries, and pineapple are delicious with chicken salad.
Chef's Salad
This is one of those recipes that does not have to be explicit, as to the ingredients and their amounts. Combine in desired amounts: Torn, crisp green lettuce, radish slices, little diced chunks of cheese, diced cooked chicken, slivers of avocado, tomato wedges. Dress lightly with salad dressing, if you desire. Makes a delicious, light lunch or supper.
Copper Penny Carrots
2 lbs. carrots, peeled and thinly sliced
1 green pepper, cut in rings
1 med. onion, cut in rings
1 (10 oz.) can tomato soup, undiluted
1/2 cup salad oil
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup cider vinegar
1 tsp. mustard
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Boil carrots in salted water until tender. Do not overcook. Drain and cool. Layer carrots, pepper and onion in a bowl which can be covered tightly. Combine remaining ingredients and pour over vegetables. Refrigerate, covered. Serve with slotted spoon.

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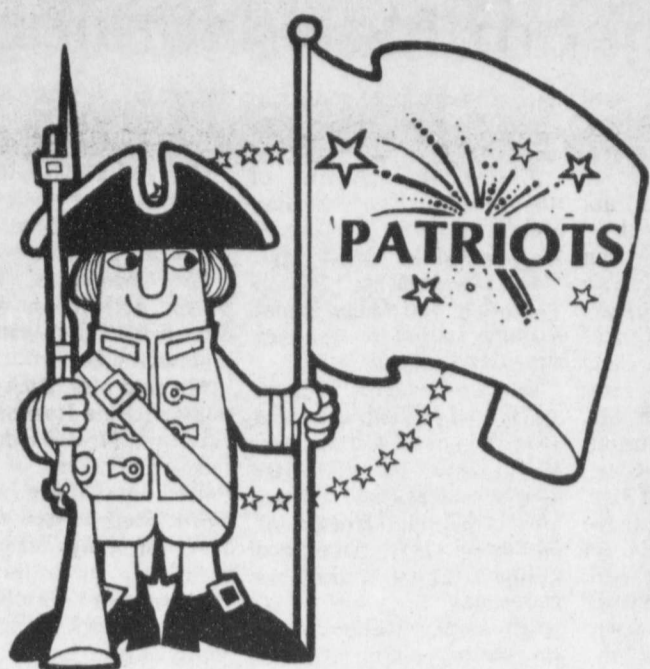

4H IN FOCUS

Spring Livestock Show
 As all of you know, spring brings with it a heavy concentration of Junior Livestock Shows. From now through May, it is possible to find a show somewhere every Saturday and many weekdays. Following is a list of some of the closer shows and if you are interested in any others, feel free to contact the County Extension Office.

Honey Grove Saturday, March 12
 This show will have classes for dairy cattle, breeding beef cattle and steers. The show will be held at Fannin Peanut Company, one block south of the square in Honey Grove. Cattle must be in place by 9 a.m. with judging beginning at 10 a.m. The entry fee is \$3.00 per head. All entries are due in the County Extension Office no later than 5 p.m. on Monday, February 28.

Roxton Saturday, March 19
 This show will have classes for breeding beef cattle, market steers and market lambs. The show will be held next to the school in Roxton. Animals should

arrive by 8 a.m. and judging will start at 9 a.m. Entry fee is \$3.00 per head and entries are due in the County Extension Office no later than 5 p.m. on March 10.

Clarksville Saturday, April 9
 The Red River County Junior Livestock Show at Clarksville is open to Lamar County 4-H'ers showing breeding beef cattle and dairy cattle only. The show will be held on the fairgrounds. All animals must be checked in by 9 a.m. and the show will start at 10 a.m. Entry fees are \$3.00 per animal and are due in the County Extension Office no later than 5 p.m. on March 28.

Thurs. & Fri. April 21-22
Lamar Co. Junior Show
 This will be the big show of the year for most of you. All details are not complete at this time but the show will include a division for almost any type of livestock, poultry and rabbits. You will receive more information on this show in the near future.

