Plans for the restoration to be completed by July 4, 1986, are already being made. At that time, and again on the fine old girl's 100th birthday, October 28 of the same year, a week long celebration will be held.

Although many of us may never actually see the statue of liberty ourselves, we can be content to know that our help preserved her, and in doing so, will have insured that a small piece of her spirit lives within us, too!

The Statue of Liberty Restoration is a very worthy cause...think about it, and help if you can!

Prairiland Schools Will Begin August 19

Prairiland CISD has announced that all schools will begin on August 19. It had been rumored that, due to the extensive remodeling at Blossom and Deport Elementary Schools, a delay in opening might be necessary, but this is not the case.

The first day for teachers will be August 15, and Inservice for teachers will be held at Mt. Pleasant on the 16 and 17. The 18th of August will be a teacher work day.

Regular classes will start for teachers and students on Friday, August 19 and September 5 will be the labor day holiday.

Other holidays for the 1983-84 school year will be: November 24-25, Thanksgiving; December 21-30, Christmas holiday; January 2, teacher inservice; February 12, teacher work day; March 12-16, Spring Break, April 13, ice day if needed; April 20, ice day if needed; April 27, teacher work day; May 18, last day of school; and May 21, teacher workday.

December 20 will mark the end of the first semester of school.

At a meeting Monday night, August 8, the Prairiland Board approved the 1983-84 school budget.

It is as follows: Expenditures-\$1,972,384; Income-\$1,989,231. Breakdown: Payroll cost, \$1,486,749; purchase and contracted service, \$176,000; supplies and materials, \$186,134; other operating expenses,

\$46,835; debt service, \$35,320; and capital outlay, \$40,346.

The board adopted the revision of the student handbook.

Prices for adult lunches were discussed and changed: adult lunch, \$1.35, breakfast, \$.80.

The Board accepted the contract from the First National Bank at Deport for its depository bank for years 1983-85.

The First Baptist Church of Blossom will have a revival on August 14-19 at 10 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

