Rodeo Activities Begin Today In Bogata

Activities begin today, (Thursday), for the Bogata Rodeo Association, as the curtain goes up on the first performance of the annual Bogata Rodeo.

First on the agenda of activities is the downtown parade, scheduled for 5:00 p.m. through the downtown area.

A special appearance by the Sunshine Girls from Canton, Texas will enhance the rodeo performances on Thursday and Friday nights. The group of talented horsewomen have made numerous appearances at rodeos in the area, plus have competed in the Pasadena Drill Team Finals in Pasadena, California, and rode away with top honors for group performances as well as individual national titles. The group is gifted with the participation of Shelley Bridwell, a nine year old youngster whose mount has captured World Champion Drill Team Honor Horse, along with top honors garnered by his rider. The vibrant horseback group does routines to such selections as "Cotton Eyed Joe", "Tumbling Tumbleweeds" and other

country-western favorites.

For the crowd's entertainment, a specialty act of trick riding and roping will be premiered at the Bogata rodeo by Brother and Vicki Taylor of Wimberly. 1983 will mark their initial year in Bogata for the Frontier Day Rodeo.

An excess of 250 cowboys and cowgirls have entered the rodeo competition in the six major championship events for the rodeo.

Among contestants entered are Kelly Allred Ray of Lavaca, Arkansas, who is currently seeking her fourth consecutive C.S.R.A. championship in cowgirl's barrel racing. Kelly is the 1982 Arkansas Barrel Racing Champion, and has made numerous appearances at the regional finals across the country.

Carolyn Rose of McAlester, Oklahoma, the 1979 C.S.R.A. barrel racing champion is also entered in competition. Carolyn leads the 1983 standings for the championship in the barrel racing event. She will be trying to retain her lead throughout the rodeo season to receive the championship saddle and buckle at the end

of the year.

Bogata's Gary Hiner is entered in the bull riding event for the 1983 rodeo. Hiner is the 1981 C.S.R.A. bull riding champion and has captured the Finals average championship three consecutive years. He currently leads for the 1983 bull riding championship again this year.

Though the crowd will be watching the contestants entered in the rodeo, they should also note the livestock, celebrated across the United States, which is owned by Bogata's own Jerald and Joan Smith.

Bucking bulls that have proven their prowess again and again in rodeo competition will be at their peak for the 1983 version of the Bogata Rodeo K-Bob, bull No. 4, who withstood an unclaimed bounty during the 1982 rodeo season in the Central States Rodeo Association, upheld his record of being unridden through last week of rodeo competition in Durant, Oklahoma where he unseated both contestants drawn to him at the rodeo. He has been phrased "dynamite in a small

package" by many, and has been classified as "unrideable" by the cowboys who have tried to stay aboard for the full eight seconds.

Mr. Pibb, bull No. 103, is another bull that has been unridden to date in 1983, along with No. 10, Pole Cat, whose size is awesome, also remain unconquered.

Bareback horses and saddle bronc horses as No. 20, Fiddler, and AL, First Chance, 1982 Bucking Horse of the Year, will make return engagements to the Bogata arena. No total figures have ever been documented as to the amount of money won on these two horses alone, but it would go upwards of \$30,000 each.

Doug Williams, announcer from Idabel, Oklahoma will make his 26th appearance before the spectators at Bogata in 1983. Williams was presented a plaque in appreciation for his service to the Bogata Rodeo Association during the final performance of the 1982 rodeo. He has been selected

to announce rodeo Finals in Oklahoma and Texas repeatedly and is heralded as the best in his field.

Casey Jeffery, Bogata native, a professional

bullfighter, is scheduled to perform at the rodeo this year. However, due to a previous injury suffered earlier in the arena this year, he may not be able to perform to capacity. Jeffery

has been a professional rodeo clown for three years and his injury this spring was the first major injury he has received.

Rodeo performances will begin at 8:30 each night.

Blackmon Action Affects Area

After several weeks of speculation and rumors concerning exactly what was happening concerning the closing of Blackmon Machinery Company on May 16, it seems that a number of facts have begun to emerge.

That the figures involved in multiple loans and mortgages related to the businesses of Eddie Blackmon, Jr. will reach into the multi-million dollar range seems certain, according to parties involved.

Blackmon's John Deere dealerships, both in DeKalb and Clarksville, were closed on May 16 apparently because of inventory investigations by John Deere Corporation and financial

inquiries by area banks. Blackmon filed for bankruptcy during the week of June 6 on the implement business, Blackmon Farms, Inc. and Western Sports, Inc.

After the business closed reports of missing machinery from the inventory, including several expensive combines, valued at \$70,000 to \$80,000 each, totaled around 19 pieces.

A number of area banks have discovered that equipment had as many as five liens upon a single piece of equipment, with the transactions filed in different counties.

Since there is only a serial number on farm equipment, no titles exist, and the sale will be registered only in county records, which made such multiple liens difficult to "catch".

It appears that there may even have been fictitious serial numbers presented as collateral basis for loans on implements from Blackmon Machinery.

A number of farmers and ranchers having purchased equipment from Blackmon Equipment have now found they have dubious legal claim to the expensive items, or no machinery, yet a loan payment to make.

An area banker stated that among some of the transactions that were irregular were: were

secured on a piece of equipment from more than one bank, each loan in a different county. Cooperation of a secondary purchaser would be necessary in such a transaction; fictitious serial numbers presented for a loan on equipment which did not exist, or exists in another state. An innocent customer would be given the serial number by a dealer in this situation, with the dealer leaving the impression that the equipment would be held with the dealer until a specified date.

A piece of farm equipment could be released for use of the farmer, but would not be removed from inventory records. Then, during maintenance on the vehicle, it would be cleaned, and left on the lot of the dealership to be counted by John Deere officials as a part of the inventory inspection.

