It really isn't a bad time without it there wouldn't be a fall harvest, nor would we be able to truly appreciate those first cool, crisp days of autumn.

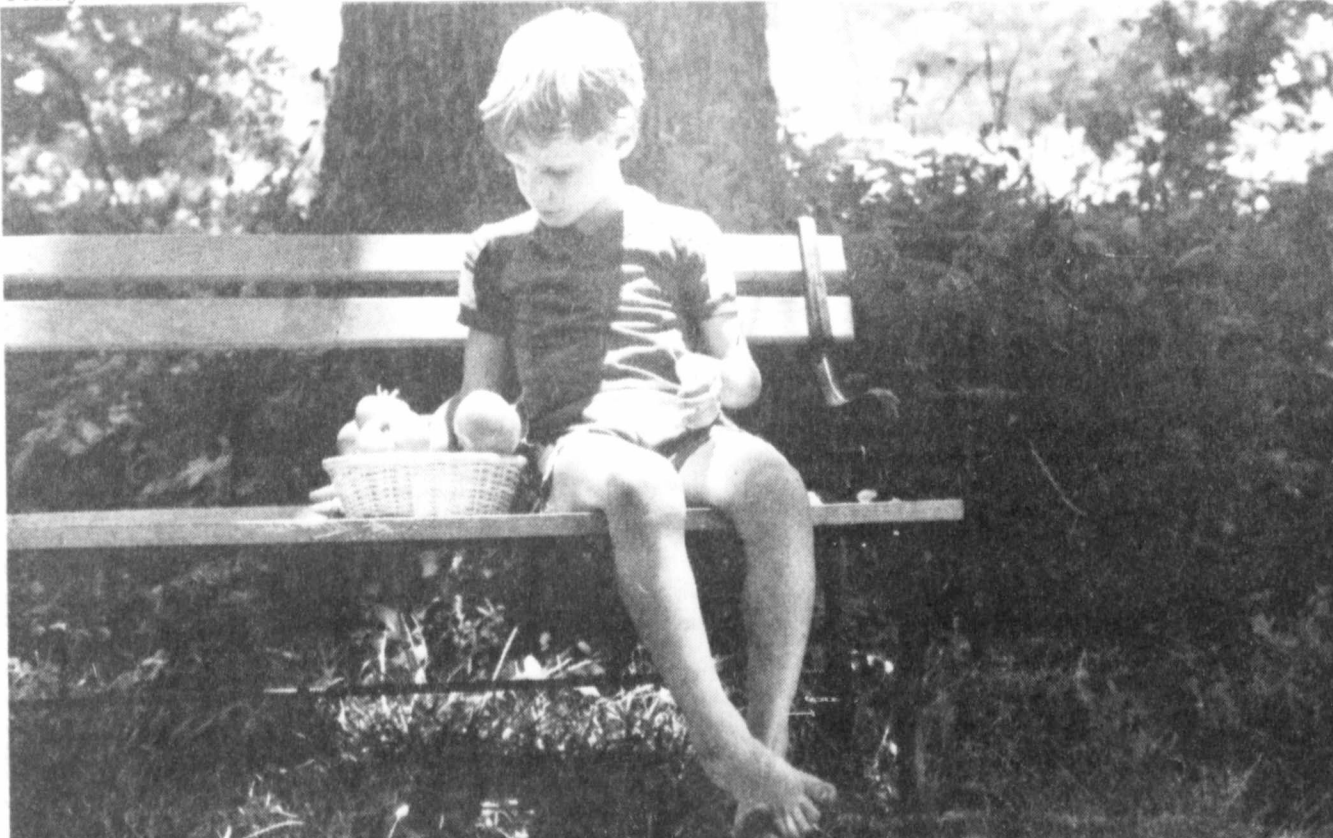
So keep a grip, turn on the air conditioner, read a good book, and remember that cooler, better days really are approaching!

Gardening, Preserving Reaches Peak In Area

Gardening has reached a peak in the area, and canning, pickling and freezing are currently on the agenda for many people.

Although the extraordinarily wet summer has kept fruits and vegetables from being as good quality as they are in some years, it has been compensated for by the abundance of produce which cooler, wetter weather has kept going.

Tomatoes, one of the current major producers, are red, ripe and juicy, and make one of the finest additions to a table imaginable. They can be canned, frozen, juiced, fried or just plain eaten with a dash of salt.

Okra, another old-time east Texas favorite, is also coming off right now. Squash has been so prolific that many people are practically begging "squashless" folks to take some.

Far from being a fading art, gardening, and it's partner, canning and freezing, has been a tremendous upsurge over the past few years. It is hard for anyone to resist home-grown produce. Peppers, onions, potatoes or peas,

they all seem to taste just a little better when "I grew them myself". Nothing feels much better than to be able to list all the home grown goodies that make up nearly a complete meal on a warm summer evening.

Although freezing has taken the place of the hot, time consuming method of preserving many fruits and vegetables, there are still many younger women learning the art of canning just for the pleasure of it.

A pantry arrayed with multi-colored jars of peppers, pickles, jams, jellies and relishes can rival any artist's canvas.