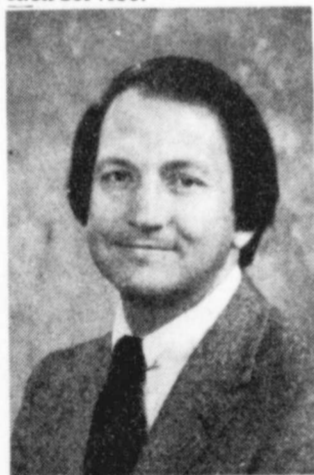

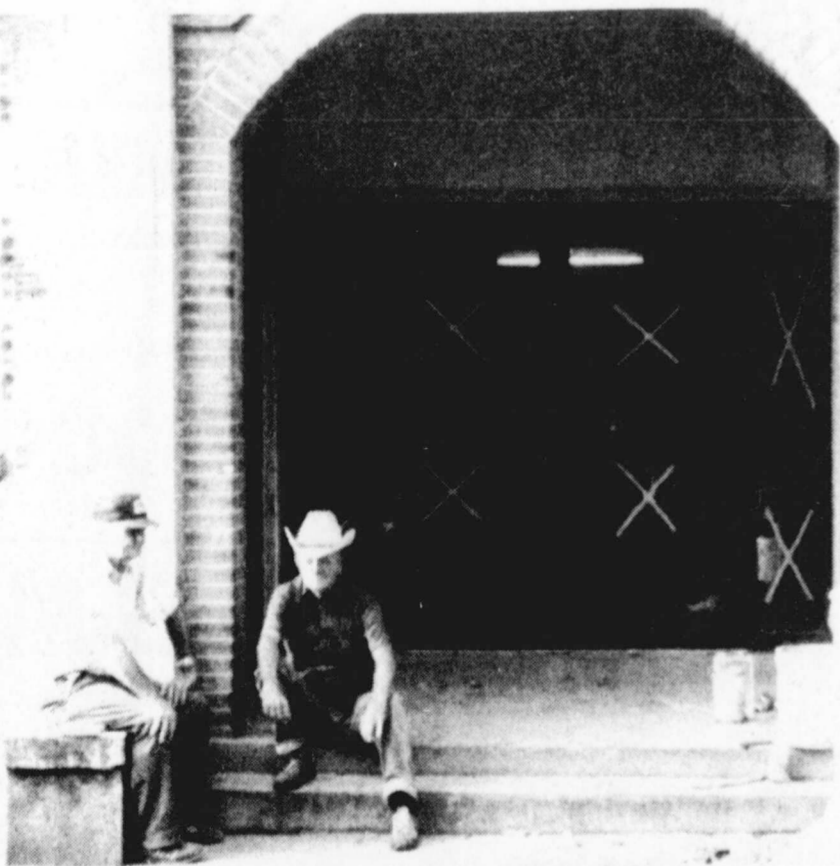

Was sitting in front of the air conditioner Sunday afternoon and got to thinking about how we used to spend our Sunday afternoons when I was growing up. There was no air conditioner or T.V. so we had to make do with what we had.

We used to go to a lot of singings held around the country. There were some country schools where they would have a singing every Sunday in the summer, and some pretty good singers would come. One of the best country quartets that I had the privilege of listening to was one from Deport that consisted of Sam Monk, Pony Cogbill, Morris Hobbs and Johnny McLemore. I have heard some of the best, or they were supposed to be the best, like the Stamps Quartet, but for my money, I liked the Deport group the best.

When I was young living south of Deport in what was called Lone Oak and Sam Monk would hold a singing school in the school house every summer and I never

could sing, but Mr. Monk would tell me that he had to have me come to the school so I could sing bass for him. Since I have thought about it, I know that all he wanted was just for me to come to the school so he would have enough pupils to hold a school. Anyway, all the young people in the community would go, and at the end of the school we would have a big singing. It was an all day thing with dinner on the ground. All the ladies of the community would fix their favorite dish and we would all sing all morning and at lunch time, the ladies would have the dinner all spread out under the trees, and believe me, after you have been cooped up in a hot building, all morning singing, it sure was a relief to get out in the open and have a good lunch.

I think that the Stamps School of Music sponsored all different singing schools and also the singings around the country and at the end of the summer they would sponsor a singing school in Dallas for a week and at the end of the week they would get all the ones who were in

the school to help them and they would have a big blow out that would last all Friday and then on Saturday they would start at ten in the morning and sing all day and all Saturday night and they would have all the best students and also some of the best quartets that they could get to come and help them. It was a big thing back in those days and people from all over the state and from other states would be there and some very good singing as there were some very good singers and some were professional singers would attend. It was quite an honor to be invited to appear on one of their programs at the end of their singing school.

They would have very big crowds every night and on Friday and Saturday they would have more than they could seat and they had a very big building on Jefferson Street in Dallas.

The Stamps bunch was also a music PUSHING HOUSE FOR GOSPEL MUSIC. They had their plant on Bishop Street in Oak Cliff. The singing

schools and the singing convention were quite a thing in the late twenties and early thirties, but they all have died out now, I guess, for the only place that you can go and hear good singing is out at Lone Star and if you have not been out and heard them singing, you should make a special effort to do so and I do know that the good people out there will make you feel right at home, so go out some night soon and hear them sing.



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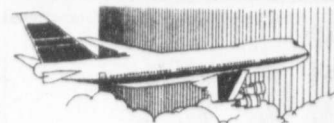
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Travel In Britain, Drivers Have A Different Outlook!

In last week's article, I mentioned just how innocently brave our little band of travelers were when we decided to chauffeur ourselves around Great Britain.

Perhaps an explanation might be in order. Well, it isn't learning to drive on the left hand side of the road, although that is certainly different...it is adjusting one's mental attitude in such a manner that survival is possible!

Because the average Briton is kind, courteous and helpful...until he gets behind the wheel of a car!

Then it seems that they all decide they needed to be where they were going on yesterday...and heaven help whoever gets in their way.

They also have a clever little device called a roundabout. This has saved the government millions of pounds in under and overpasses, we are sure. But it is a hairy way to introduce an American to traffic patterns, and there is one every few miles!

