Rivercrest Downs Prairiland In Opener

You can put the cat in the bag, but if you don't keep that bag tightly shut it will get loose! That's exactly what seemed to happen to the Prairiland Patriots last Friday night when they appeared to have a solid season opener "in the bag" until the last quarter of the

game, when the tough Rivercrest Rebels charged back to come from a 12-0 situation and downed the Red Pride 24-12.

The Patriots, led by the fine running of Mike Connot, Dennis Rhodes and Craig Gibson had a problem with their passing game until the second quarter, when they

passed on third down with 23 yards for a first down. Most of the first quarter seemed to be a see-saw situation with neither team going much past the center field for long.

The Red Pride QB Todd Davis threw a screen pass to first year player Joe Smith. Smith alertly lateraled the

ball to Craig Gibson who then charged all the way down for the TD.

Barry Johnston's extra point attempt failed, however.

At half time it was 6-0, and the highlight of the evening was definitely from the Prairiland Band. The first year band played several

selections, and formed a giant "P" on the field. Their performance was outstanding, and the crowd gave them a standing ovation.

At the first of the third quarter the Rebs fumbled the ball on the Prairiland 28 and shortly thereafter a roughing the kicker call and

two interference calls on Rivercrest gave the Pats a 1st and goal on the Rivercrest nine yard line.

Two plays later Craig Gibson squirted around the end to make the score 12-0.

With 2 minutes 7 seconds in the third Rivercrest's Randy Galloway broke loose from the 10 yard line for a TD.

Then again early in the fourth quarter Rivercrest's Kelly Jeffery passed to Scotty Goates for a tie-up score making it 12-12.

The Patriots were unable to get back on the board against a determined Rebel team. With 3 minutes and 43 seconds left in the game Kelly Jeffery, Reb field commander, faced with 4th and 12 passed to Bobby Thomas for a go-ahead TD that put the Rebels in front by a touchdown. The extra point was no good.

