

## Soy Bean, Milo, Harvest Looks Good

 The other night, just before I drifted off to sleep, the brain pulled the old light bulb trick, and a strange thought sprang into being...what ever happened to all those crafts that have come into vogue and then vanished?  
 It really started me thinking about all the various projects that have come and gone over the years...most of which I tried my hand at.  
 Who remembers...way back in the 1950's, when my mother and every other lady around could be found scouring the roadsides for dried seed pods? They carefully sprayed them all gold, glittered them and arranged them.  
 Then everything was felt...felt telephone book covers, glasses cases, door knob covers...all beaded, sequined and decorated to the fullest.  
 During the 1960's era, crafts became more outrageous than ever. Tying-dyeing was a time consuming process that no gal felt complete without attempting!  
 Plotted shirts, bed spreads and jeans blossomed everywhere. And if tie-dyeing wasn't the thing, beads, feathers and leather braiding was.  
 Somewhere along that time arose macrame...some of which were very beautiful, some of which were big enough to sit in!  
 Embroidered work shirts kept us all busy for quite some time too.  
 How about decoupage...for a time anything that could be sealed away under layer after careful layer of varnish.  
 Then we turned to burlap flowers...and from there to carpet and pom pom flowers.  
 Not in chronological order here, but probably lodged in most folk's memory are: sequined or flittered fake fruit...antiqued salad dressing bottles decorated with shells, net Christmas trees, bois d'arc limbs turned into gumdrop trees, popsicle stick place mats and innumerable other crafts.  
 There was even a phase of hats created from cut-out aluminum can sides crocheted together. Or egg carton caterpillars!  
 Lately there has been a wave of latch hooking going on. The list is amazing, and occasionally amusing.  
 The basic fact that remains from this little ramble backwards is the fact that most of us enjoy creating something...and most especially if it is out of "nothing".  
 It's a hard urge to resist...so why try!

Area farmers are beginning to harvest early soybeans and milo crops, and are pleased with the heavy yields that they are getting so far.  
 A wet spring allowed milo heads to fill out, in spite of some losses to midge, a small moth which destroys the individual grains of milo.  
 Soybeans reaped much the same benefits from the rains, with a heavy bloom stage having enough moisture to keep the blooms on the plants and develop into a well-filled bean pod.  
 Many soybeans in the area will not be harvested until much later, however, since they were planted behind a wheat crop.  
 The dry weather which set in suddenly at the last of July may affect those beans.  
 Prices on soybeans are also up from last year,

partially because of the heavy participation in the PIK program, which cut down sharply on the number of acres of grain sorghum and soybeans planted.  
 Cotton farmers, however, are not nearly so pleased. The cool, wet spring and serious insect infestation has created a cotton crop that looks to be one of the poorest in many years, according to several area cotton producers.

Cotton prices are not up, even though the terrible drought situation in west Texas and the PIK program has reduced cotton acreage in the United States by an estimated one-third.  
 poor, in fact, that many

farmers figured spraying for the insects would cost more than the profit for increasing the yield would make. Others, however, initiated a late spraying program in an attempt to salvage what they could.

In all, farm prospects, the farming is the major source of income throughout most of the area, are somewhat better than last year. Hopefully the area's agricultural economy will improve to the point where

farmers will not constantly be on the brink of financial disaster and can once again make a reasonable profit.  
 Many agriculture experts, however, think that time may still be quite a way into the future.

Prairiland High School will begin classes earlier this year than in previous years. The first class will commence at 8:20 each morning this year.  
 The Blossom and Deport Elementary Schools will begin as usual at 8 a.m.  
 The bus routes, according

to High School Principal Gary Ballard, will run as they have in past years on the same schedule.  
 All schools will begin on Friday, August 19. Orientation for high school students was held on Monday, August 15.  
 The two elementary

schools have undergone extensive remodeling, with lowered ceilings, air conditioning, new heating systems and new windows being added.  
 Some construction will continue during the school year, but is not expected to seriously disrupt the school classes in any way.

