

# Deport Times In 75th Year Of Publication

This year the Deport Times is celebrating its 75th year of continuous publication.

The newspaper has been serving the community of Deport and the surrounding area since February 8, 1909, and at present has the highest subscription list it has ever had except for two years during World War II when over 600 copies of the paper went to overseas servicemen alone! That was in addition to the regular

subscription list. The paper currently goes to Africa, Alaska, Hawaii, and almost every state in the union.

The Deport Times was originally established by Claud Council, who sold the paper to Sam C. Holloway in 1912. Holloway published the paper until his death in 1960. At that time the estate operated the publication with George Grant as editor. Grant, who began his employment with the Times in

1916, purchased the paper, as well as the Talco Times and the Bogata News, also owned by Holloway, from the estate around 1963.

Grant sold the three newspapers to Robert and Patricia Wright in 1973. The Wrights remodeled the office, removed the old hot type presses and generally advanced the growth of the paper.

The Wrights created the Blossom Times in 1976, and all four papers were pur-

chased by Nanalee Nichols in 1982. Nichols, who had been employed for five years by the Wrights, is the current publisher-editor of the Deport Times, as well as the other three papers.

Deport had other newspapers before the Times made its appearance. Lack of patronage made them cease publication within a year or two each time. There was the Red-

Mar named because it served two counties, Red River and Lamar, which

splits Deport. It was published by Bill Crooks, who later moved to Rosalie and established the Rosalie Courier.

The Deport Triumph, and the Deport Chronicle were both in and out of existence before 1905.

During its 75 years the Deport Times has covered many news events both world-wide and local. The first World War, the second, Korea and Viet Nam have

all been covered and the news of promotion and tragedy alike has appeared as local boys served.

During the course of its many years the Times has seen the schools change from one-room school houses at every tiny community to four...East

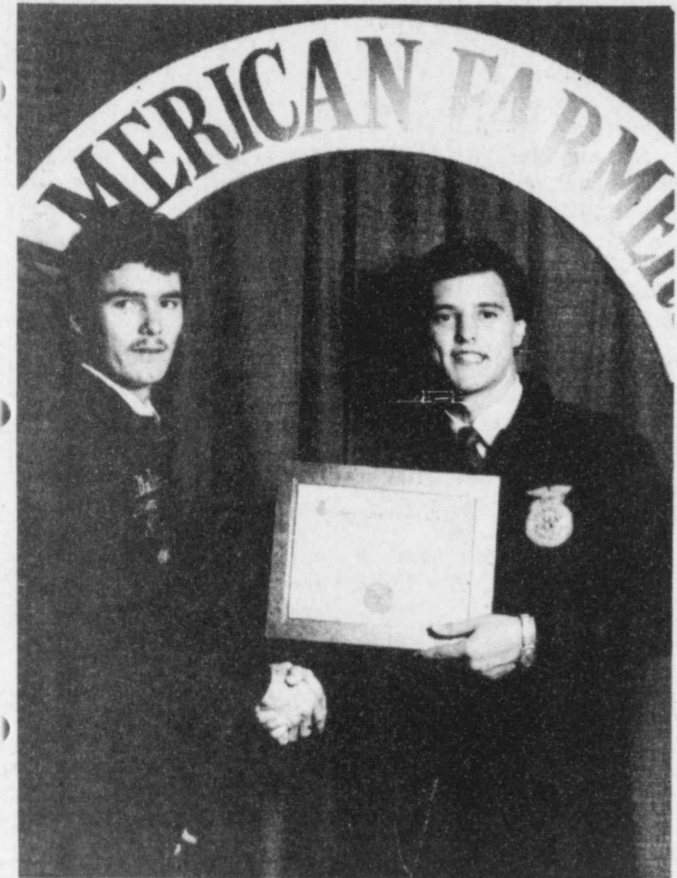
Lamar, Deport, Cunningham and Blossom...and then the combination of those four to the Prairiland School complex that serves the area today.

The goal of the Deport Times has always been, and will continue to be service to the community and area. It provides coverage of local news, sports, and politics that the larger daily papers cannot, and is proud to continue its upward trend.