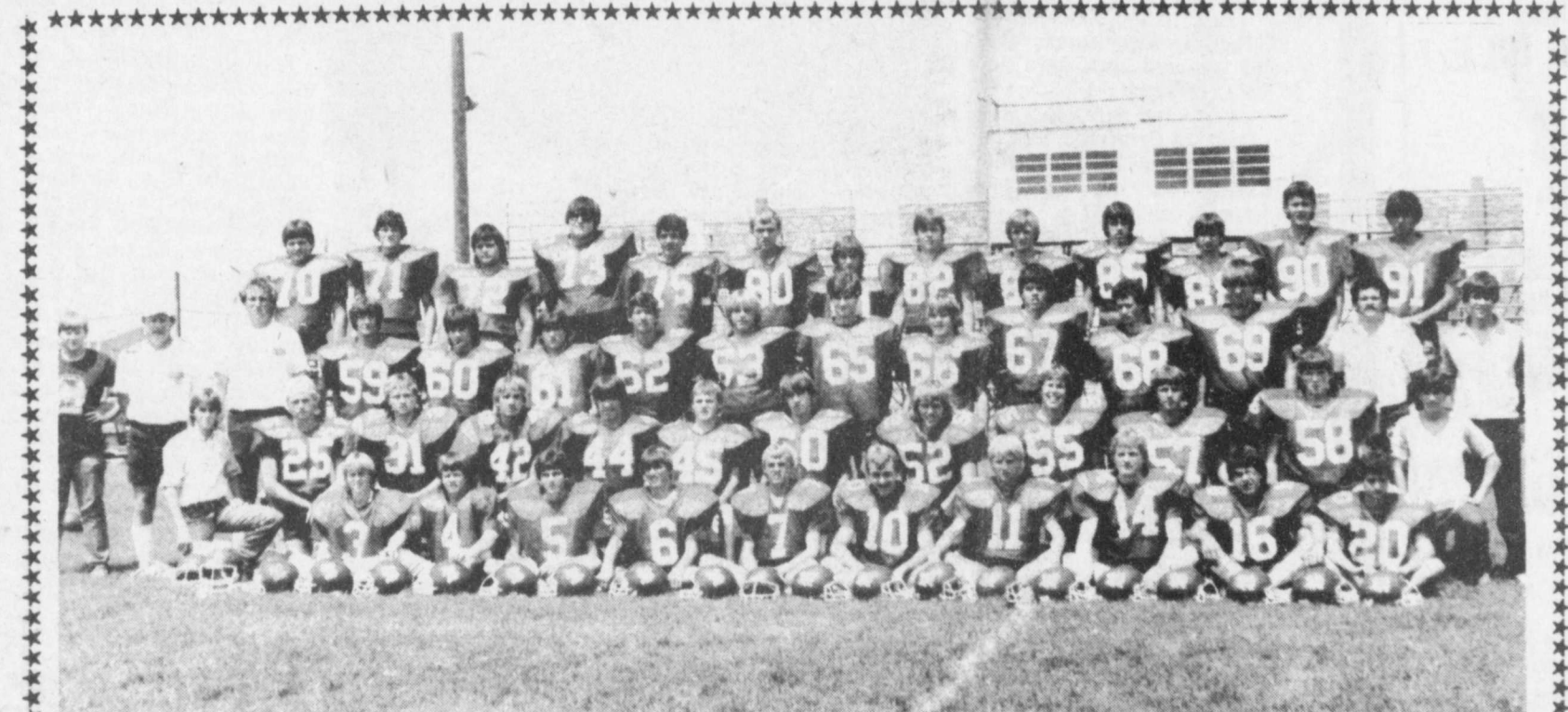
The Rebels finished their

breakout with an intercepted pass from Red Pride quarterback Todd Davis which was picked off by Rebel star Randy Galloway.

Galloway gathered in the pass on the Prairiland 39 yard line and streaked down field for the fourth Rebel score.

Again the point-after was no good, and the clock allowed the Patriots an almost hopeless task of scoring at least twice with 2 minutes and 32 seconds left.

Patriot Robert Cody carried the ball from his own seven yard line all the way to the Rivercrest 45. Todd Davis fired to Vern Barker for another good ground gain to the 27 yard line, but the Rebels stepped in and broke up pass attempts twice in a row, running the clock out and giving the Rebels a 24-12 victory.

Poll Shows People Want Tougher Drug Laws

Three out of four Texans believe the state's drug laws are not tough enough, Dick Collins, President of the Texas Foundation for Conservative Studies, said today.

The results of a statewide poll commissioned by the

Texas Foundation for Conservative Studies (TFCS) in which one of the questions sought to find out what Texans think about the state's drug laws.

"A clear majority of Texans—74.6 per cent—said that our drug laws are not

tough enough. Only 6.9 per cent felt that the drug laws were too tough.

"This indicates to me that Texans want stronger anti-drug laws from our state government. The overwhelming consensus in the state is that our laws are not

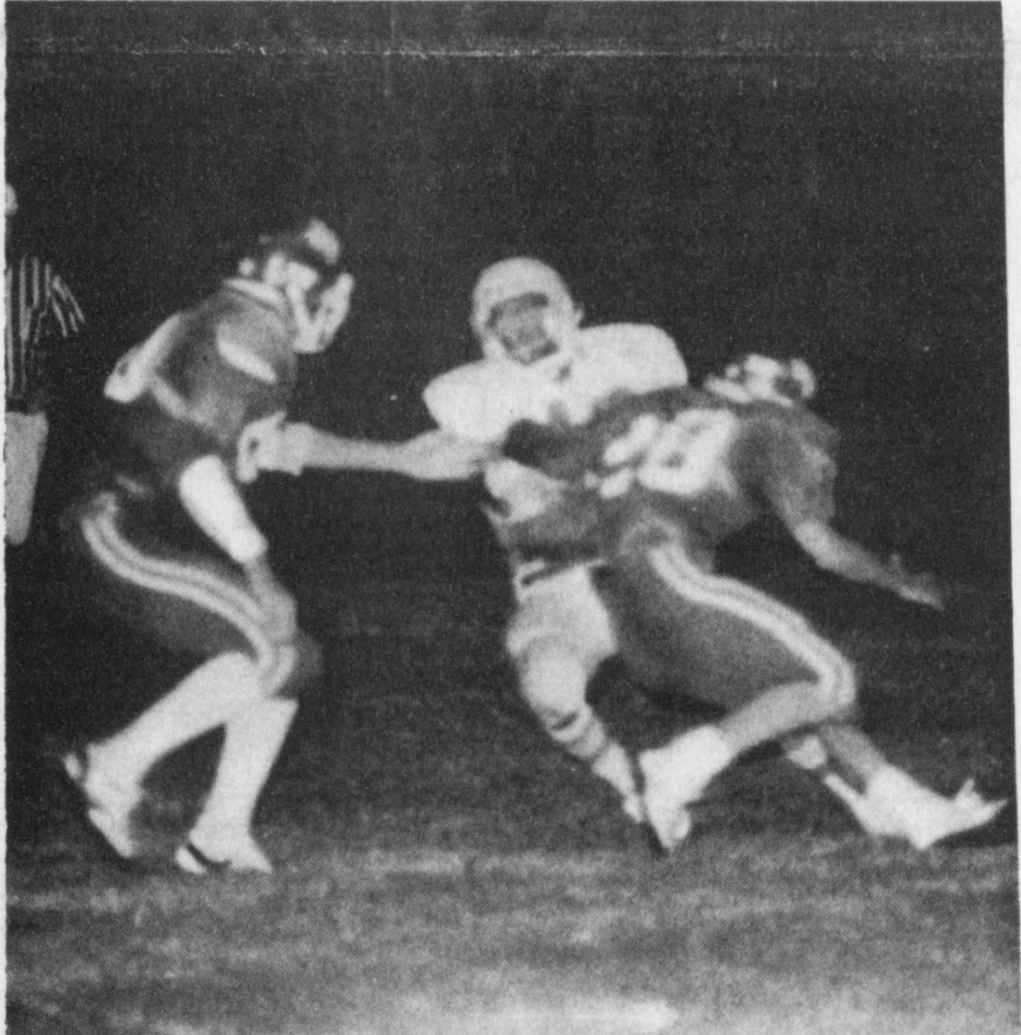
tough enough on drug abusers."