A number of other methods of fraud apparently exist, although are not provable.

John Deere has filed suit against some of the "third party" farmers for the right of possession, according to sources.

The "mess" is tremendous, and will obviously take months, and probably years to straighten out.

Banks in both Texas and Arkansas are apparently involved in loans and

mortgages concerning Blackmon's personal and business transactions.

DeKalb, New Boston, Lone Star, Mt. Pleasant, Texarkana, Clarksville and Bogata were listed among them.

The First National Bank of Deport holds a 1983 wheat crop for cash flow collateral on Blackmon's personal loans, and has asked for confirmation of possession of a backhoe tractor. So far, the piece of equipment has not been confirmed as the one pledged as loan collateral.

The impact of the bankruptcy, double and triple mortgages and other problems, will apparently affect farmers, businessmen, banks and John Deere Corporation, leaving a number of farmers with financial difficulties, and a legal tangle that rivals even the best of movie plots!

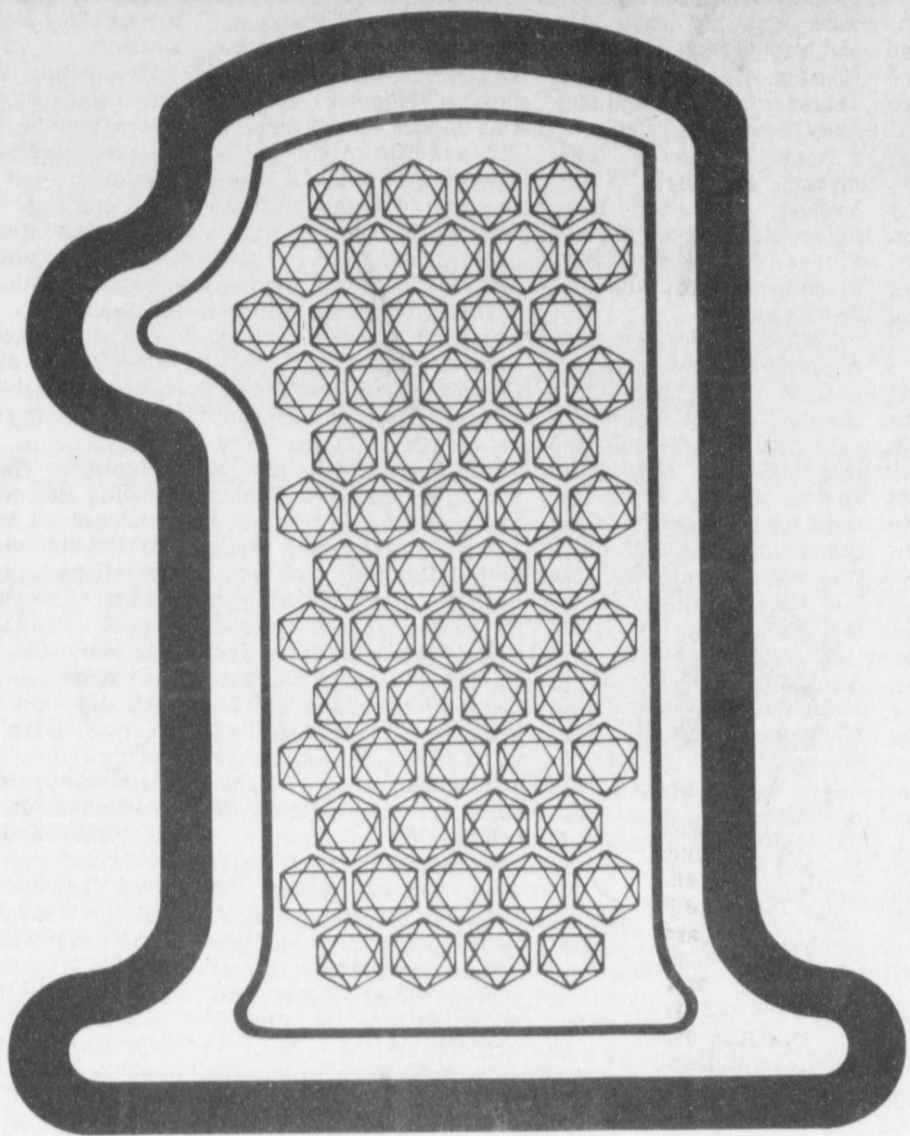

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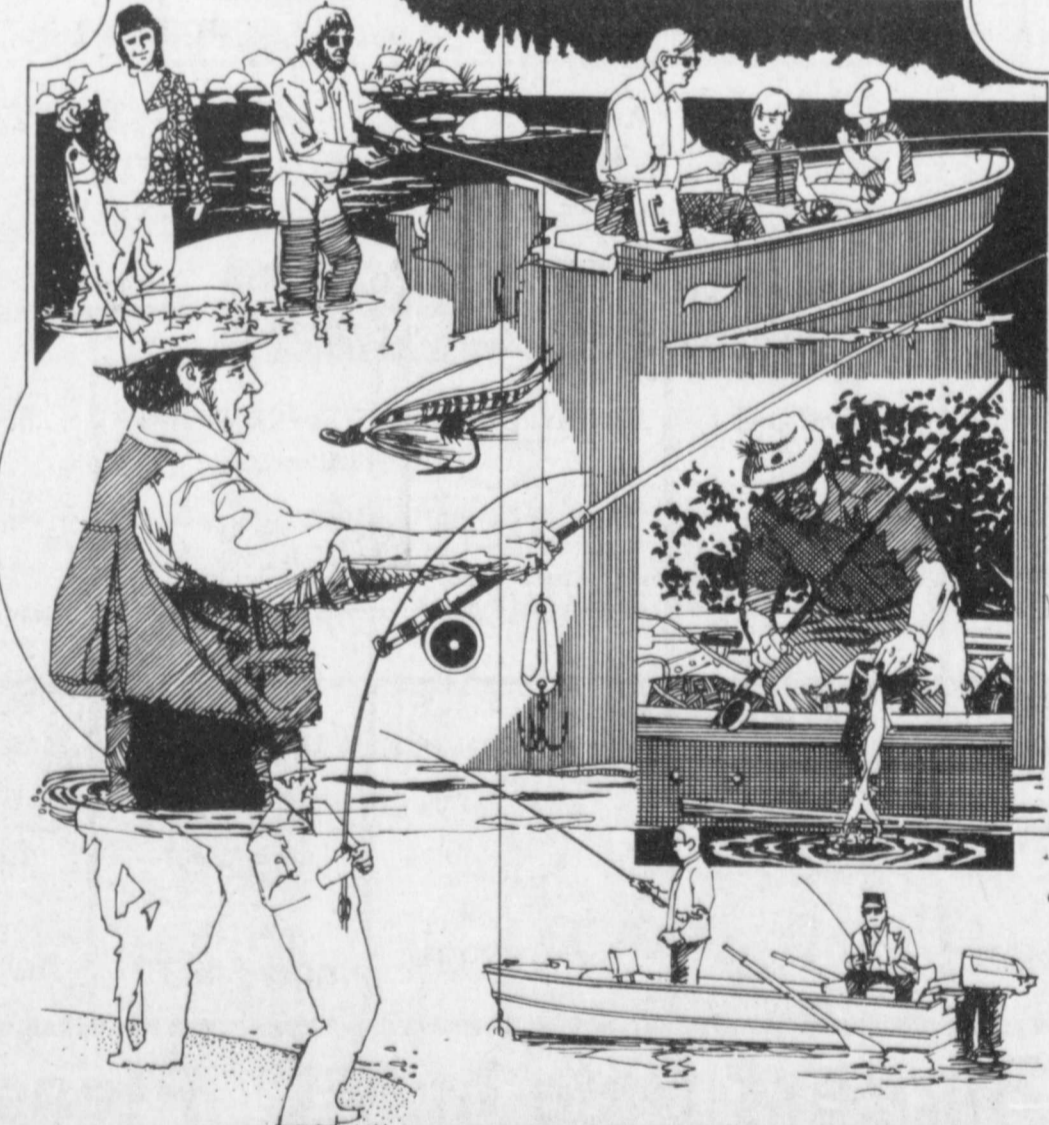

C.S.R.A. Approves Rodeo Contest In Bogata

The Central States Rodeo Association is the largest regional pro rodeo association in the country, serving contestants and rodeos in seven states, Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Louisiana.

In the last six years, Central States Rodeo Association has proven to be one of the most innovative rodeo associations in America. It has pioneered the first successful regional central entering system for contestants, as well as sanctioned jackpot rodeos and free rodeo clinics. In addition to innovation, Central States is known for its service to the rodeo industry. The association does its best to serve all areas of rodeo, including the contestants, rodeo committees, producers and sponsors and rodeo fans.

The association was formed in 1976 to serve the needs of cowboys and cowgirls in this region. Before the energy crisis of the mid-1970's, cowboys

normally traveled throughout the country each year to compete at rodeos. But when fuel prices began to rise, they were forced to travel closer to home.