Except for the First National Bank the Deport Times is the oldest business in Deport under continuous operation and with the same

name. It has acquired numerous awards throughout its history, the latest ones being for sports photography and local column. Stacks of plaques, too many to hang, are stored in the archives of the paper.

All in all the Deport Times serves as an excellent example of a small town newspaper operating with local ownership and interest.

## Local Sales Tax Sent Out Early

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent city sales tax rebate checks a full week early because many taxpayers paid by the 20th of last month—as all taxpayers will be required to do this month.

"We're sending these checks early because 134,000 Texas taxpayers paid before the deadline," Bullock said. "This kind of cooperation among taxpayers is helping us avoid new and higher taxes. It's obvious this change will help local governments put these tax revenues to work faster in

their cities." Starting in November, all taxpayers will be required to file by the 20th of the month instead of by the last day of the month.

The earlier deadline set by the Legislature will bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Bullock said this month's early payments "show that Texas merchants have accepted this change in the same spirit it was suggested—to save us from a tax increase."

Bullock's office has been

working with trade and professional organizations to inform taxpayers of the change.

He left Garvin Wednesday and happened to some hard luck on the road, losing his pocketbook containing about \$700 in checks, drafts and cash. 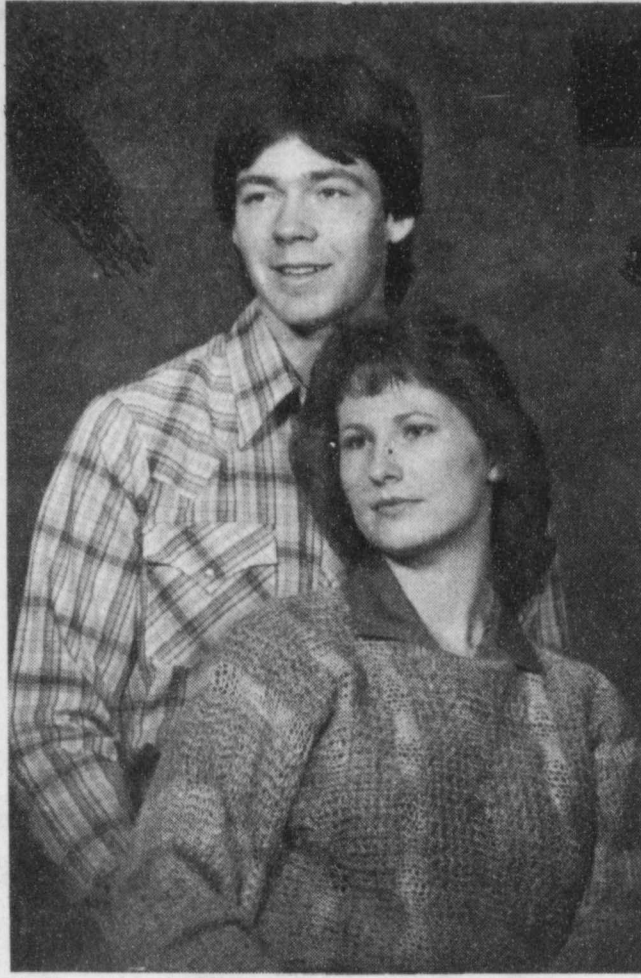