The poll was conducted by Arthur J. Finkelstein and Associates, a nationally recognized polling firm and is accurate within plus or minus 4 per cent at the 95 per cent confidence level.

"The view that Texas' drug laws are too weak increases among Texans, women, hispanics and older Texans.

"By geographical area, Texans along the Border, by the largest majority, feel the state drug laws are not tough enough, with 89.4 per cent of those residents wanting the drug laws strengthened and no one answering that the state's drug laws are too tough," Collins said.

The clear support for stronger drug laws is evident in every part of the state, and cuts across ideological and party lines, Collins noted.

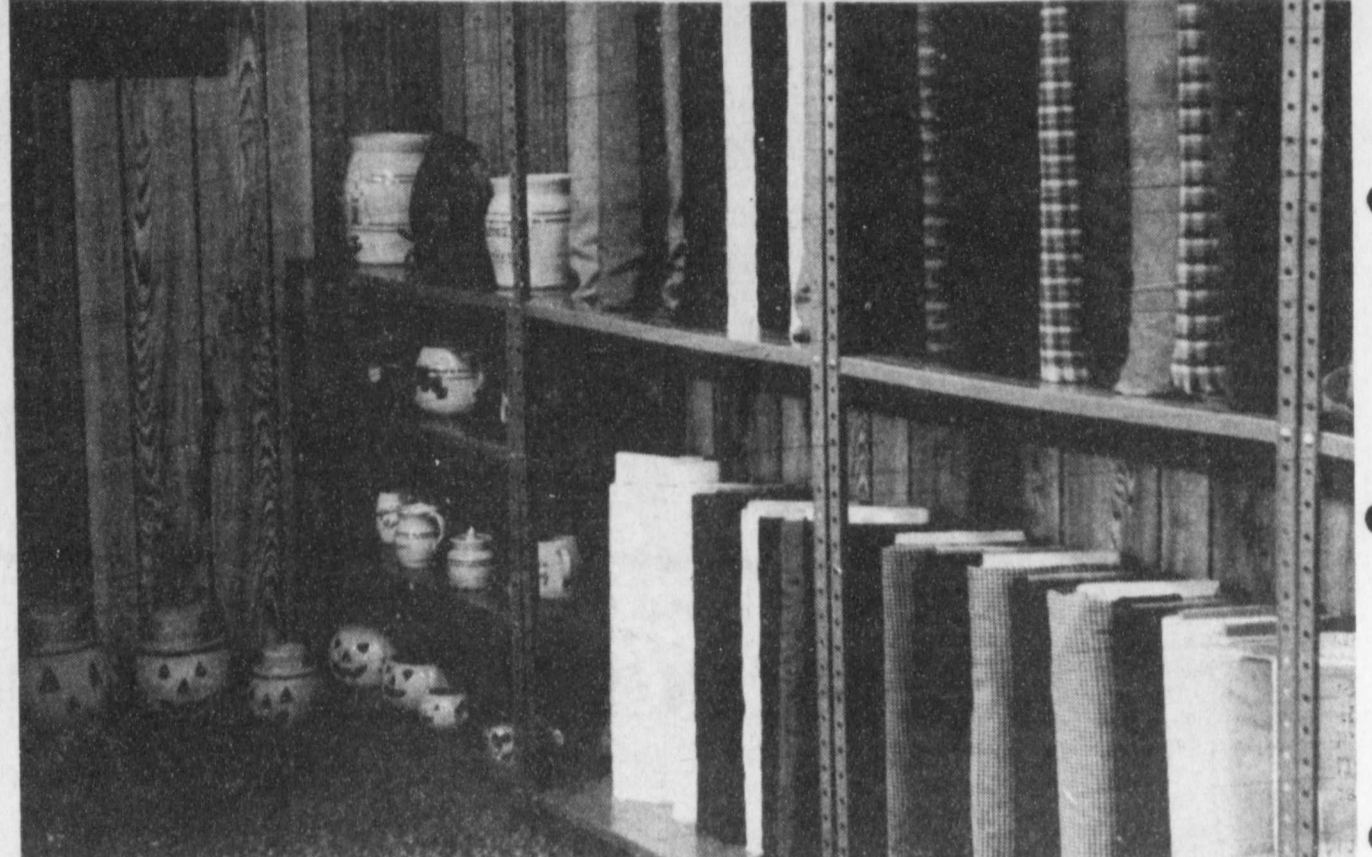

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Footprints From The Past

Living on the farm or in the country back in the twenties or early thirties could get boring if you did not have something to occupy your time as there were no TV's and not too many radios.

You could not go to the movies very often, as we did not have the good roads or good cars that we now have, so we were just about stuck with what you could do at home so we visited a lot in those days and we could play a lot of dominoes and flinch. How many of you remember flinch?

We used to have some really spirited games of flinch, as the whole family.

In the winter when the weather was bad, the men folk would gather at someone's home and have some really good, hot domino games and they would last all day or until it was time to go home and feed the stock and milk the cows. The stock always had to be taken care of, no matter what else there was to do.

Most of the farmers had at least one team of mules and one cow to be milked and also two or three hogs to feed, so you can see that there was plenty to do on a farm, but there was also plenty of time to do other things like playing dominoes and flinch or a lot of other games that we played to help pass away the long winter nights.

The days sure did get to be long and cold especially if there was something you had to do on the outside when it was cold and raining. I remember one time just after I had gotten married and I was helping my father-in-law plant some oats. We were in what we called the grey land part of the farm.

It had been snowing and the ground was frozen and you could hardly keep your plow in the ground it was so hard, sometimes it would jump out of the ground and you would have to back up the team and plow to where it had jumped out of the ground, as it would not take the frozen ground.

I kept telling Mr. Edwards that we were wasting our time as the seed could not come up, but he said we had plenty of seed and as we had nothing else to do, we might just as well be doing the spring planting. I thought some spring planting and it snowing so hard that you could hardly see.

Well, I could hardly wait until the spring of the year so I could say I told you so and to my surprise that was the best stand of grain that we got and also made the most, so I never did get to say I told you that the crop would never be any good.