The C.S.R.A. was ideal to meet those needs. The association became an ideal choice for cowboys hardest hit by high fuel prices. From Tulsa, the geographic center of the association, there is no sanctioned rodeo more than 500 miles away.

With a membership in C.S.R.A., rodeo contestants are able to hold a full time job and still compete for top honors on the rodeo circuit. If the cowboy is a full time contestant, he is able to attend several rodeos during the week.

For a group that holds a C.S.R.A. rodeo, the association can attend to the needs of that rodeo better than a large national association could. The C.S.R.A. believes there is no

such thing as a "little" rodeo in the Central States region.

The association has grown greatly since the association was formed. There were 57 rodeos in 1977, 87 in 1982 and in 1983 there will be more than 125. The total payoff to the cowboys and cowgirls in that first year was \$271,419. In 1982 the total payoff was \$769,843 and the association expects to break the \$1 million mark this year. More than 4,200 persons have held active memberships in the association since it was formed.

The biggest rodeos of 1982 were at Seminole, Oklahoma, which paid out \$29,469 and Tahlequah, Oklahoma which paid a total of \$27,450.

Bull riders earned the most money in 1982, taking a total of \$166,807.

Some CSRA cowboys and cowgirls who have their

sights set on a national level leave after a few years to try their hand at the Professional Rodeo Cowboy's Association. And many of them do quite well.

For instance, Bobby DelVecchio won the CSRA bull riding title in 1979, and has twice finished runner-up to the bull riding championship in the PRCA. Butch Myers, CSRA finalist in 1979, has since won the steer wrestling event and finished as runner-up in his first three seasons in the PRCA.

Kathy Spears, who finished second in CSRA competition in 1981, won the rookie of the year award in the WPRA in 1982. Two other Central States Alumnae, steer wrestlers Gary Green and Joel Edmondson, also appeared at the NFR in 1982.

But not all the top cowboys and cowgirls go on to the PRCA. Some of the

best in the world remain in the Central States Rodeo Association.

Bareback rider Jim Martin, of Canadian, Texas is an example. Since the association was formed, Martin has either won or finished runner-up to the bareback championship each year. In six years, he has won the title four times.

