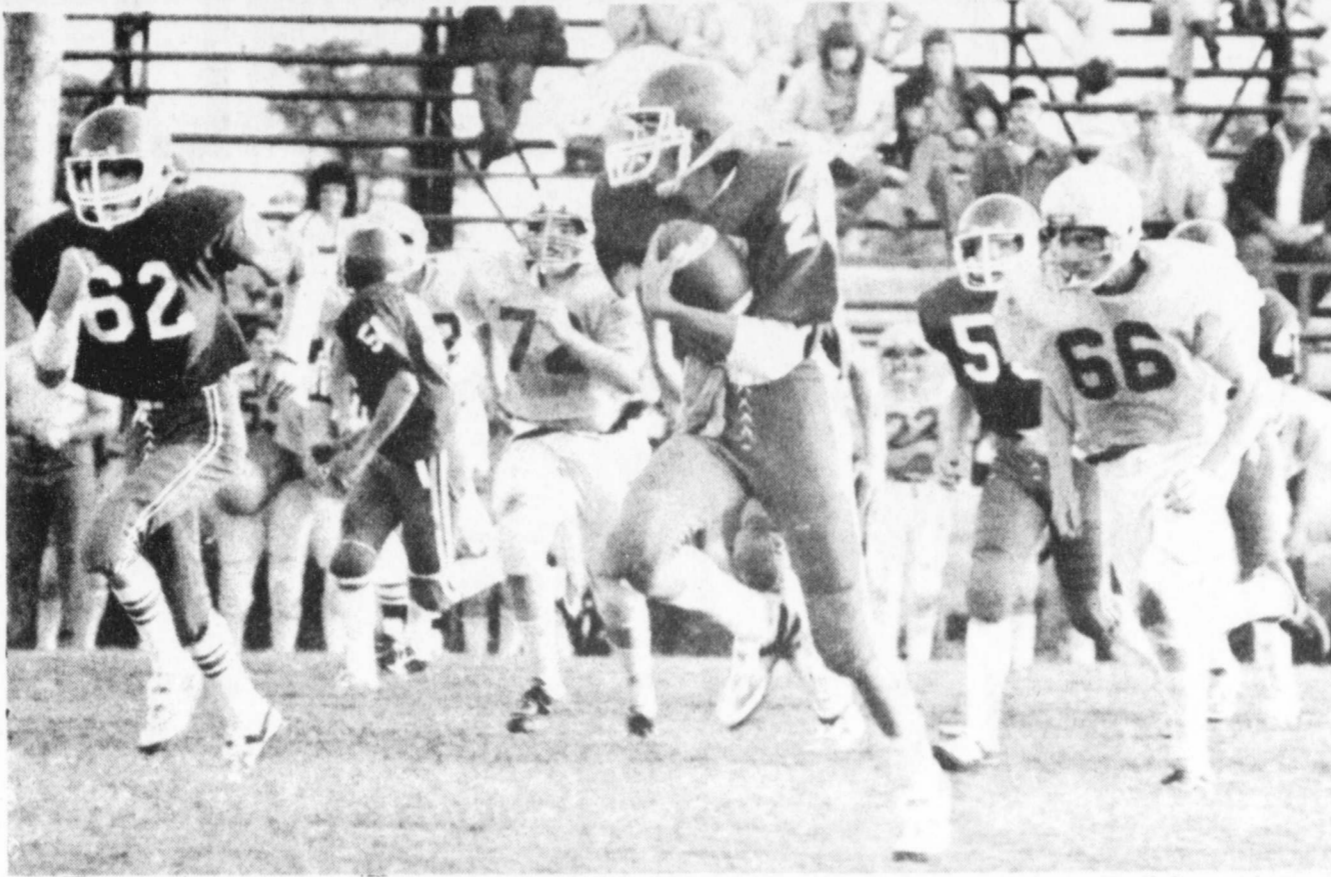

Heavenly Angel Cake Surprise

This old-fashioned cake has a surprise pineapple cream filling.