Cooper Saturday, May 7
 The Cooper show will have a breeding beef cattle

division and dairy division only. This is an excellent one day show, and all of you should make every effort to attend. There are no entry fees for this show. The Delta County Chamber of Commerce sponsors all of the trophies. Entries should be in place by 9 a.m. in the show barn at the City Park. Entries should be in the County Extension Office by 5 p.m. on April 7.

Remember that all 4-H entries to any Junior Livestock Show must be made through the County Extension Office. To complete your entry, we will need your name, the breed, sex, and date of birth of your animal and your entry fee. We are looking forward to a lot of participation from Lamar County 4-H'ers in these local livestock shows.

Annual Art Fair Announces Categories

Competition at the Paris Art Fair '83 is divided into four divisions: professional, senior, Paris Junior College and youth grades 6 through 12. Cash awards are given in the professional and senior divisions. And artists may enter both divisions although professional work is juried and slides and fees must be submitted by March 25. The YWCA sponsored event is scheduled for Saturday, May 7 on the PJC campus.

Senior division competition is open to any artist, including students, whose work is totally original in conception and execution. Work must not have been entered in previous Paris-YWCA Art Fair Competition. Entries for competition will be accepted from 8 to 10 a.m. Art Fair day, May 7 at a tent on the PJC campus. The entry fee for each piece entered in the senior division is \$3 and must be paid at the time of registration. Judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. Winners will be presented their awards at 4 p.m. at the entertainment area. Photographs will be taken of the winners with the Art Fair chairman, Susan Vaughan.

There are eight sections of entry. Section I is oil, acrylic, collage or any other media painted on canvas, masonite or similar support. Section II is watercolor or pastel worked with water.

Section III is prints and drawings, Section IV is sculpture and Section V is pottery, hand built or hand thrown.

Section VI is special original design under which there are two classes. Class A is soft media such as needlepoint, macrame, quilting, stitchery and batik. Class B is hard media such as jewelry, woodcarving, stained glass and metal work.

Section VII is color photography and Section VIII is black and white photography. Entries must be a minimum of 8x10 and must have a card attached stating the type of camera, film and by whom it was developed and printed. This card is in addition to the item identification card which must be on all senior division entries.

All paintings must be wired and ready for hanging. Drawings, prints, watercolors and photographs need not be framed but must be mounted on a heavy support and wired for hanging. An item identification card showing title, medium, artist's name and address and price must be placed on each piece entered. The card should be attached to the right front of each entry with the lower half of the card folded under so that only the title and medium shows.