Some days all we got to do was get up, build a fire, feed the stock, milk, eat breakfast and play dominoes all day. There were three of us and we would play heads up with the one who was sitting out getting the wood for the fireplace and the wood for the cook stove.

We would eat two meals a day and play dominoes until time to do the night chores, then we would eat our evening meal and then the whole family would either go to visit someone or they would come and visit you and then you would play flinch until bedtime. Sometimes there would be three or four families at one house and then you would sit up two or three tables with some playing flinch and some playing dominoes.

We did have fun and we got to know our neighbors and also had time to talk and be a family with our brothers and sisters. They were good old times and when you think back over them, they seem like they were better than they were.

Recycling Isn't New!

Recycling is a way of life today. We read and hear about many things being recycled: paper, metal, fibers of all kinds, petroleum products and many more that I don't know about.

At the risk of telling my age let me tell you this. As I swept off the front porch this morning, a thought ran through my mind- 'I wish I had a tub of wash water to scour this porch.' You might ask, 'What has that to do with re-cycling?' Don't you remember wash days? If you were fortunate, you had three wash tubs plus a wash pot for boiling the whites. The first tub was warm sudsy water with a rub board for scrubbing the dirty clothes, then the next tub was clear water (the first rinse) and then the third tub was cool bluing water. When the wash was done and hung on the clothes line and garden fence to dry you had these three tubs of water left. Here's where re-cycling originated. The soapy water could be used to scour the porches, scrub the kitchen or mop the linoleum.

Notice the methods used- scour with a broom, scrub with a brush or rags (on hands and knees) and mop with a string or rag mop. The rinse water was used to wash off the soapy water. The wash water could also be used to bathe the dog or cat (if you could hold it). But best of all, if you were lucky, the kids could just play in it.

Remembering the day set my thoughts re-cycling. It was a pretty exciting day for kids. I especially remember wash days across the road at my grandmother's. She had a nice shady place in the back yard with a long bench that held all three tubs. And the wash pot was the biggest in the neighborhood. Even the dinner on wash day was special- maybe a big pot of boiled cabbage with cornbread. Nearly always a l-egg cake, covered in plum or berry jelly and still warm from the oven. Or a butter roll, the likes of which I haven't tasted since.

I don't care to go back to the tub and rub board days but sometimes I still wish I had a tub or warm sudsy wash water and maybe just a bit of that jelly cake