They are a complete circle, with various roads splitting off from the left hand or right hand lane,

depending how far into the circle one goes. These are not large circles, either, so one goes around with tires screaming, looking for the proper exit.

We had a lot less difficulty after finding out that if there is a broken white line across the lane we were in, it meant for us to yield! Until we found that out...well, I'm afraid we tried the patience of many drivers rather sorely.

The speed limits are 60 mph on the ordinary roads, and 70 on the dual carriageways...what we would call an interstate.

However, it seems more as if the limit on the carriageways is 100 mph. We were passed while cruising along at 80 as if we were standing still. And nowhere on the entire trip did we see a policeman giving a speeding ticket. That does not mean we didn't see policemen, they just didn't seem concerned about speed.

Another major adjustment is the fact that roads are beautifully surfaced, but have absolutely no shoulders. They are often lined with high rock walls, which sit exactly where the outside stripe would be on

one of our farm to market roads.

This takes some adjusting to, the walls whizzing by at high speed, only inches away from the car, and oncoming drivers do not hesitate to pass, even in the face of other drivers. Somehow, everyone squeezes over and makes room!

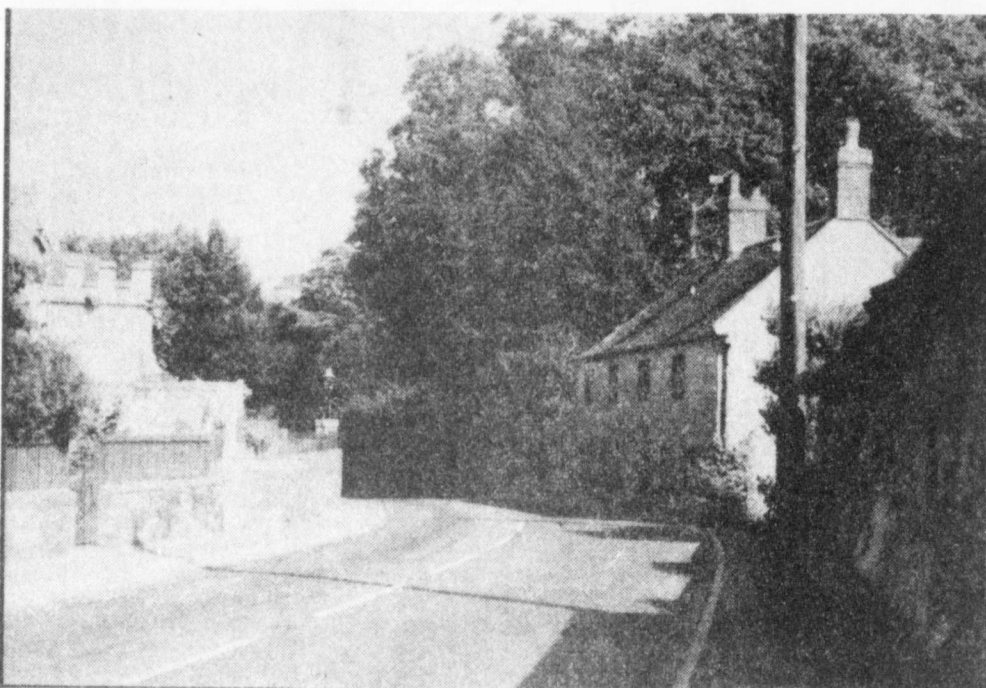
The country side is enticingly beautiful, but city traffic is absolutely beyond description!

