

# Patriots Thrash Pittsburg Pirates 63 - 41

After a loss earlier in the week to West Lamar, Dan Harris' Prairiland Patriots needed to convince themselves that they were capable of hanging with the big boys of 13-AAA. Following the Patriots' 63-41 thrashing of the Pittsburg Pirates, there should be no questions in anyone's mind. Joe Smith and Jeff Griffin energized the Prairiland attack with 32 and 17 points. Smith was invincible as he had the Pirates defense eating out of his hands. Prairiland scored to 12-6 after they wrapped up their district opening game with

Pittsburg. Pittsburg jumped out to an early 6-0 lead in the first quarter, but Harris said there was no cause for alarm. "When it's that early in the game, there is no need to panic," Harris stated. The Pats got back in the game as two free throws from Scott Scudder tied the game at 8-all. Pittsburg, though, still managed to take a 12-10 lead at the end of the quarter. Smith was sharp in the second quarter as he shucked Pirate defenders for the first six Patriots points of the quarter. With the game tied at 20-all, Griffin drove the length of

the floor and was hammered after a successful lay up. This gave the Patriots a three point lead with 1:52 left in the first half. A reverse lay up by Smith gave the Pats a 27-20 half time lead, much to the delight of the partisan crowd. Smith was on top of his game in the third quarter as well. The Pirates recovered from an eleven point deficit with six points to trim the lead to 33-28. But Smith unveiled some more of his round-ball magic with eight more points to give Prairiland a commanding 41-28 lead. The Pats knew they had it

in the bag when Mike Connot and Griffin added buckets to give the Patriots a sixteen point lead early in the final quarter. Lay ups by Smith and Griffin gave the Pats a 53-33 advantage with four minutes left. The Pirates showed signs of knocking on the door when they closed the gap to 55-41. But Prairiland put that idea to rest when they ended the game with an eight point scoring streak. Smith had six of the eight and Heath Kennedy added an inside basket. The Lady Patriots were not as fortunate in their contest with the Lady



The Lady Pirates were ranked No. 5 in the state, so there was no reason for the Patriot feds to be embarrassed. In fact, the Lady Pats had a good chance of winning up until the last two minutes. Coach Ronnie Baker said his team just got off to a slow start. "We beat them in the second half. But we got off to a slow start in the first half and missed some good shots," Baker added. "They kind of intimidated us on defense."

Coach Baker hit it on the head when he mentioned a slow start as the Pat feds scored only two points in the first quarter. Pittsburg led at the end of the first quarter 8-2. Prairiland had different people score as they did considerably better with eleven points in the second quarter. But Pittsburg was still able to widen the gap and take a 23-13 halftime lead. Tonya Burdine's shot from the twilight zone and Vicki Bridges' shot after a stolen inbound pass, cut the Pitt lead to 27-19. Pittsburg, however, got those four

points back to lead 31-19 at the end of the quarter. In the fourth quarter, there seemed to be no stopping Prairiland as they scored nine unanswered points. Burdine started it off and Tiffany Morgan, Lee Ann Ballard and Bridges all contributed. Another shot by Burdine brought the Patriot feds within five at the 2:19 mark. Burdine then made a steal and appeared to have an easy bucket. But her shot was blocked and the Lady Pats could not recover. The loss lowered Prairiland's record to 13-7

and 2-1 in 13-AAA action. Both Prairiland teams play at Clarksville on Thursday. In the first game Friday night, the Prairiland Junior Varsity boys dropped a 47-40 decision to the Pirates. Kyle Martin scored 10, Aubrey Allen led the team with 11 points. Burdine, Bridges and Kim House all scored six points for the Lady Patriots.

## County Awarded Road Money

Lamar County Judge Brady Fisher has announced that Lamar County has received approval of the county's 1983 Community Development Block Grant application for specified road and drainage improvements in low income areas. Fisher received the notice in a letter from Governor Mark White. The grant is funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development through the Texas Department of Community Affairs. It is in the amount

of \$314,450. Fisher stated the CDBG funding was very competitive. There were twenty-four competing applications in the northeast Texas area, and only five received full funding this year. Fisher noted that this was one of the county's top priorities, because the needs were great, and the funding was 100 percent. The grant will be used to pave roads and construct storm drainage ditches in designated low income areas. Fisher expressed special appreciation to all of the

people involved in the county's efforts, especially; the Lamar County Commissioner's Court, for their continued interest in and support of the project; Depart Mayor Charles Foster and the Depart City Council, who cooperated in including a Depart project as part of the county's project, rather than submitting a competing application; Hayter Engineering, who assisted in the preparation of the application; and the Ark-Tex Council of Governments staff, who provided valuable technical assistance.

