year, as the Prairiland Patriots dealt their third straight win against the Panthers by the score of 12 to 3.

It started well for the Panthers in the first. They struck quickly by scoring three runs in the top of the first inning to give the Pats

a hill to climb from the beginning.

Today, however, no hill was too high to climb for the Pats.

After tying the game at three after four innings of play, the Pats came back in the fifth and scored four more runs, two on a 2-run

homer by first baseman Todd Davis.

The Pats district record moves to 9-4 in the standings. Tied for first place with the Clarksville Blue Tigers. Prairiland vs. Pittsburg

Tuesday, the Pats went to Pittsburg to keep up their winning ways in hopes of a play off berth. Things did not go quite the way they wanted it as the Pirates beat the Pats 13-3.

It was a big day for Pirates bats as the long ball played a key role. Two home runs for Jerald Walker sparked the Pirates on a wet, cold, miserable afternoon.

In the fifth inning, the Pats got into the long ball hitting. Phil Graves pounded a solo homer over the left field fence. Unfortunately that would be the last of the Pats scoring.

The Patriot record now goes to 0-5 going into Thursday's game with Mt. Vernon, which is the last game of the regular season.

Permit Required To Fish In Local Lake

The Deport City Council voted and approved the selling of permits to fish in the flood control lake, Jeffus Reservoir, located north of town.

A permit will cost \$5, and can be obtained at the Deport City Office.

The council also approved a city ordinance stating the rules and regulations for

fishing in the lake. They are as follows:

A year's permit for a family of four will cost \$5. A family of more than four will pay \$10. No nets will be used. Small boats with paddles or trolling motors only will be allowed on the lake. No firearms will be permitted.

No swimming. Anyone 18 or older must have a permit.

Trot lines must be marked and not left over 5 days at a time in the lake. Twenty-five hooks per trot line and not over 1 (one) line per person. Catfish and bass no less than 10 inches in length can be removed from the lake. The bag limit is 10 catfish and 10 bass per day.

A valid fishing license must be held in accordance to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The lake must be entered on the west side, on City property or could be prosecution for trespassing violations.

No littering, drinking of alcoholic beverages or narcotics will be permitted.

Fines of from \$10 to \$200 will be enforced by the City of Deport and State laws will be enforced by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The council made these decisions Monday night, and the rules are in immediate effect.

In other business, the city decided to fix the street leading to the newly constructed Deport Housing Authority.

A representative from

Lone Star Gas Company

presented their request for a rate increase. The last rate increase was in December of 1980, and was almost 14 percent. The increase was approved by the council, and will be a 8.05 percent increase.

Bill Brooks, of the Red River Authority of Texas discussed the purpose of the

authority. The authority is a new one, and can assist small cities when they need help in specific areas such as water pollution.

Dr. T.H. Glover was appointed as the Health Inspector for the city.

The minutes were heard and the financial report approved during the regular meeting.

The workshop will cost \$15 and will begin at 9 a.m. and continue until 3 or 4 p.m. that afternoon. A sack lunch

may be brought.

Supplies for whatever type of work the individual prefers may be brought, and Lindsey says he will be able to fill in any supply gaps that might arise.

Several artists have expressed their intentions of making this workshop.

PJC To Hold Beginning Photography Course

A beginning photography class will be offered through Paris Junior College's continuing education division this summer, said June Jones, director of continuing education.

Jim Brookshire, media specialist at PJC, will teach the class beginning Thursday, June 2. The 24 hour course is scheduled on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 6 to 9 p.m. for eight classes, ending Tuesday, June 28.

Included in the course will be instruction on camera operation, taking properly exposed and balanced photographs, camera maintenance and darkroom skills. The class will be held in the photography classroom in the PJC Art Building. Students will learn to develop black and white film and make prints of their photographs.

Each student must supply a camera, film and paper for printing pictures, the instructor said. Brookshire, who holds a master's degree in audio-visual education from ETSU, has been a photographer for more than 10 years.

