

Patriots Open With Two Wins, One Loss

It's that time of year again. The 1983-84 edition of the Prairiland Varsity Boys basketball team is out. Head coach Dan Harris is expecting good things for his team in his first year at the helm.

Friday night the Patriots journeyed to Sulphur Springs for their second game of the season. Prairiland was coming off a 51-41 season opening victory over the Hugo Buffaloes.

bowed admirably to the Sulphur Springs Wildcats 69-68 in a game that was exciting from start to finish. The Patriot scoring attack was led by Rodney Harrell, Kalvin Williams, Scott Scudder, and Joe Smith with Harrell garnering 16 and the trio scoring 12 apiece.

Neither team could sustain a lead in the early going. The lead changed hands on numerous occasions. Jeff Griffin, who was plagued with foul trouble most of the game, picked up three fouls in the

first quarter. Patriots held a slim 17-16 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Wildcats would not allow the Patriots to pull away from them in the second quarter. With the Patriots ahead 36-35 with under a minute left in the half, two quick buckets gave them a 40-35 halftime advantage. The last two points came on a lay up from Scudder after a steal by Smith.

The Patriot margin diminished in the early part

of the third quarter. The Wildcats outscored the Patriots by five point in the quarter to deadlock the score at 50-50.

The fourth quarter proved the Patriots have plenty of character. Williams kept Prairiland close with two baseline jumpers for the first two buckets by the Patriots. The Wildcats peeled off nine straight points to hold a 65-54 lead with three minutes left.

A Patriot comeback was in order. Smith made a

driving lay up from the baseline and then stole the inbound pass and found Scudder for two more points. Two free throws apiece from Williams and Griffin added to a Todd Davis shot from the lane cut the Wildcat lead to 67-64 with thirty-eight seconds left. Williams stole a pass and Griffin made the shot while being fouled. The Patriots were down by one after the missed free throw. A tip in on a missed

free shot by the Wildcats gave them a three point lead with time running out. Williams added another corner shot for the last points of the game. A disappointed Patriot team came up one point short in what was a valiant effort.

Coach Harris was pleased with his team's effort. "We played really well for it to be so early in the season. We just need to keep on working on every part of our game. We showed improvement

since our game with Hugo." The Patriots will play Saltillo in the first round of the Rivercrest Tournament. Eric Stewart and Jerrod Bankhead helped the junior varsity to a 43-39 victory over Sulphur Springs with 16 and 12 points apiece.

Varsity boys won 88-54 over Tuesday night. Jeff Griffin made 17 points, Scott Scudder followed close behind with 13, and Joe Smith had 15 while Todd Davis racked up 12.

The Junior Varsity won 67-60 on Tuesday night. The Freshmen lost 59-56. Varsity girls defeated Cooper 52-38. Lee Ann Ballard was top scorer with 12 points, Tonya Burdine had 11.

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP

Be Prepared For Winter Emergencies

Until my husband retired a few months ago, we spent our whole married life living in a New York apartment building. We knew absolutely nothing about building maintenance. If a faucet dripped or a light bulb failed, we picked up the phone and someone came by to take care of it. We have just moved into our first home. It is in the Midwest, on a very beautiful small lake, but 15 miles from the nearest town. I understand we may be in for the worst winter in decades and it bothers me. There will be no one to call when something goes wrong with the plumbing, lighting or heating. My husband doesn't even know how to turn off the main water line. I wonder if it would help if we got some books on home maintenance from the library and read up on some of the things we know nothing about.

Do-it-yourself books are available at public libraries and book stores. Some are very detailed and clearly explained how many small problems around the home can be handled. Become acquainted with some of the professionals in the nearest town—plumbers, electricians, etc.—before an emergency arises. If your home is very old, you should have plumbing and wiring inspected before the severest weather arrives. The plumber can tell you whether or not you have pipes that should be insulated and how to shut off the water in the event of an emergency. The electrician should be consulted about the steps you need to take when a fuse is blown, the adequacy of your electrical system, etc. You will probably have to pay a service charge for the call, but it's a good investment. Another good investment would be supplemental sources of heat and light. Ask the professionals.

Siliconized acrylic caulk and polyurethane foam are popular sealants. Do they have universal or different uses? Siliconized acrylic caulk is resilient and best used for filling cracks and crevices. Polyurethane foam sealant is best used to fill deep cracks and holes and adheres better to moist surfaces. Caulk is best around kitchen and bathroom areas subject to water splashing, as it is more mildew resistant.

- 1/4 cup salted cashews or peanuts

Cook and stir celery, onion and green pepper in margarine in 10-inch skillet until onion is tender. Reserve 1/2 cup noodles. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into ungreased 1 1/2-quart casserole; sprinkle with reserved noodles. Cook uncovered in 350° oven until hot and bubbly, about 30 minutes.

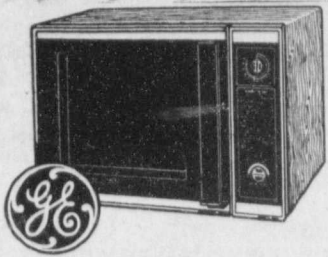
