### James Young Injured In Motorcycle Accident

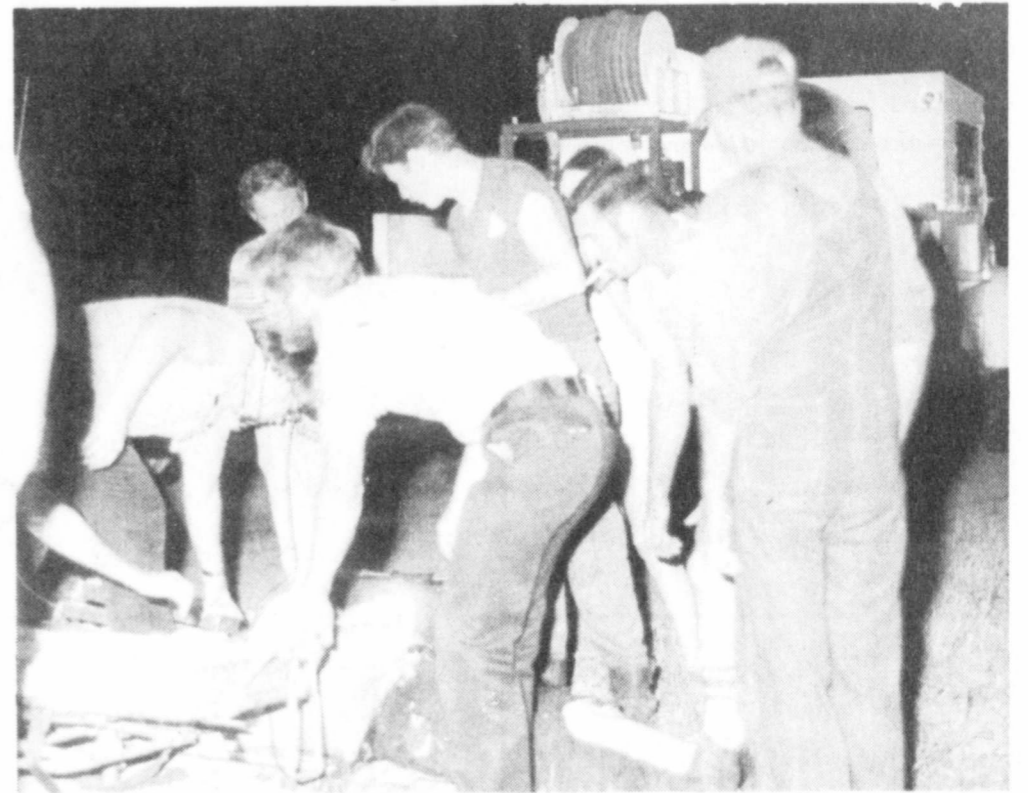
James Ray Young, 37, of Blossom, was involved in a motorcycle accident Saturday evening, July 2.

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## East Texas Eating

—We East Texans are discovering the joy of fresh, ripe blueberries, thanks to pick your own blueberry operations. The nearest pick your own blueberry orchard is Mrs. Moody Storey's, south of Avery. Almost any morning this week, and maybe next, you will find someone from Cunningham, Blossom, Deport, Bogata or Talco picking blueberries from the big bushes.  
East Texans venturing into Arkansas will find pick your own blueberries through the fruit growing region of the Ozarks, My

husband, Sam, and I visited the Cox Berry Farm three miles north of Clarksville, Ark, last week.  
The Cox's grow thirty acres of strawberries, blackberries, red raspberries and blueberries. The strawberries are through bearing and the beds have already been reworked. Customers were picking blackberries, red raspberries and blueberries.  
Pick your own prices for blueberries this year are \$5.00 a gallon locally, and at the Arkansas farm we visited.  
The blueberry growing

folks of our acquaintance have very good blueberry recipes. Here is Mrs. Storey's blueberry muffin recipe, and the Cox's blueberry pie filling recipe. Do try both! You will want to put them in your permanent recipe file, as I have done.  
**Blueberry Muffins** (about 36 muffins)  
3 cups sugar  
1/2 cup Crisco  
1 stick margarine  
5 large eggs  
3 cups flour (plain)  
1 cup sweet milk  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 tsp. lemon flavoring  
1 cup or more blueberries  
Cream sugar, margarine and Crisco. Add one egg at a time. Fold in the flour and milk. Add the flavorings and blueberries. Bake in muffin cups at 350 or 300 degrees.  
**Blueberry Pie Filling**  
4 cups fresh or frozen strawberries  
1 cup water  
1 cup sugar  
3 tbsps. cornstarch

juice of 1/2 lemon  
Boil 1 cup blueberries with water and sugar; strain. Add cornstarch to liquid; boil until thick. Remove from heat and add lemon juice. Stir in remaining blueberries.  
I poured the blueberry pie filling into a 9-inch unbaked crust, topped it with a lattice crust, and baked the pie in a 425 degree oven until the crust was a light golden brown. It was absolutely delicious!  
The filling could be poured into a baked crust and topped with whipped cream or the whipped topping of your choice.

