back and added two more runs on a two run homer.

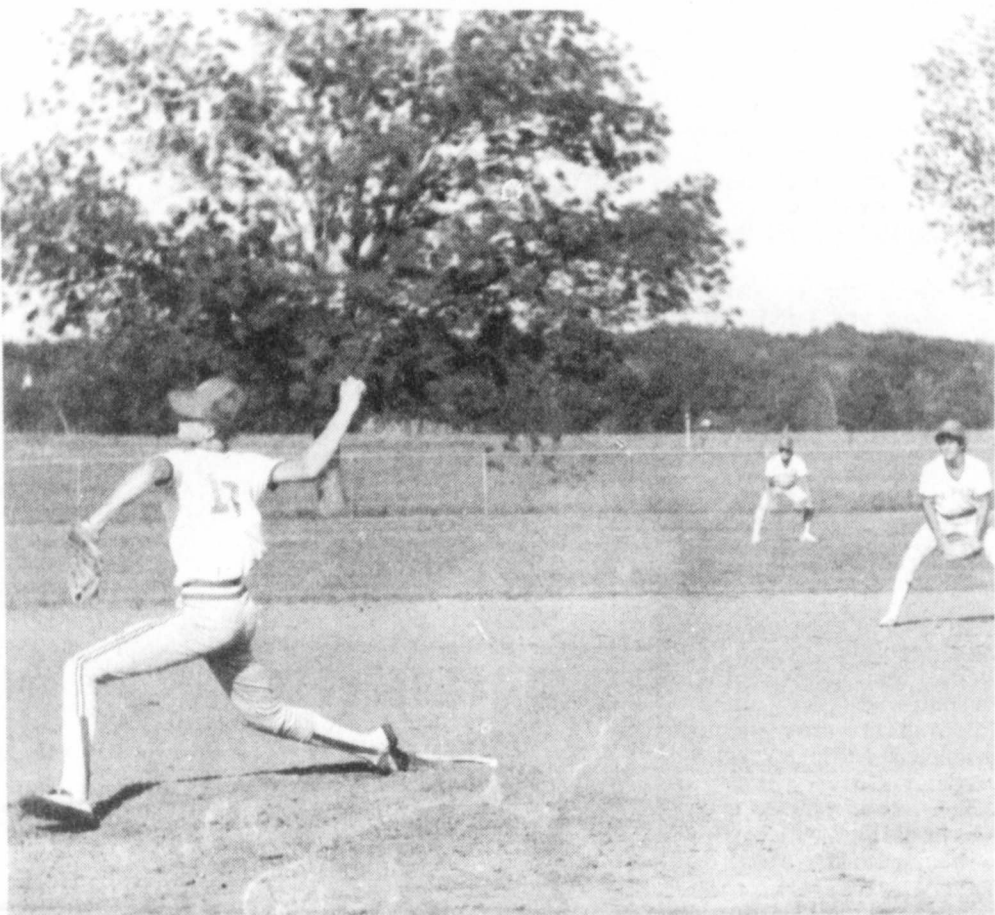

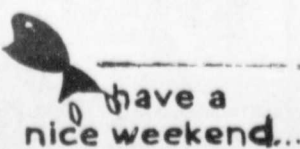

Texas Veterans Bill Would Provide Housing Assistance

Texas veterans will have the opportunity to purchase a home through the Veterans Housing Assistance Program if it is approved by voters as a constitutional amendment in November, Garry Mauro announced. The legislature completed action Tuesday on a measure which will provide a loan of up to \$20,000 for eligible Texas veterans to purchase a house. The proposed amendment will allow for the sale of \$500 million in bonds for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program and \$300 million for continuation of the Veterans Land Program. The election is set for November 8, 1983. Mauro said private businesses and the entire state economy will benefit from the establishment of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program. "Existing lending institutions will administer the housing program so we will not have to create another state agency or bureaucracy. We will also stimulate construction of 25,000 new homes and provide another 45,000 jobs for people in Texas. This program is the best example of the cooperation between government and private enterprise which can work to benefit all people," Mauro stated. Texas currently has more than 1.6 million veterans including 525,000 Vietnam era veterans. "The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program has the support of our state leaders, veterans organizations, lending institutions and thousands of other Texans. I am hopeful Texas will agree with me in November in voting for this program and the continuation of the Veterans Land Program," Mauro said.