- 1 pkg. (14.5 oz.) angel food cake mix
- 1 can (8 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Juice
- 2 1/2 cups whipping cream
- 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
- 1/4 cup toasted chopped almonds
- 1 tbsp. sugar

Prepare cake according to package directions. Drain pineapple well, pressing out excess juice with back of spoon. Whip 1 cup cream. Fold in pineapple, cherries and almonds. Slice and reserve a 1-inch thick layer from top of cake. Cut cake around outer sides and inner sides, leaving about 1-inch thick border. Remove inside cake with hands; break in chunks. Fold into pineapple cream. Spoon pineapple mixture into cake hollow. Cover cake with reserved top. Whip remaining cream with sugar. Spread over cake. Refrigerate 2 hours, or overnight. Makes 8 to 10 servings. *Reserve juice for beverage.

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CRA Finals To Be Held In Tulsa

The Central States Rodeo Association has announced November 3-6 as the dates for the Central States Finals Rodeo to be held in the Fairgrounds Pavilion in Tulsa.

This year, as an added feature to the Finals, recording artist Johnny Lee will be appearing on Friday and Saturday nights, during the rodeo and afterward for a special concert-dance.

Added money of \$21,000, plus special prizes of saddles, buckles and trophies will be awarded to the champions of seven rodeo events. This year's total of awards and prizes totals well over \$80,000.

The Top 15 qualifiers in the seven major championship events of rodeo are eligible to attend the Central States Finals Rodeo. Many qualifiers are repeat

finalists, many are new faces that will appear at the Finals for their first time.

Among champion contenders that will be featured at this year's Finals are Jim Martin of Canadian, Texas who will be trying to garner his fifth consecutive bareback riding championship. Martin leads his nearest competitor well of \$1,500.

The All Around category is being led by Charles Hiner of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, who leads by some \$1,300 going into the Finals this year. He has a lead over Paul Foreman. Both Hiner and Foreman will be competing in two events at the Finals this year, Hiner in bareback riding and bull riding and Foreman in calf roping and team roping.

Eldon Day of Okmulgee, Oklahoma has literally dominated the steer wrestling event in the Central States during 1983. He is credited with having possibly the best team of steer wrestling horses in the business today, an asset to any successful steer wrestler. Bobby Gage of Pryor, Oklahoma, sits in second place for year end honors.

And in the bull riding, it's Gary Hiner of Cuthand, Texas who has set all the records again this year. Not only will he be shooting for his fourth straight Finals average win in the Finals this year, he will be looking for his second title championship, which is mathematically sewn up. Hiner holds the Finals record for the highest marked ride during the 1981 Finals, he scored an exciting 89, two times and in 1983 set an all time record for winning the most money in the bull riding in the history of the CSRA. He has collected over \$12,000 during the regular rodeo season.

Livestock for the bareback riding, saddle bronc riding and the bull riding at the 1983 Central States Finals Rodeo has been selected from herds based in Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Only the tops of the herds have been selected for an appearance in Tulsa. Celebrated bulls such as K-Bob of the Wing Ranch Rodeo Company of Bogata, Texas and Bad Medicine of the Diamond L Rodeo Company of Stilwell, Oklahoma will be pitting

their ability as bucking bulls against the Top 15 bull riders in the association.

All in all, the Central States Finals Rodeo is deemed to be good watching, total family entertainment. It is the

culmination of one year's hard work of over 1,800 active members, 30 stock contractors and 130 individual rodeos within the realm of the Central States Rodeo Association.



