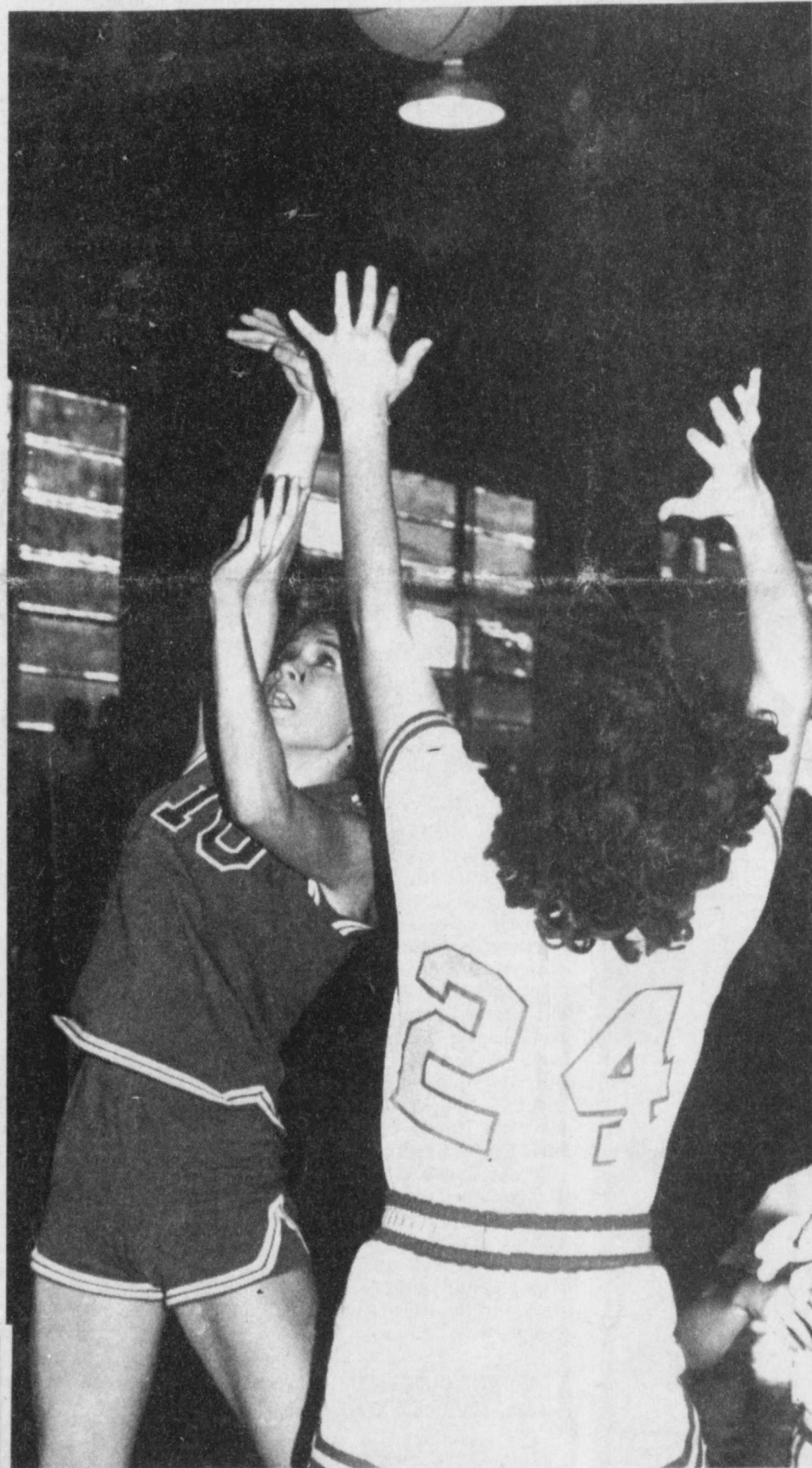

Cold Weather Creates Special Problem In Cattle

By Paul D. Payne
Providing water for the livestock during the past 10 days has been a major chore for area cattle producers. It has been many winters since ponds and streams have frozen as solid and deep as during the present stage.

