Area Cattlemen Await Issue Decision

Brucellosis-every cattlemen knows about it, every cattlemen has his opinion on it. And they all have opinions on the threatened federal quarantine on out-of-state shipments of Texas cattle because of it.

For that matter, so does the Texas Senate. The senate has killed a bill which would have prevented the quarantine. The action will probably bring on a showdown between the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which says it will quarantine Texas cattle beginning June 1 because of a lack of testing for the disease, and Independent Texas cattlemen who say they will take the matter to court.

Brucellosis, known as bangs disease also, causes cows to abort their calves. Usually the cow loses only one calf, thereafter calving normally. This causes

difficulty in detection of the disease. Texas is the only state without a complete brucellosis testing program, according to the USDA.

Vaccination of heifers is possible, and many experts think it is nearly the only way that the highly contagious disease can ever be controlled effectively.

Last year some 877,000 Texas cattle were vaccinated against the disease, but it still remains a problem.

Senator Bob Glasgow, Democrat from Stephenville, feels the quarantine will push many cattle raisers into bankruptcy, pointing out that the value of the state's cattle will fall sharply.

Senator John Traeger, Democrat from Seguin, differs sharply with Glasgow, saying that the brucellosis-control program is a wasteful use of tax

money. He continued to say that millions of dollars have been poured into the program, and no progress or success has been shown.

Traeger led the fight to kill the bill in the Texas Senate. He maintains that the quarantine will have little effect on the Texas Cattle industry, as only breeder cattle would be affected.

Steers and non-breeder cattle could still move out of the state without problems. Breeder cattle would be required to be from a herd tested twice to make sure they were not carrying the disease.

Former Governor Dolph Briscoe approved the senate's action, accusing the federal government of trying to intimidate the state of Texas by threatening quarantine.

Frates Seeligson, president of the Texas and

Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association however, says the action will put an unnecessary burden upon Texas cattle producers.

The bill which would have prevented the quarantine,

would have provided mandatory vaccination of Texas cattle, and was approved earlier by the House.

Most people in Austin think the bill is dead, however.

No restrictions on movement of cattle within the state would result under the quarantine.

Whichever way it goes, whether the federal government quarantines the

state or whether it doesn't, one fact remains clear. A long, bitter dispute within the courts will result.

And area cattlemen will wait, and watch, and worry.

The most severe loss was the death of five cows and a calf seeking shelter under a tree in the John Burchinal pasture when lightning struck the tree.

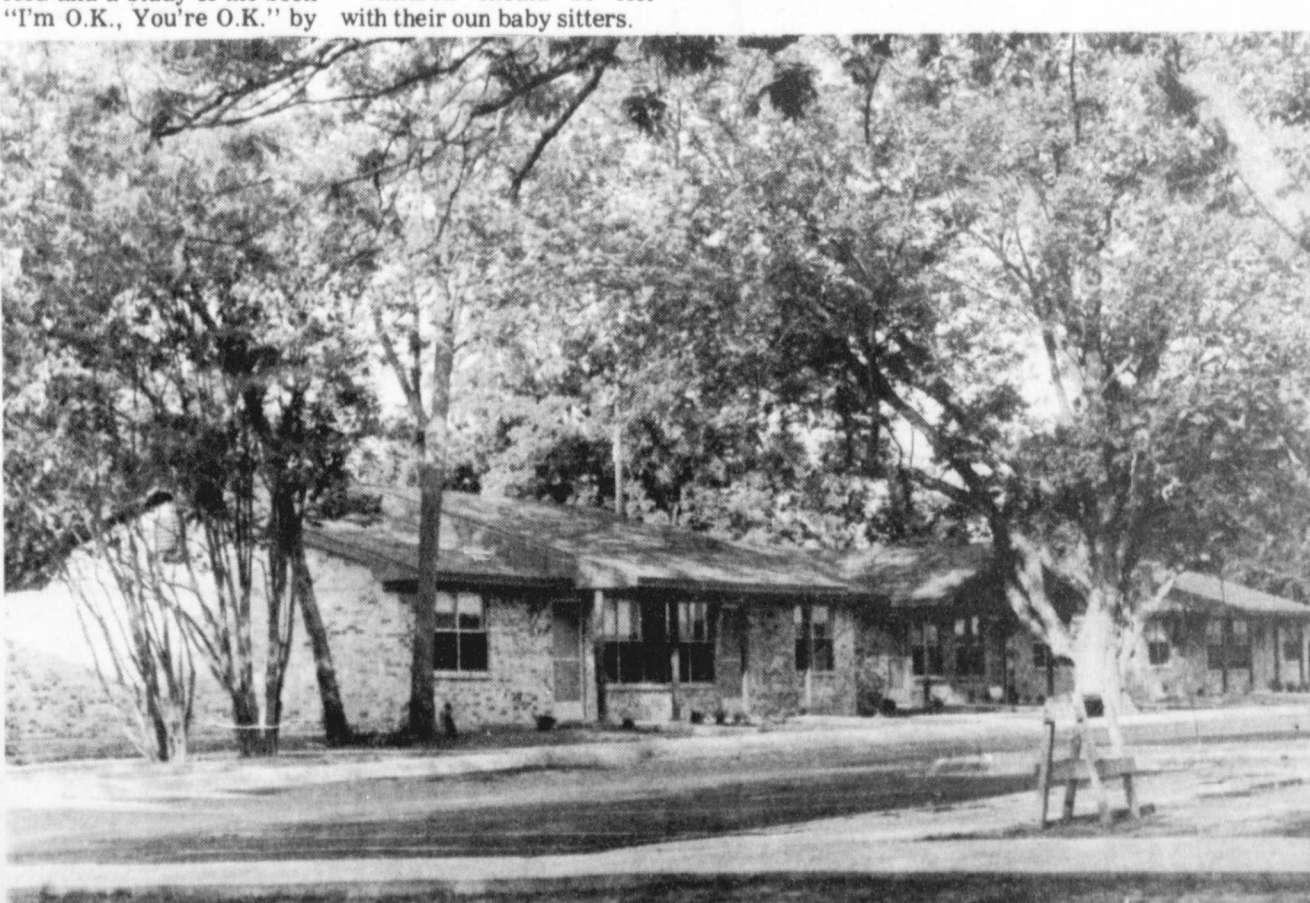
A storage shed at the Phil Bettis home was overturned by the strong winds. Also several reports of hail

