DPS Releases Accident Statistics

The Texas Department of Public Safety has released the accident summary for October, 1983 for the North Central Texas area, commanded by Captain J.A. Dumas. For the counties of Lamar and Fannin County the area supervisor, Sergeant John Hanna has released the following accident data for the highway patrol for the month of October. For Fannin County the highway

patrol reported a total of 10 accidents, with no fatal accidents, 3 injury accidents with 5 injuries and 7 property damage accidents, for Lamar County the Highway Patrol reported 30 accidents, with no fatal accidents and 11 injury accidents involving 25 injuries, and 19 property damage accidents. Sergeant Hanna request the assistance of all motorists in each county in keeping the

accident toll to a minimum, especially with winter fast approaching. Be sure to watch your speed during the winter months because of the probability of ice being on bridges and windshields. 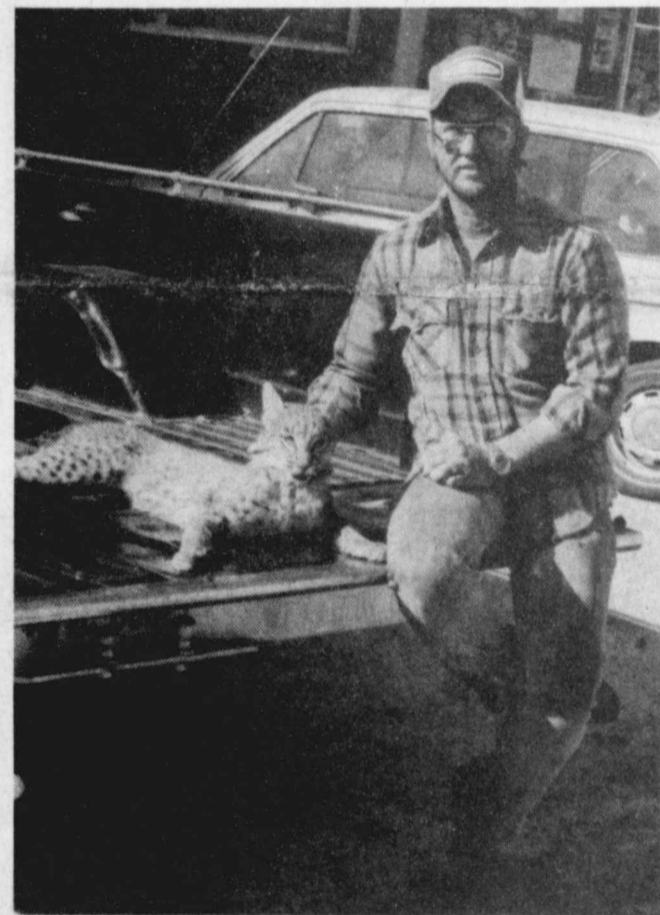
was about playground equipment. Most of what we have now is old and is in need of renovation or replaced by new ones. Mr. Martin also announced school will be closed

It is a wonderful thing to discover something special is even better than believed! Last Friday night we went to Jefferson with friends to hear James A Michener speak.

For many years I have devoured any book he wrote, and am among the many people who think he is one of if not THE foremost contemporary novelist of today.

But people are seldom as special in real life as they are in the imagination, so it was wonder and delight that we sat, enthralled, as this tower of intelligence, instead of giving a speech, simply fielded question after unplanned question with ease and narrated illusions and replies. He was far more intelligent than even his monumental writing indicated.

Currently Michener is working on a massive novel on Texas. That was the reason he was available for speaking in a town the size of Jefferson.

One of the things he said needs to be repeated and repeated. He pointed out that talent was one of the most common things possessed in this world...and one of the most commonly wasted! He urged anyone with the inclination to write, to draw, to create in any way to do so.

At seventy-six years of

age he considers himself not in the least diminished creatively, and expressed sorrow over the many lives filled with a talent or skill that goes unused.

It is truly a lesson we all should take to heart.