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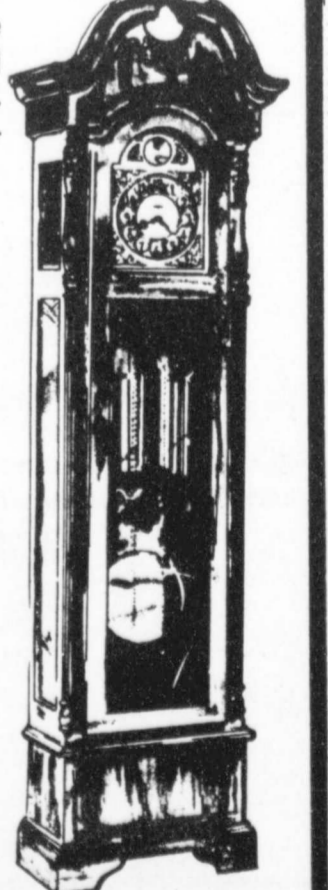
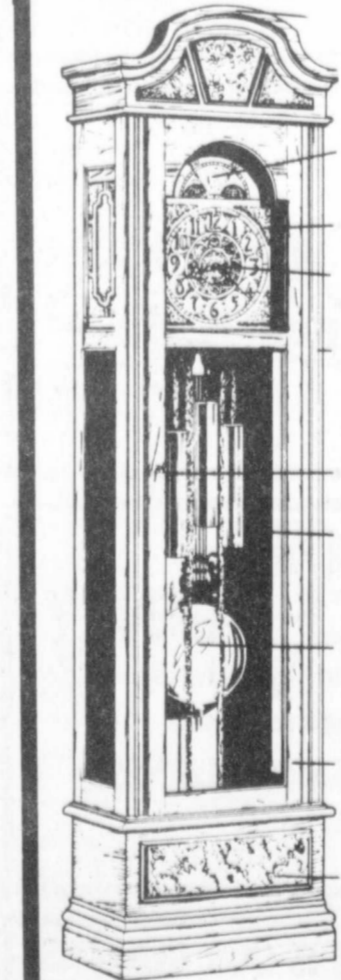