Tuition for the course is \$35, which should be paid in advance by mailing a check payable to PJC or paying the fee in the continuing education office, Alford Center.

Pilot Ground School Set At PJC

A private pilot ground school will begin Tuesday, May 17 at Paris Junior College, according to June Jones, director of community services at PJC. Objective of the course is to prepare student pilots for the FFA written examination for the private pilot's certificate.

The class is scheduled from 6:30 to 9:30 p.m. on Tuesdays for 12 weeks. The fee will be \$75. A student kit with a navigation computer must be purchased in advance from the Paris Flight Center.

Classes will be held in the Alford Center at PJC and taught by flight instructors from the Paris Flight Center.

Reservations for the course should be made by mailing a check payable to the college to the PJC continuing education office or going by the Alford Center on campus. More information may be obtained by calling the college, 785-7661, extension 445 or the Paris Flight Center, 785-1700.

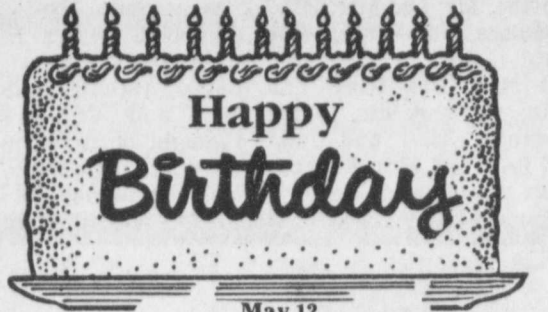

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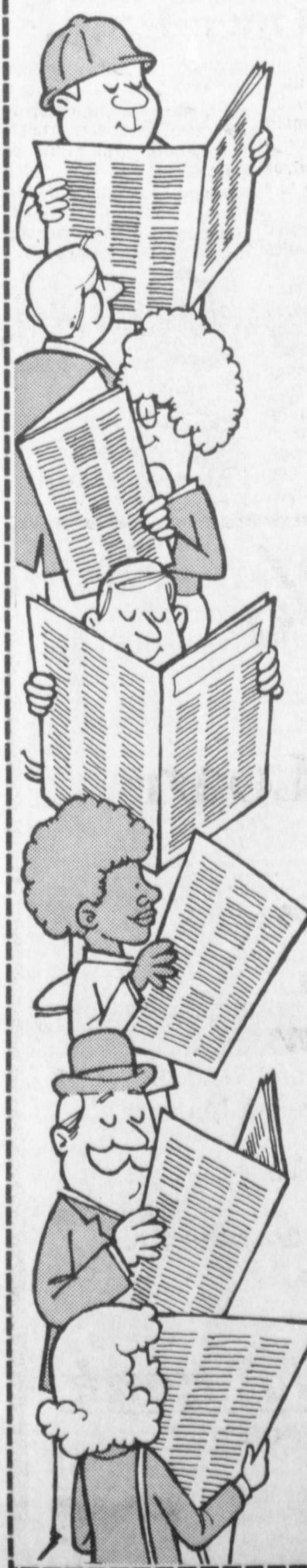

Tips For The Amateur Photographer

By Nanalee Nichols Photography as a hobby can be one of the most rewarding...and inexpensive hobbies imaginable. Investment in equipment can be as expensive, or as inexpensive as the individual desires. And it is simple to learn basics and proceed on to more complex forms of the art. Few other hobbies can provide a creative sense of fulfillment, and record family history and events too. Although 35mm cameras offer a wide range of effects, angles and challenges, they aren't by any means mandatory to enjoying photography. In this column, we will endeavor to help amateurs eliminate some of the most common mistakes in photography, and later will proceed into more complex situations. We will also attempt to cover some basic camera and film care. Simple 110 or polaroid cameras can be used for a wide variety of photos. One of the first rules of photography is taking into account exactly what you are shooting.