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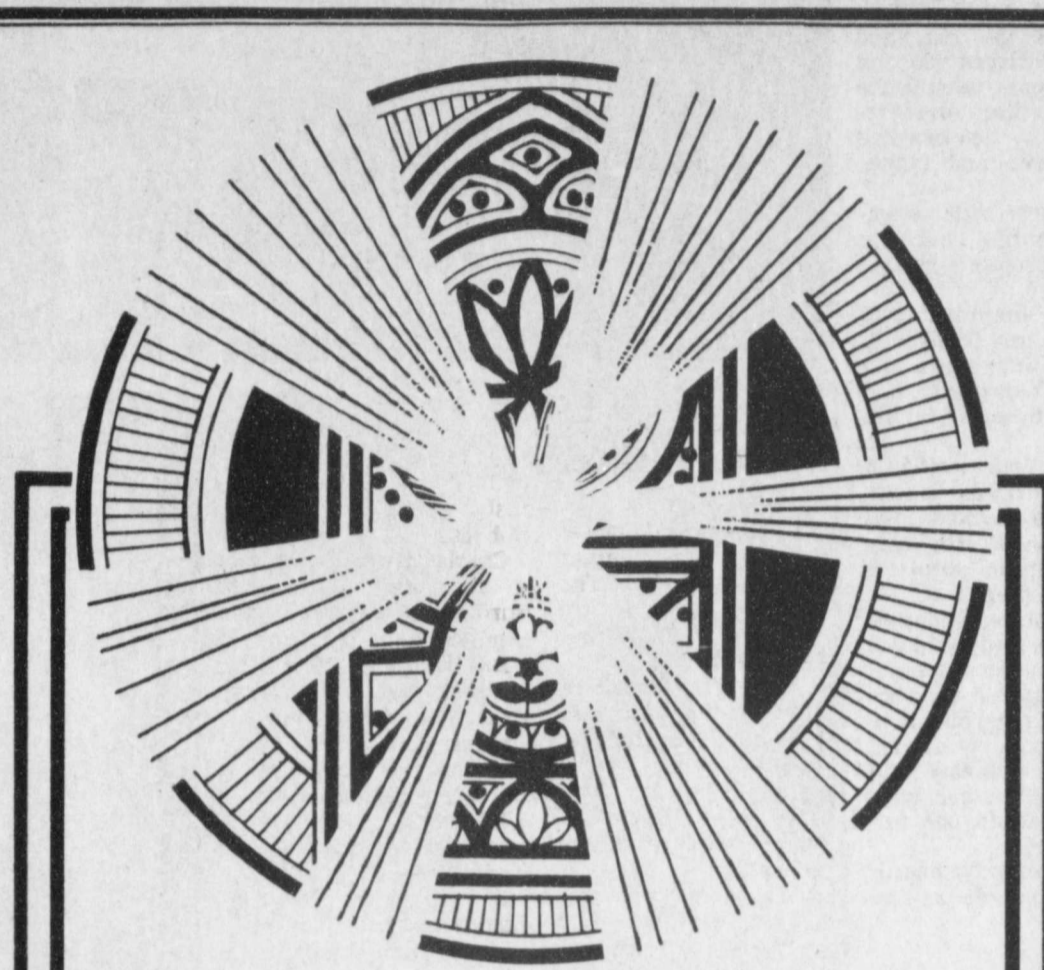

