"Economic emergency loans are designed for emergency loans will be farmers who are in a costprize squeeze or face county office located at 1745 another financial difficulty Ballard Drive, Paris, Texas, beyond their control," telephone 785-8408. Wishard said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood."

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981 and was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to farmers who are suffering an economic emergency through no fault of their own. They must show that hey have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA and that they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can be used to finance debts and related uses," Wishard said.

Wax buildup on wooden furniture may be removed by washing the surface with a sudsy mixture of a mild detergent and water. Use a clean, soft cloth from which most of the water has been wrung out. Work fast-wash, rinse and dry a small area at a time. Don't wash furniture more than once a year.