Another four-time winner is Paul Lee Foreman of Barnsdall, Okla. The team roper was the first to win a C.S.R.A. season event title three times in a row. That record was tied this year by Kelly Alred Ray of Lavaca, Ark., when she won her third straight barrel racing title. She has won more than

\$24,000 in C.S.R.A. competition.

Jimmy Crowther of Gypsum, Kansas, became the first person in C.S.R.A. history to win back-to-back All-Around titles in 1982. Crowther, who is also one of the top stock contractors in the region, has won the bull riding title three times in the past six years.

Another C.S.R.A. bull rider, Gary Hiner of Cuthand, Texas, has set some records of his own. Along with winning the season title in 1980, he has won the Finals average title the last three years. During the 1981 Finals, he twice rode bulls for a score of 89, a C.S.R.A. record.

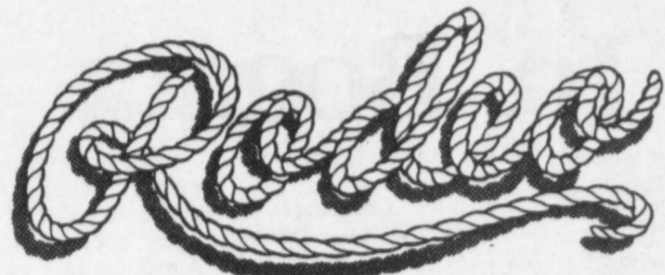
New bleachers in 1963

Here's Some Tips On Pro Rodeo

One of the foremost thoughts of a first-time rodeo spectator is wondering just what is going on down there in the arena.

It's easy to tell if a cowboy makes the whistle in a riding event or takes all day in a timed event—but why are some cowboys that make the tooter given a no score and how come some ropers were fined ten seconds and others weren't.

Well, each event has its own set of rules. These rules are made by the contestants themselves and usually serve two purposes: make it harder on the cowboy; easier on the livestock.

In the horse riding events, the rider is required to spur his horse out of the chute. This means that his spurs must be touching the horse somewhere ahead of the shoulder slope the first time his mount touches the arena floor with his front feet. Miss one out and the no score is automatic. If the judge turns away from the rider right there in front of the chute, he's usually writing down a zero for violation of this rule. A hand can make a perfect ride on an impossible horse and still get a "goose egg" for missing the horse out.

In all riding events, the cowboy is required to keep one hand free and in the air at all times. If he so much as touches his mount with his free hand he is given a no score. This infraction is most common in the bull riding.

How come one cowboy rode a rank horse and another rode one my kid sister could ride and still scored higher? Easy,

cowboys are judged on how well they ride, usually meaning where and how much they spur their mount. The animal and the rider are marked separately and the total is what counts. Thus, a poor ride on an outstanding bucking animal will usually not beat a good riding on an average animal.

All other timed events are conducted behind a barrier. The barrier gives the calf or steer a head start and leaving the box too soon costs the contestant 10 seconds for a broken barrier.

A calf roper can catch his calf any way he can make the rope fit but a team roper must catch

his steer around the neck or horns before the heel catch may be made.

A steer wrestler is simply required to throw his steer so that he is on his side with all four feet clear from under him. He must be touching his steer when he is flagged by the field judge.

15 started Rodeo Association in '48

The Bogata Rodeo Association was established at the 1948 meeting in Rosalie and after a cattle show in 1949, the first association's first rodeo was held on Aug. 17, 18 and 19, 1950 at Bogata. Stock for the initial rodeo was provided by Ramsay's Ranch of DeKalb.

There were approximately 15 charter members of the Bogata association, with the four surviving members being Hale, Gibson, Jessie Gray and Steve Biggerstaff. There are currently 70 members of the Bogata Rodeo Association. The group holds monthly

meetings throughout the year and will begin plans for the 1983 performances immediately after this year's rodeo is concluded.

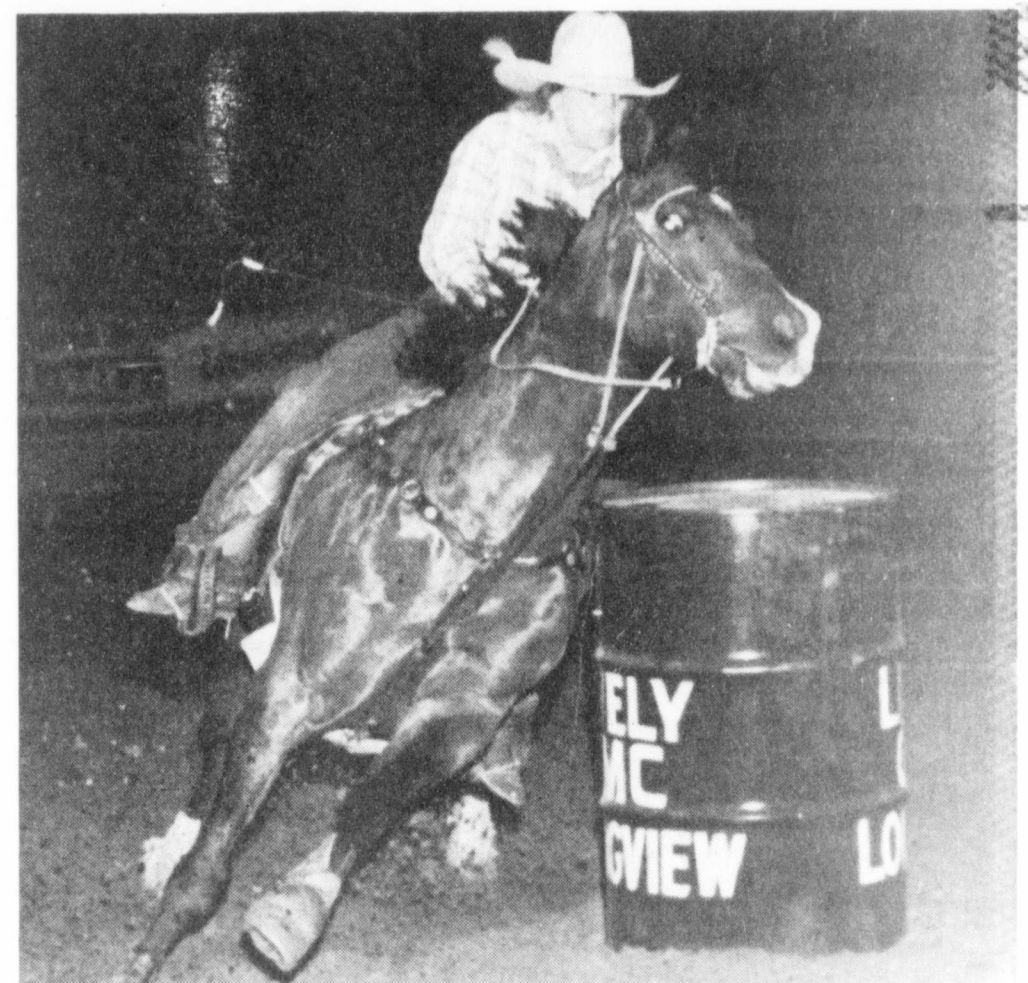
"They are a busy bunch of hardworking men who go to a great deal of trouble to

