The number of brucellosisfree herds in Texas are almost double what they were a year ago, the Texas Animal Health Commission reported Thursday.

As of July 1, the state had 793 certified brucellosis-free herds, compared to 419 a vear ago.

Hopkins County has the highest number of brucellosis-free herds with 21, Milam County is second

Other counties with 20 or more certified herds are Henderson with 23 and Navarro with 24, Bell with 22, Washington with 21 and Bosque with 20.

Lamar County is in the 10-19 brucellosis-free herd category.

Antartica windiest