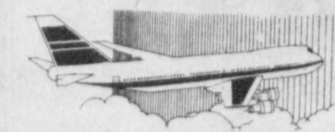
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# Travel In Britain, There Are Many Small Differences !

After commenting on a few of the language and attitude differences we discovered between Americans and our cousins over in Britain, I'll attempt to mention a few more.  
Wash cloths come to mind immediately. Why? Because in England there is no such thing! They have the most marvelous bath towels...about (no kidding) six feet long, three feet wide and very fluffy. They have hand towels as large as our bath towels...but no wash cloths anywhere.  
The British bathtub is delightful, very deep, very

big...and stoppered with an old fashioned rubber plug no matter how new.  
Shopping for food can be another experience. Except in the very large cities, there are no super markets. One goes from vegetable and fruit shop to the meat market...which displays cuts of meat, fish and poultry from hooks or shelves.  
Then a trip by the bakery and sweet shop, or a tiny store which handles canned goods.  
There is no such thing as a pre-sliced loaf of bread that we found. But oh, is that bread fresh and good!  
Every bed as two pillows per person...but no hotel room has an ice bucket or ice machine.  
That's because they don't

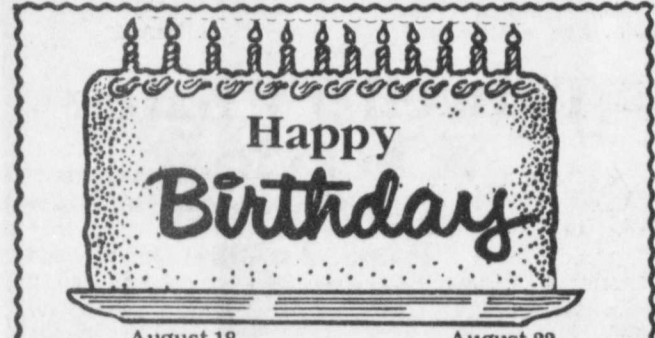
drink water. They just don't. Not in restaurants, not at home. Nor do they drink iced tea.  
In stores, wire racks will be sitting out stocked with canned soft drinks, all well known brands and some Americans aren't familiar with. The catch is that they aren't chilled at all!  
Hot tea or coffee is always available. But not ice water.  
We quickly learned and purchased a thermos which we had the restaurant at our

hotel fill with ice each morning. Then we would fill it with water from whatever tap we managed to find!  
That way we could make it through a warm summer day without dehydrating!  
Speaking of warm...the weather isn't. For them a 90 degree day is a ten or fifteen year rarity. So is bright sunshine. Most nights we ended up with a heavy blanket before morning.  
There is no air conditioning...not in cars, not in

buildings. Of course, there is no need for it.  
Another thing there is no need for...window screens. We were startled when we found our first hotel room with huge wide open windows without screens. We were more startled to realize that the reason is simple...there are no bugs!  
During our whole trip we counted two flies, one at the airport (probably hitched a ride from the States) and one, naturally, at our picnic!

Otherwise, no mosquitoes, flies or moths.  
As an East Texan, the lack of blazing summer heat and crawling summer insects (they have no ticks, no

chiggers to speak of) was perhaps the most fronted with a wide array of astonishing and pleasurable trivial differences, but none that mattered much!

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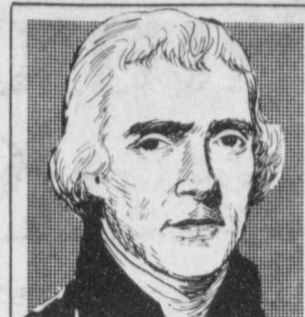

##### Carburetor Floats

Carb floats made of hollow metal and plastic or even solid plastic can become saturated with fuel or have a pinhole. This will allow it to sink and cause the fuel to flood the bowl. Your average mileage will be affected by consuming more fuel than necessary. This can be detected by hard starting for the first 15 or 20 min. after the engine has been cut off.