have the great rodeos you have in Bogata each and every year," a spokesman says.

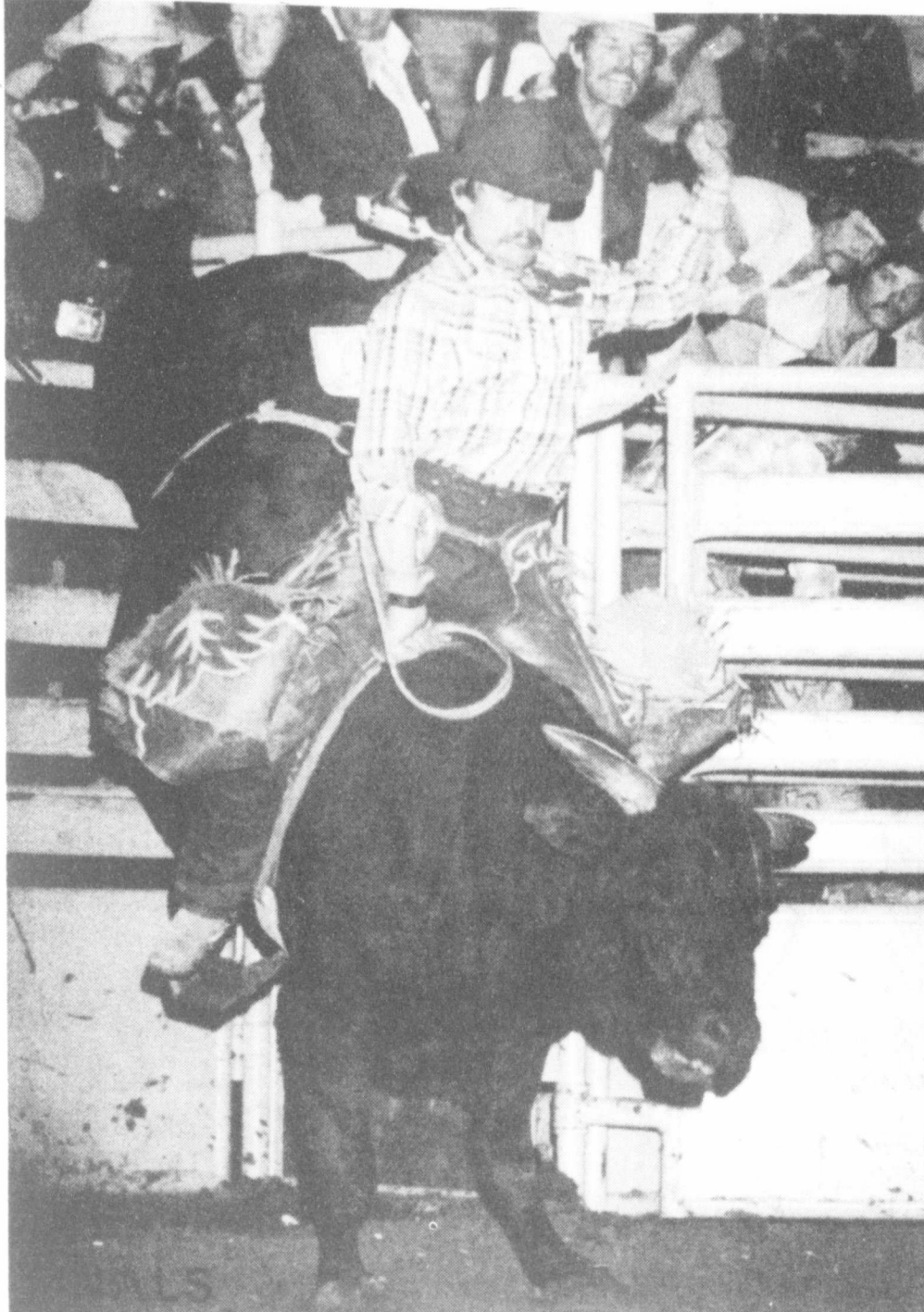
Although reports give no estimate on the crowd at the 1950 rodeo, it was stated that the "grandstands were full and overflowing".

Those 1950 performances were held at 8:30 p.m. and were lighted by 14 large electric lamps of 1500-watt capacity.

June 6, 1952—The rodeo was held June 12-13. M.N. Whitten of Idabel furnished a string of horses.