Many ponds were low and this only complicated matters as the water was frozen to the bottom around the edges of these small ponds. The ice on these ponds is frozen to a depth of seven to eight inches.

An abundance of warm water is needed by the dairy cow before top production can be expected. Dairymen should consider the installation of a tank heater in their water tanks in light of the current weather. It appears to me that this would be an economical management expense. A high producing dairy cow can consume up to 300 pounds of water per day. The thumb rule is one gallon of water per gallon of milk.

The recent weather may not have been the most ideal for horseflies, but cattle lice seem to thrive. It has been estimated that cattle lice cost the cattlemen \$100 million annually.

Lice normally begin to reproduce rapidly in cold weather and reach their peak in late winter and early spring. There are a few animals in each herd who

seem to be infested greater each year. They spread from one animal to another and this takes place when animals bunch up.

The heavy hair coats also afford protection for the parasites and allow for increased reproduction.

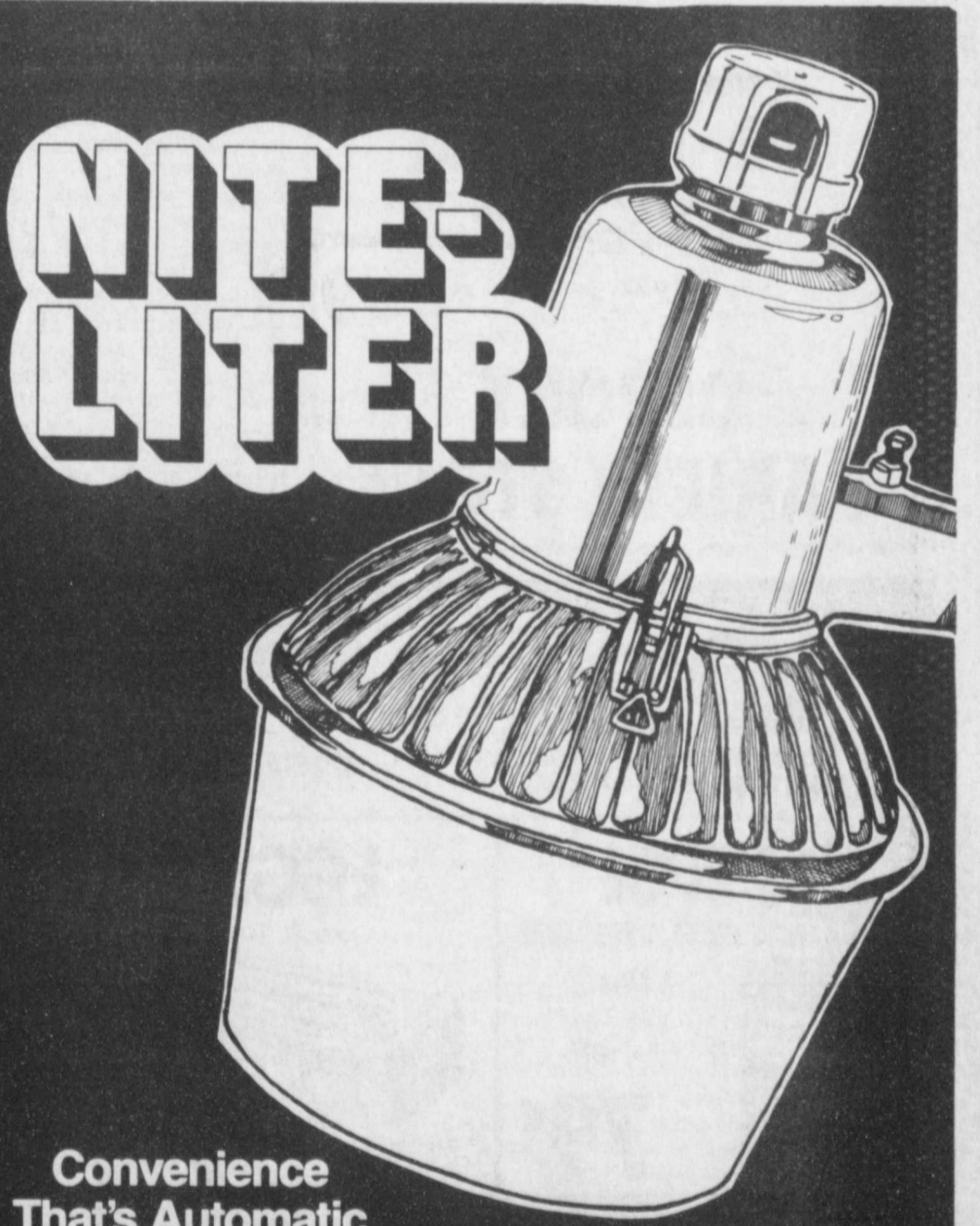
Insecticide control of lice is not difficult to achieve but there are some problems. Most will not kill eggs; therefore, retreatment is required in two to three weeks to prevent another buildup.