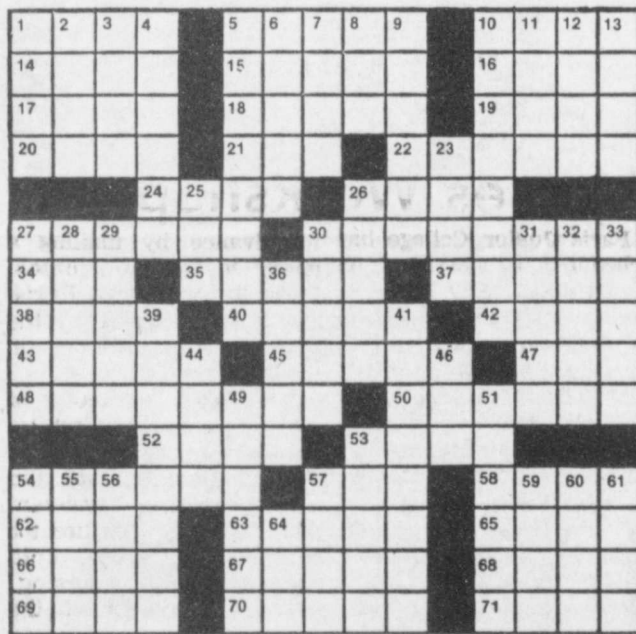

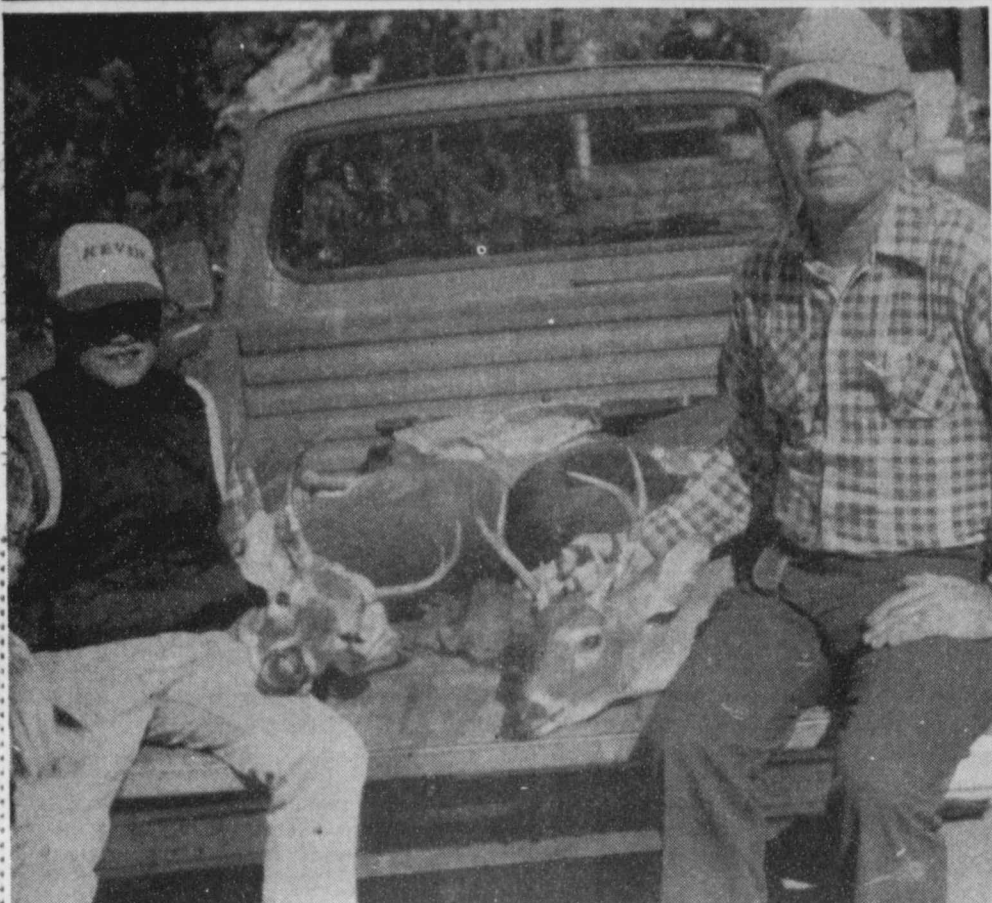

## Judge Fisher Announces Project Approval

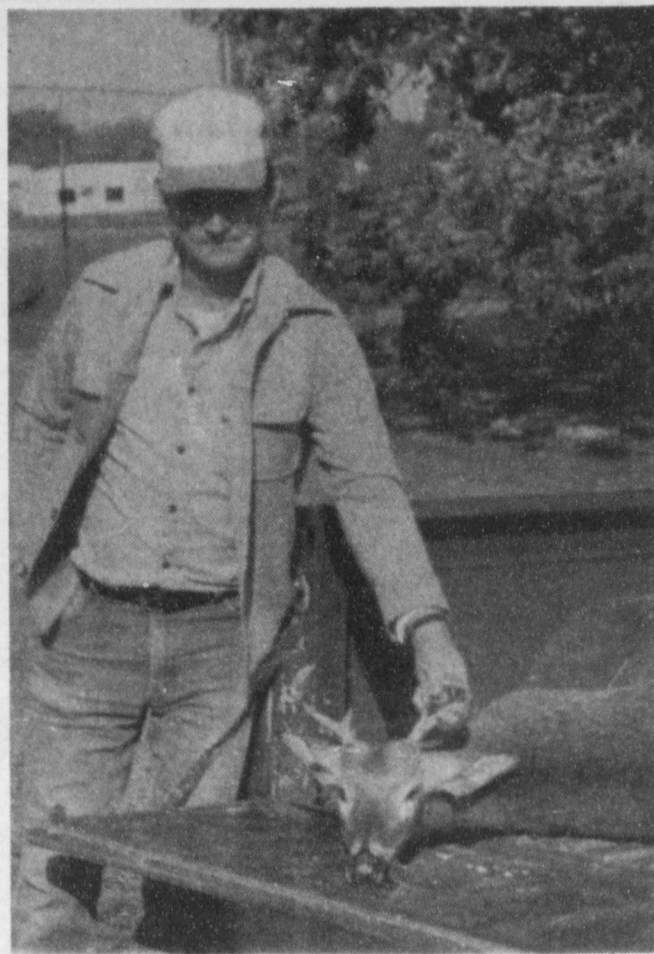

## Spray Fruit Trees

### Now Control Diseases

Fall is often the time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer, notes Bob Moody, county agent.

Moody says that applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the six diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is in the fall with a copper-containing fungicide such as Kocide 101.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding damage to trees, Moody explains. Copper is a metal and may cause severe defoliation unless applied correctly.

He advises spraying when 70 per cent of the leaves fall off the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide, Moody notes. But again it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliage burn.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the trunk and main limbs.

Fall spray in northern Texas is most often applied from late October to November 15. Application time will vary with the season, so Moody suggests checking your fruit trees closely.

Fall spraying is important to the health and production of fruit trees, Moody says, because there's no other time when 50 per cent of peach and plum tree diseases can be controlled with one spray.

## BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

### Wood-Burning Stoves Can Reduce Heating Costs

I am about to spend my first winter in the Midwest. Winters were never a problem in Southern Florida, so I have concerns about things like driving in the snow. I think I worry most about home comfort. My wife and I purchased an old home that is attractive and liveable. However, it is heated by a gas-fired furnace and it is not too well insulated because the sides are brick and the front and back are partly cedar shingles. It does have a full basement in which there is a usable fireplace. My neighbor tells me that the monthly gas bills are something else and say that I could save on heating costs by installing a wood-burning stove in the fireplace location. Is that a good idea?

