And then all that work is not only worth it...but a real pleasure.

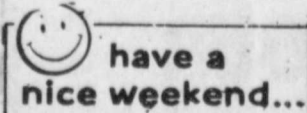
## Board Tends To Business

The Prairiland School Board met Monday night and tended to some routine business.

After hearing the minutes and approving them, the board approved the Title I education program, raised the cooks at the three schools to \$3.60 per hour, and raised the head cooks extra pay from \$50 a month to \$70 a month.

A discussion of the building renovation going on at Blossom and Deport Elementary Schools was held, with the board hearing progress reports on air conditioning, new window installation, lowering of ceilings and various other facets of the renovation program currently going on.

The board also approved the financial statements for the school.

## School Zone Established In Deport

The State Department of Highways has told the Deport City Council that they do not feel that there is sufficient problem with speeding or traffic to establish flashing caution lights at each end of Highway 271 entering Deport, but

they have designated an area 600 feet long as a school zone.

The area, which will be marked with school zone signs, is at the intersection of Hwy. 271 at the turnoff to the Deport Elementary School, where school buses

and parents turn in order to pick up or leave off their youngsters at the school.

A half hour before and after school begins and ends a flashing caution light on the sign will be in operation, and the speed limit during that time will be 35 miles

per hour. A discussion as to whether the city could hire a marshal to issue tickets to speed violators took place at the council meeting, but no action was taken.

In other business, the council, which met in

regular session Monday night, approved the construction of a sewer and water line to service a portion of eastern Deport. The line will run approximately from the Paul R. Keys residence to the T.V. Skaggs residence, on the farm to market road toward Shadowland. Bids for the construction of the line will be opened

soon. C.G. (Bud) Nobles appeared before the council, asking that Deport residents be reminded that he is strictly a night watchman for the city, and to emphasize that he is not to be called for matters which should be attended to by the Lamar County law officials or constables. A discussion on the

problem of stray dogs within the city limits was held, but no action was taken. A number of citizens have complained that they cannot put their trash out without it being ripped and strewn about by dogs running loose in town.

Other routine matters, such as hearing the minutes and approving bills, was carried out before the meeting adjourned.

## Requirements For Reduced Price School Meals Released

The Prairiland CISD School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$.80 and breakfast for \$.50. Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the following scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals.

To apply for free or reduced-price meals, please fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the school.

The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year. If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the

same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250. If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be

done by calling or writing the following Official: Supt. L.F. Taylor at 652-6476.

The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data. If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact 652-6476. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied. Applications may be picked up at Prairiland C.I.S.D., Pattonville, Texas.