Finals in Tulsa, November, 1982. Hiner rode four of four to capture his third consecutive Finals average

championships, marking 89 points twice during the week's competition, placing in three of the four go-rounds of competition.

Rodeo Remembrances...

June 8, 1956—The rodeo was labeled "entertaining" by the media. Pete Belcher won first in the bronc riding and Pop Bivins won third. Alice Ann Mitchell won first in the ladies barrel racing.

June 5, 1959—June 25-26-27 were dates for the rodeo. Clyde Crenshaw again furnished the stock. Seating capacity at the arena was increased by about 50 percent. Sam Barnard was the president, R.L. Fennell was vice-president and Billy Allen Legate was secretary.

May 18, 1956—The rodeo opened May 31-June 2 with Lester Davis providing livestock.

May 7, 1954—The board voted to add \$5 to the ladies flag race each night of the rodeo.

June 3, 1955—The rodeo was held for three days. Admission was \$1 for adults and \$.50 for children. Lester Davis of Tishomingo, Okla. provided the stock, as in 1954.

May 30, 1963—Eliminations for junior barrel racing were to be held June 13-14-15 at 7:30 each day. Boys and girls 12 and under were eligible to try out. Six riders were picked to participate in the rodeo, according to George Marshall, president of the rodeo association.

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Courageous clowns

If the desire to ride bulls is mystifying for the average rodeo spectator, the occupation of a rodeo clown must appear to be downright suicidal.

To a bull rider, the clown is one of the most important men in the world.

When a bull rider leaves a bull — intentionally or not — only the clown is there to keep the bull from hooking, butting or running over the fallen rider.

Most bulls don't lower

their head and charge. They will keep their eyes glued to a fallen or scrambling cowboy and they can move with lightning speed.

They can hook and butt and they don't seem a bit concerned about where they put their feet. A rodeo clown may often have to slap a bull around the head to get him to turn his attention away from a fallen rider.

Whatever their specialty, most bullfighting clowns have contested in rodeo and

are hooked on the sport. Along with cowboys, they share in the emphasis the sport places on freedom.

They would rather lead a tough life than trade one bit of freedom.

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Thursday, June 23 is annual Hub Whiteman Night At Bogata Rodeo

Whiteman was one of the most popular and prominent cowboys in the business. Whiteman started his rodeo career in 1929, after a spell with the 101 Ranch Wild West Show. He won recognition as an all-around cowboy and a top night bronc rider. He rode three of the toughest bucking horses in rodeo history, "Midnight", "Five Minutes 'til Midnight", and "Hell's Angels" for several years. Whiteman was one of the

biggest winners in rodeo and one year, at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show Rodeo, he won both the bronc riding and bulldogging awards. He was the world's champion bulldogger in 1941 and went into the Army soon afterwards, serving in the European Theatre during World War II. After the war, he returned to rodeo activity on a fulltime basis. His active contestant career, he judged many of the largest rodeos.

In 1936, he was one of the organizers of the Cowboys Turtle Association, forerunner of today's Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association, and served on the Turtle's board of directors. Thursday's opening performances of the Bogata Rodeo will be observed as the sixth annual Hub Whiteman Night, honoring the late champion rodeo performer from this area whose outstanding rodeo

career spanned some three decades and won for him a niche in the sport's hall of fame. Prior to his death on Sept. 1, 1977, Whiteman served on the board of directors of the Cowboy Hall of Fame's Board of Directors. On Thursday, June 23, 1977, the Bogata Rodeo Association honored Hub for his accomplishments and efforts to promote rodeo nationally by presenting him with a plaque and by designating the first performance of the 1977 rodeo as

"Hub Whiteman Night." On Jan. 28, 1978, Whiteman was inducted into the Central Texas Cowboy Hall of Fame, at Belton, posthumously. More recently, he was posthumously inducted into the Rodeo Parade of Champions Hall (an area for world champion cowboys only) at Colorado Springs, Colo. In Whiteman's memory, his widow, Mrs. Marie Whiteman, will award a \$100

Savings Bond to a rodeo fan in attendance at the Thursday night opener, with the recipient to be chosen in a special drawing.

Cuthand's Gary Hiner set wind-up

There was no cowboy alive who could beat the streak Gary Hiner, of Cuthand, was in the last few months of 1981. Although he wasn't in contention to repeat the bull riding championship he had won in Central States in 1980, it didn't keep him from competing better in the last three months of 1981 than ever before.

Gay, Denny Flynn and Bobby DelVecchio to take the first prize and more than \$20,000, the richest purse ever in bull riding. Three weeks later Hiner came to the Central States Finals Rodeo with the same attitude. As a result, he came away with the best

showing of any cowboy in the history of the Finals. He won the Finals average, taking first in three of the four go-rounds. In two go-rounds he had record scores of 89 points. Hiner finished the Finals with 341 points, 33 points more than his closest

competitor, Dale Haraway of Oklahoma City. His lowest score at the Finals was an 81 to take third place in the fourth go-round. July 6, 1981—Sue Legate of Fulbright was crowned Tomato Queen by balloting done over the city in various ballot boxes. Jack Maddox won first in the calf roping the first night of the rodeo, Bobby Dickey won third in bronc riding and Thur Wood won third in the ladies flag race. In the second performance, Jack Maddox won first again in the calf roping, Bennie Stevens won second and Slim Hulien won third. Bobby Dickey won second in bronc riding, Red Hulien won first in ladies flag race and Carabel Ward won third.