Many people who use them say that wood-burning stoves do reduce their heating bills. Basements are a good location because the heat rises. The system works well if you have a venting system that allows heat to enter individual rooms. How much you can save depends upon how well the home is insulated and what you must pay for the wood you burn.

### Cheddar-Tuna Quiche

- ¾ cup uncooked long grain rice
- 3 eggs
- 2 tbsp. butter, melted
- 2 tsp. chopped parsley
- 1½ cups (6 oz.) shredded Cheddar cheese
- 1 can (6½ oz.) tuna in water, drained and flaked
- 1 cup milk
- ¼ tsp. salt
- ¼ tsp. dry mustard

## Plan Your Spring Garden

Gardners should have their soil tested about every two years, and if new ground is being broke, it is especially important to have the soil tested. The soil test will tell you the nutrient requirements needed for your plants.

To collect a soil sample the soil needs to be moist but not wet. Dig out a handful of soil at a depth of four to six inches. This should be done in several spots in the garden. Each handful of soil should be placed in a large container and mixed well. From this mixture, you need about 4½ pint of soil. The County Extension Office can supply a container and tell where to send the sample for testing. The regular test has a cost of \$4. and the regular test plus iron, zinc and manganese is \$7.00.

If your tomato plants had blossom-end-rot last summer, you should consider adding limestone or gypsum to your garden soil. Blossom-end-rot is partially caused by a calcium deficiency and adding limestone or gypsum will help correct the calcium deficiency in your soil. An application put in your garden now, will provide the benefits next spring.

Limestone also has a loosening effect on a heavy clay soil. If you thought about using sand in your clay soil to loosen it don't do it. The result may be a concrete-like mixture harder than the original clay. Use limestone.