# Hall Votes For Repeal On Interest Withholding

Congressman Sam B. Hall Jr. voted with the majority of his House colleagues recently to repeal the 10 percent withholding provision on interest and dividends, which was included in last year's tax bill. The House vote was 382 to 41 in favor of repeal.

His vote to stop the tax climaxed numerous efforts by Congressman Hall in the past few months to secure its repeal. He voted against the 1982 tax legislation because it contained the withholding provision.

He reported that over 37,000 constituents in the First Congressional District wrote in opposition to the withholding measure. Congressman Hall said that everyone who wrote received a reply from him.

One of the first bills introduced by Mr. Hall at the beginning of the 98th Congress in January was co-sponsorship of repeal legislation.

When the repeal bill was apparently stymied in the Ways and Means Committee, which has legislative jurisdiction over tax matters, Mr. Hall became an

early signer of a discharge petition to force the bill out of committee for action on the house floor. In addition, prior to signing the discharge petition, he formally asked the Chairman of the Committee, of wage earners salaries the amount was less than 5 percent. It's now up to an average of 25 percent. This time we had an opportunity to stop the monster before it got out of control, and I'm proud to be associated with the effort," he concluded.

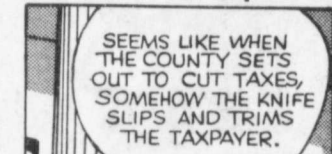

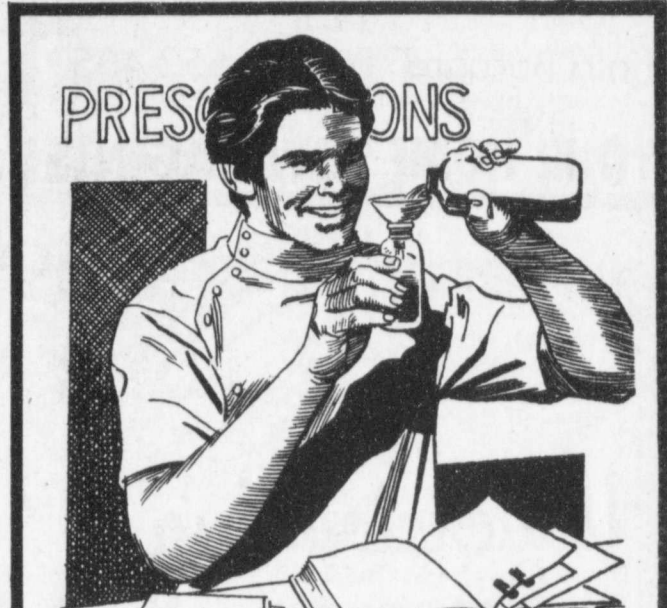

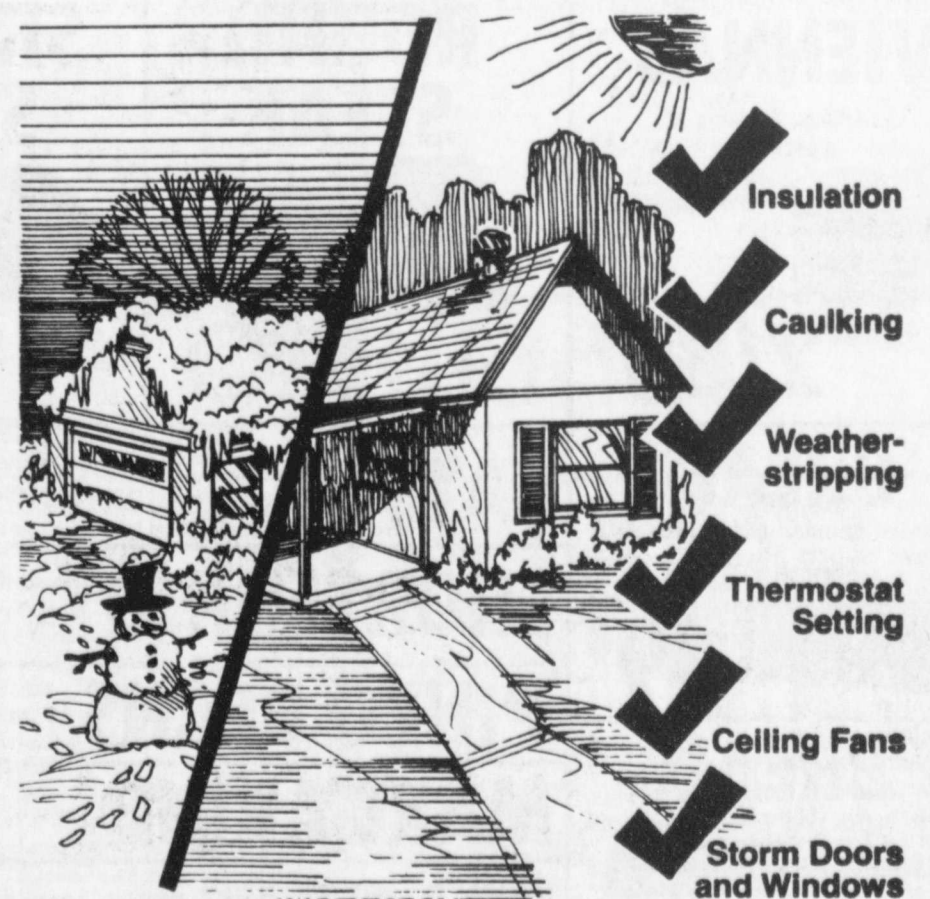

**FINE FOCUS**  
 Tips For The Amateur Photographer  
 By Nanalee Nichols  
 Framing the picture in a camera viewfinder is even more important than framing a finished photograph to hang on the wall.  
 It is a simple matter of editing before shooting. Closing in is absolutely the major factor in good pictures.  
 Look at the scene and say to yourself, "what doesn't need to be in this picture?"  
 Get rid of a car bumper sticking into the corner of the picture, a fence running about head high height behind a subject's head or a large patch of grass, house or other area that really isn't going to help the picture any.  
 You'll be amazed how much excess picture area you can take out if you will take the time to glance around the edges of the viewfinder and really see what is there.  
 Many times you can actually turn a camera vertically to make a "snugger" fit for the picture.  
 It isn't necessary to get everyone's feet into a group photo, but it IS necessary to get the tops of their heads in!  
