

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
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POTATO BISCUITS

- ²/₃ cup Potato Buds® mashed potatoes (dry)
- 3/3 cup hot water 1/3 cup shortening or butter or margarine,
- softened 11/2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon baking powder
- ½ teaspoon salt 1/2 cup milk

Heat oven to 400°. Mix potatoes and hot water in bowl; let stand until water is absorbed. Mix in shortening. Mix dry ingredients; stir into potato mixture. Mix in milk. Turn dough onto well-floured board; knead 10 times. Roll or pat dough to 1/2-inch thickness; cut with 2-inch biscuit cutter or into desired shapes. Weekly **Briefs**

Wheat in some areas of East Texas is beginning to turn a yellow color, says Dr. Sim Reeves, Jr., agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. One or more of several major causes may be responsible for the yellowing.

The most obvious cause is nitrogen deficiency. If moisture has been plentiful and growth good, Reeves says the wheat could have used 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen already. The solution to this problem is to apply additional nitrogen.

A low soil pH will also cause wheat to yellow. Small grains are very sensitive to soil pH. A soil test is the accurate method of determining the pH level in the soil. If agricultural limestone is needed, it can

be applied now. Excessive water can also cause yellowing. This condition may cause an oxygen deficiency in the soil, thereby starving the plant of this vital element. Wheat planted on a well drained area will seldom have this problem unless heavier than normal rainfall is experienced.

Diseases or insects can cause yellowing if the infestation is heavy enough. Greenbugs, aphids and winter grain mites have shown up in some fields. Insect populations should be checked very carefully before applying insecticides.

Reeves says check the field thoroughly to determine the exact cause of yellowing before treating. Treat the cause and not the symptoms, he emphasizes.



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

Healthy Lawns

Should Start Now Many of us have been looking forward to the end of lawn chores. However, now is an excellent time to do a few things that will make our lawns healthier and more appealing in time to come.

Fertilizing in the fall can produce great benefits. We can prolong the green color of our lawns and help Bermuda and St. Augustine recover early in the spring. A dense turf will also be promoted which helps resist winter weed invasion. Fall fertilizer prepares the lawn for winter dormancy through the nutrients that

come from the fertilizer. Nitrogen is the key, and fertilizing with a nitrogenrich fertilizer in the fall will promote a good survival rate in the winter and an early recovery in the spring. A 3-1-2 ration of fertilizer is best. The first number represents the nitrogen, the second, potassium, and the third, phosphorus.

Examples of 3-1-2 fertilizers are 15-5-10 and 12-4-8. If you use a 15-5-10, you should apply between 7 and

14 pounds per 1,000 square feet of lawn. If you use a 12-4-8, the rate is 8-16 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

In newly developed yards, it's too late to plant a permanent lawn. To prevent tracking in mud and sand, you might consider planting cereal rye, wheat or oats to provide a soil stabilizing effect. In the spring, this can be turned under, and you can plant your permanent lawn.

If you don't care to look at your Bermuda or St. Augustine, you can overseed with the rye grass or wheat. The planting rate for rye grass is at least 5 pounds per 1,000 square feet. When your winter lawn reaches a height of about three inches, it's time to mow. Set your mower at a height of two

Overseeding and fall fertilization can be done at the same time. If you do overseed with a winter grass, another application of fertilizer six weeks later will be needed. This overseeded grass should slowly die out next spring with the return of warm weather, and the permanent summer grass

will take over. Your permanent lawn should continue to be mowed at the normal height until dormancy. Watering should also be continued as needed but slack off on the frequency to harden the turf for winter

For spring weed control, apply pre-emergent herbicides at the end of February and early March. Dacthal, balan or betasan are excellent herbicides for the control of warm season



Azaleas should remain attractive two to four weeks in your home, particularly if you will put them in a 60-65 degree spot each night. They just do not seem to prosper at normal room temperature.

Be careful to avoid drafty locations when you select a spot for your azalea, and again, be extremely careful of your watering practices. Most greenhouse azaleas are grown in virtually 100 percent peat moss, and it's fairly easy to goof on the watering. Florist azaleas are not particularly well adapted to our area, so you may want to discard the plant once it is finished flowering.
