An artist and his wife came to visit us over the weekend, and wanted to roam around the countryside looking for interesting houses to paint.

We loaded them up and set off, with a hearty promise March 11. that they would be well supplied with almost any variety of barn, house or farm ever found in the area.

In doing so, it brought home that much of what we take for granted as abandoned buildings rotting away and Hooks next with 88. is actually a wealth of going documented.

By dark, the poor couple were almost overwhelmed by the variety, age and number of structures they had seen.

We had shown them examples of plantation style buildings, with stores, big houses, small share cropper houses, barns and silos.

They had found a "steamboat" house in the best victorian tradition, and a log barn.

Classic east Texas farmhouses with dog walks, verandas, gingerbread work or long porches were almost too numerous to photograph.

The perfectly square, totally utilitarian farm house with the non-gabled roof, examples of which are to be found buried under vines and trees all over the area, were recorded.

"L" shapes, box shapes, "T" shapes, we located them all, ranging throughout the afternoon to the Bogata, Detroit area, to Deport, Cunningham, up toward Blossom and all over.

The film was long gone, the light fast fading, and yet more and more farm complexes, small town houses and cemeteries kept coming to mind....each unique and classic in it's

own special way

Sadly, a number of the buildings were in the process of falling down or being town

down. Happily, a number are also carefully kept, painted,

repaired and cherished. Nothing expressed the history of an area better than not just the unusual or large structures of the wealthy, but the small, every-day homes that sheltered families that lived on the

land. They are out there, ready for a pleasant evenings drive, gracefully fading away...a true picture of what our land looked like back in the days of our grandparents, greatgrandparents...and on back.

Weekly Agricultural Briefs

With spring just around surprise since these trees the corner and small grain will need timely applications winter pasture growing rapidly, many producers are beginning to think about utilizing the small grain forage for hay.

been topdressed with nitrogen, Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agromonist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says to fertilize as soon as possible. About 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre is a rule-of-thumb generally used. Any excess nitrogen not used by the small grain will be utilized by the permanent pasture. Fertilization will give extra growth and better quality to the small grain hay.

Reeves says to cut small grain in the dough stage for best quality hay. This may come sooner than expected so producers should keep a check on the pastures for maturity. Once the seed start getting hard, the hay quality drops rapidly.

If two species of small grain have been planted together, Reeves says to cut when the first species is in the dough stage. After cutting, some regrowth should occur and grazing can

be started again. The fertility level and the stage of growth when the forage is cut are the major factors in hay quality. Reeves says that proper management can mean the difference between just a filler for the cattle next