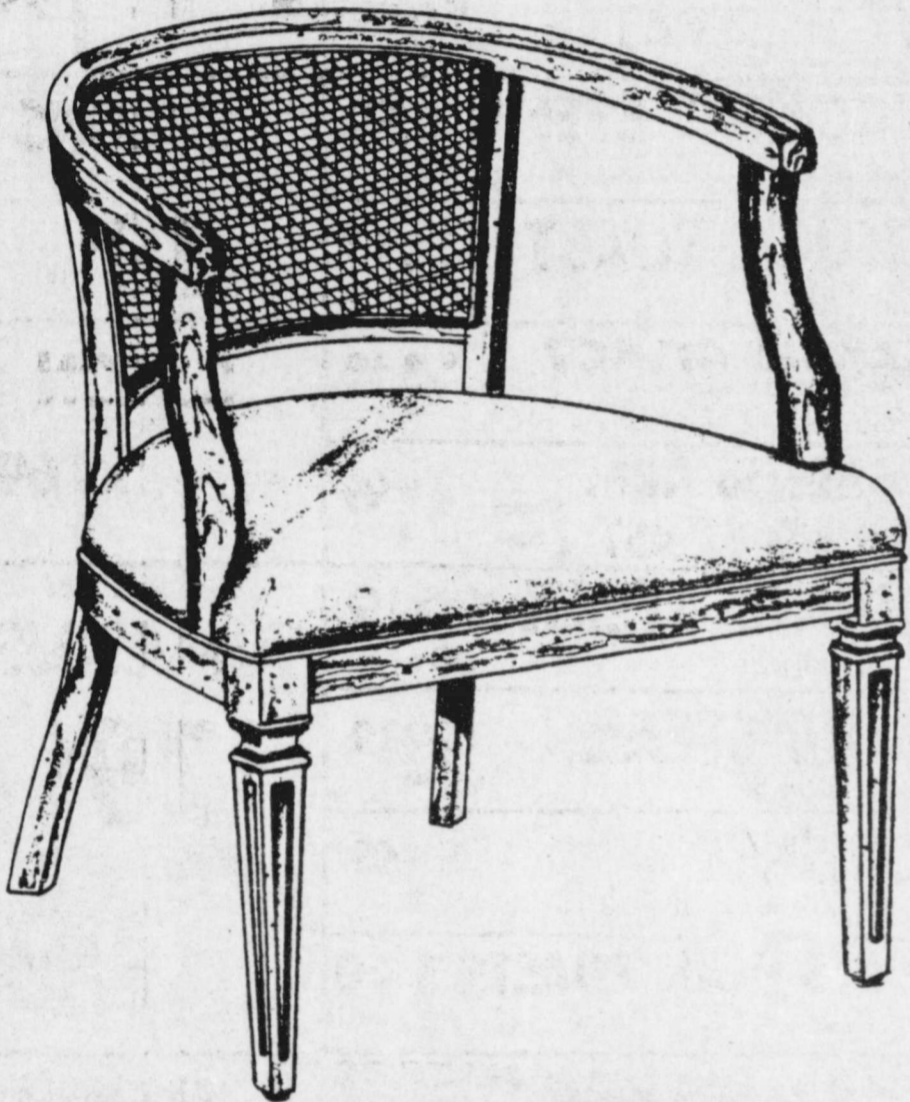

PJC Financial Aid Applications Being Taken

Students needing financial aid for the 1983-84 school year at PJC should make application as soon as possible, said Dr. Jerry deBin, director of financial aid for PJC.
Dr. deBin stresses that all prospective students should make application for the assistance, whether or not they feel they are eligible.
To apply for any type of financial aid, students or prospective students should go to the financial aid office in room 130 of the Rheudasil Learning Center. No appointment is necessary; it will only take a few minutes to obtain a form and receive instructions on completing it, deBin pointed out.
After making application, a period of six to eight weeks is required for processing, and students will be notified by mail of their eligibility. In addition to the grants, financial aid may be obtained in the form of loans or work study employment at PJC. The basic federal grant, which is based on need shown in the application, does not have to be repaid as long as certain rules are complied with, but the federal loans must be repaid by the students.