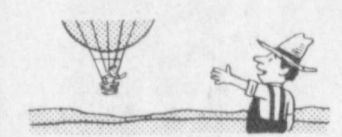

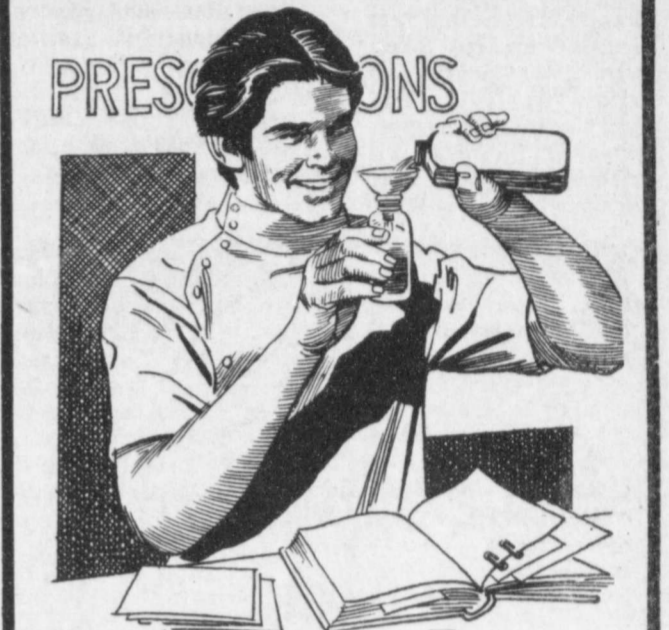

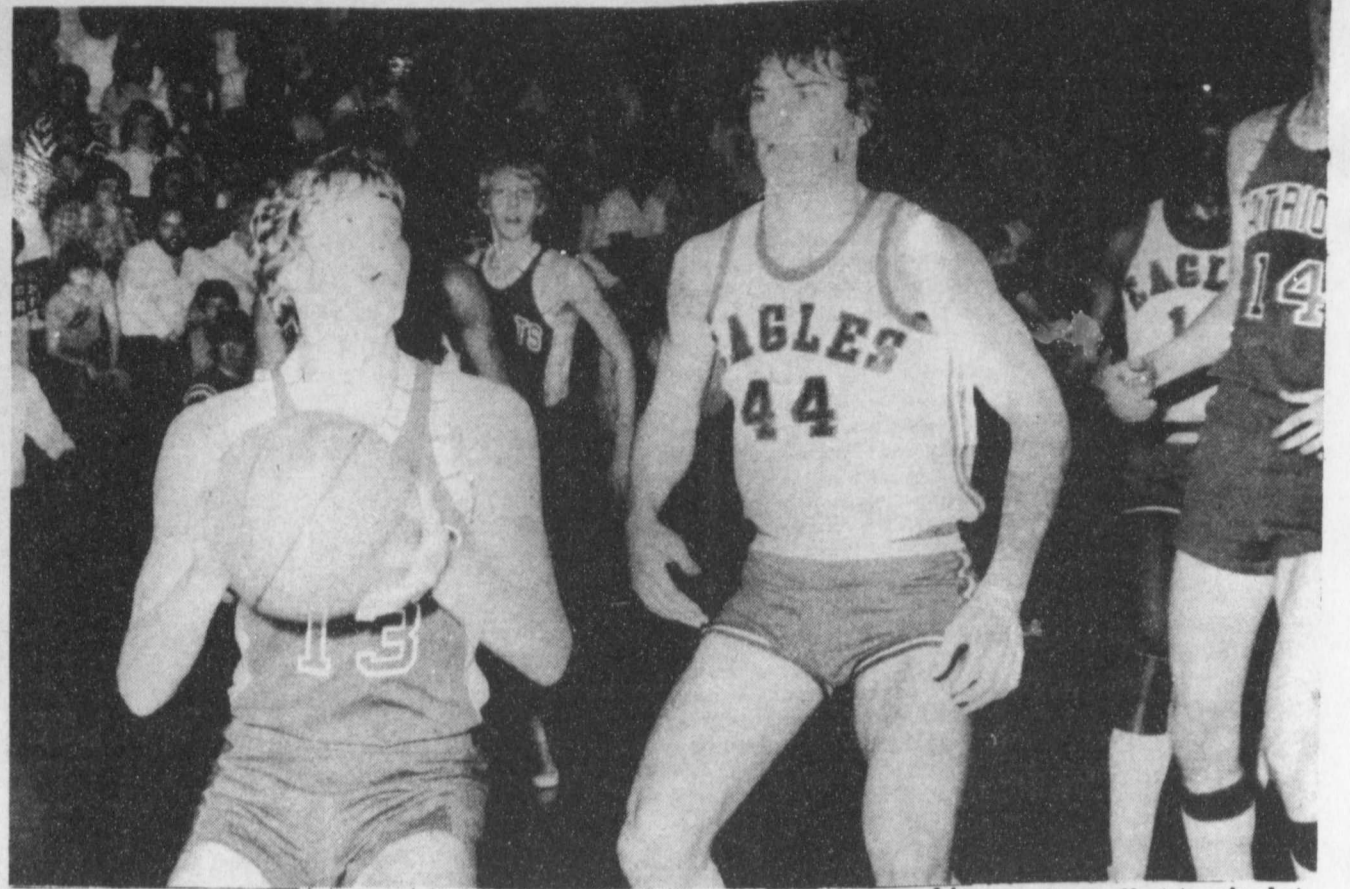

Congressman Hall Receives Committee Assignment

In addition to the new slot, Congressman Hall serves on the Judiciary Committee and the Veterans Affairs Committee. He is Chairman of the Judiciary Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations.