 So rather than back up so far that you can't see much but a blob of faces, get in close enough to get a good look at those faces and don't worry about feet or knees.

They don't usually add much to a picture anyway!  
 When taking a picture of say, a child on a horse, it isn't necessary to get all the horse in usually, try getting a front view, looking past the horse up into the saddle at the child, or perhaps get to the height level with the rider instead of standing looking up.  
 Triangular patterns are good for small group portraits. They concentrate attention and keep the eye in the picture. Try seating two or three people and putting one or two behind them. Don't hesitate to put family pets such as cats and dogs in portraits, too, they liven interest.  
 Horizontal lines in pictures, such as long shadows, can create a feeling of tranquility. Diagonals create feelings of action, and verticals can lead the eye into the picture.  
 Remember, look into the viewfinder, eliminate things that are unnecessary, then remember to ask if you are truly close enough. The results will be better pictures for all.

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## Continental To Ask \$10.6 Million Annual Increase

Continental Telephone of Texas and Lakeside Telephone Company have announced their intent to ask the Public Utility Commission for an increase in local telephone rates. The companies, which provide telephone service in 175

exchanges throughout Texas, will request a \$10.6 million annual revenue increase from their Texas customers. Representative members of Continental's management filed all necessary documents with the PUC in Austin recently.

Continental's director of Public Affairs, Loma Allen said that the need for additional revenues is the result of continued rising costs occurring since the last increase which had been granted in 1978. "We have been able to avoid raising rates for five years mainly because of our employee productivity improvement program and a tight cost control management policy."

Continental's record of service improvement and expansion in Texas is impressive, according to Allen. The company is operating within PUC service standards throughout its exchanges which reflect for the last five years a 31.1 percent growth in customers.

"This rate increase will allow us to earn a reasonable return on our investment in order to remain financially healthy, and thereby enable us to continue to serve our customers well in the future," Allen said.

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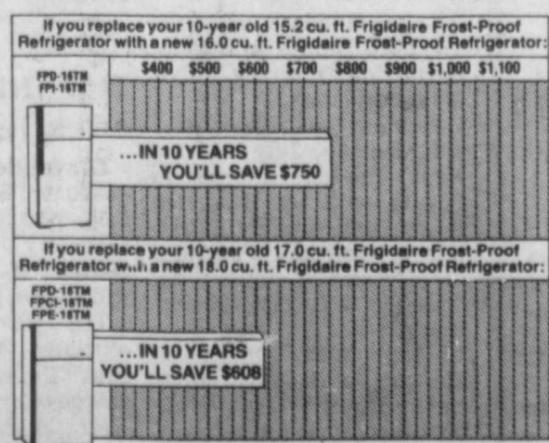

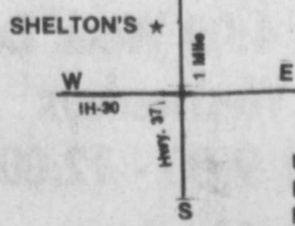