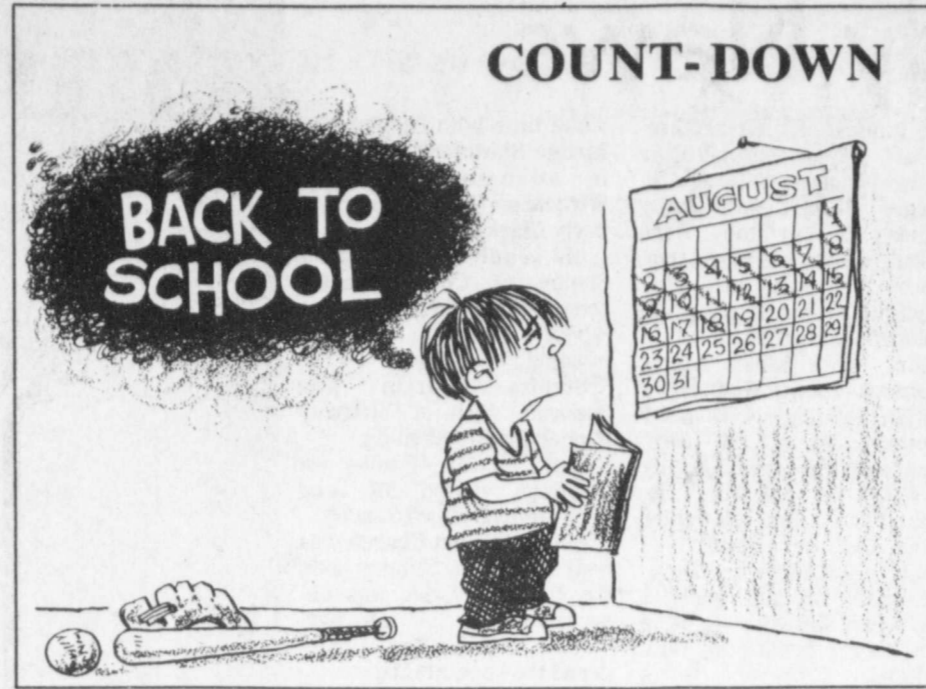

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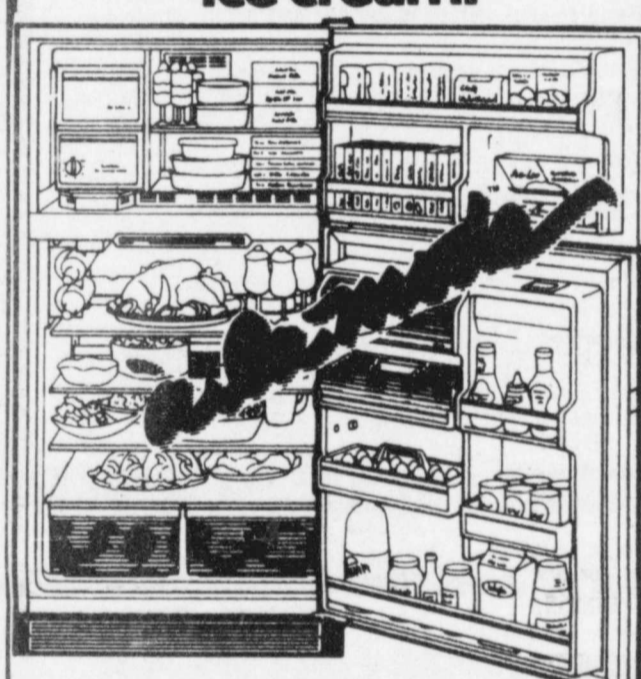

Weekly Agricultural Update

Lawn care has many problems and two of the biggest in this area are fire ants and bahia grass. With patience and a little work, both of these can be dealt with.

If the lawn is bermudagrass, DSMA or MSMA can be used to effectively control bahia grass. Follow label directions. If the lawn is San Augustine or carpet grass, spot treat the bahia with Roundup in a wick applicator. Bahia grows from seed, therefore, several years may be required for complete control. Some preemerge herbicides that prevent plants from growing from seed are approved for use in lawns. County Extension agents throughout the area have additional information on approved herbicides.

Fire ants in yards can be controlled by several methods. Amdro, an ap-

proved fire ant bait, can be used for small mounds. Amdro is slow acting and may take several weeks for complete control. Do not use Amdro when the soil is wet or just before watering the lawn. Wait until the dew is off the grass to apply Amdro and follow label directions. Wait at least two or three days before watering the lawn.

The quickest way to destroy established fire ant mounds is to treat them with one of the approved pesticides. These may be used in several forms, baits, powders, drenches or dusts. Diazinon, dursban or orthene may be used as drenches. MC 96 comes in a liquid form and is also a drench.

Orthene 75 percent soluble powder can be used as a powder. Diazinon or sevin are approved for use as dusts. Regardless of the pesticide used, label

directions should be strictly followed. Reinfestation of fire ants is likely to occur, therefore the lawn should be checked frequently and new infestations treated immediately. Additional pesticides may be available for fire ant control. Check labels for specific approvals, Robinson urges.