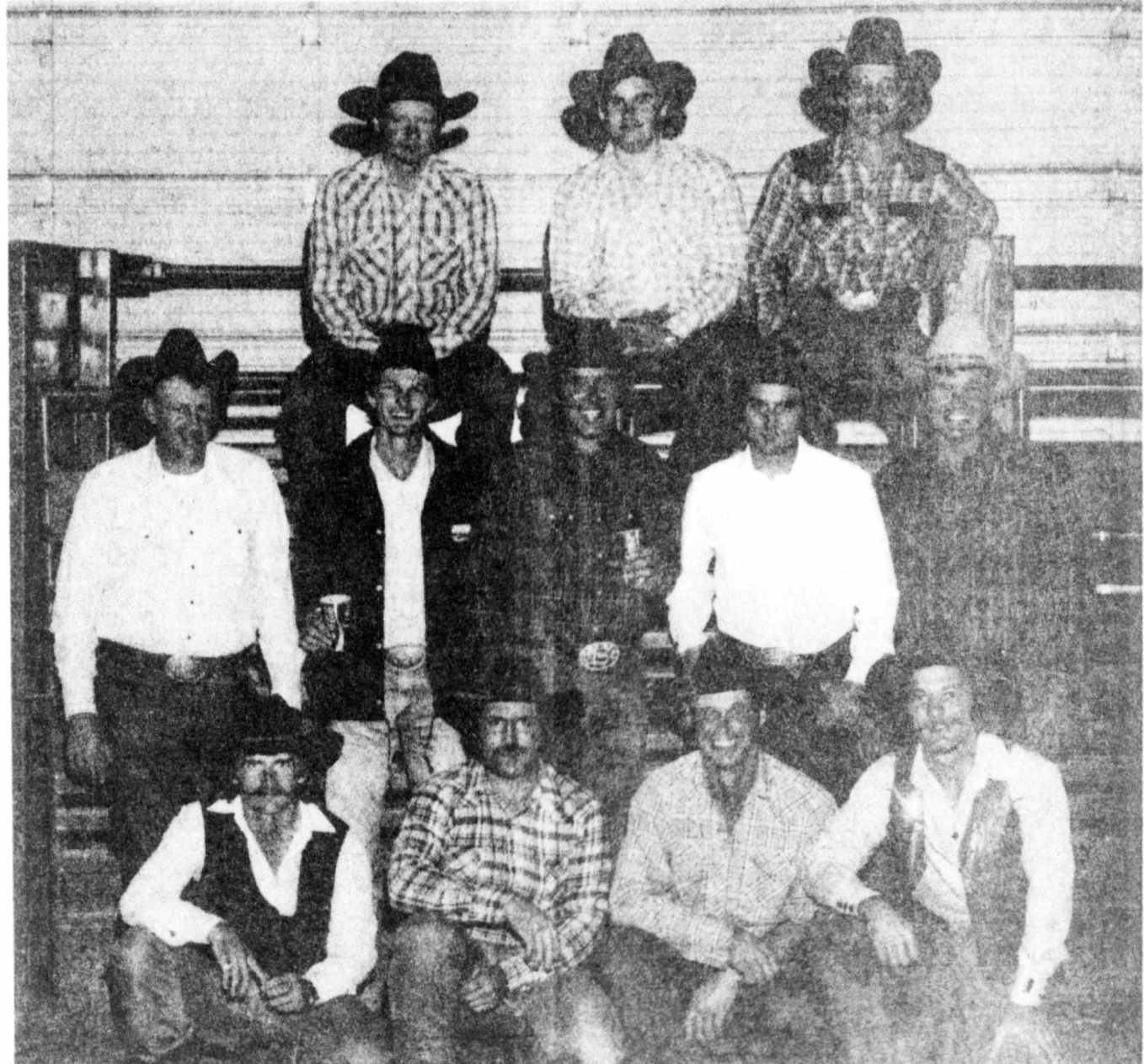

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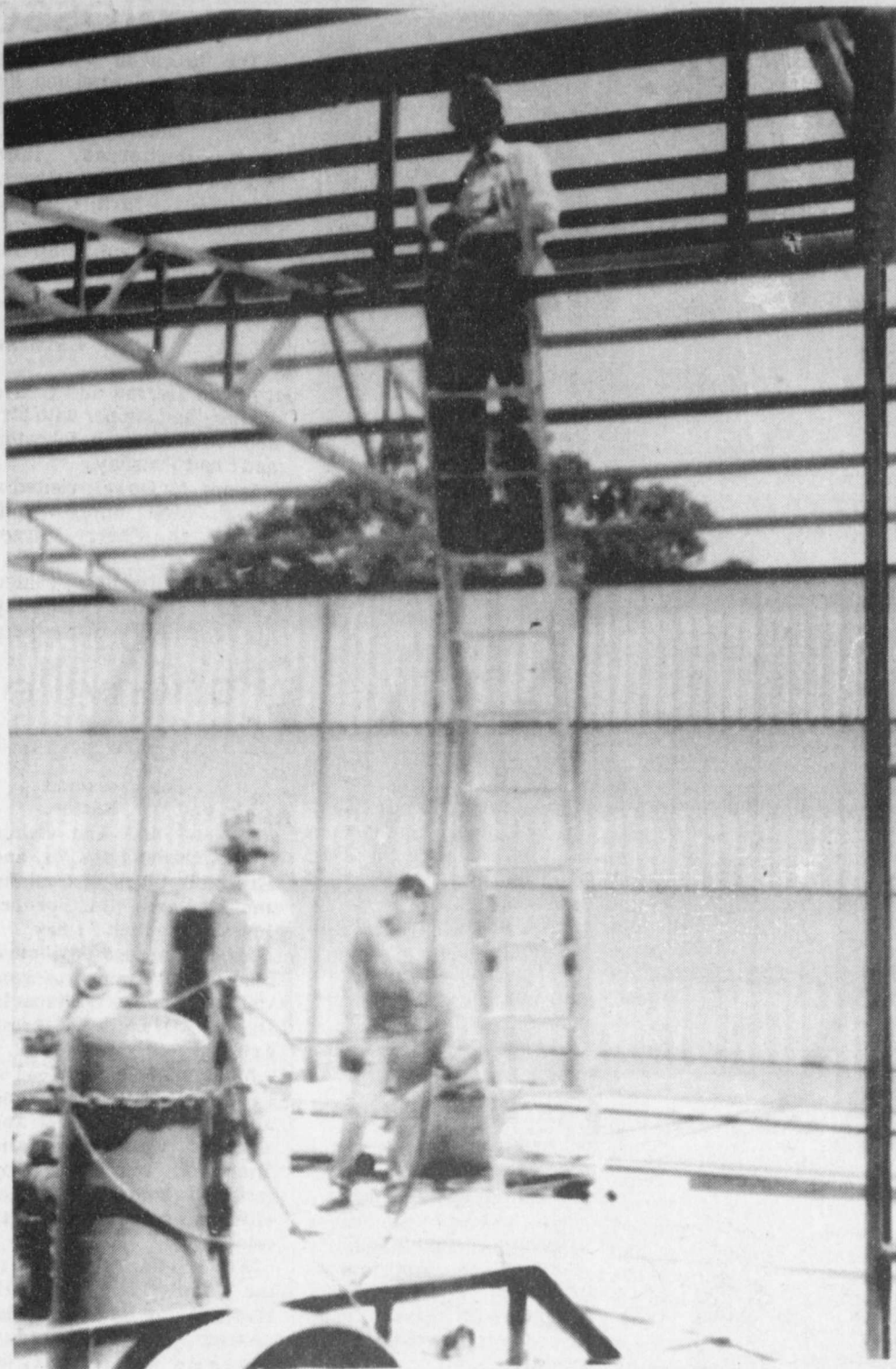