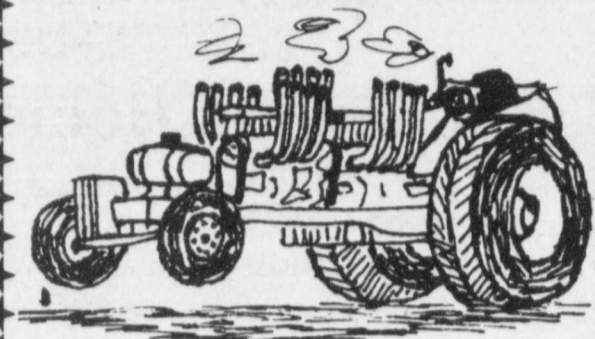

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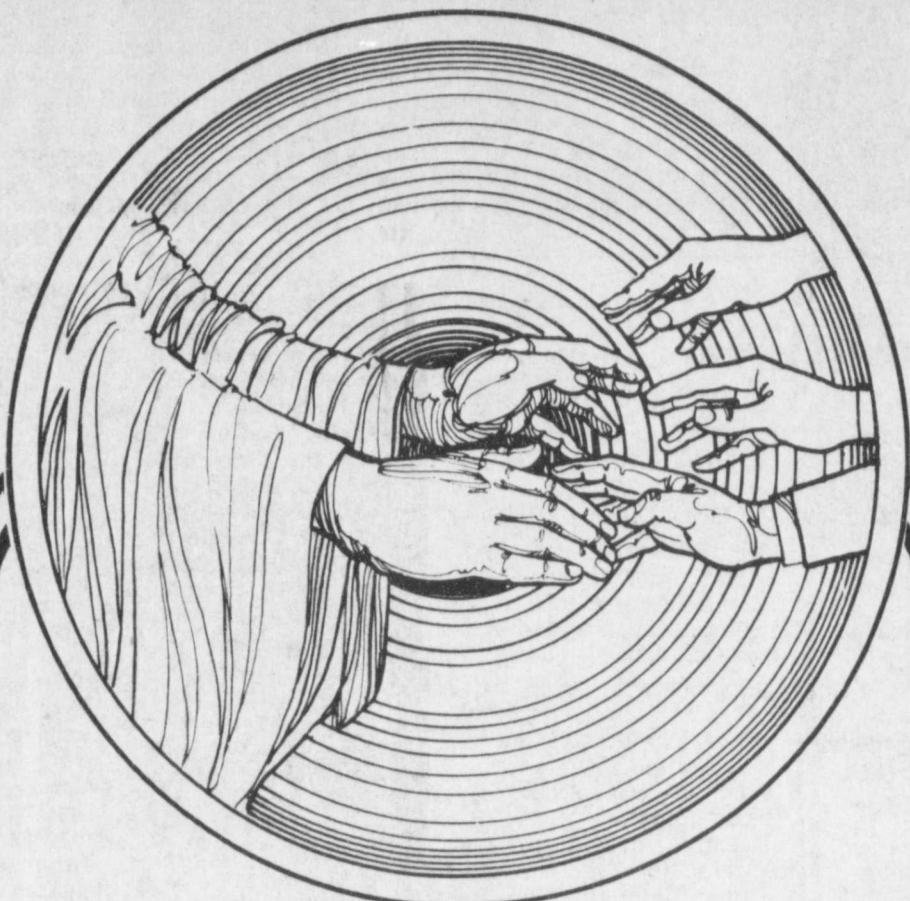

## Pecans Need Attention For Production

This week's article will focus primarily on pecans. There are certain diseases and insects to be on the lookout for this time of year. Pecan Scab is a foliage and nut disease caused by a fungus. It effects rapidly growing shoots and leaves and later developing nuts. Pecan scab is the most destructive disease of pecans in Texas.

From now until the end of August, the primary objective for controlling scab is on the shucks. Scab lesions appear as small, black dots which are elevated or sunken in older infections. Eventually these lesions become large and the entire surface becomes black. At this stage, development of pecans stops and nuts drop prematurely.

Benlate and Du-Ter are probably the best fungicide for scab.

Yellow aphids and second generation casebearers.

The walnut caterpillar can defoliate an entire tree overnight. Young caterpillars are reddish-brown with narrow, yellowish lines. Fully-grown caterpillars are almost black with two grayish lines on the back and two on the sides. Diazinon will control the walnut caterpillar. Diazinon or Malathion should control the yellow aphids when they are seen.

Second generation pecan casebearers emerge approximately 42 to 45 days after the first generation. Eggs are greenish white when deposited and gradually turn red in four or five days.

After hatching, larvae feed on buds and shoots for two to three days before entering the nuts. Insecticide applications should be timed so that trees are sprayed by the third day

after egg hatching. Zolene is an excellent insecticide for controlling this insect.

In Peaches, look for brown rot, scab and foliage and fruit feeders. Plums are also susceptible to these and can be treated in the same manner.

Brown rot looks like its name. Scab is often called freckles or black spot. They cause lesions and often secondary decay in the fruit can occur. Benlate 50 percent WP, Botran 75 percent WP, Captan or Orthocide 50 percent WP or Sulphur 97 percent WP are used to control diseases.

Stink bugs and the plum curculio are the main insect pests. Both attack the fruit and can be controlled with 50 percent WP, Malathion or any insecticide labeled for their control.

Grapes may be experiencing powdery mildew and insect damage, too. Benlate, Dithane Z-78,

Dithane M-22 or Captan will control mildew. Benlate, Dithane Z-78 and M-22 should not be applied within seven days of harvest.