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

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

Area beef cattle breeders with bull consignments for the 18th annual Red River Valley All Breed Bull Sale should be making plans to make those entries with the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce.
Entry deadline is October 1, but changes in brucellosis testing this year make it necessary that a decision be made earlier. This sale is scheduled for November 28. The brucellosis restrictions that will apply to bulls entered in the sale will require bulls from non certified brucellosis free herds to have two negative tests 60 days apart. The last test must be made within 30 days of the sale. Therefore, the first test must be made prior to September 28 and there must be at least 60 days from that date to the second test.
Bulls from certified free herds may move without being tested. All bulls must have a TB test and Leptospirosis vaccination as well as fertility test.
Bull consignments must be between one and five years of age and weigh at least 1,000 pounds. They must also be registered.
The entry fee is \$25 per bull which applies to the sale commission of 10 percent of the gross sale price up to \$1500.

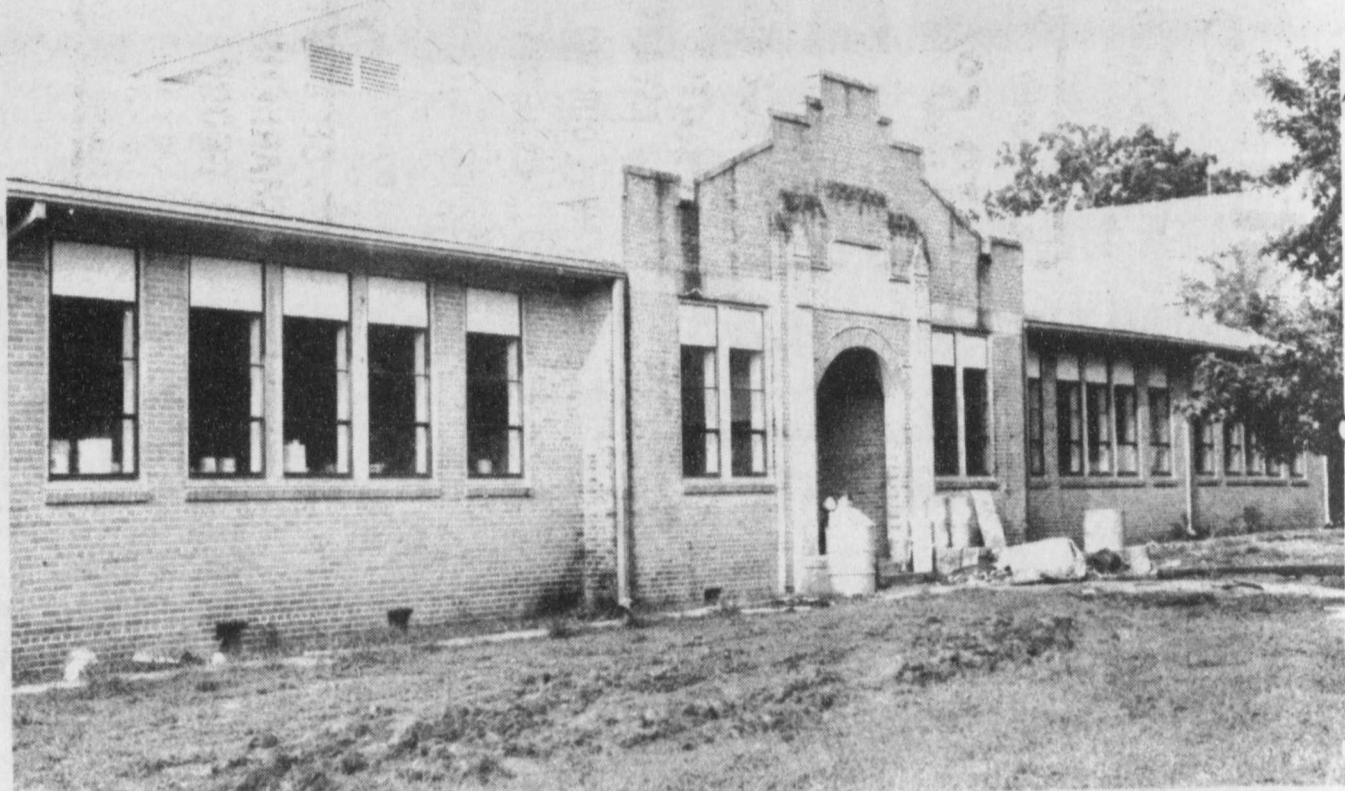