Sam B. Hall Opposes Nuclear Dump

Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr. said this week that he is opposed to the possible use of various sites in Northeast Texas for disposal of radioactive waste.
 Recent news reports indicate that the so-called Northern Prairie Area is one of 15 sites under consideration as a dump site by the Texas Low Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority. Parts of Delta, Fannin, Lamar and Red River Counties could be affected.
 "In the past there have been occasions where areas in Northeast Texas have been singled out as nuclear and chemical waste dumps, and our citizens have been totally

opposed," Congressman Hall said. "While I am not a nuclear engineer or a geologist, I can tell that Northeast Texas is not a proper place to dump nuclear waste, whether low level or high level. We have significant population density and good, productive land. If the State of Texas must find a dump site, then surely an area can be found that is sparsely populated and has little production potential," Congressman Hall added.
 Congressman Hall said that he welcomed input to his office from citizens about the dump site proposal.
 Two years ago Congressman Hall opposed the placing of a chemical

dump site in Red River County, near Cunningham, by an industry located in South Carolina.

Garrison Murderer Confesses, Receives Life

After being indicted by the 102nd District Court Grand Jury at Red River County Courthouse last Thursday, William John Roth, age 31, Monday pled guilty to the murder of Travis Eugene "Buddy" Garrison, a spokesman for Red River County Sheriff's office said.

Roth subsequently received a life sentence in the state penitentiary.

He was transported about 6:30 p.m. Monday to the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville by Red River County Deputy Gerry Allen and Texas

Ranger Eddie Almond.

Judge Leon Pesek handed down the sentence "confined for life" Monday afternoon.

Roth, apparently from New Jersey, had been charged with the felony offense of murder and felony theft, since he apparently stole Garrison's automobile, later located in Louisiana. Roth was taken into custody on Friday, June 10 by Morrilton County, Arkansas law officers, who had stopped him for routine questioning.

Garrison, a resident of Woodland who lived alone,

was found brutally beaten and stabbed to death in his home on Sunday, June 5 and had apparently been killed on June 3 or 4.

He had been seen in the company of a man meeting Roth's description shortly

before his death. Law officers had acquired a large quantity of evidence, which was sent to Austin for laboratory analysis, and apparently felt confident of a conviction before Roth's confession.

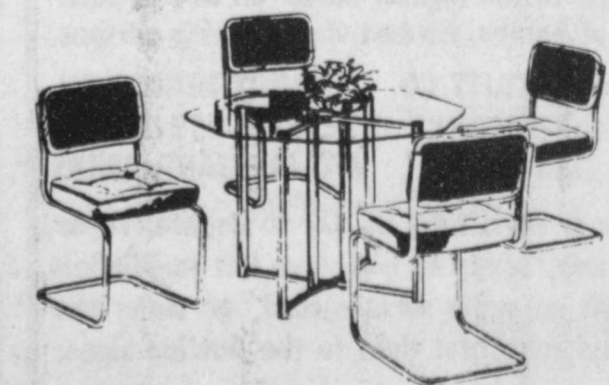
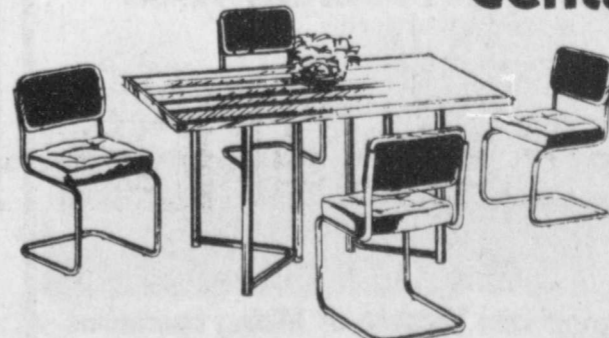
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