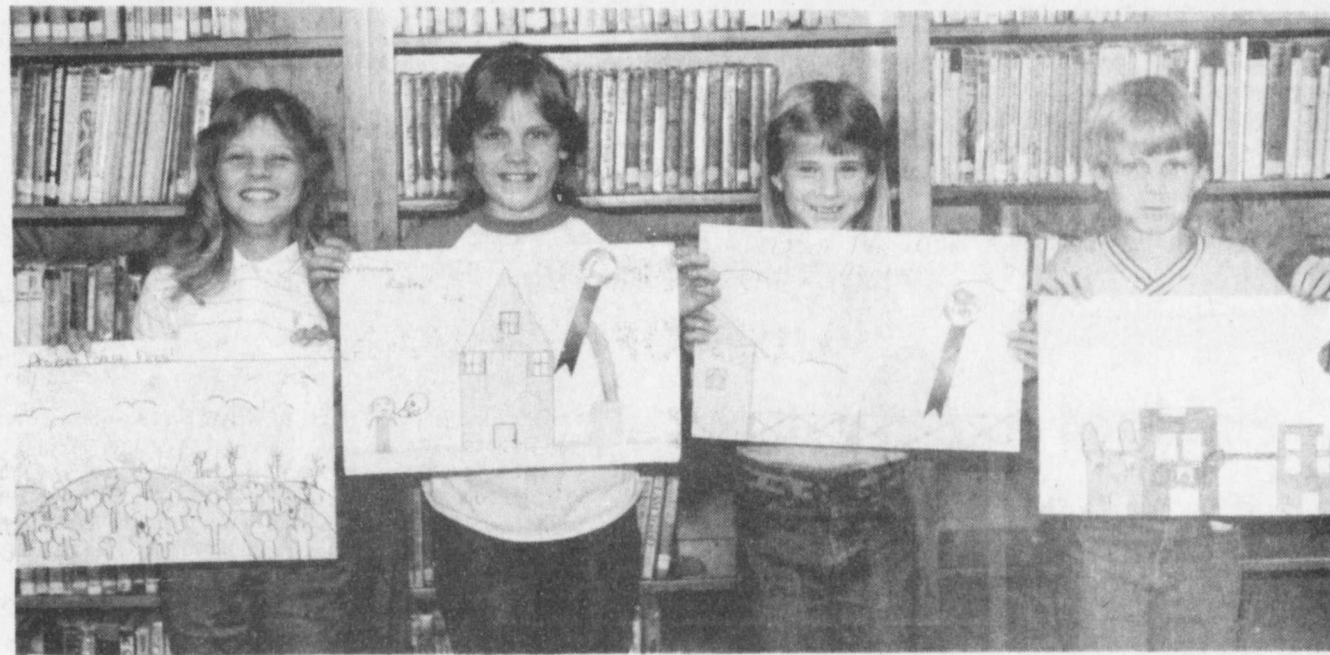

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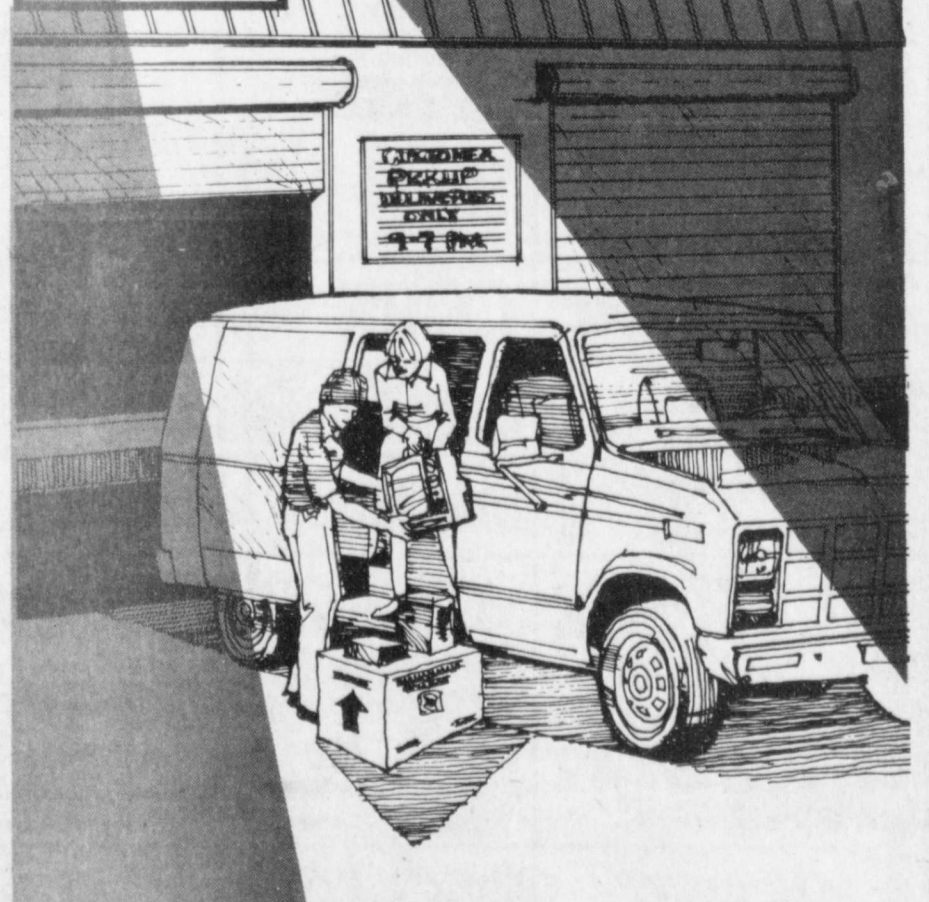
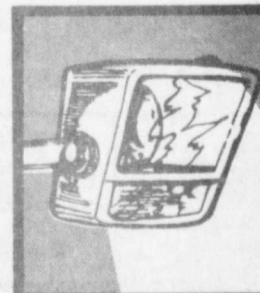
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PATRIOT Volley Ball Scoreboard