At a reception afterwards we debated whether to try and meet him personally or not...and found him not standing in a formal reception line, but rather sitting, relaxed in a comfortable chair in the corner of the den. He spoke briefly and graciously to all who came by, laughed happily, and left people feeling stimulated to do better things with their lives.

I plan on trying to do better and hope that sharing this brief story will prompt others to think about their talents...and to use them, instead, as we often do, letting them lie for fear of failure!

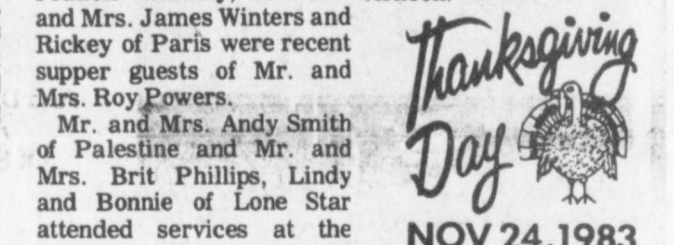

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Continental Officially Announces Rate Increase

Continental Telephone of Texas has officially announced that it has agreed on a compromise settlement with the Public Utility Commission of Texas regarding its recent request for increased rates. The Commission has approved an annual increase of \$1.769 million, effective November 3, 1983.

Director of Public Affairs, Loma Allen, Jr. stated that while his firm feels that the original amount of its request was fully justified, they are nonetheless pleased with the PUC decision. "This decision approved and established several new service and pricing methods," Allen stated, "and we feel they are critical in the new competitive environment of our industry. An important new method approved was usage pricing, where customers in certain exchanges pay for local service based on how much they use it. Another important feature that will affect all customers is charging for directory assistance. After three free requests each month for local or intrastate directory assistance, customers will be charged 25 cents for each additional request. Also approved was charging for mobile telephone air time usage, and for time and materials involved in installation and repair functions. These new offerings are important in that they help establish the principle that customers pay for what they use," Allen continued, "and don't pay for what they don't use. The approval by the Commission of these new concepts will be more equitable for customers and make the adjustment to the changes in our industry easier for everyone," Allen concluded.

The basic increase for the majority of Continental's 135,000 Texas customers is approximately 75 cents per month for a one-party line. The Commission decision also equalized rates for Continental's recently acquired exchanges in Fabens, Ft. Hancock, Whitehouse, Maud, Redwater and Simms. These towns, formerly part of other companies, will realize an increase slightly higher than that above. A brochure detailing changes in rates and other pertinent information will be included in all customers' next billing statement.

Adult Programs Offered At PJC

Three programs for adults are offered through the Adult Basic Education Program at Paris Junior College, according to Janie Bonham, instructor. All programs are sponsored through the Texas Education Agency and are offered with no tuition and fees charged, Mrs. Bonham said.

For several years, PJC has offered the general education development (G.E.D.) classes for those interested in preparing for the test and receiving a high school equivalency certificate, the instructor explained. Also offered is preparation for the competency based high school diploma, which may be obtained by persons who hold a G.E.D. and are interested in going a step further.

PJC's newest program, which started this fall, is an adult reading program for improving reading skills, Mrs. Bonham said. Classes for adults are taught Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. or Monday through Wednesday from 6 to 8:30 p.m. in the Rheudasil Learning Center. Students are taught on an individual basis the skills required for the particular program of interest.

Assisting Mrs. Bonham with the adult education classes is Annie Sims of Paris. Students must be at least 16 years of age and must not be enrolled in high school, the instructor noted.