For business, the same officers were re-elected for another year and members paid their dues and meetings were assigned for the new year.


The program was led by the hostess, the subject being "Voice of the Coun-

**Good News For Taxpayers**

The Short Form 1040A is a little longer, the Internal Revenue Service officials say that will be good news for many taxpayers.

The 1983 version of the 1040A has added five lines and a schedule which may be attached if needed.

According to the IRS, the new short form becomes a more versatile tax return that will save time and reduce errors for the taxpayers who can use it.

For example, taxpayers claiming the child care credit can now use the 1040A

instead of filing the longer Form 1040 and separate schedule that were previously required. Likewise, taxpayers claiming Individual Retirement Arrangement deductions can use the short form.

According to IRS officials, the new 1040A should reduce refund delays caused by errors as well as save time for those who use it. One reason for this is that many taxpayers who previously had to use the 68-line long form can now do the same job with the 1040A. This not only saves the time of reading through the nonapplicable lines of the 1040 but also reduces the chance of errors caused by wrong line entries.

Taxpayers who filed Form 1040A or 1040EZ last year will automatically receive the same forms in the mail. Other taxpayers can request the 1040A or 1040EZ through the Federal Tax Information number listed in the phone book under U.S. Government.

**Weekly Agricultural Briefs**

If insects can be killed by cold weather, then the recent cold spell should be one of the best presents that Red River Valley agriculturists could receive. Can you imagine a spring without heel flies and face flies tormenting cattle, lice on turnip greens, chinch bugs on lawns, borers in trees and midge on grain sorghum?

That is a nice thought, but do not get your hopes up too high. It is a safe assumption that the hard freeze did reduce insect numbers since the soil was frozen from eight to ten inches. If the December cold spell did not reduce insects, then forget about cold weather affecting insect populations in the future. However, we will have to wait and see.

Another area where it is too early to tell about freeze damage is ornamentals. We have been receiving numerous calls about ornamentals, but the plant that most are concerned with is the Waxleaf Ligustrum. This plant

normally fairs very well out of doors, but most plants located on the north side of buildings are chocolate brown. Just how much of these plants are damaged is undeterminable at the present time.

Do not prune any of these damaged plants at this time. Wait until growth begins in the spring, as the freeze damage may not be as extensive as anticipated. You may want to take a sharp knife to a few of the shoots and limbs to see if there is green.

We do not anticipate severe freeze damage to Pottsboro shrubs as they have frozen out at least two other times in the past ten

years. We want to re-emphasize that no pruning be done at this time.

We are fearful that we may have lost stands of St. Augustine turfs. The only factor which could have prevented this from happening is the snow blanket on the ground.

There is one thing that can be learned from the cold spell and that is the cold tolerance of various plants. Look around you and note the affects of the cold. You might want to stop by the county wheat variety demonstration planting on the Trent Jones farm located west of Paris High School. In short, let us learn of your situation.





HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

#### YOUR WILL

If you feel smug about the fact that you have finally made your will (or have updated it), pause for a moment. You probably failed to tie up all the loose ends.

Does your will contain a list of ALL your personal property? Is there a safe deposit box somewhere? A savings or checking account that is known only to you? Do you have stocks and bonds stashed away in some hiding place?

While your will may be quite adequate to spell out your wishes, it may need to be supplemented with a letter of last instruction. If they are not together, this letter should give the location of your will, the name and address of your estate executor and family religious leader, location of safe deposit boxes and keys, bank accounts, father's name and mother's maiden name (for the death certi-

cate), personal property, proof of ownership of cars, etc.

Chances are your executor will not be familiar with all the people with whom you do business. List them all—including physician, attorney, insurance agent, accountant, employer(s). List the names of the people to whom you owe money, amount owed, and any monies due you from whatever sources.

You can be more specific in a letter of last instruction in regard to funeral and burial instructions, names and addresses of those you wish to be notified, any pre-arrangements you may have made. The letter will help assure that everything is done the way you want it to be done.

The letter of last instruction is not a legal document. It does not replace a will; it supplements it, providing helpful guidance to those who must see that your wishes are fulfilled.


### Judge Fisher Speaks To Optimists


