Some preemerge herbicides that prevent plants from growing from seed are approved for use in lawns. County Extension agents throughout the area have additional information on approved herbicides.

Fire ants in yards can be controlled by several methods. Amdro, an ap-

The quickest way to destroy established fire ant mounds is to treat them with one of the approved pesticides. These may be used in several forms, baits, pwoders, drenches or dusts. Diazinon, dursban or orthene may be used as drenches. MC 96 comes in a liquid form and is also a drench.

Orthene 75 percent soluble powder can be used as a powder. Diazinon or sevin are approved for use as dusts. Regardless of the pesticide