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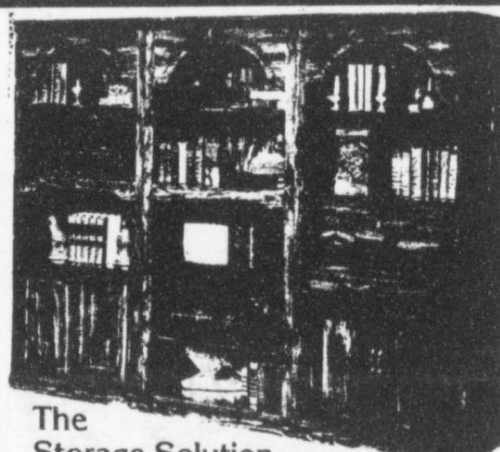


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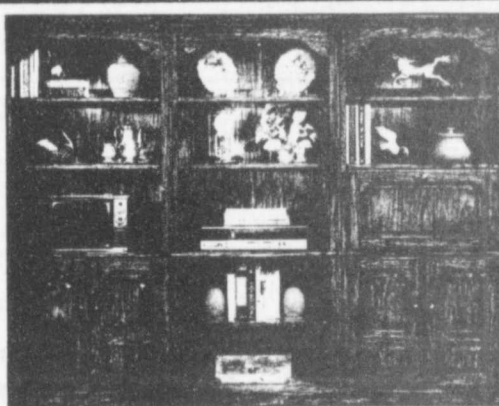

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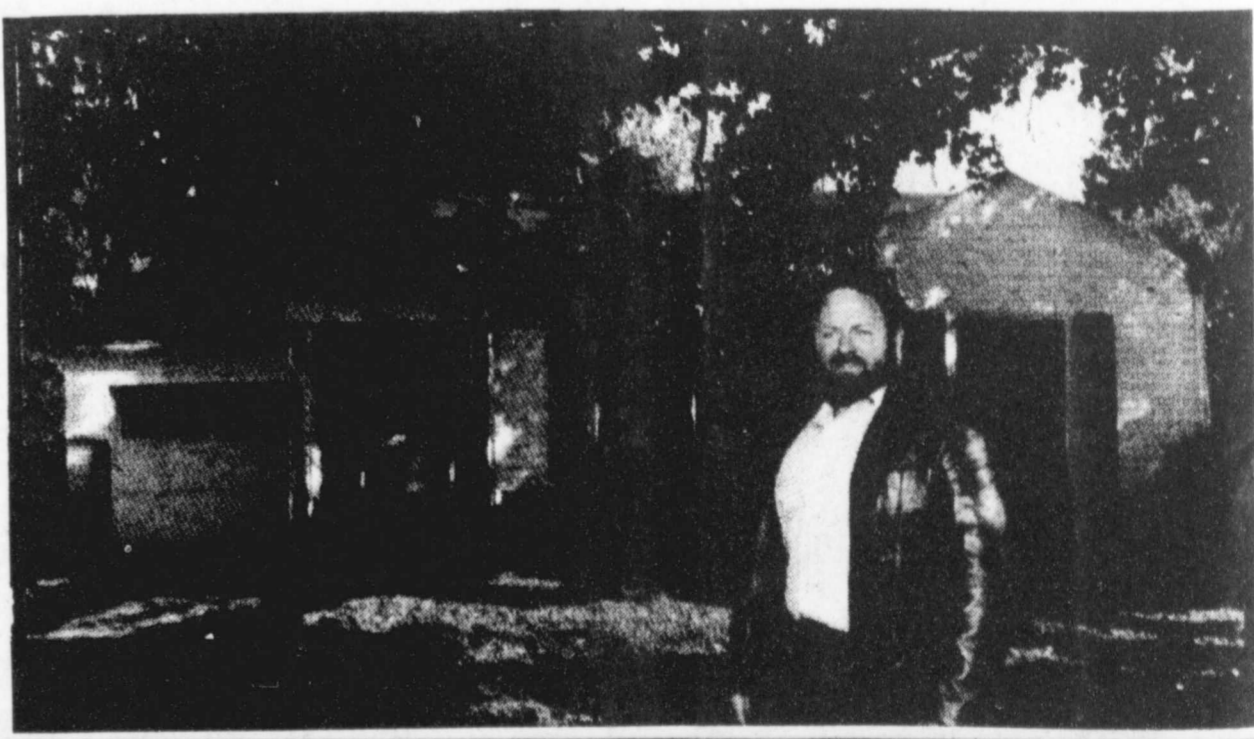
