

'Hard times have dogged the farmer constantly," said Hightower, "making it all the more commendable that some families have managed to keep the old home place in production for a century or more."

The Family Heritage Program was created by the Texas Department of Agriculture to honor families who own land which has been maintained in agricultural production for 100 years or more by the members of that family. Since 1974, when the program began, 1,558 properties in Texas have qualified for the Family Land Heritage Program. Twelve of that number are in Lamar

County. The honorees will receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry when they are honored at the Capitol in November. The Registry is a brief history of each farm or ranch and includes old photographs of the families and homes.

Those who feel they meet the basic qualifications and wish to apply may obtain an application from County Judge Brady Fisher, County Historical Commission Chairman Bob Burns, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to: Family Land Heritage Program, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711.