Ground limestone or dolomitic limestone can be used. Ground limestone is less expensive and is easy to apply. Dolomitic lime has 20-30 per cent magnesium and 30-50 per cent calcium. It's available in both hydrated and ground stone types.

The more concentrated forms of lime such as the hydrated or burned lime forms should be used in lesser amounts. One-hundred pounds of ground limestone is equal to about 74 pounds of hydrated lime or 56 pounds of burned lime.

A soil test will give the recommended rate of lime needed for your soil.

If you haven't already prepared your garden site for the winter, then now is the time to get it cleaned up. Many disease problems can be prevented by practicing

good sanitation. Plant parasites often overwinter in refuse from last year's crops. Pulling vines, stalks and overripe fruit is an effective way to control plant diseases and bacteria. If these parts of plants show any disease, they should not be put on the compost pile but sealed in plastic bags and sent to the disposal.

Several things have been mentioned to help you prepare your garden for next spring. However, now is also a good time to decide on the types of vegetables you plan to plant. Variety selection is important. Visiting garden centers, seed stores or browsing through seed catalogs will help with new ideas.

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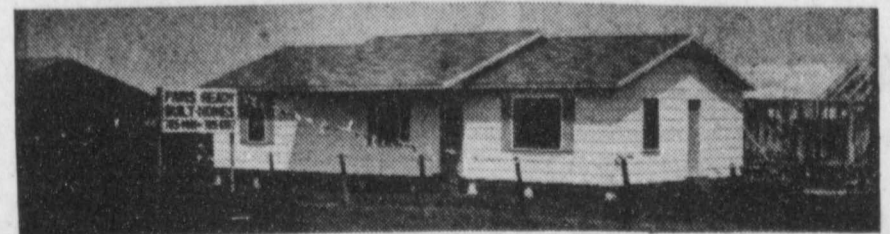
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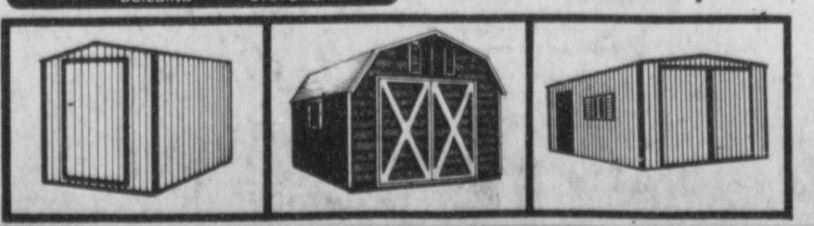

**MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE IN TEXAS 1982 AND 1983**

Washington, D. C., Nov. 14.—The Department of Commerce announced that, according to the returns received, there were 80,000 marriages and 69,738 in 1982, representing an increase of 16.4, or two-tenths of one per cent.

During the year 1982 there were 14,711 divorces granted in the state, as compared with 15,120 in 1982, representing an increase of 381, or 2.5 per cent.

There were 103 marriages annulled in 1982, this being the first year for which statistics of annulments have been collected.

The estimated population of the state in 1982 was 23,212,000. On the basis of these estimates, the number of marriages per 1,000 population was 34.2 in 1982, as against 33.4 in 1981, and the number of divorces per 1,000 population was 2.0 in 1982, as against 2.0 in 1981.

**31,662 BALES GINNED IN RED RIVER COUNTY**

Cotton ginned in Red River county prior to Nov. 1, amounted to 31,662 bales. On the reporting date last week, the county had ginned 15,056 bales. Cotton ginned in the county during the month of October totaled 17,188 bales against 8,450 last year.

There were 38,987 bales of cotton ginned in Lamar County from the crop of 1982 prior to November 1, 1983, as compared with 19,826 bales ginned to November 1, 1982. To state it more clearly, twice as much cotton has been ginned over, than was reported on November 1, last year.

### Texas Highway Dept. Planning For Future

Responding to massive future population projections for Texas in the latter part of this decade, and into the next century, the Texas Legislature this year authorized the expenditure of \$28 million for the coming biennium earmarked for public transportation.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, through its public transportation fund, is responsible for disseminating the funding for various public transportation programs throughout the state.

