## **Trees Attract Birds To Yards**



According to Ann Holland, urban forester with the Texas Forest Service in San Antonio, "A variety of trees, shrubs and vines planted by a homeowner may create mixed habitats needed by birds during all seasons, places to feed, sing, court, nest, rest or hide." Even small yards can be made attractive to birds by the right choice and variety of

plants. Recommendations for trees, shrubs and vines to attract birds includes: Holly, used by 28 species of birds. including mockingbirds, robins, bluebirds and cedar waxwings. Firethorn, used by 16 species of birds, including catbirds, brown thrashers, mockingbirds and cedar waxwings. Redcedar, used by 22 species of birds, including robins, cardinals, bluejays and cedar waxwings.Crabapple, used by 24 species of birds, including woodpeckers, robins, evening grosbeaks and purple finches. Hawthorn, used by 19 species, including bluejays, mockingbirds, robins and cedar waxwings. Cherry, used by 47 species, including woodpeckers, orioles, tanagers, cardinals and purple finches. Wild Plum, used by 16 species, including mockingbirds,

brown thrashers, robins,

cardinals and rufou-sided

towhees. Oak, used by 37

chickadees, titmice. nuthatches and evening grosbeaks. Flowering Dogwood, used by 45 species, including woodpeckers, robins, bluebirds, thrushes cardinals and mockingbirds. Russian

Olive, used by 50 species mourning dove, pheasant, the Balkan countries. finches and cardinals.

"In addition, insects species of birds, including around plantings will attract woodpeckers, bluejays, warblers, flycatchers, martins and swallows. Also, proving a source of water. such as a bird bath will add to your yard's potential for attracting birds," Holland concluded.