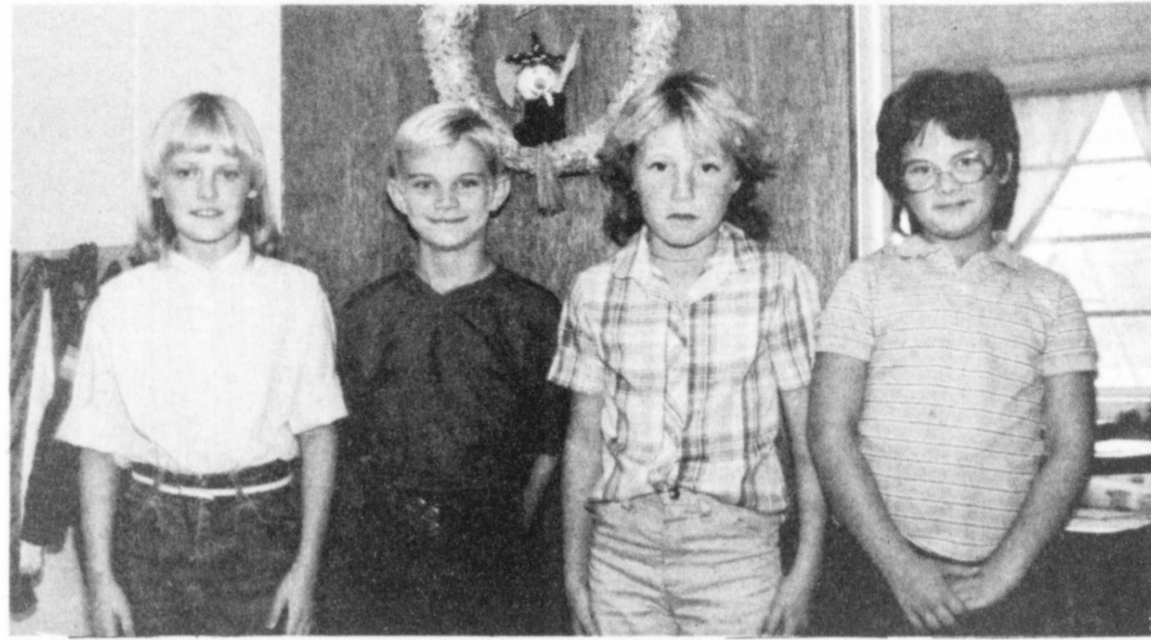

Chicken Breasts with Rice

- 4 chicken breast halves (about 1 1/2 pounds)
- 1 tsp. seasoned salt
- 1 jar (2 1/2 ounces) sliced dried beef, cut up
- 2 medium stalks celery, chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1 small onion, chopped (about 1/4 cup)
- 1/4 cup margarine or butter
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 2 tbsp. snipped parsley
- 1 jar (1 ounce) pine nuts (optional)

Place chicken, skin sides up, in ungreased 10x6x1 1/2-inch pan. Sprinkle with seasoned salt. Roast uncovered in 400° oven 30 minutes.

Cook and stir beef, celery, onion and margarine in 8-inch skillet until celery is tender; remove from heat. Stir in rice, parsley and nuts. Remove chicken and drain fat from pan. Spoon rice mixture into pan; place chicken on top. Roast uncovered until chicken is golden brown and done, about 15 minutes.

Let me tell you that that was a long walk on the old gravel road but I made it there and back and we fed the sardines to Pluto and in three or four days he

was as good as ever and he lived for us to have many more good times with him hunting and just playing with him like boys do with their dogs.

About a year after he had the close call with the sore mouth he just disappeared one day and we never saw him again. We don't know to this day if some one run over him or if he just went off somewhere to die. We looked everywhere for him but had no luck. I still wonder to this day what happened to Pluto.