The director points out that one cannot determine eligibility for financial assistance based upon whether or not someone else is eligible. He also explained that PJC has an off campus placement system to help PJC students find jobs in the area. This is available only to PJC students, regardless of whether they qualify for financial aid, he said. These jobs range from one day to permanent employment. Area employers are encouraged to call the college when they need employees.

Wheat Field Day Set For May 30th

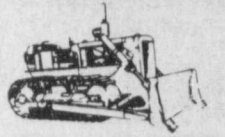

4 pounds country-style pork ribs
salt
1 can (20-oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in syrup
1/2 cup diced onion
1/2 cup chili sauce
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon dry mustard
Wipe pork with damp paper towel. Cut slits about halfway through meat between bones. Place ribs on roasting rack with a drip pan. Sprinkle with salt. Cover ribs with foil. Bake in 325° oven 2 hours until tender. Meanwhile, combine remaining ingredients in a medium saucepan. Simmer 30 minutes. Spoon sauce evenly over all of ribs. Bake uncovered 30 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

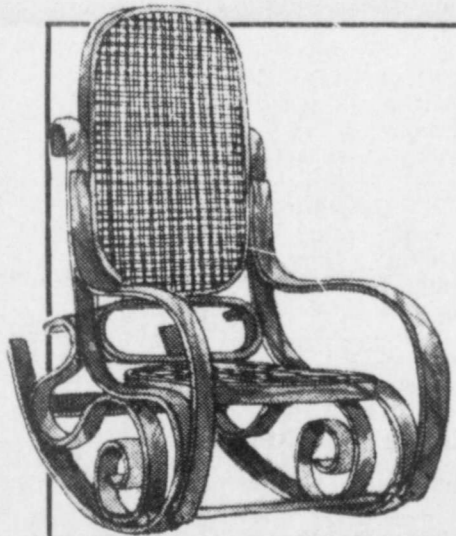

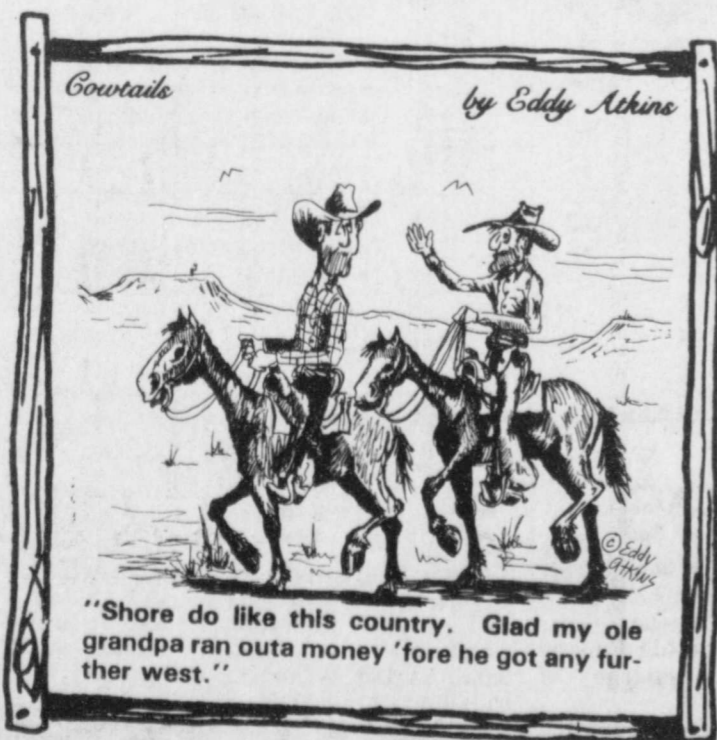
