The Prairiland Patriots proved to be quiet a surprise to the Northeast Oklahoma Vikings, who came from Oklahoma City thinking they would roll over the Patriots.

Dennis Rhodes punched through the line for the score, and Barry Johnston, who has proved remarkable

accurate this year, made good the PAT.
The biggest problem in the game was the typical behavior of the Northeast Oklahoma team.
Just as last year they played in an undisciplined, very disturbing manner.
Head Coach Chet James commented that "that contract is over, and we won't be seeing them again...ever".
That, for all concerned,

seems to be the best. One can only pity other teams who have to put up with the Vikings regularly.
The Vikings earned themselves 20 penalties totaling 210 yards, including nine personal fouls. That doesn't count what went on where referees couldn't hear or see!
James comments that although the Vikings are individually good athletes, they just aren't a good team.

Playing under such conditions is difficult, and the Patriots did a remarkable job of "keeping their cool" against verbal abuse which could easily have sparked fighting against a less sportsmanlike team!
Leading the Patriots in yardage that night was Mike Connot, who had 101 yards, out of the 113 the Pats racked up.
That compares to N.E.

Oklahoma's 155.
The Patriots had 11 first downs against 17 from Oklahoma, completed one pass out of 14, and lost and regained one fumble each.
Penalties...well, 50 yards against the Patriots, 210 for Northeast Oklahoma.
It simply will be a delight this Friday night for fans to watch the Pride take on the Mt. Vernon Tigers for homecoming in what will probably be one of the most

exciting games of the season, and, if past years count, also a cleanly played, disciplined game that will typify what high school is all about.
Kickoff will take place at 8 p.m., with homecoming ceremonies at halftime, and fans are urged to come see this head-on clash between two teams that play the same kind of football.

It will be held, in conjunction with the other homecoming week activities, at the Prairiland Cafeteria, from 7 to 8 p.m.

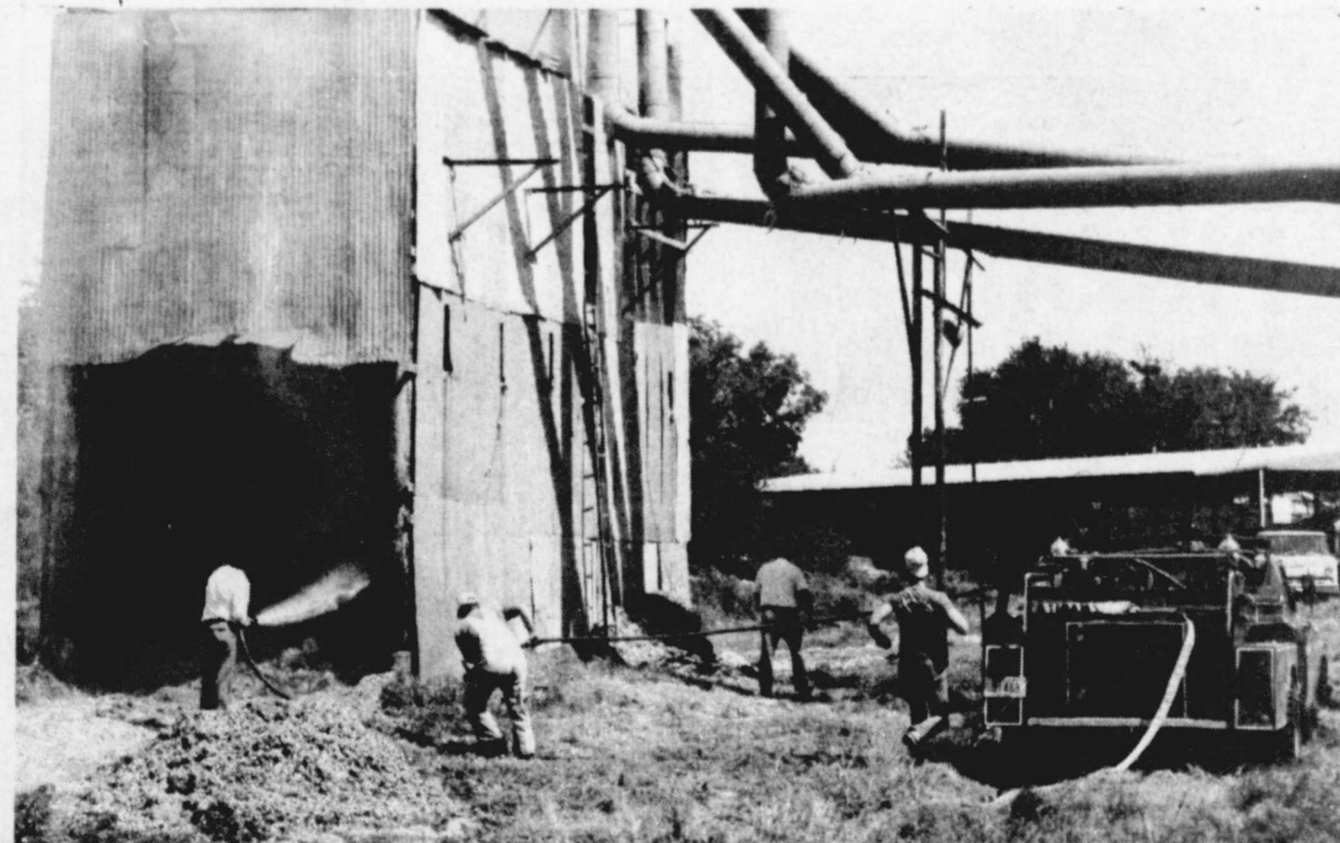

All students and ex-students are encouraged to attend events and especially the football game against the Tigers.

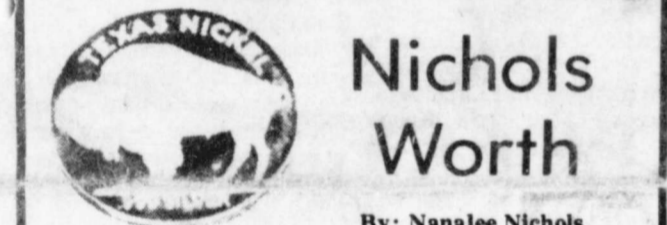


Dear Nanalee:

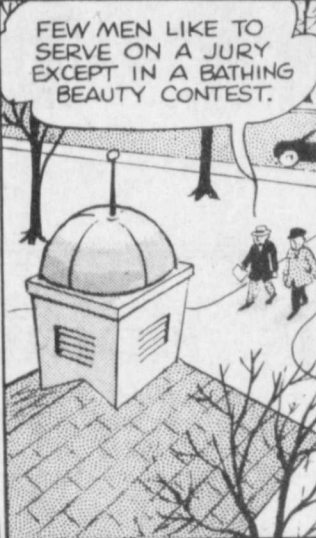