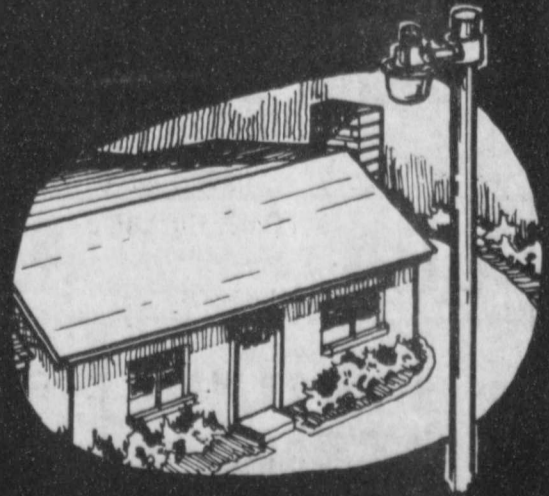

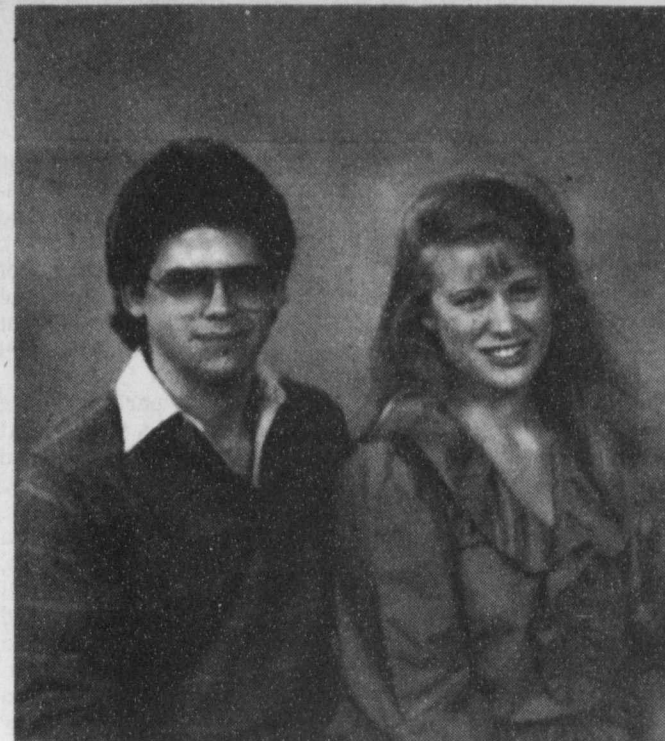

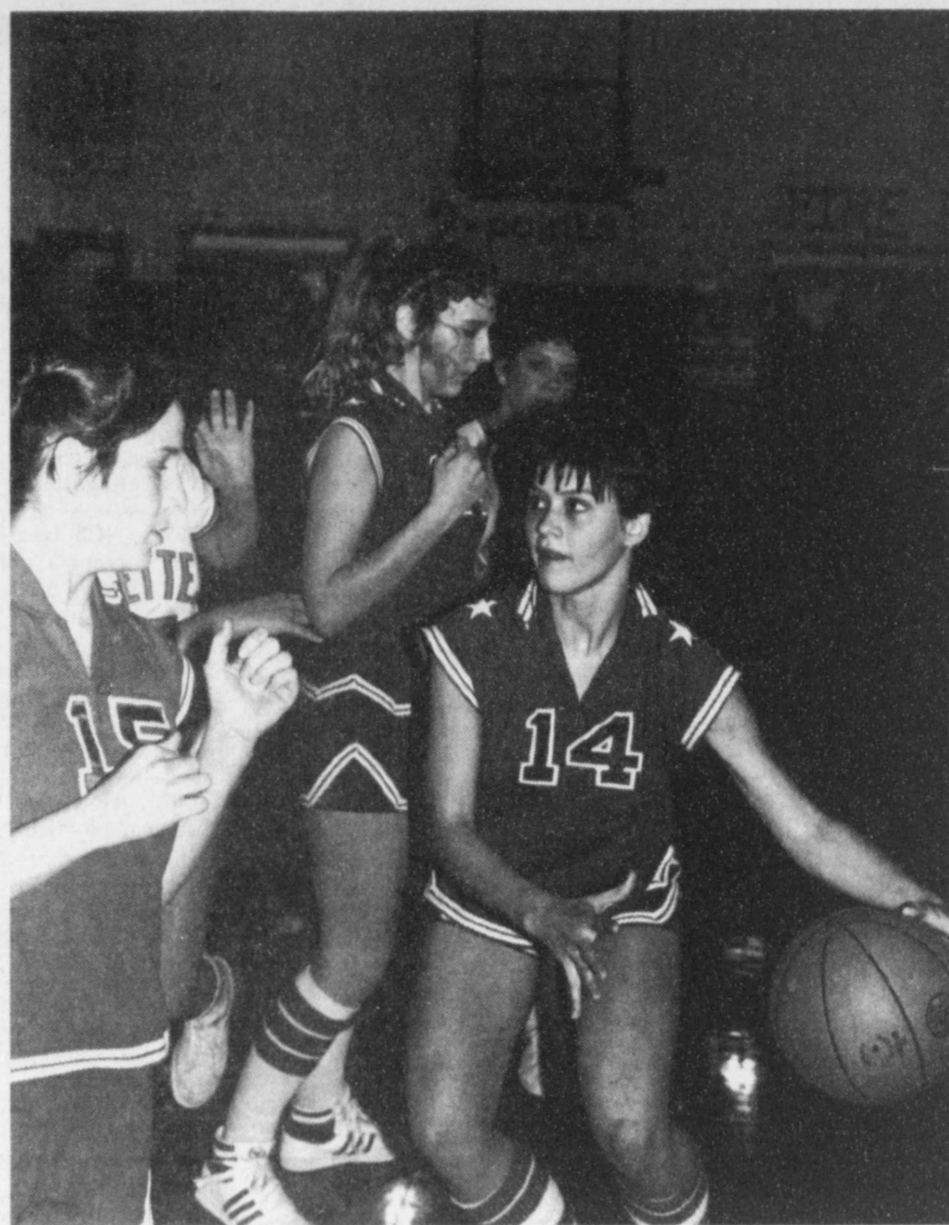

One of the world's most isolated big cities, Western Australia's Perth is closer to Indonesia's capital across the Indian Ocean than it is to Australia's own capital, Canberra. Isolation stunted Perth's growth for decades, but it now counts nearly a million people, National Geographic says.