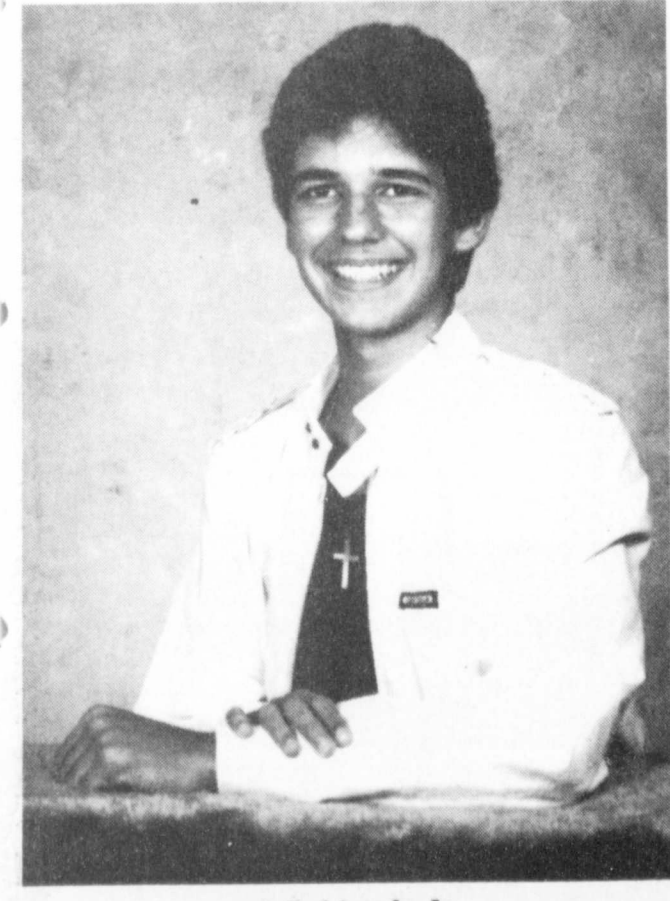


COMPLETE—The new addition of the Deport Housing Authority is finished and ready for

IS ONE EYE AS GOOD AS TWO? How about YOUR eyes? Can you see as well as you should in both eyes? Or is

say, "One eye is almost as good as two," you may have been ready to disagree with him. It just doesn't make sense that one eye could serve your vision needs as well as two. Yet in some ways one eye is ALMOST as good as two. One eye can do the work of two and continue to do so without "wearing out". But without two eyes that can see well, there will never be the binocular vision that is needed for true depth perception. People who only have one good eye can adapt to the loss by developing a substitute judgment of depth. This can help them function well visually except in situations where perfect depth perception is needed, such as in landing an airplane, playing the outfield in professional baseball, or performing surgery.

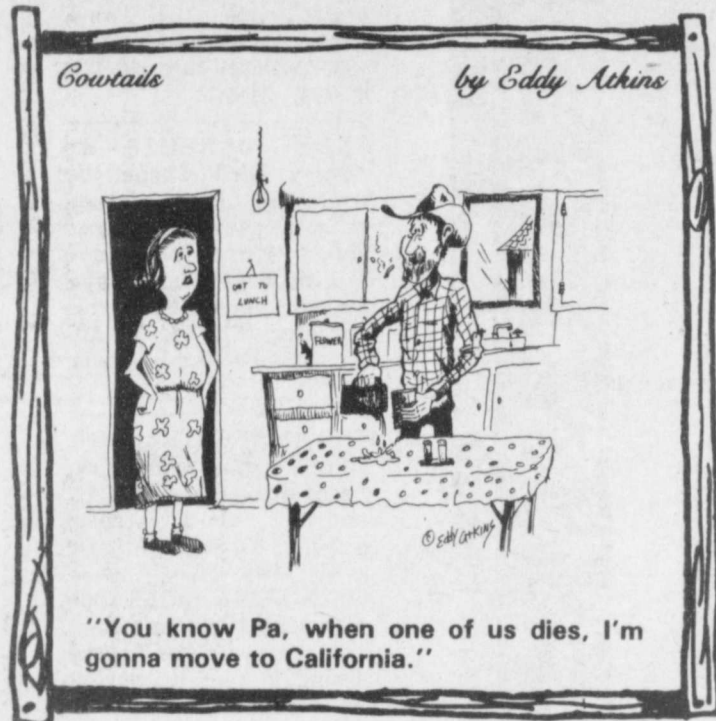