There will be, conservatively 21 million Texans by the year 2000, compared with 14.2 million in 1980," said engineer-director Mark Goode. "You can imagine the impact this will have on transportation and transportation facilities."

The monies provided by the legislature will enable major cities to work toward solutions to current and projected traffic and transportation problems.

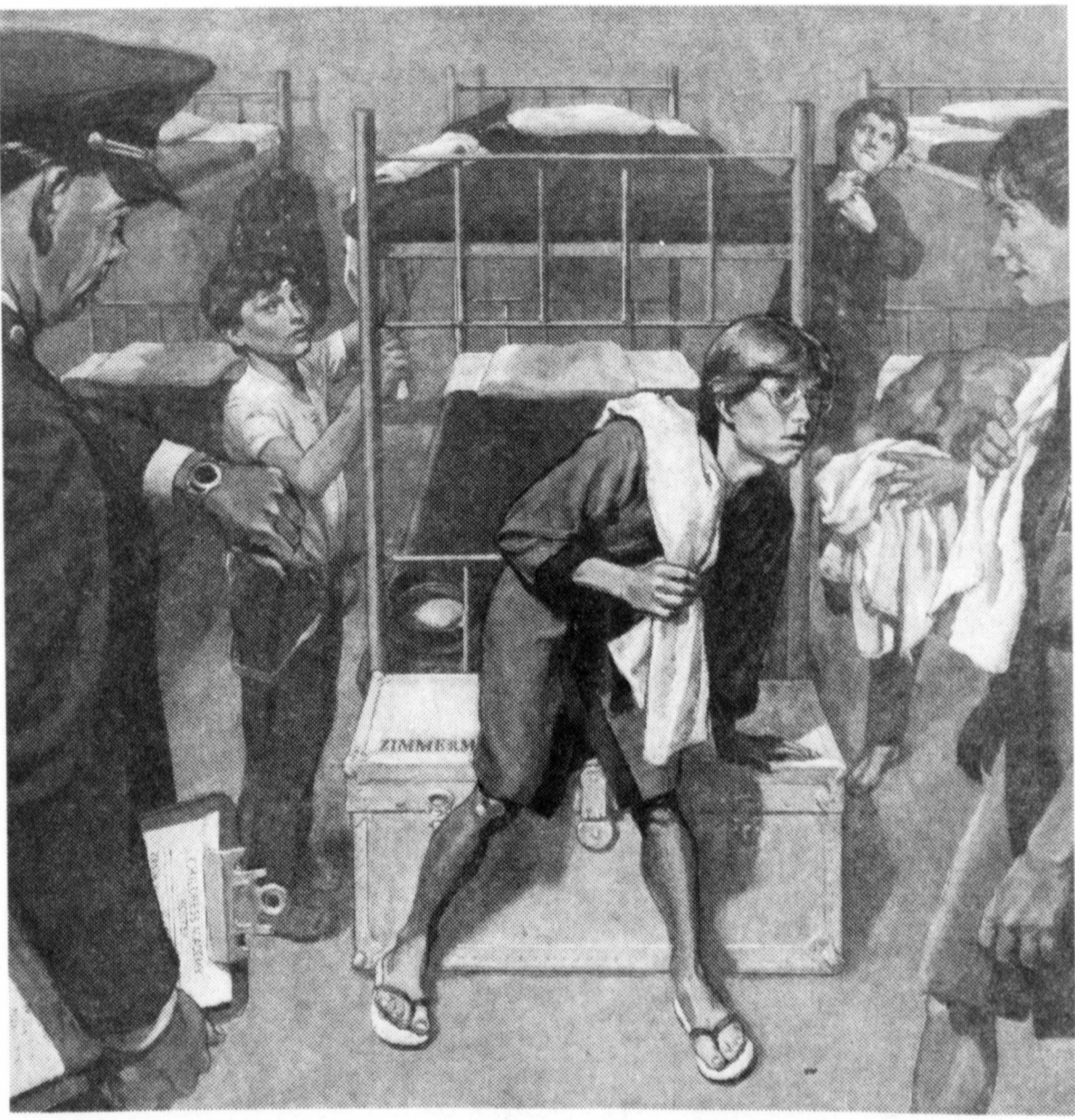