Committee membership includes representatives of other standing committees with jurisdiction over federal narcotics laws. Congressman Hall will represent the Veterans Affairs Committee, which has jurisdiction over drug rehabilitation and other areas of drug programs

affecting the nation's veterans.

The Select Committee has wide-ranging authority to monitor activities of the Federal government in curbing illegal drugs, assist Congressional committees in their narcotics-related jurisdiction, and work with the international community in stopping the flow of dangerous drugs into the United States.

Congressman Hall said that he "welcomes the challenge presented by the new Committee assignment."

"There can be no greater priority than that of stopping the importation of illegal drugs to our shores and clamping down on the filthy vermin who make their living pushing those drugs, especially to our young people."

"Dramatic proof of the connection between crime and heroin addiction was pointed out recently in a study of 240 heroin users in Baltimore in which each of them committed an average of 180 robberies a year to feed their habit."

"I look forward to an opportunity to do something positive about curbing the importation, sale and use of dangerous drugs, as a member of the Select Committee," Congressman Hall said.

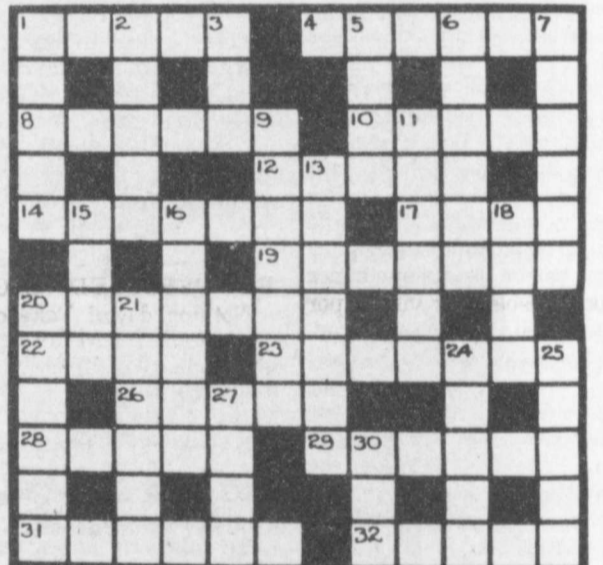

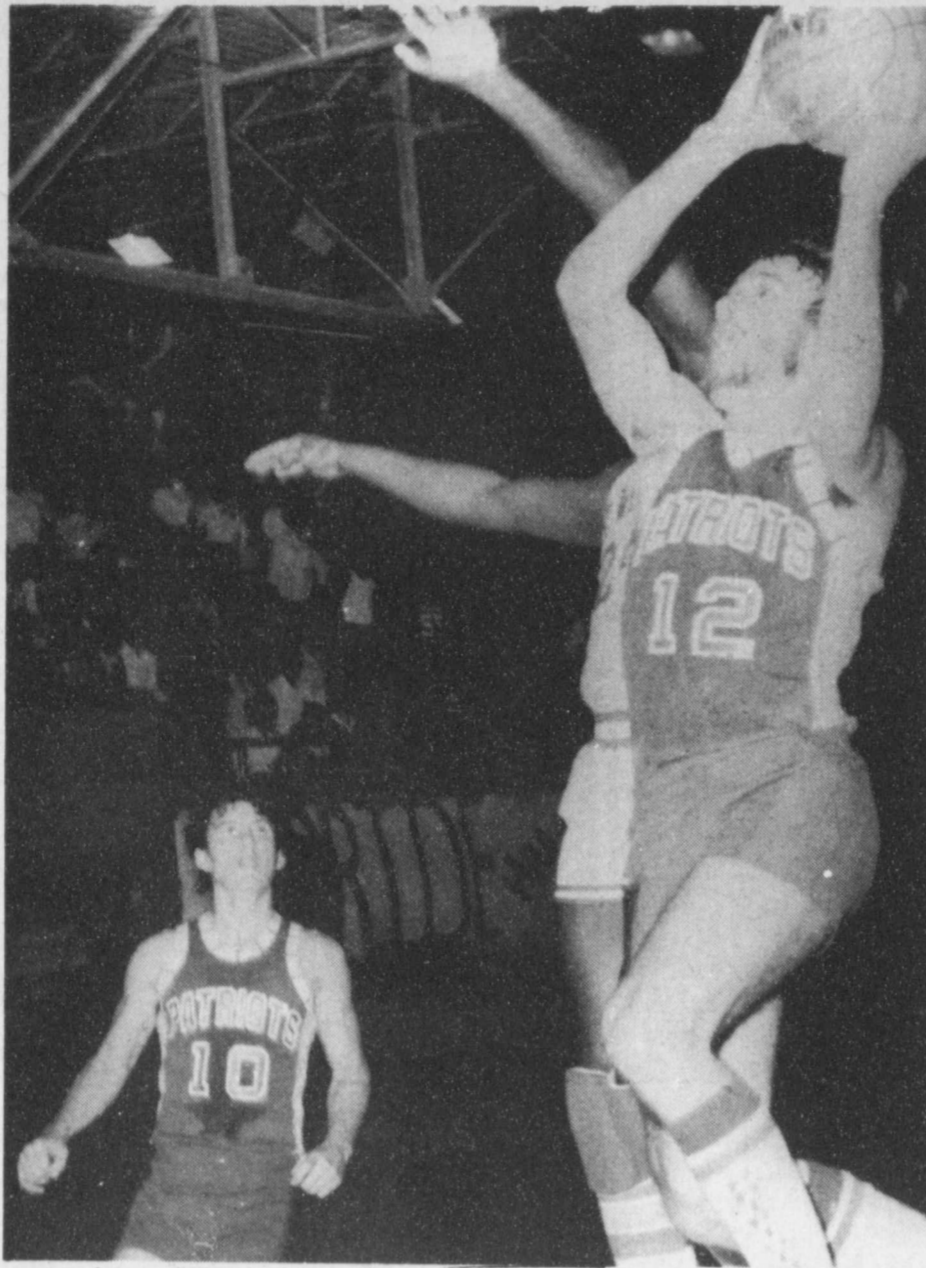

Weekly Agricultural Briefs

Wheat Situation
Leaf Rust has overwintered in our area and is present on at least six of the varieties in the county wheat variety demonstration plot. Although rust is present, this does not mean that we will or will not experience as much problem as occurred in 1982. It does mean that each wheat grower must inspect his wheat acreage to determine disease situation.
If it should become necessary to prevent leaf rust through fungicide application, it will be a costly practice. Therefore, it is extremely important for one to know the yield potential of a field as research work in 1982 indicates that there should be a 40 bushel yield potential before chemical application is justified.
A new product, Bayleton, has recently received registration and should be considered for use to prevent powdery mildew and leaf rust problems. Based on research conducted in 1982 in North Central Texas, two timely applications of Bayleton worked beautifully in preventing these disease problems. The key word in the previous statement is "timely". The material is a systemic and is absorbed by the plant cells and will last for upwards of six weeks when applied at heavier rates.
If a producer has a serious powdery mildew problem, two ounces of Bayleton will take care of the disease for upwards to six weeks. This can be mixed with liquid fertilizer and or insecticide. The cost of the chemical would be from \$6.50 to \$7.00 per acre. Then it will take another application probably three weeks later to protect the flag leaf from leaf rust. The second application should be four ounces. One should strive for five gallons of water per acre for best control.