Another pleasant aspect of home gardening can be found when the chores are shared with the help of youngsters.

A child will look dubiously at the wrinkled up seeds he drops into a furrow, and then with delight at the sprouts that soon emerge. When the plants mature and begin to bear, children positively glow with joy!

Few youngsters can resist the "treasure hunt" of searching among glossy leaves for bell peppers, pulling up onions or digging and searching for potatoes amidst warm, rich soil.

A spirit of competition urges them on as they exclaim "I found a bigger tomato than you" or, "I bet I can pick more beans".

And, for the older folks, a young back that doesn't ache from too much bending over is a blessing.

Sharing excess produce with neighbors and friends is yet another facet of gardening that brings people closer together.

Those who have corn, share it with those who have none. Those with too many peppers will "swap" for plums or peaches. It is a revival of the old system, and one that makes good sense.

But perhaps the nicest part of all is when the cold winter winds blow. Then, the home gardener can pop open a package or jar of preserved summer time! The hard work, the heat, and all the memories of summer seem much more worthwhile when that frosty air swirls around outside the house!

County Herds Certified Free

The number of brucellosis-free herds in Texas are almost double what they were a year ago, the Texas Animal Health Commission reported Thursday.

As of July 1, the state had 793 certified brucellosis-free herds, compared to 419 a year ago.

Hopkins County has the highest number of brucellosis-free herds with 21, Milam County is second with 27.

Other counties with 20 or more certified herds are Henderson with 23 and Navarro with 24, Bell with 22, Washington with 21 and Bosque with 20.

Lamar County is in the 10-19 brucellosis-free herd category.

"This shows to us that many livestock producers in the eastern half of Texas are using the certified brucellosis-free herd program to protect their cattle against this highly contagious disease," Commission Director Dr. John W. Holcombe said in a news release.

Tractor Pull Promises Excitement

The Eighth Annual Paris Young Farmers Tractor and Truck Pull is set for July 29 and 30 at the Lamar County Fairgrounds. This year's event will feature about eight two-wheel drive trucks in the competition, according to pull organizers.

Several new tractors will be at the event, according to Audie Neisler, one of the event's organizers. Several "smokers" will also return to the event this year.

The tractor and truck pull is a nationally sanctioned event which attracts trucks and tractors here from several states.

A new class has been added to this year's event. This is the first time that two-wheel drive pick up trucks have competed in the Lamar County pull. Last year, Neisler said, competition involving four-wheel drive trucks generated much excitement. The two-wheel drive trucks are "even more exciting" Neisler said.

"From what I understand, these trucks are pulling so hard that they go down the track on their back two wheels. The only way they follow the course is by

looking at the lights on top," Neisler added.

The purse of the tractor-truck pull is \$9,400, a first prize of \$800 for each class except for the econo class which has a first prize of \$600.

Classes competing Friday night, July 29, will be 7200 Mod, 7200 Super, 9200 Mod, 9500 Super, 6200 Mod P.U. Competing Saturday night, July 30, will be 7200 Mod, 7200 Super, 7500 Open, 12000 Super, 6200 Mod P.U. and 6200 Econo.

Advance tickets are now on sale at local farm equipment dealers and from Young Farmer members. The show will begin at 7:30 each night.

The Paris Young Farmers is an organization for young people interested in agriculture. The group is open to people who are out of high school through age 35. Associate memberships are open to those age 35 or older.

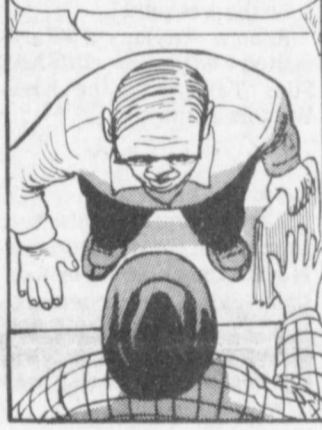
4H IN FOCUS

Tons of waste
Each year, America's metal and nonmetal mines — primarily copper, iron, titanium, uranium and phosphate — produce more than 2 billion tons of waste material. This waste, both coarse rock from development of a mine and extremely fine tailings from the mineral-processing operation, is discarded in massive piles or tailings ponds.

Agriculture Update

Many producers have been caught with hay in the field as the result of scattered rains throughout East Texas. It is difficult to determine the quality of this hay by just looking at it. Therefore, it is important to have the hay tested for quality.
For best planning and suggested testing each cutting of hay. Knowing the nutritive content of the hay is necessary to plan an adequate winter feeding program. If the quality of the hay is known, the producer can determine the most economical supplement needed to meet the nutritive requirements of the animals.
Additional, if the protein content of each cutting of hay is known, it is much easier to feed the appropriate hay to the proper group of animals. For example, the best hay should be fed to wet cows and the lower quality hay can be fed to dry cows.
When buying hay, it is better to buy on quality, including both protein analysis and physical characteristics. If low quality hay is purchased, supplement costs will increase. The producer should buy hay with the quality to meet the particular animal's nutritive requirements without additional supplement.
